completed in less than the allotted time under law precluding the calling of a special session, thereby again saving the taxpayers money, and establishing a record. It was the first time in more than 20 years a Legislature has completed its work in so brief a period, Arledge pointed out.

As a farmer-rancher, Arledge has raised cattle, grain, and cotton, and has first-hand knowledge of the problems of people who make their livelihood this way. For 12 years, he was chairman of the Quarterhorse Division of the Texas Cowboy Reunion. He and his brother, Henry Arledge, of Seymour, with whom he was in the cattle business many years, have won many grand championships with their entries at Southwest Stock Shows.

No newcomer to the political scene at the local level, which has provided him with a grassroots viewpoint of problems and projects of the folks he represents in Austin, Arledge was a

member of the City Council at his home town, Stamford, for six years.

Arledge entered the business field as an ice manufacturer at Rochester, in Haskell County, where he lived and worked for five years. In this business, he quickly rose to the top, as attested by his election to the presidency of the Southwestern Ice Manufacturers Association.

A leader in Boy Scout work, Arledge is one of a comparatively few men in the Chisholm Trail Council who have received the Silver Beaver Award, reserved for the peak recognition of service to Scouting by an individual. He is also active in the First Baptist Church of Stamford.

Arledge and his wife, the former Lois Lee, of Haskell County, who taught school in the Rochester area several years, have lived in Stamford since 1930. They have two sons, Jack in the automobile business in Midland, and Jimmy, a building contractor of Abilene.

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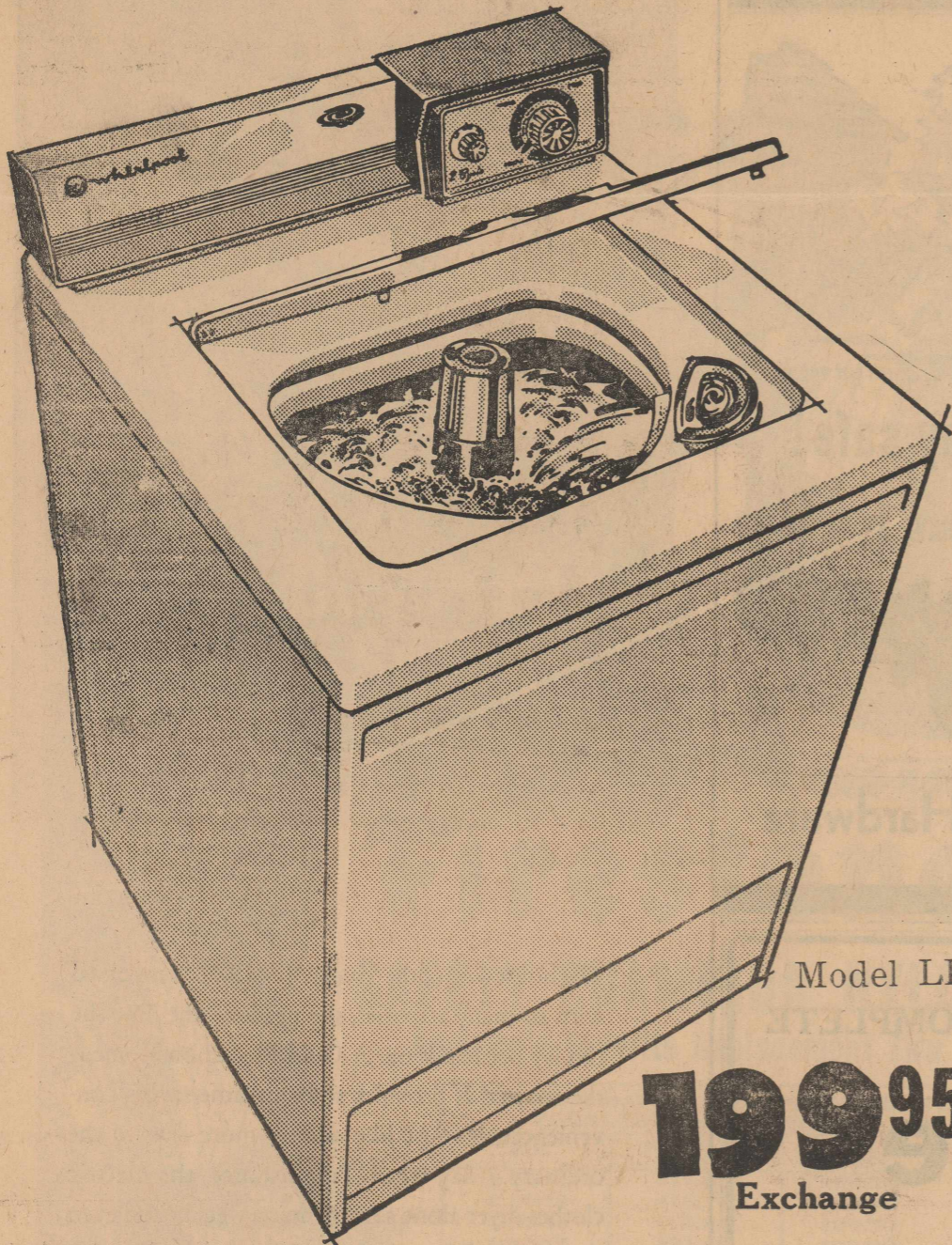
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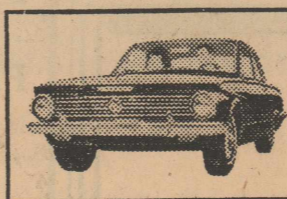
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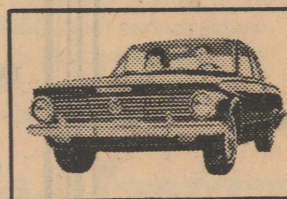
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## STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights By Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

**AUSTIN** — Only the upper 15 per cent of Texas High School graduates ought to be taken in the state's top universities, the Governor's Committee on Education Beyond the High School has been told.

A sub-committee also informed the panel that some type of higher education must be available to all and that there is an urgent need for general upgrading of the college system. Enrollments must be built up, dropouts reduced and standards steadily improved, the study group heard at a meeting last week.

**COURT SPEAKS** — State Supreme Court upheld lower court decisions that approval of \$65,000,000 Millican Dam on the Navasota River is final.

Grimes and Brazos County landowners challenged feasibility of the big federal project. Cities of Bryan, College Station and Navasota asked dismissal of the suit.

High Court also held an East Texas oilman, Austin Stewart, can keep on operating two slanted oil wells that bottom under his own property. Decision overturned a district court order which had knocked out a Railroad Commission order permitting Stewart to produce from the wells.

Supreme Court upheld the right of irrigation district to levy flat-rate assessments against land — regardless of the exact benefit it will obtain from irrigation — when it affirmed a San Antonio appeals court decision on a Maverick County case.

A resident of that county sued

the Maverick County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 contending that a \$5.25-per acre assessment on irrigable lands and a \$2 per acre assessment on lands which could be irrigated by gravity was illegal.

He said his land is rolling and did not benefit as much as level land downed by others in the district, but the trial court, appellate court and the Supreme Court ruled in favor of the water district's right to flat-rate assessment.

**JUVENILE PROGRAM IMPROVING** — Texas Youth Council reports that there has been a sharp and welcome drop in the number of repeaters among juvenile offenders sent to Gatesville, Gainesville and Crockett correctional schools.

In the fall of 1961, the rate of returnees was 45 per cent. Then the 1961 Legislature appropriated funds for expansion and improvement of school facilities and for five council parole officers. By August, 1963, the return rate was down to 29 per cent and youth council spokesmen say they hope to hold this since the parole personnel was increased to 20 last month.

The Rev. Clint Kersey, council parole supervisor, said, "We believe that by an increased stay, we can keep them in school. Then when they are paroled, they are better able to adjust and hold a job, and that cuts the chance of return."

**SCREWWORM APPROPRIATION ASKED** — Gov. Connally has requested a \$5,500,000 congressional appropriation for continued protection against the

screwworm menace.

A two-year program has eradicated the screwworm from Texas, Connally told congressional leaders, and feasibility of a barrier along the Mexican border to prevent re-infestation is provided.

While southwestern states, livestock producers and sportsmen have financed over half the \$12,000,000 program to date, Connally said, it now is an international matter and should be financed by the U. S. without local matching requirements.

The state, producers and sportsmen would continue to provide inspection, survey and other services in the U. S.

**OIL FIELD BRINE** — The Texas Water Pollution Control Board scheduled a hearing for July 1 at 9 a.m. on its order prohibiting the surface disposal of oil field brine in Area II of the Ogallala formation — the Middle High Plains. All area II permit holders are to appear at the hearing and show cause why their permits should not be amended to conform to the no-pit order.

A May 27 hearing has been set for Ogallala area I—the Panhandle area — and a hearing on area IV will be held on August 5.

**THE JUDICIARY** — All gubernatorial candidates have been asked by a State Bar committee to pledge that, if elected, each will consult the bar committee on judicial appointments.

Vernon B. Hill of Mission wrote all candidates that his committee would propose no nominees, but would rate each considered for judicial appointment either exceptionally well qualified, well qualified, or not qualified.

He said a similar procedure is followed by the President of the U. S. and the Attorney General and the American Bar in appointments to the federal judiciary.

State Bar also has named a committee to consult with newspapermen and law officers about the problem of publicity on lawsuits and trials.

Talbot Rain of Dallas is chair-

man, with former District Judge Joe Frazier Brown of San Antonio and Joe H. Reynolds of Houston members.

Apparently, the group will seek to work out some sort of joint code for policing publicly. **"AIRPORT" OFF-LIMITS** — The airstrip at the LBJ Ranch, a single, 6,300-foot runway located 12 miles west of Johnson City, has been declared off-limits to all civilian and military aircraft, "except those on official business with prior permission to use the airport."

An order published by the Texas Aeronautics Commission for the Federal Aeronautics Agency, said aircraft also must avoid flying within one nautical mile of the presidential residence.

The state is offering 369,786 acres of public lands for lease to oil and gas producers. Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler has called for sealed bids on 608 tracts to be submitted by 10 a.m. on May 5.

Sadler predicted the leases will increase the Permanent School Fund by several million dollars.

**SLANT-WELL SUITS** — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr announced that nine new civil penalty suits have been filed against 14 alleged slant-well oil operators in East Texas, making the suit total 106.

First suit to be filed outside of East Texas, as well as the first against an out-of-state defendant, was filed in Jackson County against John Wrather of Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

Carr also filed another "first" suit, claiming a Rusk County gas well was slanted.

**OPINIONS** — Atty. General Carr held in opinions:

Bee County Commissioners are not required to name a board of managers for a county hospital at Beeville which has been leased to Seventh Day Adventists;

A Bexar County man is entitled to credit on his prison sentence for six months held in the county jail;

Term of Titus County Justice of Peace Precinct 1, Place 1, began Jan. 1, 1963 and extends through 1966, while the Titus County J.P., Precinct 1, Place 2 (Unexpired term) serve only through this year.

## VETERANS

### QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

**Q**—Is it true that the VA is discontinuing distribution of free cigarettes in its hospitals and domiciliarys?

**A**—Yes.

**Q**—Who gets top priority for VA hospital treatment?

**A**—Veterans needing hospitalization for injuries or diseases incurred or aggravated in line of duty in active service.

**Q**—I borrowed on my G. I. insurance and want to start paying off the loan with monthly payment. How do I do this?

**A**—Make your check or money order payable to the Veterans Administration and mail it to the VA office where you pay your premiums. Give your insurance number and specify that the payment is to be applied to your loan.

**Q**—How much is paid to a war orphan or eligible peace-time orphan taking part in the VA's Orphans Education Assistance program?

**A**—Students enrolled in the VA's War Orphans Education Assistance program may receive \$110 a month for up to 36 months of schooling or vocational training.

**Q**—I have never asked the VA for anything but I am a

war veteran. Can I get a free physical examination?

**A**—You can get a free examination but it will have to be in connection with your application for some sort of benefit such as hospitalization or to determine if some condition you have may be found to be service-connected. A free examination cannot be had for some private purpose of your own.

**Q**—Some years ago, the VA denied my claim for disability pension. I am becoming increasingly worse. What steps can I take to have my claim considered again?

**A**—Write or visit the VA office which previously studied your claim and enclose a statement from your doctor as to the nature of your disability and its increasing severity. The VA will then send you further instruction.

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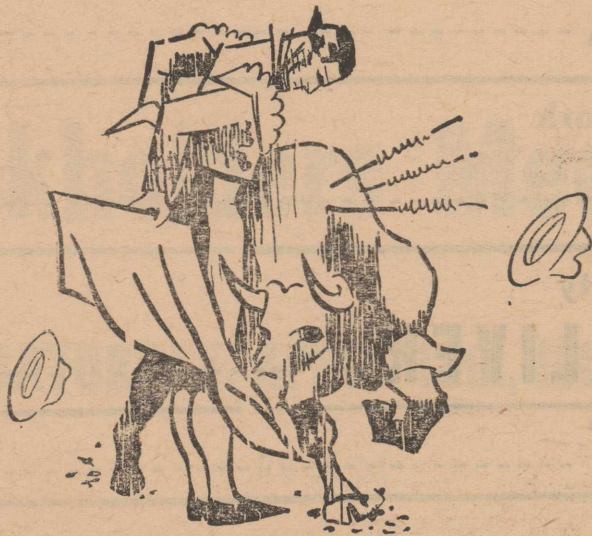

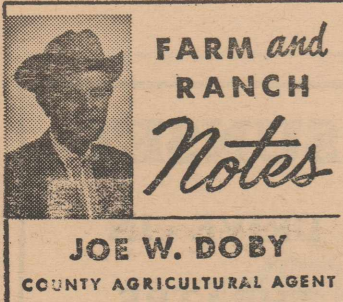

**Teachers Speak To Study Club**

Mmes. A. V. Kemletz and Otis Cash presented the Education program to members of the 1946 Study Club Tuesday at the Woman's Club.

Mrs. Paul Hoge introduced Mrs. Kemletz whose subject was "Readiness In The Six-Year Old." She said that children should be read to before they started to school and that they should be allowed and encouraged to color with crayons. She also recommended letting a child learn to print his name.

She said that learning some of his numbers would help him and that learning the alphabet was also a good thing.

Mrs. Kemletz discussed briefly the changes in teaching arithmetic but said there would be little change in the first grade method of teaching. Foremost in helping the six year old adjust to school was having them observe good health habits, especially getting plenty of rest.

Mrs. Cash spoke on aids parents could give to the high school student. She said they should be taught to respect authority from early childhood.

This should include respect for their parents, respect for God and respect for the laws of the land.

She recommended that par-

ents keep their homes open for their children and their friends. Parents should at an early age, win the confidence of their children and make every effort to keep that confidence. A child should be taught to reason, she continued, and should have plenty of encouragement and guidance. They should be given a place and the time to study. And parents should make every effort to teach them good social habits.

One of the biggest problems teachers hear from parents is that their children will not study. Mrs. Cash said that parents and teachers should attempt to inspire students to study, not just require them to study. Both speakers were presented gifts by the club. 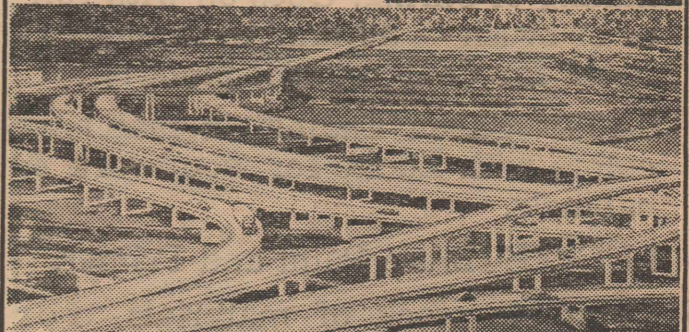
