Burglars Nabbed In Record Time

Knox County Sheriff H. C. Stone and Deputy Kenneth Lamascus solved an attempted post office burglary at Vera and post office of the Benjamin post office Monday in less than 12 hours after the crimes were committed.

Sheriff Stone was called to Vera early Monday morning to investigate an attempt to enter the Vera post office. While he was investigating that crime, Deputy Lamascus was checking the post office in Benjamin.

The Benjamin office was entered through a window and approximately \$5.90 in silver was taken and a validating money order stamp.

The crimes were committed between 2 and 3 a.m. it was disclosed.

At approximately the time the Benjamin burglary was discovered Dickens and Guthrie also announced a grocery burglary at Dickens and an attempt to enter the Guthrie post office.

The sheriff's department after some checking with the sheriff's departments in Guthrie and Dickens, came up with the description of an automobile.

An all points bulletin was issued on the suspected car and its occupants.

During lunch Chief of Police Tony Parsons of Anson was watching a car with two men and two women "casing" a store and after receiving the pickup

order, stopped the car for investigation.

The sheriff's department went to Anson to pickup up Bobby Charles Calhoun, 27; George Gordon Lee, 21; Mary Scrivner, 22, and Peggy Douglas, 21 to return them to Knox County.

Calhoun and Lee issued statements to the sheriff but the women denied complicity in the crime, however.

Post office burglaries are extremely expensive in Knox County—to the burglars—for the last post office burglary was committed at Truscott in 1962 and the culprits remained at large for only six days that time.

Mr. Roberson was born in Knox City, Feb. 19, 1937, to Mr. and Mrs. Walter Roberson. His father preceded him in death in 1946.

He lived in Knox City until he was 12, and moved to Amarillo where he finished high school in 1955 and received his degree from West Texas State in Canyon in 1959.

He lived in California with an uncle, George Kay, of Imperial for about a year before he went into the Army.

He was stationed at Fort Leonard Wood as a Battalion Executive Officer for training recruits when he became ill.

He married Miss Penny Phillips of Amarillo in 1960, and they had a son who died at the age of four months in February of 1963.

Survivors besides the wife are his mother and step father, Mr. and Mrs. Jack Barrington of Amarillo; one half brother, Keith Roberson of Fort Worth, two step brothers, Bobbie Barrington of Midland and Jerry Barrington of Amarillo.

Mrs. Hester was born in Haskell County, April 25, 1905, and married Roy B. Hester of Rochester, Oct. 3, 1922.

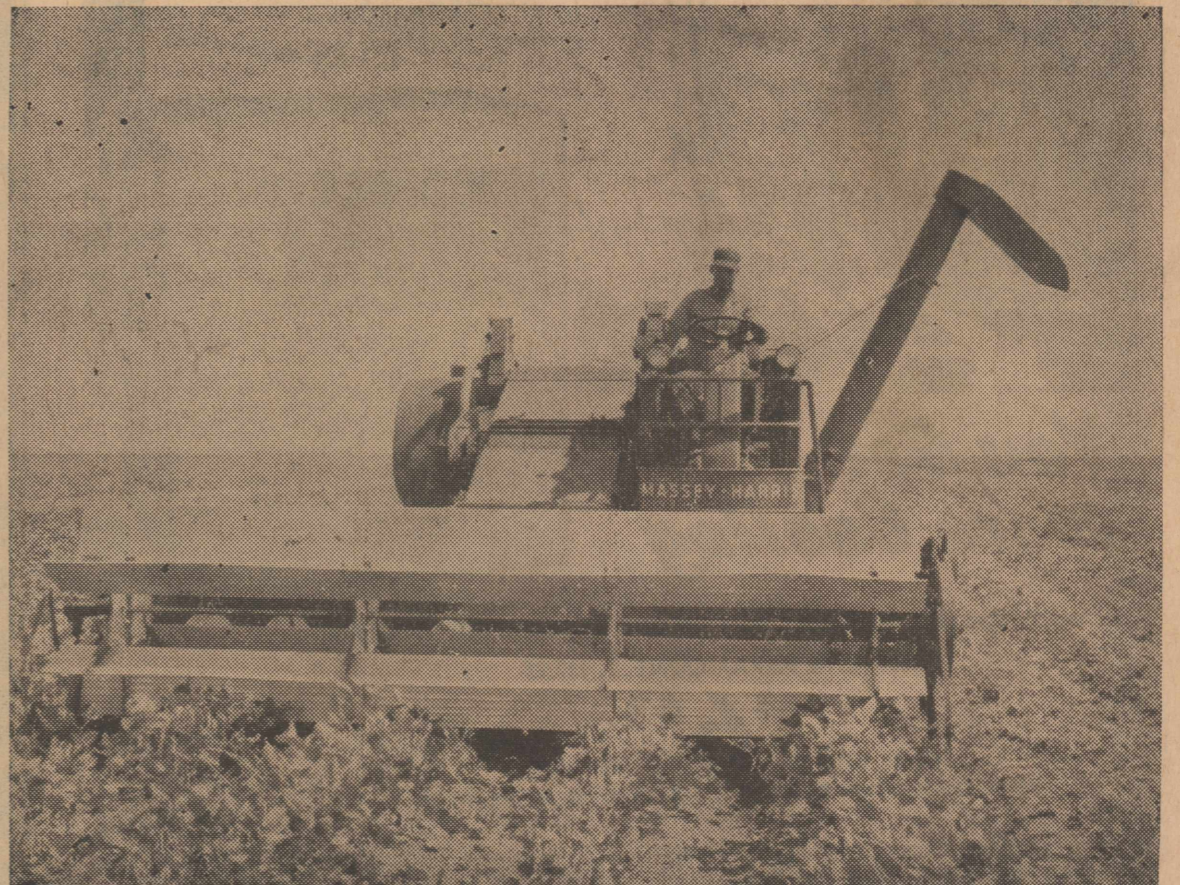

STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN — A growing toll of accidents on city streets and freeways, heavier damage claims and an act of the Legislature . . . all have combined to cause insured motorists in Texas a double-dip premium increase during the next five months.

First boost for most drivers will come on policies renewed after August 1, when new auto insurance rates set by the State Board of Insurance go into effect.

Many others face a second increase in liability insurance premiums after Jan. 1. This is effective date of a new law requiring financial responsibility of \$10,000 per person and \$20,000 per accident.

Present law requires \$5,000-\$10,000. So those now carrying minimum insurance will pay an average of \$4 more after January 1.

Increasing accident losses, mainly in urban areas, forced the Insurance Board to hike liability and collision rates in most sections of the state.

Average premium boosts after Aug. 1 will be 5.2 per cent for bodily injury, 9.7 per cent for property damage and 8.4 per cent for collision. This will cost policyholders a total of \$12,000,000. Drivers in some rural areas, however, escaped the rate increase.

PHYSICAL EDUCATION — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has been asked to come to the aid of hard-pressed physical education departments in the 20 state-supported universities and colleges.

Commission on Higher Education asked Carr for an opinion on the legality of the "rider" in the new appropriation bill, which goes into effect on Sept. 1. Rider declares that state funds for physical education can be used for mass calisthenics unless the students are majoring in PE. Net effect would be special fees charged by the school if they wanted to give instruction in games.

Some schools have protested that the rider would seriously curtail physical education programs.

JOBS ASSIGNED — Speaker Byron Tunnell has more than 60 appointments to make on interim study committees. He is making them at the rate of one or two a week.

Reps. George Cook, Odessa;

J. Collier Adams, Lubbock; Maurice Doke, Wichita Falls; George Hinson, Mineola; and Ben Jarvis, Tyler, will study the oil and gas industry. Their assignment is no small chore . . . how to restore prosperity to the Texas oil industry.

Farmers can now apply for a refund of the tax on gasoline used on the farm. The period covered is July 1, 1962 to June 30, 1963. I have the forms in my office. This is the federal tax on gasoline that has been used for farming purposes and includes gas used by custom operator on your farm. You have until Sept. 30, to file for this refund.

Please cooperate with the tester and schedule your cattle when he is working your neighborhood. If you have heifer calves to be calving vaccinated for Bangs, then tell the technician the day before he comes to your place. He will then bring out the vaccine and vaccinate them free of charge.

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

JURY DUTY

Jury duty is an experience everybody ought to have.

In a criminal case twelve jurors have a duty to do justice as each one sees it, and yet be unanimous. In most trials both sides have much to say, and the evidence is conflicting. The 12 jurors vary in their ability, temperament, character, education, and their experience in the world, and in the question at stake.

Yet a jury made up of both sexes, with wide age and educational differences, jobs and origins must all come up with the same verdict. Upon their verdict much depends—the life or liberty of others, and the public good. So it may take them days of talking among themselves, all to agree.

Jury duty calls for insight, common sense, courage, tact, fairmindedness, patience, (especially toward the jurors who disagree with you), good humor, tolerance, balance, willingness to hear others out and change one's mind, readiness to go over the facts to find something to bring agreement. In short, jury duty demands a "decent respect to the opinions" of others.

More and more women share civic duties, especially as jurors.

Time was in Texas when women could not serve on juries. They still cannot in four states.

A jury finds facts. It hears and weighs evidence and then comes to a verdict. It does not make the law — the legislature

does; and the judge "charges" or instructs the jury concerning the law applicable to the particular case it is considering.

The judge will tell you not to find the accused guilty until he is proved so under strict rules of evidence. If you have any "reasonable doubt,"—not imaginary or far-fetched — acquit the accused.

Civil cases do not demand a moral certainty, merely the "preponderance" of what you regard as reliable and believable evidence.

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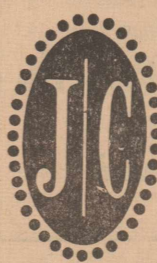
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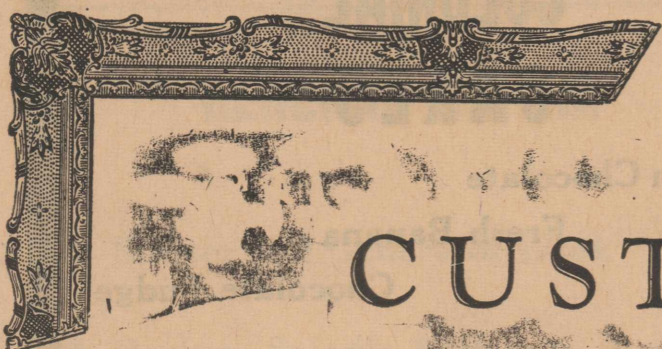
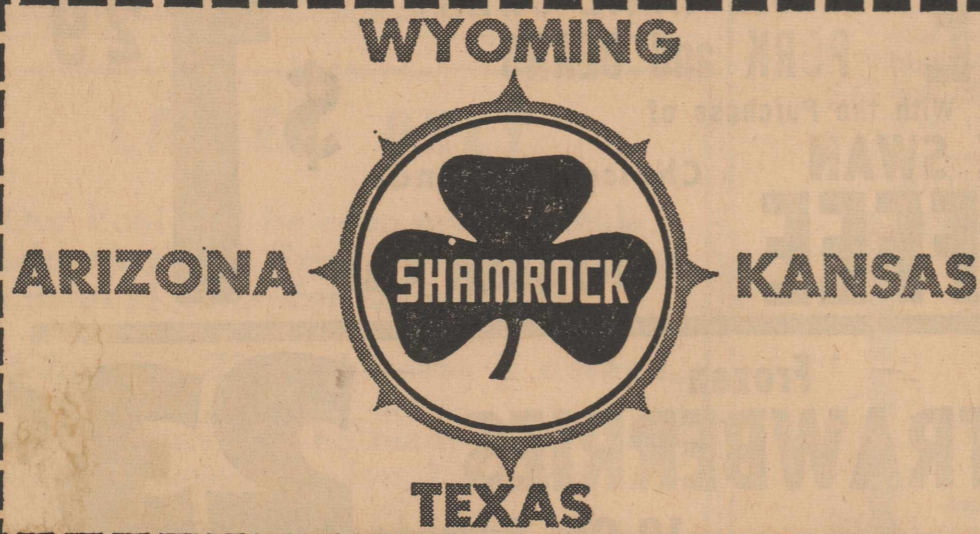
