The Greyhounds chalked up 129 first downs to their opponents 96.

At noon Governor-elect Connally and Lieutenant Governor- years later, totalled 448. elect Preston Smith will be "sworn in" in a ceremony supervised by the State Senate and House of Representatives.

Inaugural parade, following a ceremony, is expected to be one of the largest ever held in Austin. High school bands from all over the state are accepting Connally s invitation to participate. Many out-of-town floats also will participate. Also taking part will be the U. S. Navy, with a salute to its former secretary, John Connally.

The Capitol and all state buildings on its grounds will be illuminated that evening. All Texans will be invited to greet their new chief executive and other elected state officials and enjoy refreshments and entertainment in the Capitol.

This gala evening event is a brand new inovation.
