As for the Rest Home, the men, six local gents, who are pushing the thing through, will be ready to announce the full particulars in the very near future.

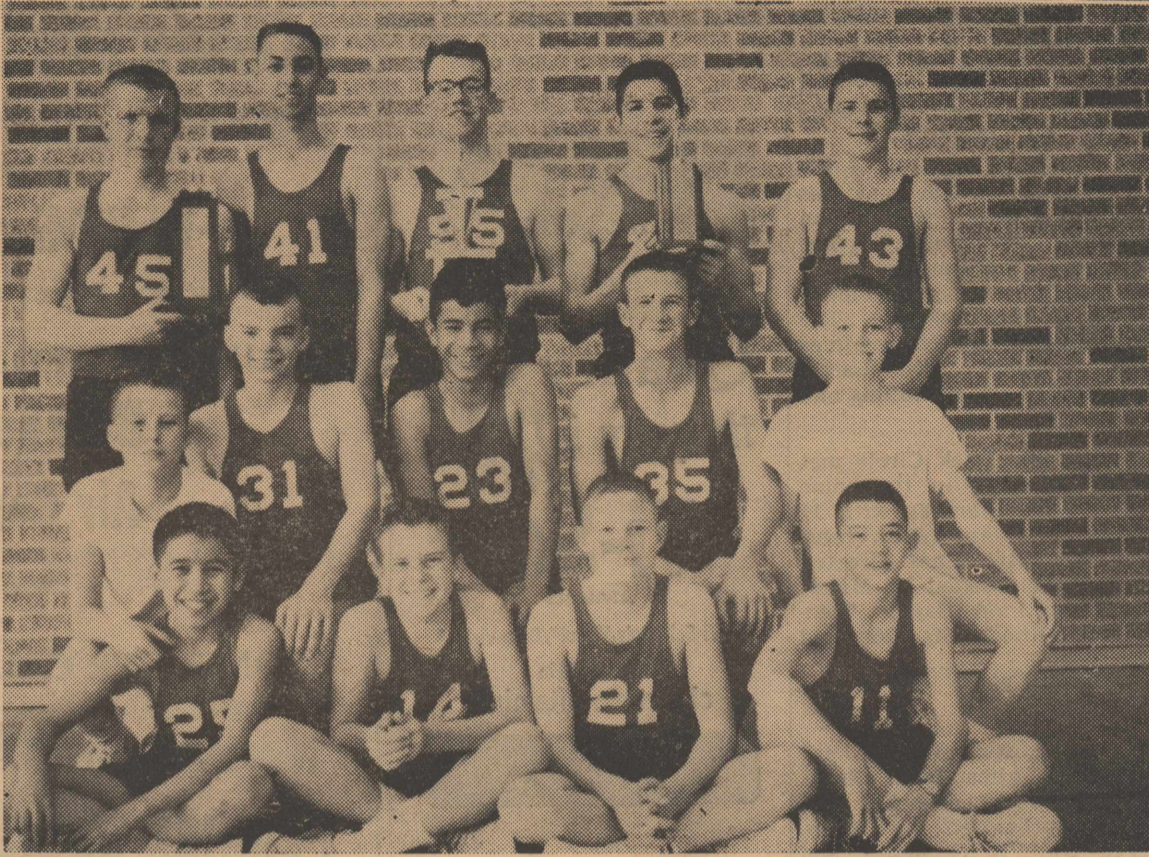
Although one wouldn't believe it, there are jillions of contractors after these and other bids that will be up shortly, and the ones responsible don't want to be bothered any more than they already are.

Sue Bankston sank 29 points to lead Knox City's girls to a 45-36 victory with Jean Manning hitting 15 for O'Brien.

Heart Fund To Open Feb. 24

Knox City's 1963 Heart Fund campaign will officially open Sunday afternoon Feb. 24, at 2 p.m. with a residential area drive by members of the 1946 Study Club, followed by a downtown area drive by teenage workers Monday afternoon Feb. 25, community chairman Paul Hoge announced.

"Heart attack alone was responsible for more than 490,000 deaths in the United States last year. Stroke caused another 190,000 deaths in addition to disabling hundreds of thousands, E. Hob Smith, county heart fund chairman, said.

Research, education and community service are the heart association's major weapons in fighting these diseases, the nations number one health enemy, Smith said.

Other communities in the county will begin their fund drives Monday and will be under the direction of Mrs. A. B. Martin Jr., Gilliland; Mrs. C. J. Albus, Rhineland; Mrs. Collins Moorhouse, Benjamin; Mrs. Orb Coffman, Gore; and Mrs. Edmund Tomanek, Truscott. Other heart fund officials are Dr. C. G. Markward, Knox City, president; Dr. David Eiland, Munday, vice president; Mrs. E. R. Carpenter, Knox City, secretary; Charles Baker, Munday, treasurer, and E. A. Youngblood, Knox City, community service chairman.

Integration Discussed By School Trustees

Approximately 30 of Knox City's leading citizens and pastors attended a called school board meeting Monday night at the High School to discuss integration of the Knox City schools.

Six of the seven school board members were present for the meeting. They were:

John Crownover, Alton Fitzgerald, Sam Clonts, Clyde Voss, Joe Roy Smith and Clifford Cornett. Lloyd Waldrup was absent.

John Crownover started the meeting by asking Rev. Jarrell Sharp to say a prayer.

Crownover said the board was faced with a problem that needed the help of the entire community and that the men were called to attend the meeting to give their recommendation to the board on the best way to conduct the issue.

Supt. of Schools E. A. Youngblood was asked to give a report on the conditions at McGee Ward School.

Teachers salaries are \$13,621 per year; teaching supplies, approximately \$25; tuition to Munday, \$732; transportation expenses \$1,626; operation expenses \$520; and administration \$2,109. Total expenditures \$18,633.

Youngblood pointed out that tuition to Munday fluctuates as there are six to twelve attending, and that mileage was calculated at 12 cents a mile, which has proved too low, and that operation expenses included a janitor, gas, water and electricity.

At present there are 50 students enrolled at McGee Ward

with 15 of this number being students from O'Brien.

Youngblood said 35 Knox City children attended McGee Ward and six attended Munday High School. This makes a total of 41 Knox City children in school.

These can be taught in our white schools for a savings of approximately \$11,000 the superintendent said.

The board made it plain that it was their opinion that integration was only a short time away and that it was a good idea in their opinion to bring all the facts and figures before the public and to let them decide what to do by way of voting.

In order to call an election the law requires that 20 per cent of the eligible voters (poll tax payers) sign a petition to call for an election.

There are 430 registered voters here.

A question and answer session was held.

Question — If it comes to a vote and is voted down will it affect our state aid.

Answer — No unless O'Brien had an election at the same time and voted to integrate their school system.

If voted on how long before another election could be held?

Answer — Two years.

Question — Why doesn't the school board integrate without an election?

Answer — The Texas legislature has ruled that if a school is integrated without an election it would lose state support.

The Attorney General has issued an opinion that this was unconstitutional. Dallas and Abilene have integrated without a vote of the people.

The board said they were afraid first of losing state aid if they integrated the schools and second they said they believed the decision should rest with the people and not them.

All those present who voiced an opinion were in agreement that something had to be done with the colored school and that integration was bound to come about in the near future.

"It would be far better for us to integrate now than to have to do it later on," was one speaker's opinion.

The board said the approximate \$20,000 expenditure each year wasn't including what the school system would be out if the colored school building was fixed up to state requirements.

One of the pastors present asked if the colored people had been approached on their views concerning integration and was told that this was the first such meeting held but that they were going to meet with leaders of the colored group to hear their views on the subject.

Petitions were made available at the close of the meeting and a number of voters signed them before they left the school.

Zane Branham of Vernon has purchased Stephens Chevrolet and the dealership will be known as Branham Chevrolet Co., it was announced last week.

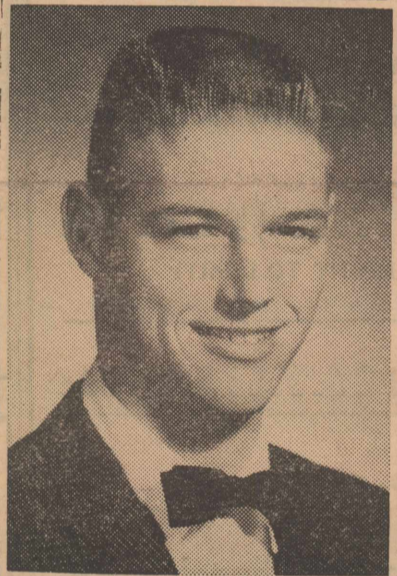
The company consists of Zane and his father E. T. Branham. Zane, his wife Terry and their two daughters have moved to Knox City to manage the new company.

W. H. Dutton Services Held Monday, Feb. 18

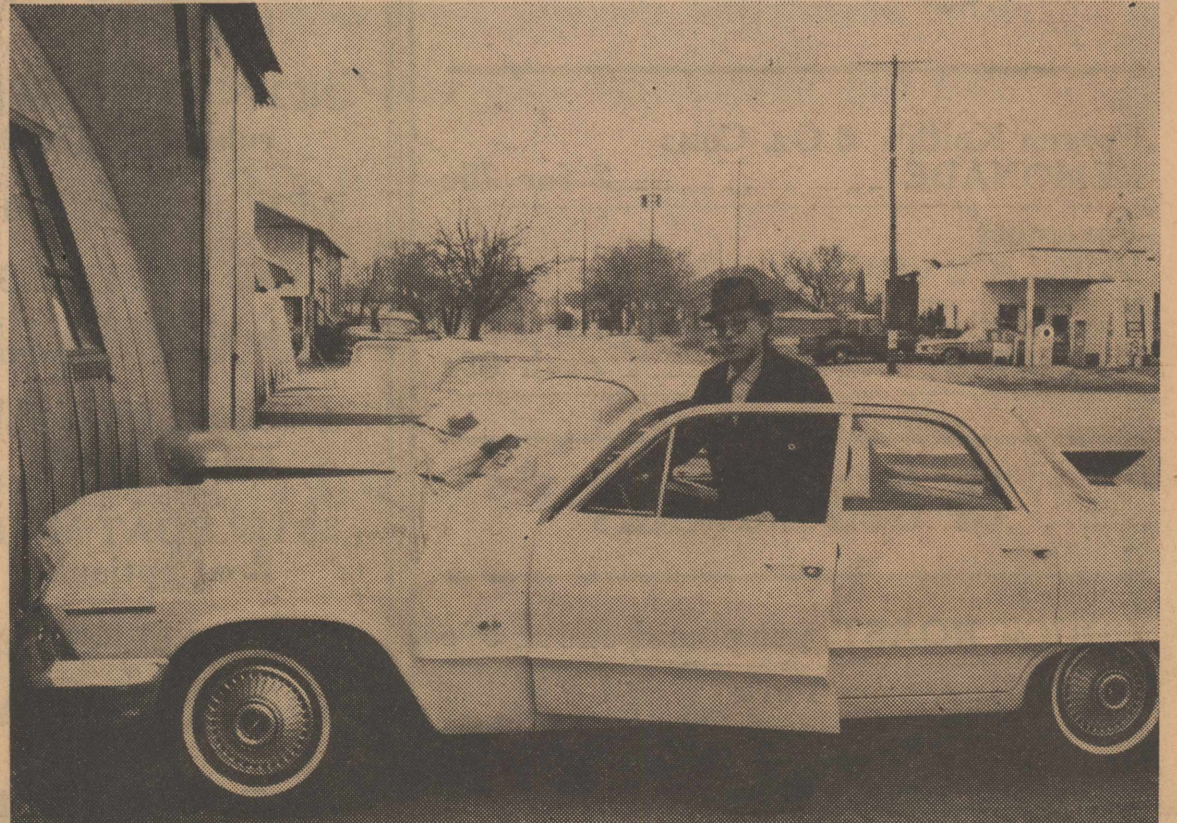

whether or not to participate.

I would like to let these significant changes. A direct price support payment of 18 cents per bushel on corn, 14 cents on barley and 29 cents per hundredweight on grain sorghum has been added.

This amount to be paid participating farmers on the normal yield of their seeded acreage. For the first time, a farmer receives this payment even if he feeds his grain. Secondly, rates of payment on diverted acres have been reduced to 20 percent of the value of a normal crop on the first 20 percent diverted and to 50 percent of the value on all or any part of the second 20 percent diverted.

Thirdly, price support loans will be available to participating farmers on total yield this year instead of only normal yield as in the past. Fourthly, the grazing period for diverted acres has been set in advance.

Diverted acres may be grazed until May 1 and again after November 1. Fifthly, after the sign-up period has ended on March 22, there can be no reduction in diversion without losing all price support benefits.

The change in compliance regulations makes it all the more important for a feed grain producer to make his decision before March 22 since he can change his intentions until that date.

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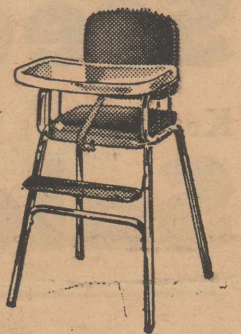
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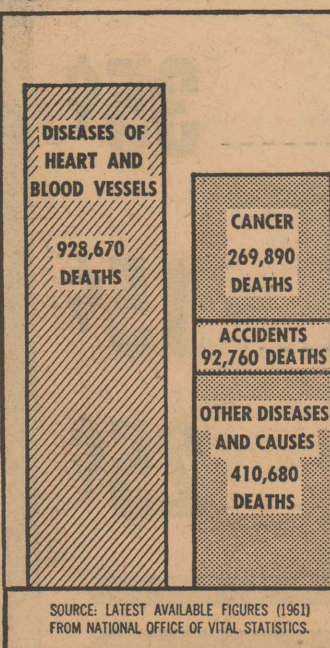
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
