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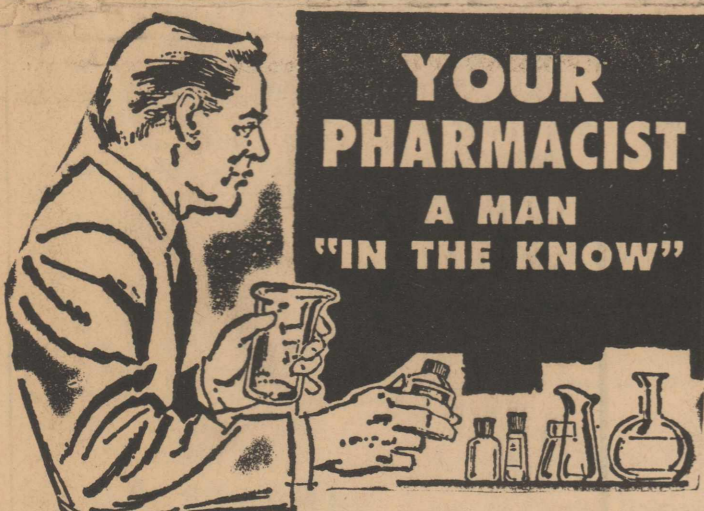

Finance companies which hope to operate in the State under the new Texas Regulatory Loan Act must be licensed by November 21.

The so-called "Loan Shark" law, passed by the 58th Legislature, allows a much higher rate of interest for lenders. But it saddles them with stiff licensing requirements.

Regulatory Loan Commissioner Frank Miskell predicted that 2,000 loan offices would come under the act. Already he has received more than 2,000 letters of intention to file application for a license. And letters still are flowing in at the rate of 30 or more a day.

One reason for the big response is that many automobile financing companies want to up their rates, too. Question of

whether they are eligible to operate under the act has not been settled. But they are signing up just in case.

**NURSING HOME INVESTIGATION** — House General Investigating Committee will explore possible scandals in nursing home construction according to its chairman, Rep. Bob Fairchild of Ceter.

Investigation was requested by Speaker Byron Sunnell after a series of stories on sub-standard nursing homes for old people appeared in the Fort Worth Star-Telegram.

A separate check by the State Department of Public Safety has been ordered by Gov. John Connally.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr also has provided support. **TEC ATTORNEY QUILTS**—C.

W. Turlington, long-time Marshall attorney, resigned as general counsel of the Texas Employment Commission.

Turlington complained that he was not consulted by commissioners before they hired a new attorney for his staff.

"In order to render the best possible service to the State it is necessary for the general counsel to have a voice in the selection of his staff, regardless of the prospective employee's race or color of his skin," said Turlington.

Hamah King of Houston, the new attorney, is scheduled to start work in October. King, a Negro, is a former vice president of United Political Organizations.

Turlington, who has served 5 years on the commission, says he has no immediate plans for the future.

**RAINMAKING AGENCY PROPOSED** — Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler thinks the State should have an official rainmaking agency. He says he has discussed the subject with the Governor and hopes to soon have a "concrete proposal to offer."

The land commissioner feels that his success with several cloud-seeding experiments warrants serious consideration of a rainmaking agency.

**DROUGHT POSING PROBLEMS** — Texas, with 53 reser-

voirs completed since 1950 and 12 more under construction, needs a stronger water development program says Gov. Connally.

He proposes that the State harness surplus flood water, then transport it to areas which have too little.

**REPUBLICANS** — First announced statewide candidate to emerge on the pre-1964 political scene is a Republican. He is Geo. H. W. Bush, 39, of Houston, who seeks his party's nomination for the U. S. Senate.

Bush and other Republican hopefuls have been discussing their chances with the GOP State Executive Committee.

Present were Jack Cox of Houston and Dr. Milton V. Davis of Dallas, mentioned as Senate race starters; also Des Barry of Houston, who ran for congressman-at-large last year, and State Rep. Horace Houston of Dallas, who has said he might run for Governor.

GOP Congressmen Ed Foreman, Odessa; Bruce Alger, Dallas, and voted registration.

**PARKS REPORT** — A two-las; and Sen. John Tower were year study, recently completed on hand when the committee and presented to the Governor, proposes expenditures of \$305,000,000 to acquire and develop 373,000 more acres of Texas parks by the year 2000.

Connally, lauding the report, suggested organization of a citizens group to follow through on needed parks programs. He also revealed he is studying possibility of buying part of the 72,000 acre J. C. Hunter Guadalupe Mountain ranch as a State Park.

Parks experts who prepared the report argue that proper development of the recreation, historical and scenic areas would boost the state's economy \$200 million a year.

CREDIT INSURANCE — State

Board of Insurance heard praise and criticism of its proposed new rules regulating credit life, health and accident insurance at a second hearing here.

The 58th Legislature gave the Board of authority to regulate life, health and accident insurance on loans. For the first time, group credit insurance also was included.

The agency came up with a proposal to establish a test for reasonableness of the relation of benefits to premiums. Some companies claimed the suggested formula resulted in too-high rates.

No decision was reached as to when the rules will take effect, pending completion of an attorney general's opinion.
