It is Knox County's good fortune to have a man of Ed's character in office as county treasurer for without him and his records, we wouldn't know what was going on.

We were kinda disappointed in the fact that there weren't many boys interested in Scouting and wanted to try and get the parents behind their youngsters to attend the meetings.

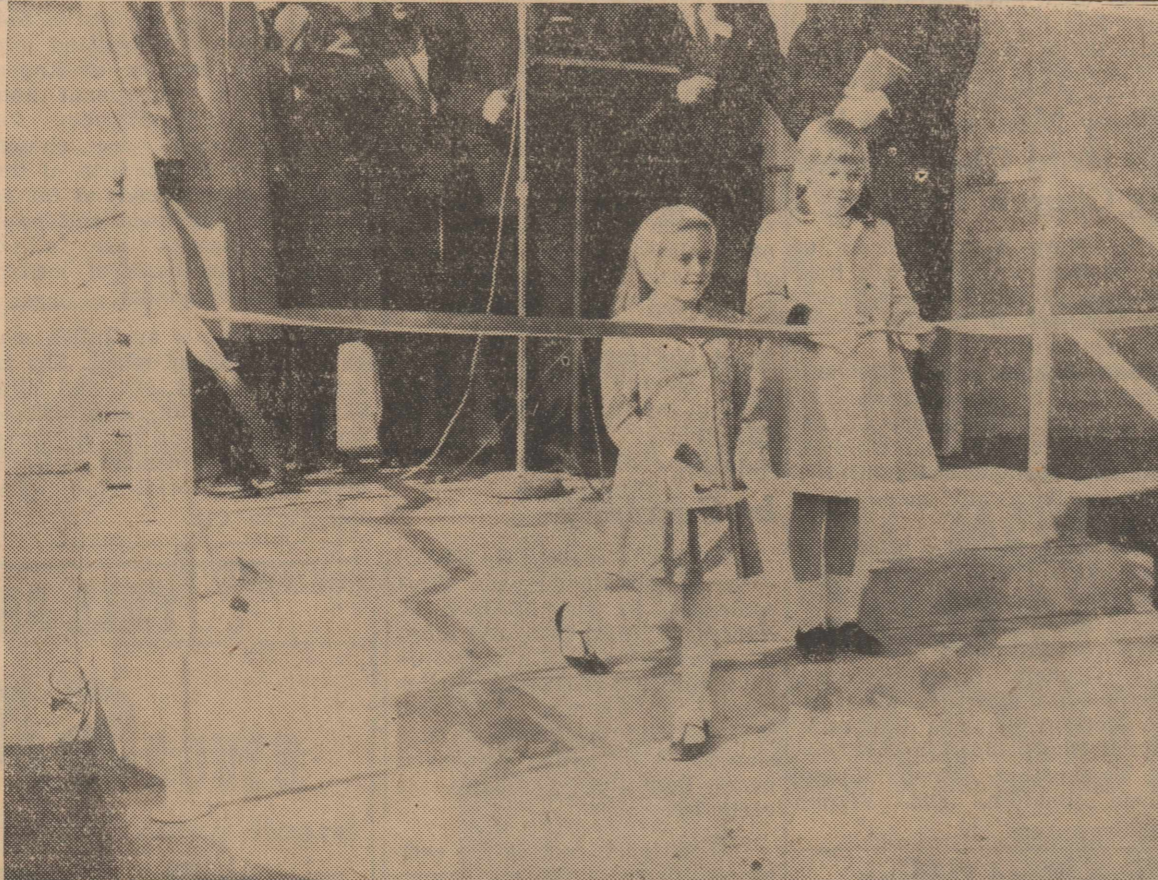
We asked Noel to announce in school last Friday that we would have a meeting at 7:30 that night at the Methodist Church basement.

## Jack Hightower Seeks Election As State Senator



Jack Hightower, former State Representative and former District Attorney of Vernon, today announced his candidacy in the Democratic primaries for the State Senate to succeed Senator George Moffett of Chillicothe who has announced that he will not seek re-election.

In making his announcement, Hightower stated: "Anyone seeking to step into the shoes of George Moffett cannot help but be impressed by the responsibility of this important place of service. Within the near future I will present my platform for the consideration of the voters in this district. It will call for an honest effort by our state government to meet the needs of our people."

Hightower, 37, is vice-chairman of the board of regents of Midwestern University. He served as a member of the Texas House of Representatives in 1953-1954 and as District Attorney from January 1955, until November, 1961.

Hightower is married to the former Colleen Ward of Tullia. They have three daughters, Ann, age 11, Amy, age 7, and Alison, age 4.

He is a member of the Baptist Church and has been a leader in church, civic and fraternal activities on both local and state levels.

## Funeral Services For Denny W. Davis Held Sunday

Funeral services for Denny W. Davis, 71, were held at 3 p.m. Sunday in the Knox City Methodist Church, with the pastor, Rev. Jarrell Sharp, officiating.

Burial was in Knox City Cemetery, under direction of Pinkard-Smith Funeral Home.

Mr. Davis, a former Knox City resident, died in a Lubbock hospital Friday, Jan. 10, after a lengthy illness.

He was born near Austin April 11, 1892, and moved to Knox County with his parents about 1900. He and his half-brother, Glover McCarty, operated a dry goods store here, and later moved to Whitewright.

He married Helen Dean in 1914, in Leonard. The couple returned to Knox City where Mr. Davis reentered the dry goods business. He moved to Ruidoso, N. M., in 1949, and was engaged in farming in Lubbock in 1954.

He was a member of the Methodist Church.

Survivors include two sons, Denny W. Jr., of Morton and brothers, Lloyd of Ruidoso, and Carl of Sweetwater; two half-brothers, Walton McCarty of Morton and Glover McCarty of Carlsbad, N. M., three sisters, Mrs. Willie Janes of Abilene, Mrs. Corrine Behrens of San Antonio and Mrs. Annie Parks of Long Beach, Calif.; and two grandchildren.

## Sen. Geo. Moffett To Retire From Office

In a statement today, Senator George Moffett, announced that he would not seek re-election to the State Senate, in which he is now serving his 26th year.

He was a member of the House of Representatives for 8 years prior to his election to the Senate in 1938. His statement follows:

"A few days ago, I underwent a complete physical examination. The results were partially unfavorable. This circumstance, together with the uncertain prospect concerning redistricting, and the fact that I am 68 years old, have persuaded me to retire."

"I am deeply grateful to the people who have chosen me to represent them at Austin for many years. Our Texas state government is among the best in the nation, and I am glad to have contributed something to it."

## Leading Soil Scientist To Speak Jan. 22

Dr. William Trogdon, executive vice president, Best Fertilizers Co., Plainview, will be guest speaker at the Knox County Farm and Ranch Day to be held Wednesday, Jan. 22. "Soil Fertility and the American Farmer" will be his subject.

A native of Oklahoma, Dr. Trogdon graduated from Oklahoma State University with major in Agronomy receiving the BS degree in 1942. He received the Doctor's degree in 1949 from the Ohio State University in the field of soil fertility with minor work in the fields of plant physiology, soil chemistry and soil physics.

He has worked with Ohio Agricultural Experiment Station, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station at Temple, with the Soil Conservation Service Research Division, was chairman Department of Agriculture, Midwestern University, Wichita Falls, and director Soils Laboratory of Wichita County Water Improvement Districts. In 1953, Dr. Trogdon became Agronomist for the Mathieson Chemical Corporation in the south-western states.

He has had wide experience in soil testing, soil fertility problems, fertilizer uses, and soil management problems, both as research worker and a commercial agronomist.

In September of 1958, he was appointed head of Department of Soil and Crop Sciences at Texas A&M College and the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station.

He is a member of a number of professional societies and has authored a number of publications and technical papers.

He succeeds B. B. Campbell Sr., who is retiring after serving as president since 1944.

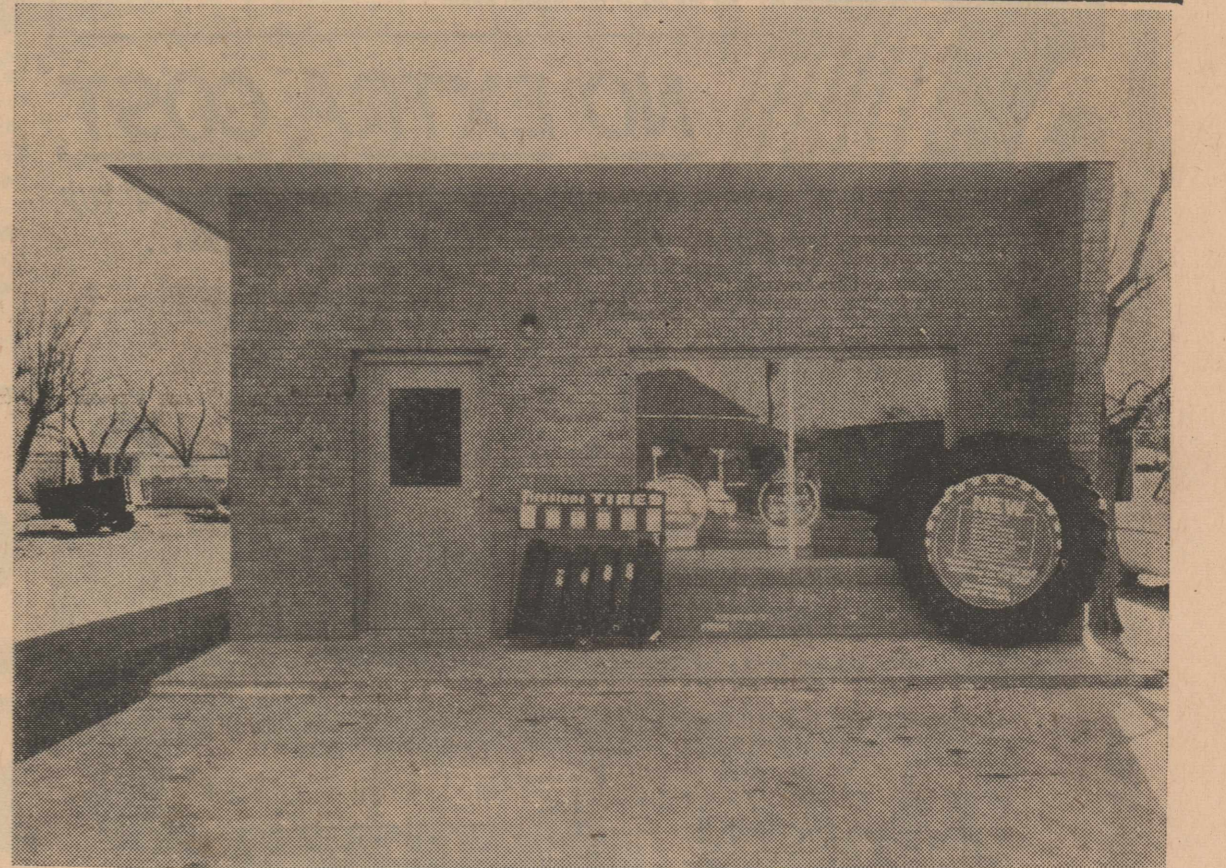

legislation.

He has vigorously sponsored scientific research for more uses for cotton, and is the author of a bill to establish a cotton research laboratory in Texas.

Was also author of soil conservation law and the present feed control law, insecticide control law in Texas. Author of bill which made Midwestern University of Wichita Falls, a four year state supported college. Has been author of more constitutional amendments than any other member.

Among them are: the amendment providing three per cent discount for early payment of property taxes; the amendment providing for erection of state office buildings; two veterans land amendments: the amendment providing direct appeals to State Supreme Court, where the constitutionality of a statute is the only point at issue, thus shortening the time to decide the case.

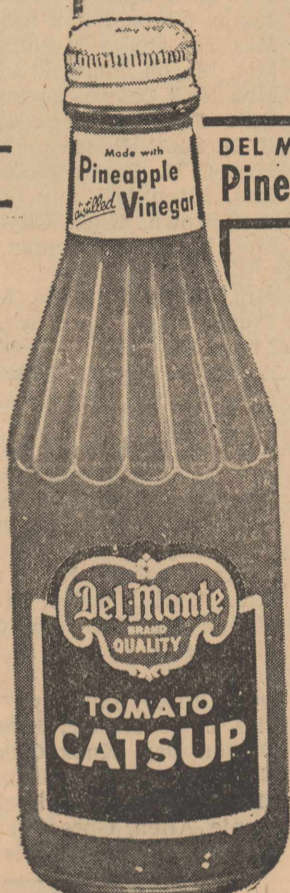

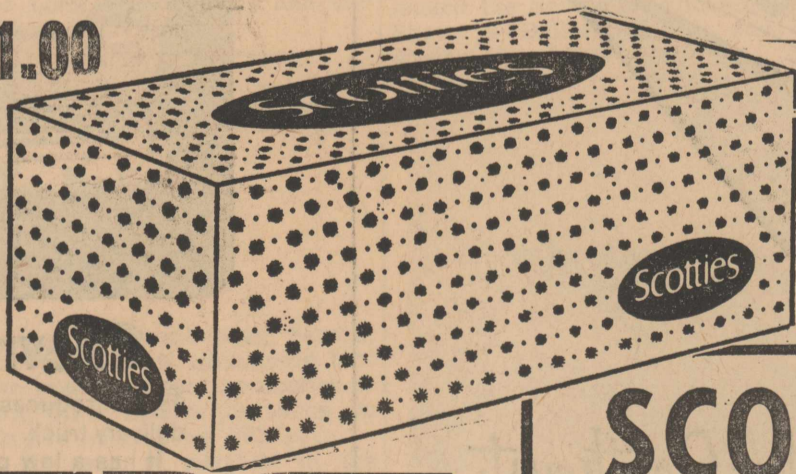

AUSTIN—With less formality than he would display in warning his wife he was inviting guests to dinner at the Mansion, Gov. John Connally "announced" he is running for a second term.

Actually the announcement was no great surprise, although rumors continued that he was going to go to Washington, retire, or run for the Senate. But the informality of it did leave some reporters wondering if they heard him right.

"When are you going to announce?" a newsman asked at the start of Connally's first press conference since he was wounded by the same assassin who killed President Kennedy.

"What's wrong with right now?" the Governor shot back. "Well, are you announcing now?" stammered another reporter.

"Good a time as any," shrugged the Governor nonchalantly. "I have no prepared statement, but I'll announce right now for reelection as Governor."

And that's the way it happened!

Before the conference was over, a half-hour later, Connally also:

Predicted the Democratic national ticket, which he expects will be headed by his old friend President Lyndon Johnson, will beat the Republicans in Texas.

Said he still sees no need for by a 60-40 margin. congressional redistricting until a special legislative session on less the Supreme Court unexpectedly acts early to uphold a lower court decision on "at-large" (statewide) elections for congressmen.

Declined to be drawn into U. S. Senate race controversy and efforts to find an opponent for Sen. Ralph Yarbrough, but indicated waves of harmony engulfing President Johnson and Yarbrough do not necessarily include him. Said Connally: "My thoughts are my own."

He is recovering his strength, has regained lost weight, has given up smoking, and has a collection of tailored slings for his shattered right arm—including a grey herringbone sling, a

blue serge, a red velveteen for sport, and a black formal with a silk "lapel" and covered buckle in the back, all from a lady in Kentucky.

**THE COURTS SPEAK** — The Supreme Court has held that Judge J. H. Starley is fully eligible to preside over trial of an eight-year old suit to determine Rio Grande Water rights over a vast area in Starr, Hidalgo, Cameron and Willacy counties. area by Mrs. Straley's uncle and aunt do not disqualify the judge, the high court concluded in directing that the trial proceed.

A suit to halt shell dredging near live oyster reefs in Galveston to Trinity Bays has been transferred from Houston to Austin and is slated to be heard in 126th District Court here Jan. 28.

**CURB TEENAGE SMOKING** — The State Health Department has a word of advice to teenage smokers: "Be smart—don't start."

Dr. J. E. Peavy, Texas health commissioner who recently gave up cigarettes himself, says the department will put up anti-smoking exhibits at junior and senior high schools in the 10 largest cities of the state.

The plan preceded release of a national fact-finding committee report on dangers of smoking.

**COOPERATIVE COLLEGES URGED** — The Governor's Committee on Education Beyond the High School may recommend a plan of coordinating college facilities in big cities.

Under the proposal, both private and state colleges in such areas as Houston, Dallas, Fort Worth and San Antonio-Austin would develop closely coordinated "megapolitan" educational programs to make it possible for strength of each institution to be best used in giving students a finished education.

Such an education, said subcommittee spokesman John Gray of Beaumont, would be too costly for a single institution to produce.

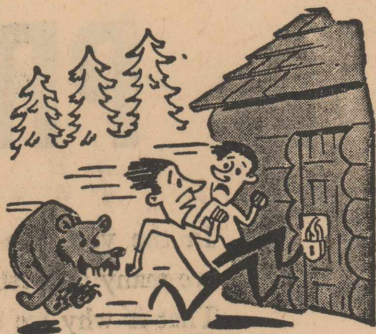

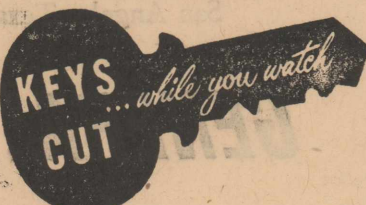

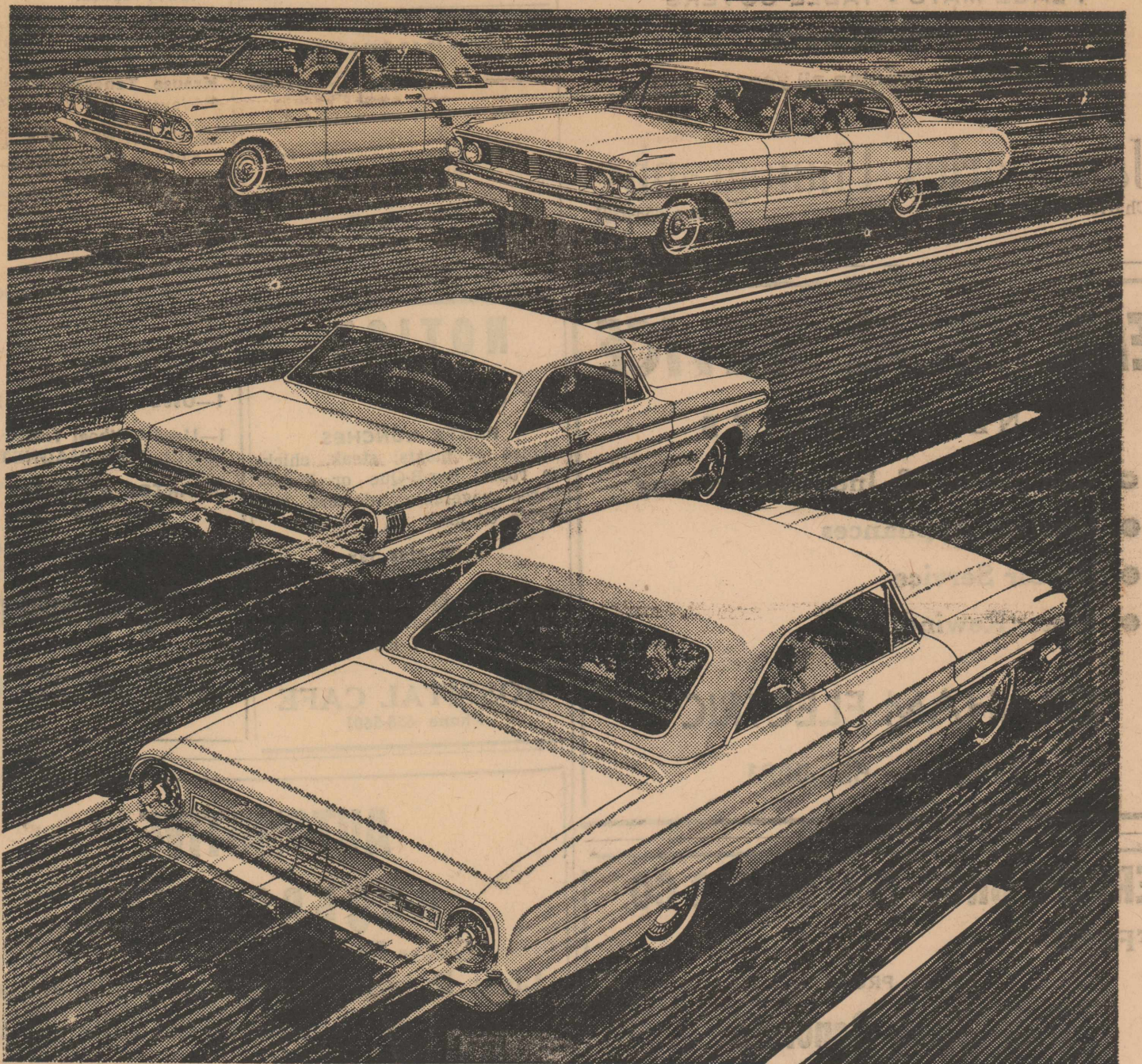
