The City Cafe will reopen for business this Friday, January 21, under the new management of Danny Morgan of Seymour.

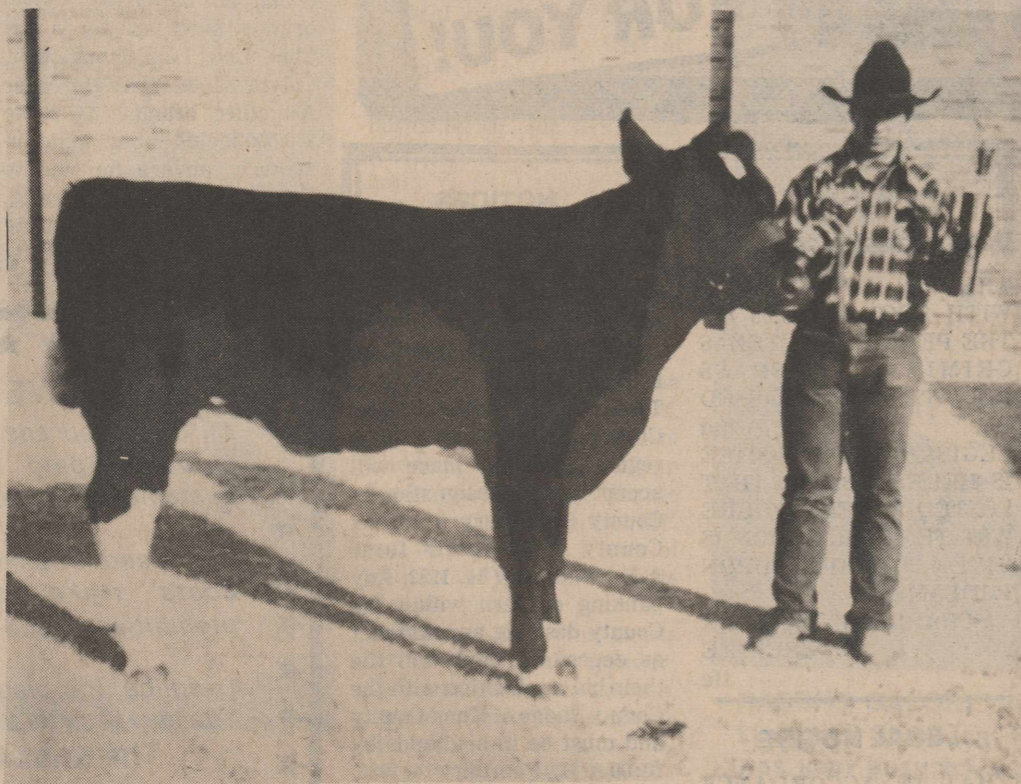

The cafe will be open seven days a week from 5:30 a.m. until 9:00 p.m.

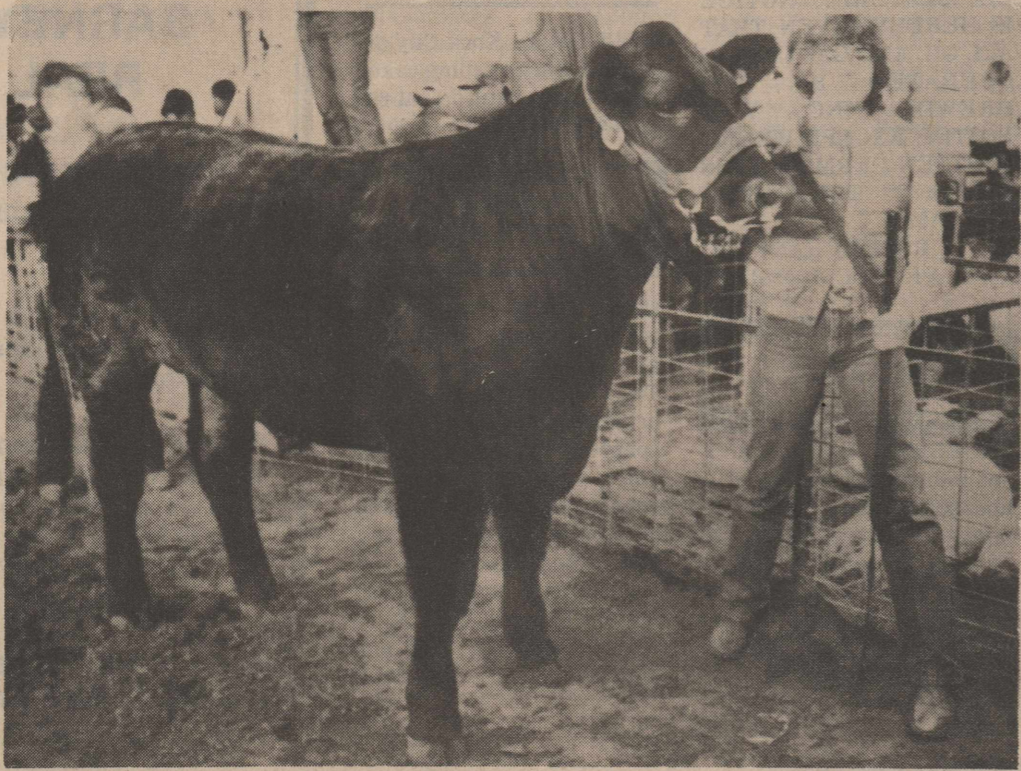
Morgan said his menu will include a variety of foods and that his kitchen facilities would be spick-and-span and open for his customers' inspection at any time.

Kristin Simmons had the grand champion fryer with Tommy Fred Ellis' entry taking reserve.

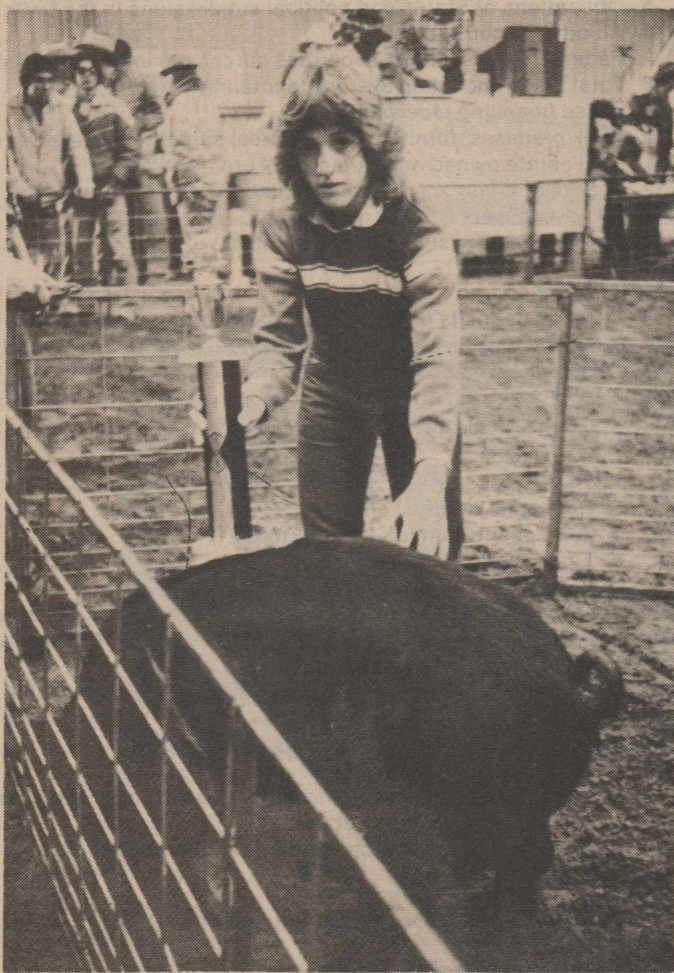
Phil Sarabia had the grand champion broiler with reserve going to Ryan Offutt.

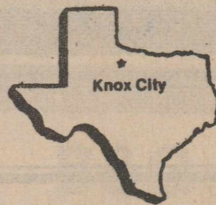

Sales Tax Decreases Slightly

AUSTIN, TX - State Comptroller Bob Bullock Thursday sent \$32 million to nearly 1,000 Texas cities as their share of the one percent city sales tax for January.

"These payments are down 7.7 percent from last January's check," Bullock pointed out. "Collections are down in every major city in the state except Austin. It is this trend that led me to reduce my estimate of available state revenue and it's affecting the finances of Texas cities even more drastically than the finances of the state," Bullock said.

Citing depression in the Texas oil industry and the repeated devaluation of the Mexican peso, Bullock dropped his estimate of available state revenues by \$1.5 billion dollars this week.

Knox City's net payment for the period ending January 7, 1983, was \$3,375.03 as compared to last year's \$3,643.81, reflecting a decrease of 7.38 percent.

Munday had \$2,145.81 for this period, which was a decrease of 3.86 percent over last year's \$2,231.87.

No amounts were given for Benjamin, Goree, O'Brien, and Weinert.

Other area towns' totals for this period included Haskell \$6,937.68, Rochester \$1,095.44, Rule \$849.58, Seymour \$4,353.63, Paducah \$1,439.31, Crowell \$505.34, Aspermont \$2,760.10, Hamlin \$5,702.99, and Stamford \$6,385.54.

The City sales taxes are collected along with the state tax by merchants and rebated monthly to the cities in which they are collected by the Comptroller.

Bryant became a deputy in Knox County as a replacement for Mike Brackman when Brackman left the Sheriff's Office shortly after being named to the post by Sheriff Gene Nix.

With the earlier departure of Brackman, then the resignation of Jailer C.H. Blackmon, Bryant's resignation marks the third major change in the Sheriff's Department in the past year.

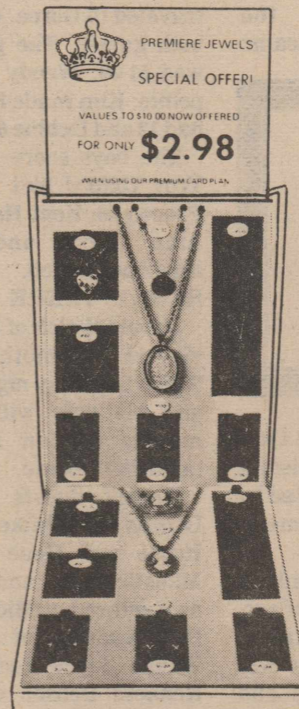
Gerri Watson On MSU Honor Roll

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

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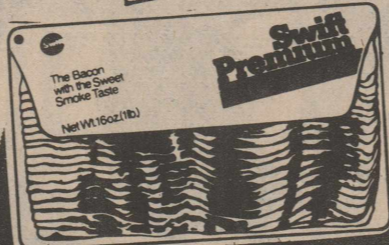
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
