The 1946 Study Club was represented by Mmes. Jerry Cobb and Paul Clayton.

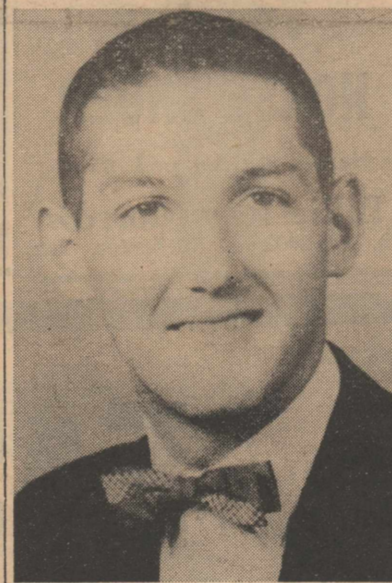

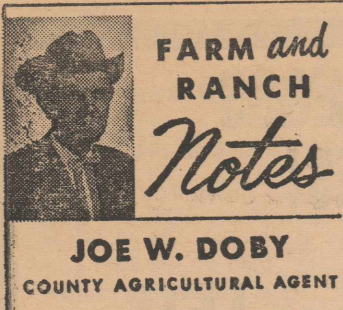

**FARM and RANCH Notes**

4-H members interested in horses have started practicing again for this year's show. The group is working each Sunday afternoon in Benjamin on barrel racing, pole bending, flag racing and western pleasure. Any boy or girl in the county is invited to participate if they are 4-H age which is 9 to 21.

The county show will be held in July. The state show will be held in August and some of the boys and girls are planning to attend.

Adult leaders helping with the group are Bobby Roberson and Levoy Kinnibrough of Vera and Donnie Ryder of Benjamin.

With the threat of rabies to farm livestock always present, we would urge farmers and ranchmen to be on the alert for the disease.

Wild animals, seem to be the chief carriers of the disease in rural areas. Rabid wild animals transmit the disease to domestic animals by biting them.

Skunks, foxes, raccoons, and

bats are among the carriers. Last year in Texas 464 cases of rabies in animals were diagnosed by the State Health Department Laboratory, the highest number in the nation for a state.

We would caution against any attempt by an untrained person to examine an animal behaving in a peculiar way, or acting as if an object was lodged in its mouth or throat.

Such animals, if rabid, can transmit the disease to humans by biting them.

Rabies in its early stages may resemble several other livestock diseases. A veterinarian should be called immediately if an animal with symptoms of the disease is noted.

The widespread vaccination of pets and greater public alertness to the disease will help keep the number of cases among humans and domestic animals on the decline.

Good management is a must during farrowing time because success or failure for the swine enterprise depends on it. And we would like to offer these suggestions for making the season a successful one.

Vaccinate all sows every six months for leptospirosis. Increase the sow's feed during the last 30 days before farrowing to allow for the maximum development of the pig embryos. Clean the farrowing house thoroughly and disinfect with lye and hot water before the sow is moved in. Wash the sow, with warm water and soap before the move and give special attention to her underline!

The move to the farrowing house should be made two to three days in advance of the expected farrowing date and decrease her feed to half normal ration and half wheat bran. Provide bedding about one inch deep for the farrowing house, preferably sawdust, peanut hulls or something on this order rather than straw.

Be present at farrowing time to clean up the baby pigs and to place them under a heat lamp which can be placed in a corner of the pen.

The pigs needle teeth should be clipped during the first 24 hours to about a fourth of their original length. The navel cord should be clipped about two inches below the belly and dipped in a solution of two percent iodine to lessen the chances for an infection.

The sow should not be fed during the day she farrows but should have plenty of fresh, clean water, the second day after she should get two to three pounds of feed and then a pound per day increase until she is again on full feed.

As an aid for preventing anemia, the county agent suggests placing a pan of clean fertile soil in the house for the pigs to root in or iron shots may be given on about the third day.

The pigs should be creep fed from the first week until they are weaned. The male pigs should be castrated at 2-3 weeks of age and all should be vaccinated for cholera at six weeks of age. Pigs should be weaned at six weeks and wormed when 10 weeks of age.

Make this farrowing season a real pig harvest by following good management practices.

**'64 Feed Grain Signup Nears End**

Friday, March 27, is the last day for filing an application to take part in the 1964 feed grain program, O. E. Moore, chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee said today. He urges growers who are interested in the program to call at the ASCS County Office as soon as possible.

"Time has a way of slipping up on us even though we think we have plenty," the chairman said. "Actually, there are only two working days left in which to sign up for this year's program."

"The office is open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. from Monday to Friday. We don't want anybody to be disappointed because he waited too long."

As last year, Mr. Moore explains, the feed grain program covers corn, grain sorghum, and barley. Minimum diversion under the 1964 program is 20 per cent of the individual farm's total feed grain base.

For diverting more than the minimum acreage from feed grain production into a conserving use, the diversion payment will be figured at a higher rate. If the diversion is 40 per cent or more the higher rate applies to the whole diversion.

Besides the diversion payments (part of which may be paid in advance if the farmer requests it), a participating grower also earns price support payments on the normal production of the acreage planted to one or more of the three feed grains in 1964, and he is also eligible to put his crops under the regular price support loans or purchase agreements.

The Chairman reports that farmer interest in Knox County is not as high as 1963 and requests that all farmers have the program explained before making a final decision.

AUSTIN — District, county, city and precinct officials learned the hard way from the Texas Supreme Court that the constitution and laws mean what they say.

Since 1876, the constitution has provided that a federal or state official is not eligible to serve in the Texas Legislature "during the term to which he was elected" to his previous office.

Even resignation before filing will not cure the ineligibility, the high court held in ruling former Bexar County Commissioner Sam Jorrie off the ballot as a House candidate and in refusing to order ex-Fort Worth City Councilman Doyle Willis certified as a Senate candidate.

Jorrie had resigned February 1, and his successor has been named. Willis' place was automatically vacated when he filed for the Senate. His successor, too, has been named.

The decisions also will apply to a Port Arthur City councilman, Bob Wyde, and to a Fort Worth constable, O. L. Watson, Jr., both of whom had filed in the Democratic primary for legislative seats.

In a Travis County case, the court held that Justice of the Peace Curtis Lacy could not run for re-election because he had moved out of the precinct, and did not meet the law's standard which is: You must have lived in the precinct, county or district.

Shoppers World Inc., of Corpus Christi claimed any type of article may be sold on Sunday if customers sign a certificate that their purchase is necessary to their welfare, health or safety. Spartan stores' attorney attacked the 1961 blue laws constitutionality.

In the Third Court of Civil Appeals, a 1960 ordinance by which LaPorte annexed 12 sq. miles of territory in Harris Co. won approval in a decision reversing the trial court.

REDISTRICTING HEARING SET — Houston federal court has set the showdown hearing on congressional redistricting for Friday.

"We will be ready," said Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr who had anticipated an early setting.

Outcome of the case will determine whether Texas must hold statewide elections for all congressmen or perhaps hastily redraw congressional boundaries in a special session of the Legislature.

U. S. Supreme Court has upheld the Houston court's October 19 finding that present districts are unconstitutionally drawn in favor of rural areas.

### Veterans

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q—Is a veteran given preference in obtaining private employment?

A—A veteran is aided in obtaining private employment by the Veterans Employment Service of the U. S. Department of Labor. This work is carried on through the local state employment offices in each of the 50 states. A veteran also has some re-employment rights for the job he held prior to going into the service. Full details may be obtained at the nearest state employment office.

Q—Can I select my own lot for future burial in Arlington National Cemetery?

A—No. Gravesites are not assigned in advance of immediate requirement. Application may only be made at time of death of the veteran or that of an eligible dependent.

Q—I am a Canadian and have served in the armed forces of the United States but not during wartime. Am I entitled to become an American citizen?

A—An alien with three years active service during peacetime may have this naturalization process authorized and expedited provided he file citizenship papers while in the service or within six months thereafter.
