Teams Win Crowns In District 19-A Play

The boys basketball team won two games this last week to take the District 19-A crown. The Hounds' record is now 11-0 in District and they will play their last District game, Tuesday with Old Glory. The Hounds will play a practice game at Munday against Goree on Thursday, February 10. Goree is rated in the top twenty in the state and should be a very strong test for the Greyhounds. The Houndettes will play Crowell girls at 6:30 and the boys' game will follow.

The Greyhounds defeated Rochester on Tuesday by a score of 69 to 31. The Hounds led from the start and had a lead of 26 to 2 at the end of the first quarter. Leading Knox City in scoring was Rodney Dever with 16 points, followed by Dwayne Watkins with 12, Craig Watson with 11 and Kevin Eaton with 10.

Knox City defeated Weinert on Friday by a score of 51 to 34. The game was closer than last time but the Hounds led all the way and increased the lead each quarter.

Knox City was led by Dwayne Watkins who had 16 points. Next was Wayne Hutchinson with 12 and then Tyke Meinzer who had 10.

The Greyhounds' Bi-District opponent has not been determined but the game will be played on February 24 or 25. The winner will then play the area game to be played on February 28 or March 1 with the regional tournament being March 4 and 5. The state tournament is the next week on March 10, 11 and 12.

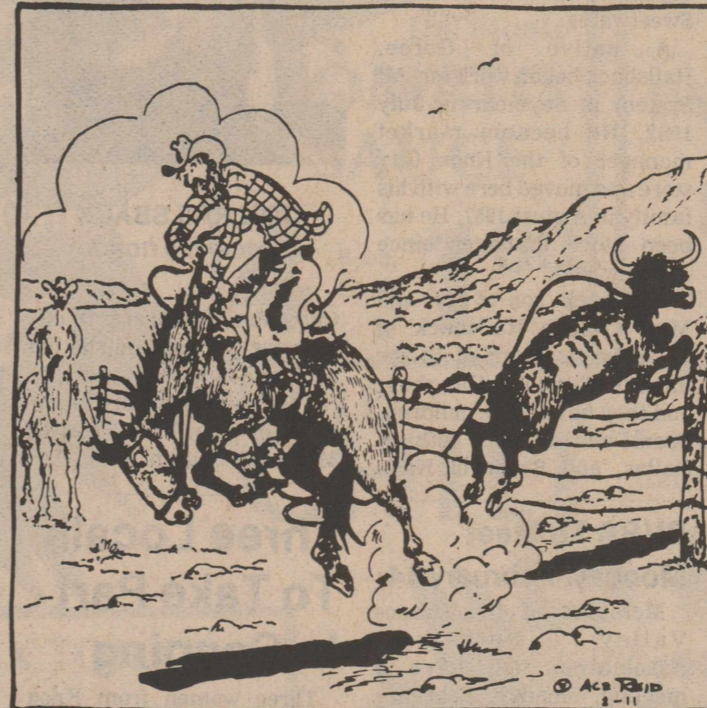

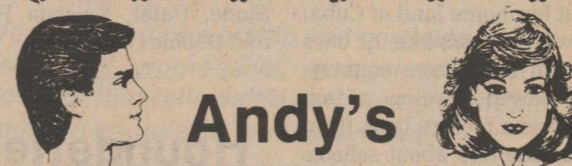

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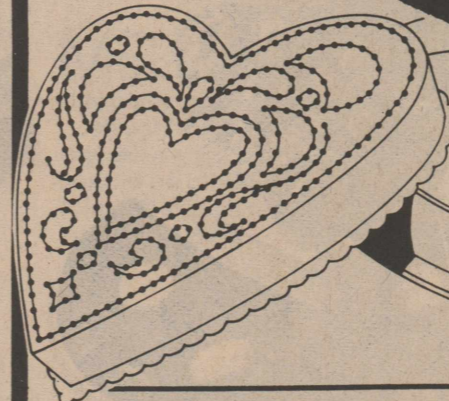
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Girl Scouts Enjoy Friendship Party

Munday Couple Are 'Artists of Month'

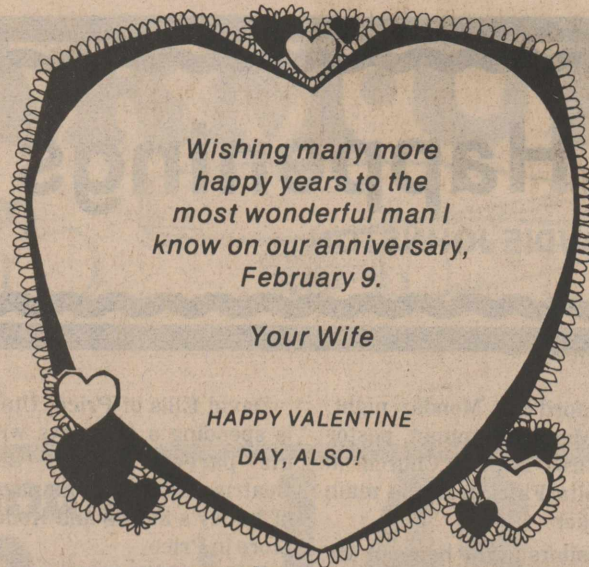
Two artists will be featured this month at The Citizens State Bank. Work will be shown by Edwin and Mary Smith of Munday.
