

Arnold Davis, manager and Ulric Lea, field superintendent moved equipment into the build ing and started the field work in early April. The first plantings were made on May 5.

Twenty-three grasses from different sources were planted in production fields ranging in size from one tenth acre to one and a quarter acres. The seed from these fields will be planted on farms and ranches over the

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

Emphysema - a word you scarcely heard of 50 years or so the bride of Joe Wade Gore in ago — is a word you hear more a single ring ceremony at 8 p.m. and more frequently today.

Emphysema-pronounced emfih-SEE-ma — is a serious disease causing the lungs to become greatly enlarged. Actually, it is derived from a Greek word meaning "inflation."

Simply speaking, this is what happens when a person has emphysema. His lungs, which normally contract and expand inhaling and exhaling air - begin to lose their elasticity. When this happens, air cannot be completely expelled and some of it remains in the lungs.

Emphysema may begin with tions. only a slight morning and evening inconvenience in breathing. Next, a short walk may be enough to bring on an attack of breathlessness. As the dis-

ease progresses, the person has to work harder to inhale air. The lungs may become overstretched, at the same time becoming less efficient in exchanging oxygen for carbon dioxide.

Unless promptly treated, the lungs may be permanently damaged. A day-in, day-out struggle to keep the lungs working can develop, every breath requiring a major effort. The ultimate hazard of emphysema, however, is the extra load it puts on the
