We are not responsible for their inaccuracies at this particular time, so as each announces and tells of his capabilities and virtues, please don't hold it against us.

Announcement day is theirs! Our chance to speak comes later. At this writing County Commissioner of Precinct Three, J. B. Eubank was the first candidate to announce for office in the Herald this year.

And so begins another tussle between candidates and supporters to get a man either in or out of the political pot.

At the present time it doesn't look like there will be too much opposition to the present office holders, as a lot of folks have just about given up on ever getting anything changed in our county . . .

We have also been aware that very few politicians like to tell the truth, either on themselves or their candidates.

Of course the public is responsible for that.

Too often if a candidate tells the truth on an incumbent, the majority feel he is "throwing mud" if the accusations are not becoming.

We do not condone "mud slinging" either, but we do believe in the truth even it hurts.

We have also noticed that if a candidate can't tell the truth before he gets in office, you can rest assured he never will!

The law gives politicians and newspapers the right to examine the character, ability and integrity of any and all candidates for an office "under a microscope."

That should be enough freedom for all concerned.

January 31 is the deadline for paying one's poll tax. Be a free American and vote . . . intelligently.

Since our earliest recollections we have advocated, like so many people, to pay the poll tax and vote.

We have always added the sentence in the next breath—"It doesn't make any difference who you vote for, but go to the polls and vote."

We are thoroughly convinced that this has been the wrong assumption. Too often—every election for the majority of the people—we go to the polls and vote for men we've never heard of before—and know nothing about.

This also happens in a small community such as ours. We are firmly convinced that if a person concerned himself enough to look into a candidates' record or qualifications, he would be able to go to the polls and vote intelligently.

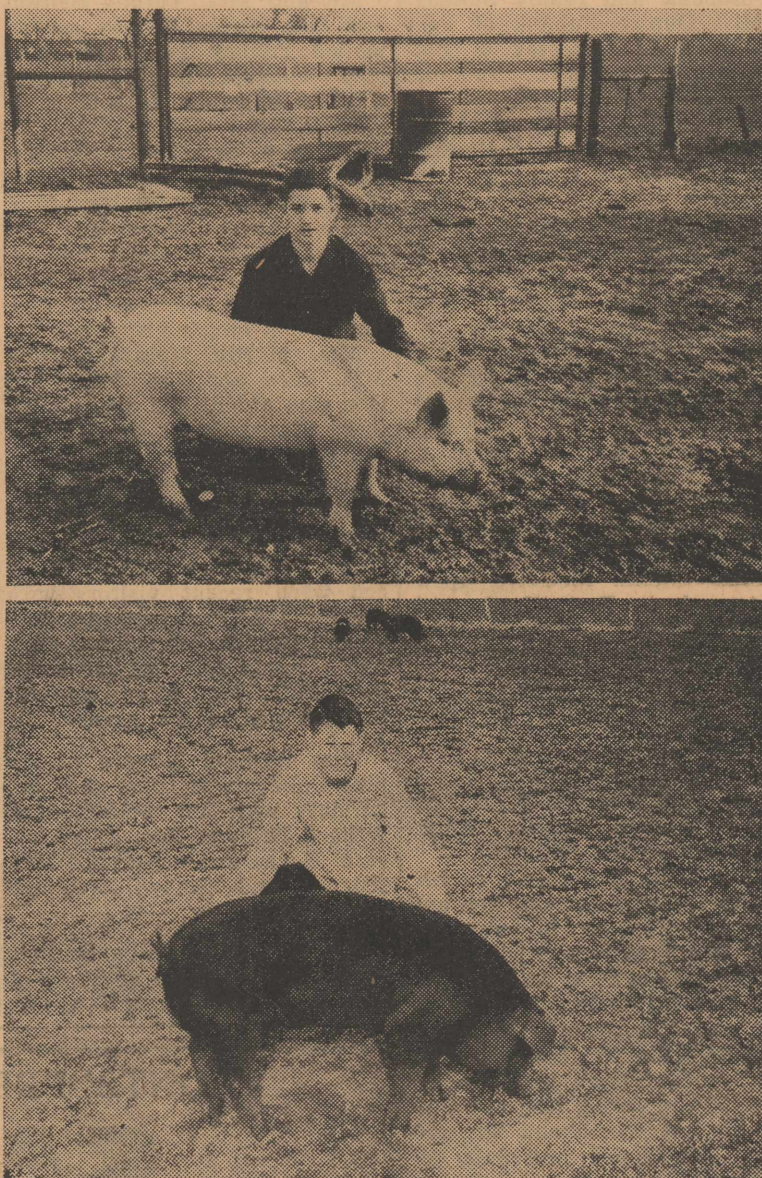
The news media should inform the public about candidates seeking office, and this is especially true on state and national politics, for we doubt seriously if there is one person who reads this article who doesn't go to the polls and vote for several candidates he knows nothing whatsoever about.

The new wing will be dedicated to the late Doctors T. P. Frizzell and D. C. Eiland.

Rev. Hal Dungan, pastor of the First Christian Church in Knox City will open the ceremonies with the invocation. The National Anthem will be presented by the Knox City Band, under direction of Norman Arnett, and the Knox County Commissioners Court will make formal presentation of the keys to the new wing to W. E. Braly of Munday, Chairman of the Knox County Hospital Board.

Paul Hoge of Knox City and Charles Baker of Munday,

chairmen of the dedication ceremonies, will speak in honor of Dr. Frizzell and Dr. Eiland.

Dedication prayer will be offered by Rev. Rex Mauldin of Munday, and the ribbon cutting ceremony by the late doctor's granddaughters, Sarah Bellinghausen and Diana Kay Eiland, will conclude the dedication program.

Dr. Frizzell began his medical practice in Knox County in 1925 and Dr. Eiland started practice here in 1934.

The Frizzell-Eiland Wing consists of nine new patient rooms with baths; a new medicine room, cafeteria, office, nurses station, lobby and storage rooms—Other improvements to the hospital include enlarged and modernized operating room, pa-

## Bud Carver Seeks Re-Election As Co. Commissioner

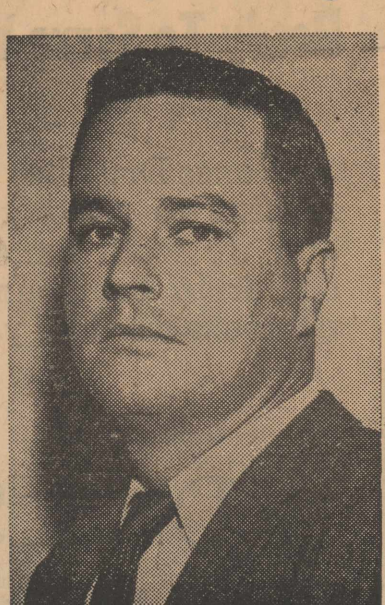

### City Council Has Regular Meeting

Knox City's City Council held their regular meeting Monday night at city hall with all members present. They are:

Mayor Buddy Angle, and Councilmen Kenneth Crowover, Otis Cash, Monty Penman, A. T. Holcomb and Vaughn Gruben. City Secretary John Robinson read the minutes of the last meeting and they remained as read.

Water Supt. Jack Land met with the council in compliance with the council's vote of the last meeting that all city employees make a written account of their department's business for the month.

Land said his department did not have much to report—that two water taps was all the business they had done.

He said he and the mayor had taken some water samples to Lubbock and had had a talk with the men in charge of the sampling station about the bad reports they had been receiving on the city's water.

The samples were O.K. he reported.

One cause of the bad reports Land said was that they were sitting in the sampling station office for days and that if the samples were too old they would show up as a bad sample.

The council discussed some complaints they had received concerning streets and drainage, but nothing definite was agreed upon.

They also discussed the feasibility of purchasing a second-hand loader, and agreed to look into the matter of trading the city's street sweeper in on a loader, as they believed it would be more beneficial to the town.

Jack Land said if the city had a loader, it would be easy for the city employees to get a load or two of dirt each day

to fill some of the holes in the streets.

This brought up the condition of the city's truck, and the council told councilman A. T. Holcomb to check it over and see what it needed to put it in good shape, mechanically.

They also thought the city's pickup truck needed overhauling, or at least checking to see what it needed.

The Mayor informed the council he and the city secretary had gone to the bank and paid approximately \$2,200 on the city hall and \$1,500 on the city's land investment.

The city authorized the Herald to offer a \$100. reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible for shooting out the traffic signal on the corner of Fourth and Central.

Ottis Cash made a motion and seconded by Vaughn Gruben for the city to pay the months bills. All voted in favor of the motion.

A. T. Holcomb made a motion seconded by Ottis Cash to increase water tapping charges from \$25 to \$45.

All voted in favor of the motion.

Kenneth Crowover made a motion seconded by A. T. Holcomb to grant permission to Monty Penman to move his butane tank from its location on Central to his new business location on the Munday highway.

Penman retired from the room while the matter was discussed and all members present voted for the motion.

F. A. Robinette district manager for General Telephone Co. met with the council to discuss telephone service in the city.

The council told Robinette they had received no complaints and that service "was the best they could ever remember."

Meeting was adjourned.

## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford

AUSTIN — Austin has settled back to being just the capital of Texas after nearly two hectic weeks news-wise as the vacation White House.

Dozens of top cabinet officers, military leaders and federal agency heads followed German Chancellor Ludwig Erhard and his advisors to the LBJ Ranch for conferences with President Johnson.

Encouraging predictions of progress toward world peace emerged from the President's international discussions. The federal budget and economy were spotlighted in the domestic talks.

Before he departed, White House sources gave these insights into the President's thinking:

He does not feel the U. S. can drag its feet until after elections this year before pressing for new peace breakthroughs.

He regards civil rights and the \$11,000,000 tax cut as legislative "musts." Also, he has expressed support for the medicare program of aid to the aged.

Reducing the budget to save money for essential human needs, including education, is regarded by the President as of concern to all Americans. He hopes cost cutting will serve as a pattern for future years.

Slum clearance and a "home for every American" are seen as goals of his administration. Some newsmen interpreted this as a likely 1964 campaign slogan. Johnson hopes to steadily improve American preparedness.

But he is strong for elimination of military obsolescence, particularly old bases and installations retained in the budget for political reasons.

Congressional leaders will run their own legislative show. But the new President won't hesitate to ask old congressional friends for what he thinks is needed.

Johnson hopes to draw on the talents of both business and labor to render public service.

He is concerned about unemployment and is calling for new solutions.

**PRISON POPULATION REDUCED** — For the first time

in 18 years, the number of prisoners in the Texas Department of Corrections shows a decrease.

Department Director Dr. Geo. Beto reports that the December 31 count was 12,150, compared with 12,203 the year before.

Since 1945, there has been a steady climb in number of prisoners in inmates.

Beto cited these reasons for leveling off: more adequate parole supervision; opening of a new first-offender unit; a pre-release program of preparing prisoners for freedom; an expanded trusty program; and overall improvement in the prison treatment program.

Prison chief said the reduction not only will save money on prison care, but also in welfare funds spent on families of inmates, not to mention restoring prisoners to productive lives as citizens and taxpayers.

**PRISON SYSTEM INCOME** — Farm products and livestock produced more than \$6,500,000 of the prison system's 1962 income, according to the auditor's report just released. Other sources were manufactured products, \$3,704,616; oil and gas leases, \$39,237; miscellaneous, \$3,287,167.

Report placed total income from farms and farm industries at \$10,144,773, with expenses of \$14,304,734 for a deficit of \$4,159,961.

Manufacturing operations include license plates, shoes, textiles, clothing and other products.

**SCHOOL INCOME THREAT** — Texas school income will be drastically reduced unless the Federal Power Commission sets an adequate price for gas in the Texas Gulf Coast area and the Hugoton-Anadarko area of the Texas Panhandle, Attorney General Waggoner Carr contends.

Carr has filed a petition to intervene in price hearings ordered by FPC to determine reasonable rates for sale of natural gas in the areas.

Earlier he filed briefs requesting FPC to set the price of all gas in the Permian Basin area at 21 cents MCF. The FPC staff

sought a nine cents MCF rate for casinghead gas and 73.7 cents MCF for gas well gas.

Attorney General noted in the brief that Texas levies a 7 per cent occupation tax based on market value of the gas at the well head to help support state government.

**HAY FREIGHT HIKE SOUGHT** — Although the hay shortage has shoved prices up to double the normal, hard-pressed Texas ranchers and dairymen may have another cost increase in sight.

Railroad Commission already has been asked by the Livestock Carriers Association of Texas to increase truck freight rates on hay and cottonseed hulls.

A hearing on the application has been set by the Commission's rate division for January 20. In some cases this would mean a rate increase of more than 100 per cent.
