## O'Brien Goes To State Meet Ten Years In A Row

Knox City is one of the most sport-conscious towns in the area, but O'Brien has made its name known far and wide by first, being very small, and second by being at the state track and field meet in Austin every year for the past ten.

As one reporter said, O'Brien hasn't let competitors there (at Austin) forget, by inches, feet, yards, and tenths of seconds, that it's very much on the sports map.

Though O'Brien has never had more than 41 students and on occasion has had as few as 25, for the past ten years the Bulldogs have sent at least one and sometimes more boys to the state meet.

This year O'Brien had both relay teams and their one man squad of Jimmy Johnston represented at Austin.

Jimmy Johnston qualified for the meet in broad jump, pole vault and 440-yard dash.

He placed third in the 440 and second in the mile relay.

The O'Brien to Austin routine began in 1954 when Billy Denton won first place with a high jump of 6 feet 1 1/2 inches.

Hershel Force took the honors to Austin for the next three seasons placing second at 12-0 in the pole vault, setting a state record of 12-8 as a junior and tying first place as a senior in 1957 at 12-0, in Class B competition.

Danny Walsworth took over the honors with a 11-6 in the next two years, and tying for fourth one year and for second the next.

Jerry Rowan and Jerry Force both went to state from O'Brien in 1960 and 1961. Force set the pole vault record as a sophomore in the regional meet at Lubbock at 12-3 3/4 inches, then tied for fourth in state. He deadlocked for first place at 12-0 in 1961 at state.

Rowan placed third in the low hurdles in 1960 and won that event in 1961. The 19 points scored by Rowan and Force in 1961 were the most points O'Brien ever scored at state.

Jimmy had a special reason for wanting to win this year. As the lone 1962 O'Brien color bearer, he failed to place in the pole vault, breaking a nine-year string in which Bulldogs had won or placed.

Charles Thorn is the Bulldog coach.

**FACTS ON 1964 WHEAT PROGRAM**  
Secretary Freeman announced the following actions for the 1964 wheat crop:

1. Set May 21 as the date for a referendum on the 1964 wheat program.

2. Establish wheat support prices at \$2.00 per bushel national average for certificated wheat and \$1.30 per bushel for non-certificated wheat if the referendum carries.

3. Set the national marketing quota at 1,220,000,000 bushels and the national acreage allotment for 1964 at 49,500,000 acres—the same as in 1962.

4. Determined a wheat marketing allocation for certificated wheat of 975,000,000 bushels, 80 per cent of the national marketing quota. Individual producers will receive marketing certificates for 80 per cent of the normal production on their acreage allotments.

5. Announced State acreage allotments based on the national allotment.

6. Set diversion payment rates on wheat acreage put to conserving uses.

7. Announced there will be no commercial wheat-producing states designated under the 1964 program.

## There Is An Alternative To Wheat Plan Farm Bureau President Declares

Wheat growers are being led to believe in many cases that their only choice in the referendum is between "supply and control" and "chaos."

This "choice" totally ignores the fact that Congress is in session and that several prominent members of both political parties are already drafting new wheat legislation for enactment after the certificate plan is voted down.

There is an alternative to "supply control" and it involves two important steps:

1. A "no" vote in the referendum.

2. The enactment by Congress of a sound program for wheat.

Farm Bureau delegates from all over the nation, at their recent annual meeting in Atlanta, outlined a wheat program for consideration by Congress after the 1963 referendum. It provides for:

1. Termination of marketing quotas and acreage allotments (and no certificates.) All producers would be free to grow as much or as little as they choose, or place their land in a retirement program.

2. Price supports at the higher of the world price of wheat during the three preceding years or 50 per cent of parity, with premiums to reflect milling and baking quality.

3. A voluntary cropland retirement program for periods of not less than three years with pay-

ment rates established by competitive bidding.

4. Protection against dumping of CCC stocks by prohibiting their sale at less than 115 per cent of support level, plus carrying charges—except as offset by comparable open market purchases.

When wheat farmers indicate they do not want "supply control" Congress will be ready to act. The future course of American agriculture is in the hands of wheat farmers. Will it be toward bigger markets, greater opportunity and more adequate income? Or, will it be toward a government-controlled, licensed agriculture, with dwindling markets, limited opportunities and lower incomes?

These are questions wheat farmers must answer as they make their decision on whether to vote "yes" or "no." The choice is theirs to make.
