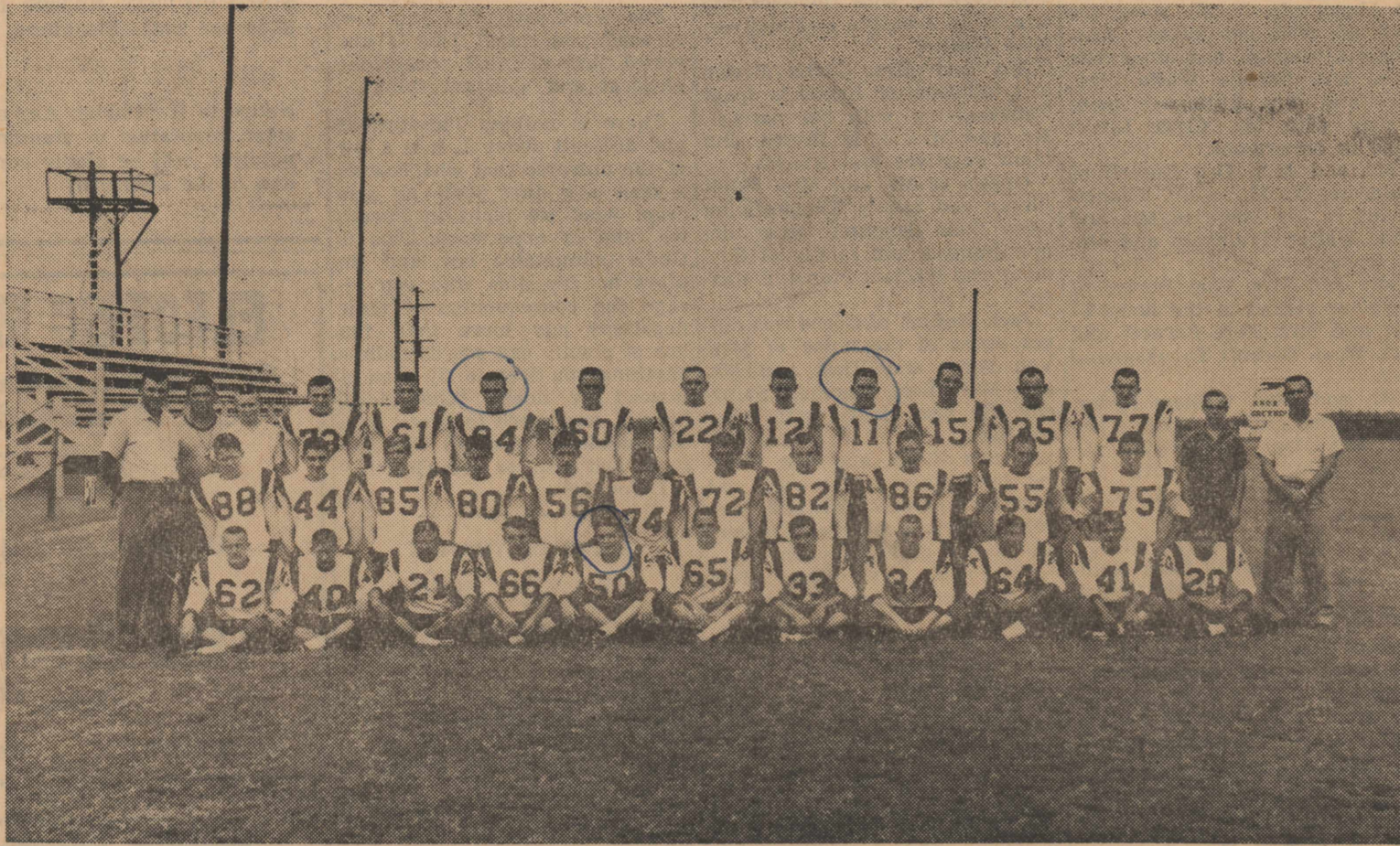

HOUNDS ROMP OVER BULLDOGS FOR BI-DIST.

The Knox City Greyhounds went roaring through to win the Bi-District championship by defeating the Loraine Bulldogs 39-8 last Thursday night in Hamlin.

Eddie Williams hit paydirt first for the Greyhounds with a 77-yard run early in the first quarter. Williams took a pitch-out from Brack Shaver, cut inside left end near the line of scrimmage and into the Bulldog secondary. He was all alone the final 50 yards.

Knox City's second score came following a Bulldog fumble.

Charlie Bateman crossed the goal line in two attempts. Freddie Smith kicked the extra point.

Another Loraine fumble set up the third counter for the Greyhounds. Williams passed to Jimmy Reyes 10 yards to the one and Shaver crossed the stripe to bring the score to 19-0.

Forty seconds before half-time Shaver passed 20 yards to Williams for another TD and Smith again added the extra point.

The Greyhounds marched 70 yards in nine plays the first time they had the ball in the second half to add another 6 points. The score was made by Ken Cornett following a 16-yard pass from Shaver.

Laval Verhalen, son of Mr. and Mrs. M. L. Verhalen of Knox City, was the high point individual in the collegiate crops judging contest at the International Livestock Exposition in Chicago Sunday.

Laval, one of a team of four students from Texas Tech who set a new national record of 5365 points out of a possible 5400 at the National Crop Judging contest at Kansas City recently, scored 1,788 points out of a possible 1,800 at Chicago to win the highest honors at the International Exposition.

In the college standings, Texas Tech set a new international record at Chicago with a 5,322.8 points out of a possible 5,400.

The Greyhounds last score came when Phil Williams hit paydirt on a plunge over the center of the Loraine line.

Williams carried the ball 13 times for 120 yards and a 9.2 average. Bateman carried 12 times for 43 yards and 3.6 average. Johnny Montandon picked up 18 yards in 7 tries for 2.6 average while Shaver carried twice for three yards.

Williams completed 3 of 3 pass attempts for 44 yards and Shaver completed 5 of 7 tries for 79 yards and two touchdowns. Phil Williams completed 1 pass for 8 yards.

Shaver and Montandon made the highest grades for the backfield according to the films while Jackie Acosta was top lineman, Coaches Darland and Hines reported.
