CHILD AT STAKE

In a hospital room, a child lies seriously ill. Doctors agree on the medical treatment that the child should have. But the child's parents, prompted by sincere religious convictions, will not allow it.

May a court step in? Does society have the power to order medical treatment for a child in defiance of his own parents?

Clearly momentous issues, both moral and legal, are involved. A state has both the right and the duty to protect a child in danger. Yet parents, by and large, are entitled to raise their children as they see fit. And, in most cases of this kind, they buttress their position by pointing to the constitutional guarantee of freedom of religion.

Case by case, in the law's cautious fashion, basic doctrines have been worked out to resolve the dilemma. Broadly speaking, a court may indeed step in and order medical treatment — but it may do so only in extreme circumstances. Before taking that step, the court will weigh these key questions:

How serious is the child's illness?

How risky is the medical treatment that is contemplated?

What are the chances that the treatment will succeed?

In one case, doctors urged surgery to correct a bone disease likely to cause permanent deformity in the victim. Still, the

child's life was in no danger. And the operation, although a common one, did involve an appreciable risk. Refusing to authorize surgery, the court said:

"We have not yet adopted as a public policy the Spartan rule that children belong, not to their parents, but to the state."

In another case, however, a court did authorize removal of a child's eye, because the operation had a good chance of success — and because the alternative was almost certain death. And in a third case a blood transfusion needed by a badly burned child, was given by court order. To the parents' insistence on religious freedom, the court replied:

"The parents in this case have a perfect right to worship as they please and believe what they please. They enjoy complete freedom of religion. But this right of theirs ends where somebody else's right begins. Their child is a human being in his own right, with a soul and body of his own. He has rights of his own."

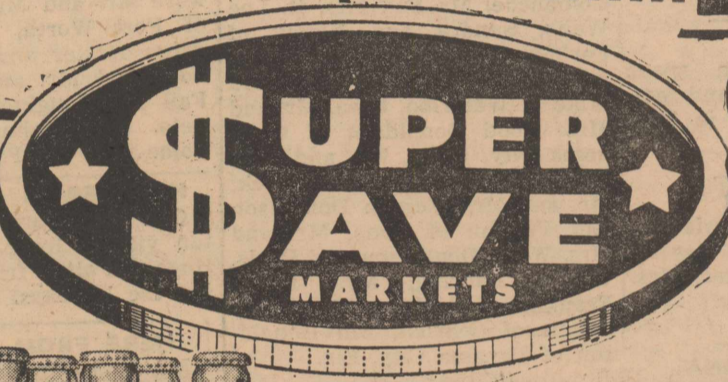

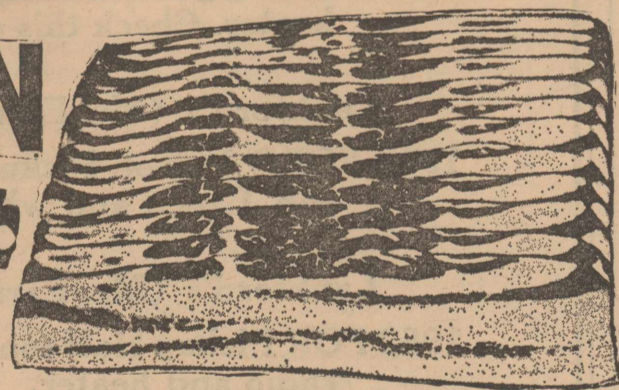

The diapause bollweevil control program in the High Plains has created a great deal of interest in our area. In order to set some of the facts straight, I would like to present the following information.

The boll weevil survives the winter as an adult in protected areas such as ground trash found in fence rows, shelter belts, along creekbanks or around old buildings. In preparation for winter survival, the weevil undergoes certain biological changes in the latter part of the season, assuming a condition known as diapause.

Research has shown that the weevil must attain diapause in order to survive the winter. Diapause is a physiological condition in which reproduction ceases, fat reserves increase, and the respiratory rates are lower when compared with non-diapaused, reproducing weevils.

How much time is required for a boll weevil to attain diapause is not known exactly. It is generally believed that after a weevil emerges a certain period of feeding (two to three weeks) is required before firm diapause is attained. How long a diapause weevil will stay in the cotton field before seeking a hibernation site is another question not fully answered.

The diapaused or overwintered weevils emerge from hibernation in the spring, infest the young cotton and produce the first generation of weevils.

Diapause boll weevil is a program designed to reduce the overwintering weevil population by attacking the diapause population in the fall before weevils leave the field for hibernation. It is logical that if the number of weevils attaining diapause could be significantly reduced fewer weevils would survive the winter to attack cotton the following year.

Experiments have shown that applications of an organophosphorus insecticide such as methyl parathion, guthion or malathion applied at approximately 10-day intervals in the fall will significantly reduce the diapause weevil population.

A program of this type would require from four to seven applications in the fall, beginning at the time weevils begin to enter diapause and continuing at ten-day intervals until frost or desiccation of the crop.

This control program would require that the treated cotton be located in a reasonably isolated area or be applied on a

community or area-wide basis. The program would not be fully effective in cotton with many adjacent untreated fields.

It is important to understand that the boll weevil situation in the High Plains Area differs in many respects from that in the Rolling Plains. The objective of the Plains program was to prevent the weevils from continuing to move west. The operation of the program was to reduce the weevil population as low as possible along the edge of the caprock and just below the caprock with the diapause control program. All infested areas which offered an immediate threat to the Plains were included. The control zone included portions of Hall, Briscoe, Floyd, Motley, Dickens, Kent, Crosby and Garza Counties.

The spray zone contained approximately 300,000 acres of cotton.

Four applications were made over most of the area. Six applications were made in the more heavily infested areas. A total of 1,136,876 acres were sprayed—Cotton only was sprayed in the program.

The program was financed on a matching fund basis by Plains Farmers and the USDA. By contributing 50 cents per bale, the Plains farmers can supply about \$1,000,000 yearly for the program based on the 2 million bale production on the Plains. All the Plains farmers contributed to a program that only covered a small fraction of the acreage.

The program on the Plains is scheduled for three years at present. It is hoped that after that length of time the weevil populations will be reduced to the extent that spot treatment will be enough.

Undiluted technical malathion was applied at the rate of 16 ounces per acre on a 75 foot swath by aircraft.

One important fact to remember is that the diapause control program is control only and not eradication. It would have to be used every year where weevils are present.

For maximum effectiveness, the program must be used with other control practices. If it is unnecessary to spray for weevils during the early season, beneficial populations may be left to help suppress bollworms.

However, it should be realized that this is a boll weevil control program only.

The first years' cost of the High Plains program was about \$1.00 per acre per application.

TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN — Texas Legislators will be back in Austin on January 12, to grapple with an array of problems which could keep them here throughout the summer.

Congressional and legislative redistricting, taxes and appropriations top the agenda of con-

troversial subjects for the 59th session.

Many lawmakers feel they barely will come to grips with the redistricting issue before expiration of the regular session in May. Special sessions very likely will be necessary to settle this explosive matter in line with the one-man-one-vote theory laid down by court decision.

Proposed expenditures for higher education and teacher pay increases look like top topics for debate in the spending area.

Other legislation sure to stir strong interest and hot tempers includes horse race betting, oil and gas lease pooling, water planning and development, mixed drink sales and judicial pay

raises. No significant change in the power structure of either house of the Legislature is likely.

House Speaker Byron Tunnell is assured of another term and Lt. Gov. Preston Smith will begin his second term as presiding officer of the Senate.

There are only two members in the Senate and 42 in the House.

CRIME RATE UP — Texas' crime rate jumped nearly 12 per cent in 1964, says the Department of Public Safety.

Rate increased from 2,261 offenses per 100,000 population in 1962 to 2,675 this year. This fact led a committee of Texas mayors to call on Gov. John Connally for advice as to action needed. Connally promised to cooperate and urged the 10 mayors to have their city attorneys review proposed revisions in the state code of criminal procedure.

Hayor Hank Avery, Texas Municipal League president, blamed the increase on crowded court dockets, loose bail bond procedures, easy paroles after short imprisonment, weakening of parental responsibility and separate trials for codefendants. Avery is mayor of Midland.

Dallas Mayor Erik Jonson and San Antonio Mayor Walter McAllister noted the high number of repeat arrests. Jonson suggested that traffic violations by drivers with suspended licenses be made penitentiary offenses. He also proposed legislation to make it harder for persons charged with multiple crimes to be released on bond.

STATE SALES TAX — There is guarded talk in the halls of the State Capitol, by lawmakers who would rather remain anonymous for now, that the two-percent sales tax will be extended to cover grocery purchases when the 1965 Legislature meets.

State sales tax law passed three years ago brought in \$204,736, 161 during the fiscal year which ended August 31. This tax accounted for 12 cents of every State revenue dollar.

But expected demands on State resources — to meet the teachers' pay raises, improvement of higher education facilities, and upgrading of other State services is expected to be the trigger for making the sales tax applicable to groceries, heretofore exempt.

ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES — A person cannot be paid as a Texas legislator and as a school teacher at the same time, says Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr.

Opinion, requested by Speaker Tunnell for Rep-Elect Joe J. Bernal of San Antonio, said that school teachers elected to the Legislature must forego a state-paid teaching salary during their entire legislative terms. Texas legislators now get annual salaries of \$4,800.

In other opinions, Carr held: County judges are authorized to pass on whether informal letters constitute petitions for re-examination of state mental hospital patients. Cherokee Co. At-

torney Paul B. Cox of Rusk asked the opinion for County Judge J. W. Chandler.

Waco officials must return a West Virginia parole violator through the usual extradition formalities. (Opinion requested by McLennan Co. Atty Don Hall.)

Legislature man authorize Texas Water Development Board to lend money for developing underground water, but it may not authorize the board to guarantee bond issues for that purpose. (Opinion requested by Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake.)

COURTS SPEAK — Texas' 1909 "full crew law" requiring five-man crews on freight trains does not apply to modern diesel-powered trains operating in interstate commerce, Austin District Judge Herman Jones held.

Jones granted summary judgment to Southern Pacific Railway. Attorney General Carr brought suit.

Jones also entered judgments of \$46,600 and \$6,000 in slant oil well suits filed by Carr. Wells were located in Rusk and Gregg counties.

Attorney General now has recovered \$1,108,195 from drillers and operators of oil wells alleged to have been diviated in violation of State Railroad Commission rules.

TEXAS BANDS WASHINGTON-BOUND — Southwest Texas State College band of San Marcos and the University of Texas Longhorn band will represent the State of Texas in the Inaugural Parade following Pres. Lyndon Johnson's swearing-in in Washington, D. C., January 20.

State Democratic Chairman Marvin Watson of Daingerfield, speaking for the official Inaugural Committee, announced the committee's selection.

Bands must raise their own funds to pay transportation expense.

NEW HIGHWAY PROJECTS Texas Highway Commission authorized construction of a \$211,400 farm-to-market road on FM 496 in Duval County; widening of Buck Creek Bridge on U. S. 83 in Childress County; and highway development studies for Eagle Pass, Del Rio and Seymour.

FM 496 project will run 12.4 miles from a point nine miles north of Jim Hogg County line. Bridge widening is a \$65,000 undertaking.

US Bureau of Public roads announced that there are more miles of roads in Texas than any other state — 236,464 miles, compared to California's 154,519; Kansas' 132,823, and Alaska's 6,230 miles.

PARKS POPULARITY UP — Parks and Wildlife Director J. Weldon Watson reports that authorized State Park improvements are well ahead of schedule.

Parks will be ready for what the Department predicts will be the "greatest park year in history," says Watson.

State parks attendance for '64 was 7,900,000 visitors, compared to 7,200,000 in 1963.

Development of a proposed LBJ State Park across from the LBJ Ranch in Gillespie County will further increase park attendance.

Watson now is conferring with a Tennessean who recently purchased the property along Ranch Road 1 for commercial purposes. New owner planned to build motel there.

TEXAS GOP TO MEET — First meeting of State Republican Executive Committee since the November general election is set for January 15-16 in Dallas. Chairman Peter O'Donnell Jr.

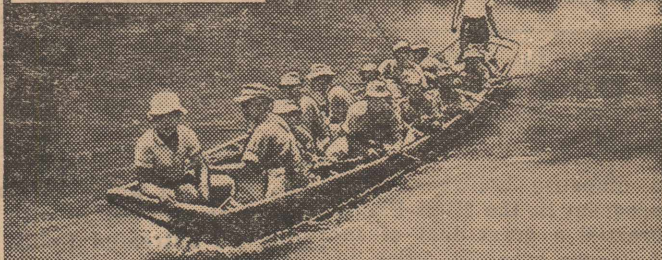

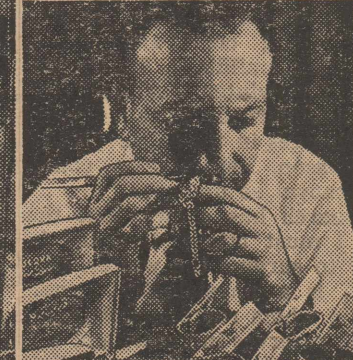
