USDA Announces Price Support Reseal Program

The U. S. Department of Agriculture has announced a reseal program under which farmers can continue price support loans on farm-stored grains. In Texas, reseal loans for one year will be available to producers on 1961-crop grain sorghum and oats and on 1962 crop grain sorghum, oats, and wheat.

Resealed loans on 1961-crop wheat will run for another year under the two-year program announced in 1962.

Storage payments, which will be announced later, are to be made to producers on grain under resale. If a farmer redeems his resale grain prior to the maturity date, his storage payment will be prorated.

FARM and RANCH Notes

The 4-H rifle contest will be held Saturday, March 30, on the north side of the Brazos River north of Rhineland. Contestants must furnish their own rifles and ammunition. Rifles must be brought to the contests with bolts open and kept open except when on the firing line. The 4-H tractor contest will be held the same morning at 10:30 a.m. at Knox Prairie Seed in Munday. The method demonstration contest will be at 1:30 in the lunchroom of the Munday Grade School.

Demonstration using plastic mulch for the growing of vegetables will be conducted by Herb Partridge and James Smith this year. Herb used this method last year and it showed great promise until wiped out by hail. The black polyethylene film is rolled out and covered in one operation by a machine hooked to a tractor. The film serves as a mulch and holds the soil moisture in while completely stopping the weed growth. The cost is prohibitive except on a high income potential crop such as vegetables. Herb was harvesting squash from plants in plastic nine days ahead of the check plot on bare ground.

Are you planning to enter the Knox County Vegetable Festival. There will be divisions for Fresh Vegetables, fresh fruit, canned foods, baked foods and flowers. It will be held Saturday, June 22 in Munday.

Leptospirosis, commonly known as "lepto," is a disease which livestock producers should watch for during this season. It causes losses of more than a \$100 million to cattle owners annually in the nation. Swine, sheep and horse losses add more millions to the total and humans are susceptible.

Lepto now exists on farms in every part of the state and because it can cause abortions, is often confused with brucellosis. The peak danger period is at hand since most cases occur during and following warm, wet weather. In areas of slow moving streams or swampy and low-lying pastures, stockmen should be especially alert. "Carrier" animals can continue such areas and spread the disease to other animals on the farm or to those on farms downstream.

In cattle, lepto can cause a death rate of up to 10 per cent, in calves up to 25 percent, in addition to abortions and a sharp drop in milk production. It is hard to diagnose in mature cattle. In addition to abortions and a drop in milk output, it may cause the milk to become thick, yellow and blood-tinged. Calves may become depressed, lose appetite and develop diarrhea.

Symptoms in swine may be overlooked because they are not as apparent as in cattle.

Because of the chance of confusing it with something else, a veterinarian should be called when symptoms appear in any animals. He may have to resort to rather complex laboratory tests to identify the cause of the trouble. If the diagnosis is positive, he will make recommendations for handling the situation. Vaccines are available for cattle and swine but must be properly used to provide protection.
