



**Residents Father Dies In Granbury** 


Funeral services were held Sunday for Robert Daniel Williamson, a retired merchant marine, who died Friday in Granbury.

\$50,000 Fire In **O'Brien Tuesday** 

Farmers Compress -Co., of Rule and Waco had a fire in one of their warehouses in O'Brien at 4 p.m. Tuesday and estimated loss was approximately \$50,000.



The average salary paid in the United States was \$8646, while Texas public colleges and universities paid an average of \$7740, a study by TCHE shows.

Even within the state there are wide discrepancies which enable some institutions to attract the ablest faculty members from lower-paying schools.

There was a \$4000 difference in the average salary paid professors at state-supported institutions in 1963-64.



Nor would many readers doubt Robinson Crusoe's conclusion, from the circumstantial evidence of a strange footprint in the sand, that another human being had come to his island. Of course, circumstantial evidence can be weak. One court gave this example: a country doctor, upon seeing a saddle un der his patient's bed, deduced that the patient had eaten a

Circumstantial? Yes, but the court found it convincing anyhow.


