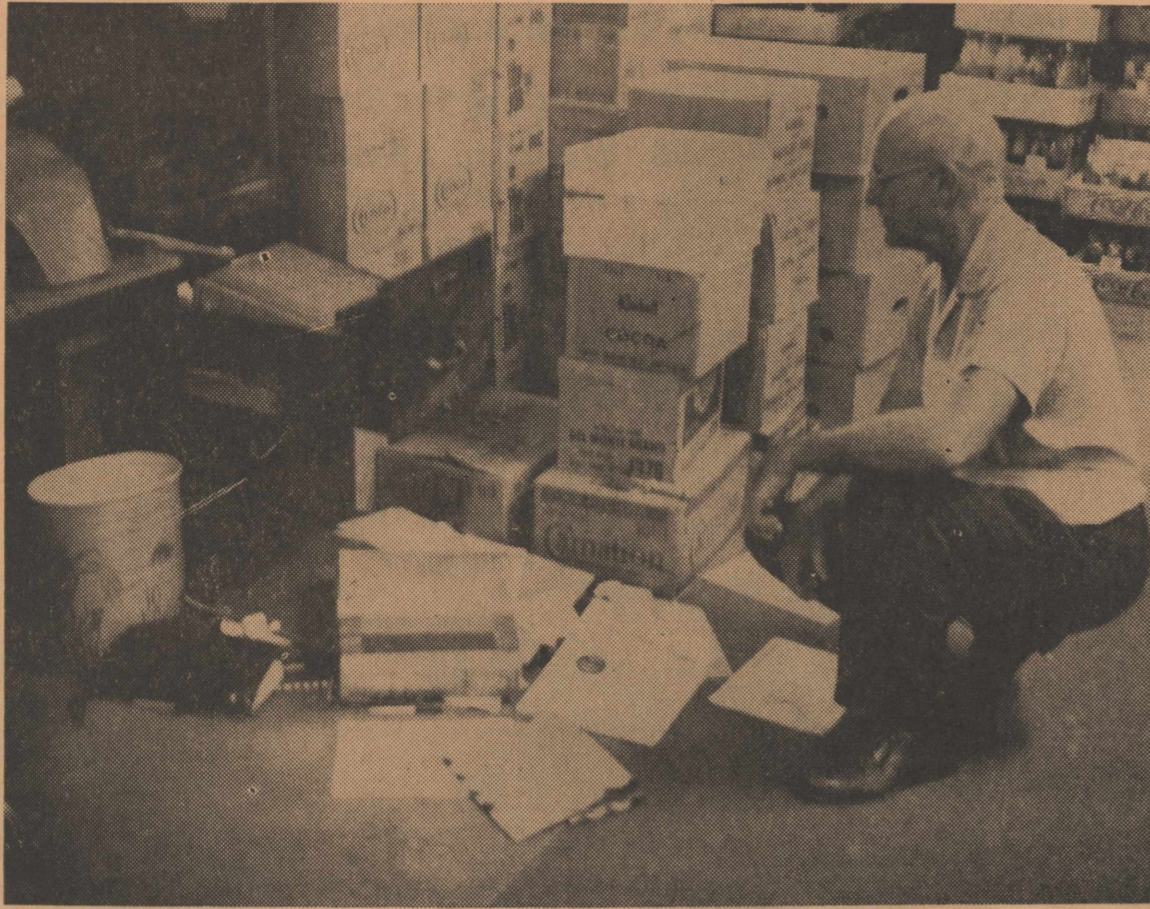

## SUSPECTS APPREHENDED AFTER LOCAL BURGLARY ATTEMPTS

Three Lubbock men were taken in custody approximately two hours after a burglary of the Knox City Postoffice was reported at 2 a.m. Friday morning.

In custody in the Benjamin County jail are Jimmy Cross, 23 Charles McCafferty 28, and Edwin Daniel 27, suspects in the offense.

Constable Leroy Davis noticed the suspects' car when he made his 2 a.m. rounds and the car was parked just north of the post office in the E. J. Ward Sand and Gravel Yard. Davis took the license number and later reported to the sheriff's department the make, model and description of the 1957 yellow Buick automobile.

Davis didn't discover the burglary until approximately 2:10, when he noticed the front door of the post office standing open.

Chief of Police Bill Stone had already been called to help him investigate other business.

Within minutes after the discovery, all local and state law enforcement agencies were notified. Sheriff H. C. Stone came to Knox City immediately to head the investigation, accompanied by Ranger Homer T. Melton. Mrs. Kenneth LaMascus and her husband, Deputy LaMascus and Deputy Doc Clark of Munday set up road blocks and made a tour of the rest of the county.

Postal Inspector K. H. Bullard of Wichita Falls was notified by Sheriff Stone and the postoffice scene with partially peeled safe door, burglars tools, flashlight, etc., were left undisturbed until his arrival at 4 o'clock.

Officers received a call from the Lubbock City police shortly thereafter and LaMascus, Bill Stone and Davis were enroute to Lubbock at 4:25 to interrogate the three suspects and for Davis to identify the car. Due to the quick action on the lawmen's part the Lubbock police were waiting for the car as it entered the city limits.

"M" System's burglary was discovered when O. W. Caussey, manager opened his back door and discovered the lock broken. A small filing cabinet was

opened and papers thrown over the floor in the back of the building. The burglars took about \$30 in silver, a \$5 bill and five ones, he reported, besides 52 cartons of cigarettes and several pairs of leather work gloves.

Ranger Melton discovered the cigarettes near the spot where the car was parked in some weeds. He and Inspector Bullard were looking for tracks as well as loot from the robbery when the cigarettes were discovered.

The gloves taken from "M" System were apparently used in both burglaries.

Officers surmised the burglars were scared from the scene of the crime before entry could be gained to the safe, as tools were left where they dropped them. Although other doors in the office were pried open, nothing was missing, Postmaster Jeff Graham reported.

A safe expert from Wichita Falls was called to finish opening the battered door of the safe and he had it open in approximately 15 minutes.

The suspects were returned to Knox City at 4 p.m. Friday and were brought before Justice of the Peace Joe Simmons Court.

Judge Simmons set bail at \$5,000 on each offense for a total of \$10,000 for each suspect.

They were removed to county jail immediately after bail was set where they are awaiting further developments.

## ★ ALL WORK AND NO PAY ARE YEGGS REWARD

Postmaster Jeff Graham told law enforcement officers early Friday morning: "I'll bet you whoever did this isn't local, 'cause we advertise the fact we don't keep any money in our safe."

Although the safe crackers could have had the door open in another few minutes they still wouldn't have gotten into the money drawer as it is protected with two-inch steel plate and with the tools they were working with they would have been there a month, was the opinion of the safe expert from Wichita Falls who finally opened the safe.

O. W. Caussey was just as surprised as Graham, for he too, has made it known he doesn't keep much money on hand. "M" System has a real significant record as far as robberies are concerned. In 1961 their safe was broken into and the thugs received less than \$2. Two years ago two men grabbed some bills from the cash register of Mrs. Vernon Buckley, a checker in the store, and were promptly caught and tried in the same day!

The latest attempt included over \$200 in cash and cigarettes, all has been recovered, with the exception of maybe a dollar or two.

The two burglaries Friday the thirteenth netted the robbers the whole sum of nothing but trouble, is the way the arithmetic figures.

Knox City's coaches were guests of the Lions Club Wednesday and Coach Bill West was featured speaker.

He was introduced by Paul Clayton, program chairman. Coach West explained to the group what he considered the most important aspects of the coaching profession and "Why I'm a Coach."

He said football was one of the best ways to teach life to a group of boys and he said although no one tries to tell a boy what church to belong to, they do instill in them that there is a supreme being. . . . Other duties Coach West put at the top of the list were to help the youngsters realize that teamwork is a necessity to get along in life. He said a player did not have to be the star of the show to receive all the glory but that hard work and competition were more important and that through them they could reach their goal.

Athletes also have to make more sacrifices the coach said, and to illustrate his point he said players had to sacrifice a good time, parties, staying out late, and had to leave alcohol and tobacco alone in order to stay on the team.

"We also try to teach that they must have a good sense of humor," he told the group. Also, he said they tried to teach them to set their goal and to reach it the best way they could.

"Those are some of the tangible things we try to teach our boys," the coach concluded.

A question and answer session was concluded with coaches Bill Harrington and Oneal Weaver making a short talk to the club.

The Knox City band will have its first performance this year on September 3 during half-time activities between the Wylie and Knox City football game — Everyone is invited to come out and watch the band.

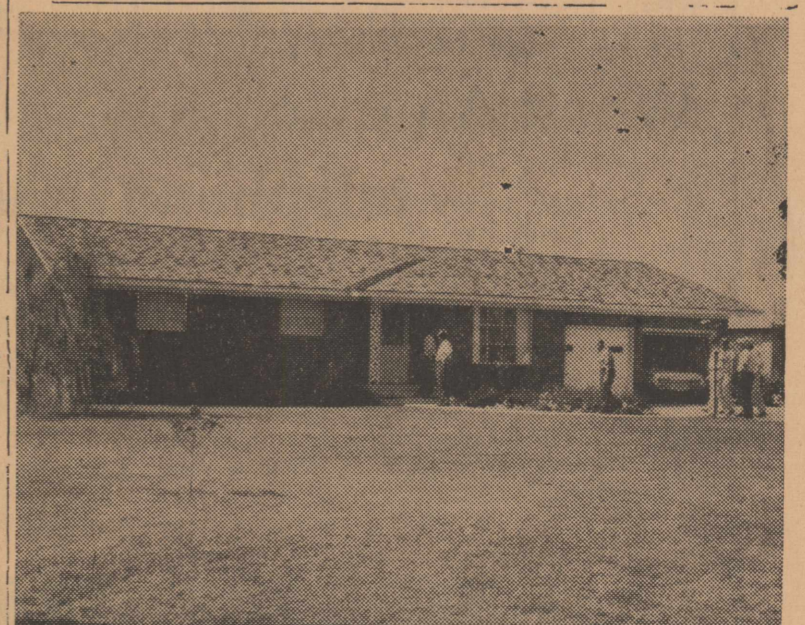
## Missionary Church To Hold Services

## James Duncan, Carlton Rhodes Make More History For O'Brien High School

A fantastic four-touchdown effort by speedy James Duncan of O'Brien proved to be barely enough as the West All-Stars scored a narrow 30-23 victory over the upset-minded East Six Man All-Stars in the Texas Six and Eight Man Coaching School all-star grid contest Friday night in Abilene.

Duncan, who has made and broken all kinds of record for the O'Brien Bulldogs was accompanied by another star, LaCarlton Rhodes, the first Negro to play in the Texas Six and Eight Man Coaching School All-Star Games.

The photo-finish battle climaxed the third day of the coaching association's clinic held in Abilene last week.

The O'Brien fullback turned in a brilliant running performance, which netted him a total of 168 yards rushing — 34 yards more than the entire Eastern squad could muster on the ground.

Duncan and his teammates waited until the second quarter before making their move. After two fake punts by Sidney McCown of Miles moved the ball within the East's 15-yard line, Duncan carried it to the one-yard line and then plunged across for the TD. Courtney King of Blackwell kicked the extra points to tie the score at 8-8.

But Duncan wasn't going to stop there. Six plays later, the 170-pound fullback scampered around right end on a fake double-reverse and dashed 50 yards down the sideline for an-

other six-pointer. Once again, the talented toe of King put the pigskin through the uprights and the West took the lead, 16-8.

The East came roaring back two minutes later when Jordan intercepted a pass on the West's first play off scrimmage. Quarterback Bud Strong of Iredell then flipped a 15 yarder to end Johnny Sartor, also of Iredell, for a TD. Darrell Streater of Normanee missed the conversion, and the half ended with the West leading, 16-14.

After gaining a fantastic 90 yards in the first half, Duncan proved that he was still good for many more when he opened the second half by galloping 55 yards around right end for another West tally. Vance Jones of Marathon booted the conversion points.

On the kickoff, Leos romped for 20 yards to set up the East on the West three-yard line. Jordan took things into his capable hands again and dashed into the end zone for his second touchdown of the night. Streater added the two point conversion.

LaCarlton Rhodes scrambled 30 yards on the kickoff to set up yet another West threat, but Leos made a perfect diving tackle in the end zone to separate the West's receiver from the ball and kill the drive.

Still vainly fighting, the East put on a sustained drive which carried the ball to the West's three-yard line. Jordan flipped a short pass to Sartor in the end zone for a TD. Sartor's second, but Streater's kick went wide of the uprights and the score was set at 30-28.

The East made one last desperate effort to close the gap when Shalor Copeland of Strawn recovered a West fumble with less than a minute remaining. The chance faded away, however, when the East lost the ball on downs after three straight incomplete passes. The clock ran out with the West possessing the pigskin.

### 10% Of All Deaths In Texas, Accidents

The waning days of summer vacation activities are attracting more and more Texas parents and their children out into the wonderful outdoors for a last fling at fun in the sun before the reopening of school starts confining them to home.

This is a time of increased exposure to the hazards of accidents and unexpected emergencies which inevitably come with accelerated outdoor activity.

Of the approximately 70,000 people who die each year in Texas, about 10 per cent die as a result of accidents. Doubtless, many are saved by prompt emergency care, but many more could be saved.

It's not at all uncommon to find that many people throw all responsibility on the physician or rescue squad personnel who respond to emergency calls, undertaking none themselves except to telephone for help.

Many times they simply do not know what to do; other times they are too excited to think or act wisely. The urgency of the situation may lead people to give grossly improper care for burns, internal injuries or extensive lacerations and abrasions.

The person telephoning for help should not rely upon the physician or ambulance attendant to give him advice; he should find out by asking directly what to do until help arrives.

In most situations the telephone conversation need not be rushed; there is time, for instance, for careful directions in cases of heart attack, burns, or head injury. Even though the caller has never had a course in first aid or has forgotten what he has learned, he can still obtain directions that may save a life.

"Hurry cases" of first aid include cessation of breathing, severe bleeding and poisoning. In such cases a delay of even a few minutes could result in death. Rescue squads save extremely few people who have stopped breathing unless someone has given artificial respiration or resuscitation on the spot.

Teaching Texans to react promptly and efficiently in emergencies is one of the prime goals of the "medical self-help" courses conducted around the

### SCS Plant Center Is Progressing Nicely

A new installation of the Soil Conservation Service is coming into its own at Knox City. The Plant Materials Center operated by the SCS is located on 60 acres of land leased from Tom Campbell five miles north west of Knox City.

The purpose of the Plant Materials Center is to assemble, evaluate and produce grasses and legumes for the range, pasture and other soil conservation programs in Texas. Promising grasses are assembled from many sources and studied at the Center. Those that might fill a need for plants not presently available will be produced in limited quantities for further field testing.

The best methods of establishing the right plants, harvesting the forage and seed and managing the stands will also be studied at the Center and in the field trials.

Seed of species or strains that prove desirable in the field plantings will be made available to growers for commercial production through the Soil Conservation Districts.

Work on the Plant Center started during the late winter when Mr. Campbell built the steel building that serves as an office, seed cleaning and storage area. Arnold Davis, manager and Ulric Lea, field superintendent, moved equipment into the building and started the field work in early April. The first plantings were made on May 5.

Twenty-three grasses from different sources were planted in production fields ranging in size from one tenth acre to one and a quarter acres. The seed from these fields will be planted on farms and ranches over the state.

Most of these grasses have proven their worth but are in short supply. Part of them are also strains that are not in the commercial trade and need testing for range and pasture plant-

ings in untried areas. In addition to the production fields approximately 600 20 foot rows have been planted to over 100 species for observational studies. Each row or series of rows represents a collection made from a different plant community. Most of them were made by the SCS personnel in Texas.

Many different range sites and soil types provided the original home for these grasses. In many cases variations in the growth forms are starting to show up between different collections of the same species. A few introduced grasses, those not native to the United States, are also planted in the observational area. These will be studied to fill a need not met by the better known native grass species.

## THE FAMILY LAWYER

### RELATIVES IN YOUR HOME

When Betty's aging mother-in-law moved into the household, no one said a word about money. For the next four years, Betty dutifully performed the various tasks thus added to her chores — including some nursing care. After the older woman died, Betty, backed by her husband, put in a claim against the estate for services rendered.

But another son fearing a cut in his share, raised an objection. "Mother never promised to pay for Betty's services," he argued in a court test.

"Not in so many words," conceded Betty. "But a promise should be presumed because of all the extra work I did for her."

However, the court, finding no adequate evidence of a promise-to-pay denied her claim. And that is the usual rule. The law will not presume, without good reason, that a relative who has joined the household intends to pay for his care.

Of course, special circumstances may convince the court in a particular case that payment was indeed intended. Suppose, for instance, that the services were especially onerous.

Or that the relative was especially wealthy. Or that the relationship was a distant one. Or

that the extra work prevented the claimant from earning money elsewhere. Such facts would argue that, even though nothing was said, payment — sooner or later — was taken for granted.

But by and large, the courts are wary of these claims. After all, in most cases, the issue arises only after the relative is dead — forever beyond questioning.

The claimant might be trying to collect merely as an afterthought, with no prior understanding at all.

Besides, the law is reluctant to find financial motives within the family circle. In one case, a man kept detailed records of his mother-in-law's periodic visits during the last few years of her life. When she died, he presented an itemized bill for his hospitality.

But the court dismissed his claim with this comment:

"It would be a crime against nature and humanity to give to all the courtesies, favors, and visits that are exchanged between parents and children the mercenary quality of dollars and cents."

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

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

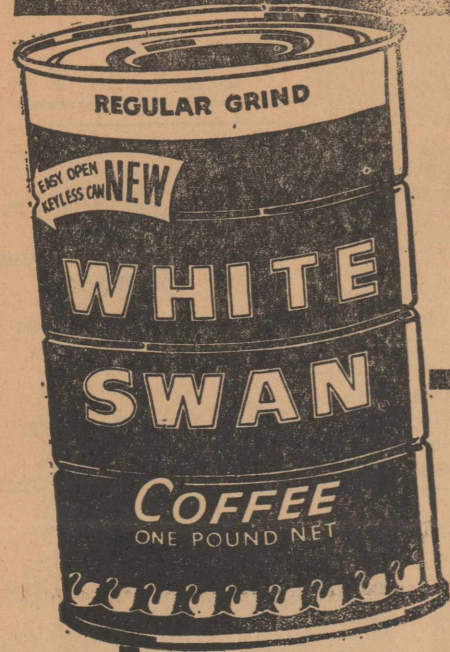

# STATE CAPITAL Highlights AND Sidelights by Vern Sanford TEXAS PRESS ASSOCIATION

AUSTIN — Federal authorities have brought suit here to abolish the poll tax as a requirement for voting in Texas elections. Suit was filed under the new voting rights act.

If they are successful in getting an early hearing, a special session of the Legislature may be necessary to enact a valid voter registration statute.

Texas' poll tax is the only existing form of registration for state and local elections. However, there is a procedure for obtaining "free" poll taxes to vote in federal elections.

Observers feel near chaos would result at the polls next year if a final ruling is handed down in favor of the federal suit, without prior enactment of

registration procedures.

Although the U. S. Attorney General maintains the tax is not used to raise revenue for the state, Comptroller Robert S. Calvert estimates over \$5 million income for the next biennium from that source. That's \$5,000,000 the state treasury won't get if the poll tax is repealed. Reliable estimates so far see the biennium ending with government in the black by only \$1,300,000 to \$4,200,000 including income from all existing levies.

Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr has announced he will oppose the federal suit to invalidate the poll tax and to enjoin state and local officials from enforcing its requirements for any general, special or primary elections.

Suit seeks to direct Travis Co.

Tax Collector Fritz Robinson and his employees to compile and certify local lists "without regard to payment of the poll tax or any other tax."

**BOUNDARY DISPUTE AIR-ED** — First meeting of negotiating committees from Texas and Louisiana reached no firm conclusions in their effort to settle a long-standing boundary dispute between the states.

Room was seen for arbitration of the dividing line in the Sabine River ship channel at the Gulf jetties. But the river boundary question seems likely to end up in federal courts.

At stake in the dispute are valuable mineral rights along the river, as well as control of fishing and future barge traffic. Texas contends the middle of the Sabine should be the boundary between the states. Louisiana claims the line was extended to the west bank of the river by the 1803 Louisiana Purchase.

Negotiators agreed to keep trying — perhaps to study possible extension of a federal boundary running between jetties bordering the channel — and to exchange briefs in future meetings.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler presided at the initial conference. High State officials and legislators from both states were present.

**ENROLLMENTS TO SOAR** — Texas Commission on Higher Education forecasts that college and university enrollments in Texas will zoom from 280,106 to nearly 400,000 by 1971.

Enrollments in the state-supported institutions are due to increase from 168,000 to 240,000.

Nearly all Texas schools report they are short on space for their present students. Predicted increases will affect every one of the existing state-supported institutions, Commission believes.

**ATTORNEY GENERAL RULES** — In recent official opinions Atty. Gen. Carr has held that:

- A valid surface lease on land being purchased under the state veterans' land program cannot be given in excess of ten years.

- First assistants and chief deputies in state departments are entitled to reimbursement for actual meals, lodging and incidental expenses while traveling on official business inside or outside the state.

- Employees of the State Highway Department who drill or supervise drilling of an occasional water well on land owned by the state do not have to be registered as drillers under new act.

- Unclaimed wages and personal property held in Texas by foreign corporations for persons whose last known address is unknown or outside Texas must be reported to the State Treasurer under escheat statutes.

- Vouchers issued to colleges and universities providing teacher training under a plan approved by Central Education Agency and U. S. Government are valid.

- No refunds may be made by the State Comptroller for unused cigarette tax stamps purchased prior to September 1, 1959.

**DRAFT IN TEXAS** — State Selective Service officials say Texas men born in 1946 and after are safe from the draft — with occasional exceptions — through October. But some of them may be called up for military service in November.

Married men who are not fourth rank are 1-A, but are in the fourth rank of selection. Most draftees come from the third rank.

Col. M. S. Schwartz, head of the state office says the state policy toward college students is "No college Students."

However, the plight of persons deferred as students or because of their occupations is in the hands of local draft boards.

**SHORT SNORTS** — State Insurance Board reaffirmed its July 1 order boosting auto insurance rates an average of 13.4 per cent. Rates went into effect on Aug. 1.

Attorney General Carr defended constitutionality of the Texas Legislature's version of House of Representatives redistricting and asked federal court to set immediate deadline for further petitions in intervention on the suit.

Texas Employment Commission has set up a new special programs department, headed by Harrell Townsend of San Angelo, to handle growing number of federal-state cooperative manpower projects.

Texas National Guard and Reserve forces will be ready for merger if and when delayed amalgamation plans are revived, says Maj. Thomas S. Bishop, adjutant general.

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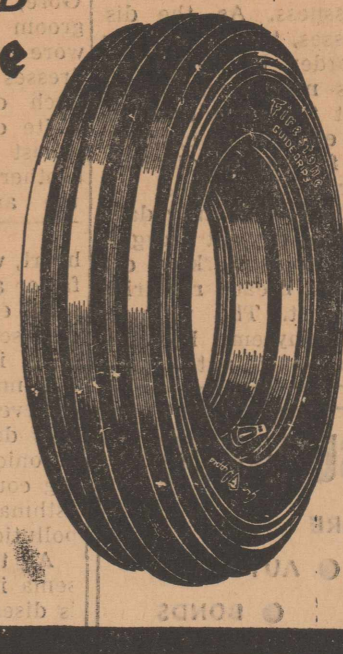

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TEN ON THE BALLOT

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 47** proposing an Amendment to Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas, to provide four-year terms of office for State Representatives.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 4, Article III, Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. The members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen by the qualified electors for the term of four years; but a new House of Representatives shall be chosen after every apportionment, and the members elected after each apportionment shall be divided by lot into two classes. The seats of the members of Class A shall be vacated at the expiration of the first two years, and those of Class B at the expiration of four years, so that one-half of the members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen biennially thereafter. Representatives shall take office following their election, on the day set by law for the convening of the Regular Session of the Legislature, and shall serve thereafter for the full term of one year to which they are elected, and until their successors shall have been elected and qualified. Except in case of an election to fill a vacancy, and election in the first election following each re-apportionment, a person who has been elected to the House of Representatives shall not be eligible to be a candidate again for membership in the Legislature until the term for

which he was elected has less than one year remaining."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified voters of the state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment to provide for a four-year term of office for State Representatives."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment to provide for a four-year term of office for State Representatives."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the constitution and laws of this state.

Sec. 4. In the event the Constitutional Amendment proposed in this Resolution is adopted by the people of Texas in the election in November, 1965, the Governor of Texas is directed not to issue a proclamation for the election and not to publish notice thereof for the Constitutional Amendment proposed by House Joint Resolution No. 1 of the 59th Texas Legislature, since the provisions of said House Joint Resolution No. 1 are included in this Resolution. But, should this proposed Amendment be rejected by the people of Texas in the election in November, 1965, then the terms and provisions of House Joint Resolution No. 1 shall be and remain in full force and effect and shall be proclaimed, published and submitted to the electorate in November, 1966, as provided in said House Joint Resolution No. 1.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 14** proposing Amendments to Section 4, 22 and 23 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office and Secretary of State; and certain statutory state officers; providing for the necessary election and the form of the ballot; and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

**RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 4, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Governor shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this state at least five years immediately preceding his election."

Sec. 2. That Section 22, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the state in all

suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the state in which the state may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the state, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 3. That Section 23, Article IV of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified; receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the state during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not

receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this Section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Sec. 4. The foregoing Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendments providing a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution."

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendments providing a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution."

Sec. 5. Nothing contained in this Resolution shall be construed so as to extend the term of office of any officerholder previously elected to a two-year term.

Sec. 6. The Governor shall issue the necessary Proclamation for the said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.

#### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 57** proposing an Amendment to Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adding to said Section as presently written, the following provisions: requiring automatic retirement of certain District and Appellate Judges at age seventy-five (75) or such earlier age, not under seventy (70), as may be provided by law; creating a State Judicial Qualifications Commission and providing for its composition and the qualifications, methods of selection and terms of office of its members; defining the functions and procedures of said Commission, including the duty to investigate, and hold hearings in respect of, disability and misconduct of District and Appellate Judges and to make recommendations to the Supreme Court of Texas for involuntary retirement or removal of such Judges; empowering the Supreme Court of Texas, in its discretion, to retire such Judges for disability and to remove them for misconduct, upon recommendation of the aforesaid Commission and consideration of the record made before it; defining misconduct for which said Judges may be so removed; providing that the proceedings of said Commission shall be confidential until filed in the Supreme Court with recommendation for retirement or removal; and providing that the removal provisions hereby established shall be alternative to and cumulative of those provided elsewhere in the Constitution.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 1-a of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so that said Section shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 1-a. (1) Subject to the further provisions of this Section, the Legislature shall provide for the retirement and compensation of Justices and Judges of the Appellate Courts and District and Criminal District Courts on account of length of service, age, and disability, and for their reassignment to active duty where and when needed. The office of every such Justice and Judge shall become vacant when the incumbent reaches the age of seventy-five (75) years or such earlier age, not less than seventy (70) years, as the Legislature may prescribe; but, in the case of an incumbent whose term of office includes the effective date of this Amendment, this provision shall not prevent

him from serving the remainder of said term nor be applicable to him before his period or periods of judicial service shall have reached a total of ten (10) years.

"(2) There is hereby created the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, to consist of nine (9) members, to wit: (i) two (2) Justices of Courts of Civil Appeals; (ii) two (2) District Judges; (iii) two (2) members of the State Bar, who have respectively practiced as such for over ten (10) consecutive years next preceding their selection; (iii) three (3) citizens, at least thirty (30) years of age, not licensed to practice law, nor holding any salaried public office or employment; provided that no person shall be or remain a member of the Commission, who does not maintain physical residence within this State, or who resides in, or holds a judgeship within or for, the same Supreme Judicial District as another member of the Commission, or who shall have ceased to retain the qualifications, above specified for his respective class of membership. Commissioners of classes (i) and (ii) above shall be chosen by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, those of class (iii) by the Board of Directors of the State Bar under regulations to be prescribed by the Supreme Court with advice and consent of the Senate, and those of class (iii) by appointment of the Governor with advice and consent of the Senate.

"(3) The regular term of office of Commissioners shall be six (6) years; but, the initial members of each of classes (i), (ii) and (iii) shall respectively be chosen for terms of four (4) and six (6) years, and the initial members of class (iii) for respective terms of two (2), four (4) and six (6) years. Interim vacancies shall be filled in the same manner as vacancies due to expiration of a full term, but only for the unexpired portion of the term. In question, Commissioners may succeed themselves in office only if having served less than three (3) consecutive years.

"(4) Commissioners shall receive no compensation for their services as such. The Legislature shall provide for the payment of the necessary expense for the operation of the Commission.

"(5) The Commission may hold its meetings, hearings and other proceedings at such times and places as it shall determine but shall meet at Austin at least once each year. It shall annually select one of its members as Chairman. A quorum shall consist of five (5) members. Proceed-

ings shall be by majority vote of those present, except that recommendations for retirement or removal of Justices or Judges shall be by affirmative vote of at least five (5) members.

"(6) Any Justice or Judge within the scope of this Section 1-a may, subject to the other provisions hereof, be removed from office for willful or persistent conduct, which is clearly inconsistent with the proper performance of his said duties or casts public discredit upon the judiciary or administration of justice; or any such Justice or Judge may be involuntarily retired for disability seriously interfering with the performance of his duties, which is, or is likely to become, permanent in nature.

"(7) The Commission shall keep itself informed as fully as may be of circumstances relating to misconduct or disability of particular Justices or Judges, receive complaints or reports, formal or informal, from any source in this behalf, and make such preliminary investigations as it may determine. Its orders for the attendance or testimony of witnesses or for the production of documents at any hearing or investigation shall be enforceable by contempt proceedings in the District Court.

"(8) The Commission may, after such investigation as it deems necessary, order a hearing to be held before it concerning the removal or retirement of a Justice or Judge, or it may in its discretion request the Supreme Court to appoint an active or retired District Judge or Justice of a Court of Civil Appeals as a Master to hear and take evidence in any such matter, and to report thereon to the Commission. If, after hearing, or after considering the record and report of a Master, the Commission finds good cause therefore, it shall recommend to the Supreme Court the removal or retirement, as the case may be, of the Justice or Judge in question and shall thereupon file with the Clerk of the Supreme Court the entire record before the Commission.

"(9) The Supreme Court shall review the record of the proceedings on the law and facts and in its discretion may, for good cause shown, permit the introduction of additional evidence and shall order removal or retirement, as it finds just and proper, or wholly reject the recommendation. Upon an order for involuntary retirement for disability or an order for removal, the office in question shall become vacant.

"(10) All papers filed with and proceedings before the Commission or a Master shall be confidential, and the filing of papers with, and the giv-

ing of testimony before, the Commission, Master or the Supreme Court shall be privileged; provided that upon being filed in the Supreme Court the record loses its confidential character.

"(11) The Supreme Court shall by rule provide for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court. Such rule shall afford to any judge against whom a proceeding is instituted to cause his retirement due process of law for the procedure before the Commission, Masters and the Supreme Court in the same manner that any person whose property rights are in jeopardy in an adjudicatory proceeding is entitled to due process of law, regardless of whether or not the interest of the Judge in remaining in active status is considered to be a right or a privilege. Due process shall include the right to notice, counsel, hearing, confrontation of his accusers, and all such other incidents of due process as are ordinarily available in proceedings whether or not misfeasance is charged, upon proof of which a penalty may be imposed.

"(12) No Justice or Judge shall sit as a member of the Commission or Supreme Court in any proceeding involving his own retirement or removal.

"(13) This Section 1-a is alternative to, and cumulative of, the methods of removal of Justices and Judges provided elsewhere in this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing for the automatic retirement of District and Appellate Judges for old age, creating the State Judicial Qualifications Commission, defining its functions; and empowering the Supreme Court, upon recommendation of said Commission, to remove District and Appellate Judges for misconduct and to retire such judges in cases of disability."

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Emphysema may begin with only a slight morning and evening inconvenience in breathing.

Next, a short walk may be enough to bring on an attack of breathlessness. As the disease progresses, the person has to work harder to inhale air.

The lungs may become over-stretched, at the same time becoming less efficient in exchanging oxygen for carbon dioxide.

Unless promptly treated, the lungs may be permanently damaged. A day-in, day-out struggle to keep the lungs working can develop, every breath requiring a major effort. The ultimate hazard of emphysema, however, is the extra load it puts on the

they are exposed to crime "fall-out" in the form of higher crime costs, inadequate police protection, fewer personal liberties, and the ever-present threat to life and property.

Consider also the plight of the law enforcement officer whose responsibility it is to prevent crime and protect lives and property. His effectiveness is being diluted by judicial gymnastics and turnstile justice which air put drop a legal curtain around hardened, unreformed criminals. In addition, law enforcement in the United States is subjected to more criticism by outside theorists and pressure groups than any other profession. I am continually amazed at the number of 'enlightened' groups and 'freedom-lov-

ing' individuals who are anxious to promote justice by attacking law and order. J. Edgar Hoover wrote all law enforcement agencies, last week. Experience shows that swift and impartial justice is one of the most effective deterrents to crime. Yet, swift justice, with all the technical loopholes and unwarranted delays in the law, is almost passed in several jurisdictions, and the rights of peaceful citizens are taking a terrific beating from the 'impartial justice' meted out in some courts.

Crime cautions are many and varied. Few, however, are more serious than misguided leniencies, including abuses of parole, probation, and suspended sentences. A young bank robber recently blamed such lenien-

cy for his turn to serious crime. The 20 year old youth pleaded guilty in Federal court to robbing three banks. He told the judge that if previous courts had been more severe with him on lesser violations instead of granting probation, parole, or suspended sentences, he would not have resorted to bank robbery.

Law enforcement, innocent victims, and society as a whole, seek no special privilege from the courts or rehabilitation services. All that is asked is that the balance be kept true.

The answer to our critical crime conditions cannot be found

in the shuffling of paper. Neither can it be found in a theory that coddles and favors vicious criminals at the expense of the public. Rather, I submit that we need to devote more attention to protecting means of ferreting out crime and to securing convictions and adequate punishment of those responsible.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing loans to students at institutions of higher education; creating the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund and making provisions relating thereto.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new Section to read as follows:  
"Section 50b. STUDENT LOANS. (a) The Legislature may provide that the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors, shall have the authority to provide for, issue and sell general obligation bonds of the State of Texas in an amount not to exceed Eighty-Five Million Dollars (\$85,000,000). The bonds authorized herein shall be called 'Texas College Student Loan Bonds', shall be executed in such form, denominations and upon such terms as may be prescribed by law, provided, however, that the bonds shall not bear more than four per cent (4%) interest per annum; they may be issued in such installments as the Board finds feasible and practical in accomplishing the purposes of this Section.  
(b) All moneys received from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in a fund hereby created in the State Treasury to be known as the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund to be administered by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors to make loans to students who have been admitted to attend any institution of higher education within the State of Texas, public or private, including Junior Colleges, which are recognized or accredited under terms and conditions prescribed by the Legislature, and to pay interest and principal on such bonds and provide a sinking fund therefor under such conditions as the Legislature may prescribe.  
(c) While any of the bonds, or interest on said bonds authorized by this Section is outstanding and un-

paid, there is hereby appropriated out of the first moneys coming into the Treasury in each fiscal year, not otherwise appropriated by this Constitution, an amount sufficient to pay the principal and interest on such bonds that mature or become due during such fiscal year, less the amount in the sinking fund at the close of the prior fiscal year.  
(d) The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Opportunity Plan Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, or its successor or successors. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature.  
(e) All bonds issued hereunder shall, after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under this Constitution.  
(f) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such acts shall not be void because of their anticipatory nature."  
Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the following:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for loans to students at institutions of higher education to be known as the Texas Opportunity Plan.

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 2, 1965. HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 5 proposing an Amendment to Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas so as to authorize an increase in the total amount of bonds or obligations that may be issued by the Veterans' Land Board to Four Hundred Million Dollars (\$400,000,000), providing for the issuance of said bonds or obligations and the conditions relating thereto and the use of the Veterans' Land Fund; and providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 49-b, Article III of the Constitution of Texas, be amended so that the same will hereafter read as follows:

"Section 49-b. By virtue of prior Amendments to this Constitution, there has been created a governmental agency of the State of Texas performing governmental duties which has been designated the Veterans' Land Board. Said Board shall continue to function for the purposes specified in all of the prior Constitutional Amendments except as modified herein. Said Board shall be composed of the various Teachers' Retirement Funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent School Funds.  
"Said Veterans' Land Fund shall consist of any lands heretofore or hereafter purchased by said Board, until the sale price thereof, together with any interest and penalties due, have been received by said Board (although nothing herein shall be construed to prevent said Board from accepting any payment for a portion of any tract), and of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board which moneys so attributable shall include but shall not be limited to the proceeds from the issuance and sale of such bonds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of any lands, or rights therein, purchased with such proceeds; the moneys received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein, purchased with other moneys, attributable to such bonds; the interest and penalties received from the sale or resale of such lands, or rights therein; the bonuses, income, rents, royalties, and any other pecuniary benefit received by said Board from any such lands; sums received by way of indemnity or forfeiture for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any such bonds to comply with his bid and accept and pay for such bonds; or for the failure of any bidder for the purchase of any lands comprising a part of said Fund to comply with his bid and accept and pay for any such lands; and interest received from investments of any such moneys. The principal and interest on the bonds heretofore and hereafter issued by said Board shall be paid out of the

moneys of said Fund in conformance with the Constitutional provisions authorizing such bonds; but the moneys of said Fund which are not immediately committed to the payment of principal and interest on such bonds, the purchase of lands as herein provided, or the payment of expenses as herein provided may be invested in bonds or obligations of the United States until such funds are needed for such purposes.  
"All moneys comprising a part of said Fund and not expended for the purposes herein provided shall be a part of said Fund until there are sufficient moneys therein to retire fully all of the bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board, at which time all such moneys remaining in said Fund, except such portion thereof as may be necessary to retire all such bonds which portion shall be set aside and retained in said Fund for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, shall be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund to be appropriated to such purposes as may be prescribed by law. All moneys becoming a part of said Fund hereafter shall likewise be deposited to the credit of the General Revenue Fund.  
"When a Division of said Fund (each Division consisting of the moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to a single Constitutional authorization and the lands purchased therewith) contains sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division, the moneys thereof, except such portion as may be needed to retire all of the bonds secured by such Division which portion shall be set aside and remain a part of such Division for the purpose of retiring all such bonds, may be used for the purpose of paying the principal and the interest thereon together with the expenses herein authorized of any other bonds heretofore or hereafter issued and sold by said Board. Such use shall be a matter for the discretion and direction of said Board; but there may be no such use of any such moneys contrary to the rights of any holder of any of the bonds issued and sold by said Board or violation of any contract to which said Board is a party.  
"The Veterans' Land Fund shall be used by said Board for the purpose of purchasing lands situated in the State of Texas owned by the United States or any governmental agency thereof, owned by the Texas Prison System or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas, or owned by any person, firm, or corporation. All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, to be paid for in cash, and shall be a part of said Fund. Such lands heretofore or hereafter purchased and comprising a part of said Fund are hereby declared to be held for a governmental purpose, although the individual purchasers thereof shall be subject to taxation to the same extent and in the same manner as are purchasers of lands dedicated to the Permanent Free Public School Fund.  
"The lands of the Veterans' Land Fund shall be sold by said Board in such quantities, on such terms, at such prices, at such rates of interest and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law to

Texas veterans who served not less than ninety (90) continuous days, unless sooner discharged by reason of a service-connected disability, on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Coast Guard or Marine Corps of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955, and who upon the date of filing his or her application to purchase any such land is a citizen of the United States, is a bona fide resident of the State of Texas, and has not been dishonorably discharged from any branch of the Armed Forces above-named and who at the time of his or her enlistment, induction, commissioning, or drafting was a bona fide resident of the State of Texas. The foregoing notwithstanding, any lands in the Veterans' Land Fund which have been first offered for sale to veterans and which have not been sold may be sold or resold to such purchasers, in such quantities, and on such terms, and at such prices and rates of interest, and under such rules and regulations as are now or may hereafter be provided by law.

"Said Veterans' Land Fund, to the extent of the moneys attributable to any bonds heretofore issued and sold by said Board, may be used by said Board, as is now or may hereafter be provided by law, for the purpose of paying the expenses of surveying, monumenting, road construction, legal fees, recordation fees, advertising and other like costs necessary or incidental to the purchase and sale, or resale, of any lands purchased with any of the moneys attributable to such additional bonds, such expenses to be added to the price of such lands when sold, or resold, by said Board; for the purpose of paying the expenses of issuing, selling, and delivering any such additional bonds; and for the purpose of meeting the expenses of paying the interest or principal due or to become due on any such additional bonds.  
"All moneys attributable to the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the Constitutional Amendment adopted on November 6, 1956, shall be credited to said Veterans' Land Fund and may be used for the purpose of purchasing additional lands, to be sold as provided herein, until December 1, 1965; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on such bonds shall be set aside for that purpose. After December 1, 1965, all moneys attributable to such bonds shall be set aside for the retirement of such bonds and to pay interest thereon; and when there are sufficient moneys to retire all of such bonds, all of such moneys then remaining or thereafter becoming a part of said Veterans' Land Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.  
"All of the moneys attributable to any series of bonds hereafter issued and sold by said Board (a 'series of bonds' being all of the bonds issued and sold in a single transaction as a single installment of bonds) may be used for the purchase of lands as herein provided, for a period ending eight (8) years after the date of sale of such series of bonds; provided, however, that so much of such moneys as may be necessary to pay interest on bonds hereafter issued and sold

shall be set aside for that purpose in accordance with the resolution adopted by said Board authorizing the issuance and sale of such series of bonds. After such eight (8) year period, all of such moneys shall be set aside for the retirement of any bonds hereafter issued and sold and to pay interest thereon, together with any expenses as provided herein, in accordance with the resolution or resolutions authorizing the issuance and sale of such additional bonds, until there are sufficient moneys to retire all of the bonds hereafter issued and sold, at which time all such moneys then remaining a part of said Veterans' Land Fund and thereafter becoming a part of said Fund shall be governed as elsewhere provided herein.

"This Amendment being intended only to establish a basic framework and not to be a comprehensive treatment of the Veterans' Land Program, there is hereby reposed in the Legislature full power to implement and effectuate the design and objects of this Amendment, including the power to delegate such duties, responsibilities, functions, and authority to the Land Board as it believes necessary.

"Should the Legislature enact any enabling laws in anticipation of this Amendment, no such law shall be void by reason of its anticipatory nature.  
"This Amendment shall become effective upon its adoption."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1965, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"FOR the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$200,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law"; and  
"AGAINST the Amendment to Section 49-b of Article III of the Constitution of Texas to increase the Veterans' Land Fund by \$200,000,000; said Fund to be used for the purpose of purchasing land in Texas to be sold to Texas veterans who served in the Armed Services of the United States between September 16, 1940, and March 31, 1955; such funds to be expended in accordance with instructions and requirements that may be provided by law."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast were in favor of same Amendment, the same shall become a part of the State Constitution and be effective from the date set forth in said Amendment, and the Governor shall issue a proclamation in keeping therewith.

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and Laws of this state.
