I see by the papers where the Defense Department has final give out some figgers on them Chinese feathers we been stockpiling. 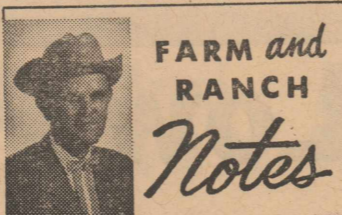
this will bring the 1962 supply down to around 9 million pounds.

Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman announced the following actions for the 1964 wheat crop as follows:

1. Set May 21 as the date for a referendum on the 1964 wheat program.
2. Established wheat support prices at \$2.00 per bushel national average for certificated wheat and \$1.30 per bushel for non-certificated wheat if the referendum carries.
3. Set the national marketing quota at 1,220,000,000 bushels and the national acreage allotment for 1964 at 49,500,000 acres — the same as in 1962.
4. Determine a wheat marketing allocation for certificated wheat of 975,000,000 bushels, 80 per cent of the national marketing quota. Individual producers will receive marketing certificates for 80 per cent of the normal production on their acreage allotments.

5. Announced State acreage allotments based on the national allotment.

6. Set diversion payment rates on wheat acreage put to conserving uses.

7. Announced there will be no noncommercial wheat-producing states designated under the 1964 program.

Who may vote in the wheat referendum?

First, let us consider qualifications for voting in the referendum. Any producer who has a farm acreage allotment will be eligible to vote except those with an acreage allotment of less than fifteen acres. In Texas, both the husband and wife are eligible to vote if the allotment is on community property. If the county committee has determined that both husband and wife are responsible under a verbal lease, both are eligible to vote. Both the landowner and tenant may vote if the landowner receives a share of the wheat crop in payment for use of the land. Individual members of a partnership will each have a vote. A person may vote as a representative of an organization, as an administrator, or executor of an estate, or as a trustee or guardian.

If the small farmer wishes to

be eligible to vote in the referendum, for price support, and land diversion payments, he must so indicate in writing at least seven days prior to balloting. With such a choice, he must comply with the provisions of the program and his acreage allotment will be the larger of (1) the small farm base acreage reduced by approximately 10 per cent, or (2) the acreage allotment determined in the same manner as the allotments on larger farms.

If the producer does not desire to participate in the program, his allotment will be the larger of (1) the small-farm base acreage or (2) the acreage allotment for the farm. More on the wheat program will be given at a later time.

The 4-H members will report to their respective contests in the morning. There will not be a general assembly in the morning. At 2 p.m. all will gather in the auditorium for the announcements of the winners. Thirteen seniors and eight juniors are scheduled to go from Knox County.

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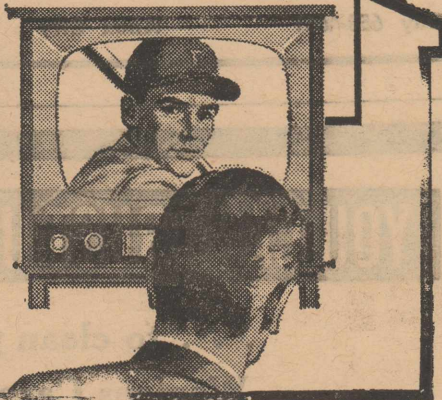
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STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN—A complete overhaul of the election code is due. Senate already has passed a bill correcting scores of errors in the old law, which was overhauled in haste in 1951.

House members amended the bill to eliminate the "agent form" of paying poll taxes. Instead, prospective voters would have to go to the court house or get a deputy tax collector to certify qualification to vote.

House also refused to require county tax assessors to name civic workers as deputies.

Progress is slow on the proposals to abolish the poll tax as a prerequisite to voting.

Sentors passed a proposed constitutional amendment to let the people say whether they want to keep the poll tax. But after some delay, a House committee put it in subcommittee.

Meanwhile, the national constitutional amendment to outlaw the poll tax in election of President Vice President, Sentors and Congressman has been ratified by 30 states. When eight more ratify it use of poll tax in Texas would be out the window.

Sen. Abraham Kazen Jr. of Laredo envisions the possibility that the 1964 election could be held with state officers elected by poll tax holders, federal officials by everybody.

SHORTEST SESSION? — A modern-day record for short legislative sessions may be set if Lt. Gov. Preston Smith and Speaker Byron Tunnell can get legislators to wind up their business by May 7.

"People in the employment field tell me that the hard core of unemployment now is composed of drop-outs from 20 to 30 years ago," Sumner stated.

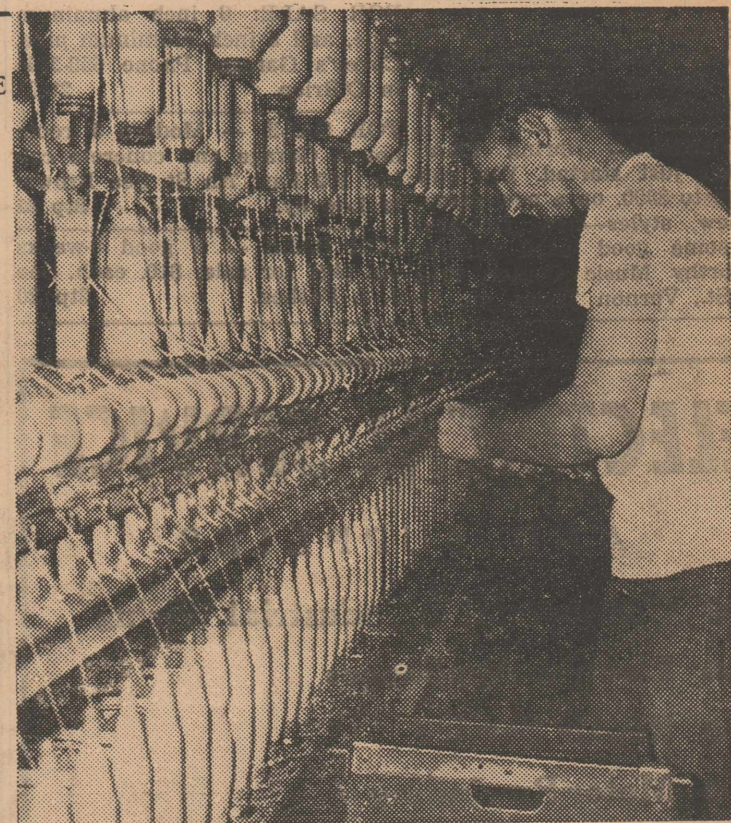
