1964 FEED GRAIN SIGNUP UNDER WAY SAYS ASCS COMMITTEE

The signup for the 1964 feed grain program now is under way in the ASCS County Office, O. E. Moore, chairman Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee announced today. The signup period started Feb. 10 and will continue through March 27.

The 1964 program will be more attractive to many producers, than the 1963 program, he said, but basically the program will be about the same, the chairman explained.

It will be available for the three feed grains: corn, barley and grain sorghum, and participation will be entirely voluntary although price support eligibility for the three crops will depend on such grower participation.

Two major improvements in the 1964 feed grain program, as compared with previous programs, are: (1) A producer may divert as much as 50 per cent of his feed grain base acreage (this was 40 percent in 1963), and those who divert 40 per cent or more of their base acreage will receive diversion payments at the maximum rate for all acreage diversion will continue to be 25 acres if this is more than 50 per cent of the base.)

Two rates of diversion payment will be offered, but the higher rate should apply to more acres under the 1964 program. The minimum rate is again based upon one-fifth of the county's total price support rate; the maximum or higher rate is based on one-half of the support rate.

If the operator signs up to divert 40 per cent or more of his feed grain base, the higher rate will apply to all the acreage diverted. If less than 40 per cent is diverted, the minimum rate will apply to 20 per

1963 Year Of Accomplishment Says Jack Idol

The year 1963 has been a year of accomplishment and progress reports Mr. Jack Idol, chairman of the Wichita Brazos Soil Conservation District.

During 1963 Soil Conservation technicians assisting the District assisted over 700 land owners with conservation problems, Idol stated.

Land owners in the District developed a new conservation plan on 64 units totaling 14,000 acres. SCS technicians assisted land owners revise 58 conservation plans on 19,516 acres. Using cost share funds available under the Great Plains Conservation Program 21 producers in the District signed contracts during 1963.

Using assistance provided by the Soil Conservation Service Wichita Brazos district cooperators completed the following conservation jobs during 1963:

203 acres of land leveling, 35,742 ft. of irrigation pipeline installed, 17 farm ponds completed, grassed waterways established on 63 acres, brush control on 11,594 acres, proper range use completed on 176,852 acres, permanent grass was established on 1800 acres, and conservation cropping systems applied on 21,125 acres.

Mr. Arche Lieb local Soil Conservation Service Work unit conservationist reports that funds are available for cost sharing under the Great Plains Conservation Program. Producers interested in this program can make application for assistance at the Agricultural building in Knox City.

VETERANS

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—Can a peace time veteran obtain treatment in a Veterans Administration outpatient clinic or by a private doctor and have the VA pay for it?

A—Outpatient treatment or treatment by an approved private physician as well as certain medicines are given without charge ONLY to veterans (either peace time or war time service) with a disability incurred or aggravated in service.

Q—Is it true that there will be a reunion of ninety-four World War II airmen who escaped from France in 1944 in "Operation Bonapart"?

A—Yes. Three of the Evadees who live in Buffalo, New York, are arranging a reunion of the veterans who participated in Operation Bonapart. It is scheduled for May of 1964, 20 years after the escape. For details write Ralph K. Patton, 327 Mt. Vernon Road, Buffalo, New York.

Q—I started school September 16 under War Orphans Assistance Act. I understand I would receive \$110 a month while attending school. My first check received on October 20th was for \$55. Why didn't I receive \$110?

A—VA pays for period of enrollment, and considers 30 days a month. You attended 15 days during September, the month the check covered, so you were entitled to one-half of \$110. Your last month of training will be figured on the same basis, following completion of monthly certification of attendance signed by you and the school.

Q—If a veteran has named his mother as beneficiary of his insurance and then marries and has children, will his family or his mother receive the insurance money in case he dies?

A—The VA is required by law to pay the insurance proceeds to the designated beneficiary. In this case, the insurance money would go to his mother.

Q—How much time remains for Korean War Veterans to get educational benefits from the Veterans Administration?

A—The educational provisions of the so-called Korean GI Bill expire for all on Jan. 31, 1965. Thus about one year remains to take advantage of that provision.

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN—Twenty-eight Democrats and 15 Republican candidates banked through the starting gate before last week's filing deadline in a democratic beginning to a political year that opened with relative calm.

A ruckus over the would-be U. S. Senate candidacy of McAllen Congressman Joe Kilgore, and Gov. John Connally's last-minute hesitancy about running for re-election, highlighted the filing-deadline spectacular.

Kilgore decided not to run against U. S. Sen. Ralph Yarborough. Connally, acknowledging that he had considered retirement, went ahead and filed for a second term.

Conservative Democrats boiled over the Kilgore incident, said it might result in a second Republican senator from Texas.

Jack Cox, the GOP's 1962 candidate for governor against Connally, was a surprise entry in the Republican senate contest—at five minutes before deadline.

The Republicans fielded a complete slate for state offices (except judicial) and congressional races.

Connally ended up with opposition from liberal Don Yarborough of Houston, Mrs. Johnnie Mae Hackworth of Brenham and Rev. M. T. Banks of Beaumont, a Negro Republican candidate for Governor are Jack Crichton of Dallas and Harry Diehl of Houston.

Yarborough is opposed by Democrats John Van Cronkhite and Gordon McLendon, both of Dallas. Cox and George Bush of Houston, and Dr. Milton V. Davis and Robert Morris, both of Dallas, are the GOP senatorial candidates.

Here is the complete lineup for other statewide offices:

Lieutenant Governor—Preston Smith of Lubbock (incumbent) and Alebr Fuentas Jr. of San Antonio, Democrats; and Horace Houston of Dallas, Republican.

Congressman-at-large—Incumbent Joe Pool of Dallas, Bill Elkins of Greenville, Robert W. Baker and Bob Looney, both of Houston, Democrats; and Bill Hayes of Temple, Republican.

Attorney General—Incumbent Waggoner Carr of Lubbock, Democrat; and John Trice, Waco, Republican.

Commissioner of Agriculture—Incumbent John White of Wichita Falls and Millard Shivers, Waco, Democrats; and John B. Armstrong, Kingsville, GOP. Land Commissioner—Incumbent Jerry Sadler of Grapeland and Fred H. Williams of Dallas, Democrats; and John A. Matthews of Abilene, GOP.

Comptroller—Incumbent Robert S. Calvert of Austin, Democrat; and Dallas Calmers, Jr., Houston, GOP.

Treasurer—Incumbent Jesse James, Austin, Democrat; and Fred S. Neumann, Beaumont, Republican.

Railroad Commissioner (full term)—Incumbent Ben Ramsey, San Augustine, Democrat. Railroad Commissioner (unexpired term)—Incumbent Jim C. Langdon of Austin, and Jesse Owens of Vernon, Democrats; and Don Flanagan, Richardson, GOP.

Supreme Court, Place 1—Sears McGee of Houston and Jack Pope of San Antonio, Democrats; and T. E. Kennerly, Houston, GOP.

Supreme Court, Place 2—Ruel C. Walker, Cleburne, incumbent, Democrat.

Supreme Court, Place 3—Incumbent Robert W. Hamilton, Midland, Democrat.

Court of Criminal Appeals—Incumbent K. K. Woodley of Austin, Democrat.

Thirteen of Texas' 23 congressmen escaped opposition in their own primaries, but for the first time in history there will be a Republican to deal with in

every district come November.

"INSTANT HOSPITALS"—The State Health Department is keeper of some 92 storehouses of medical and treatment supplies (furnished by the federal government) which could be converted into hospitals almost instantly in the event of disaster.

Eleven more "hospitals" are expected to be added to the list this month, and a master plan calls for 450 of these facilities eventually. The State Health Department is directing the Civil Defense Emergency Hospital program, and encourages local authorities to provide the needed storage space.

BUSINESS IMPROVES—The

1963 index of Texas business activity was up 5.4 per cent on the average monthly level over the previous year, according to The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Austin, Amarillo and Beaumont showed highest gains. They were followed closely by Corpus Christi, Houston, Fort Worth, Galveston and Waco.

No city showed a percentage decline.

Bureau predicted that 1964 will be another good year as far as personal income and business activity is concerned if the federal income tax bill now in the Senate is passed.

CIVIL DEFENSE SPACES UP—Texas now has 1,800,000 licensed civil defense shelter spaces of a goal of 1,900,000, CD Regional

Director Bill Parker told a conference here.

These seven cities have fully-stocked shelters, Parker said: Abilene, Baytown, Bryan, Big Spring, Denton, Odessa and Tyler.

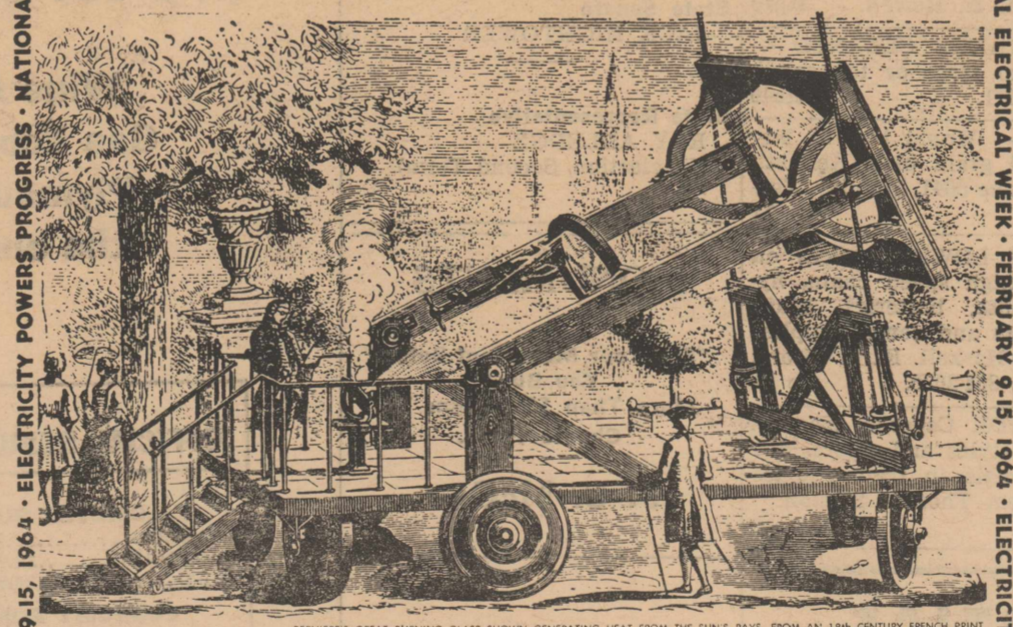

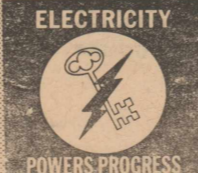
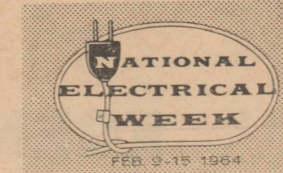
