The joint election of city, school and hospital candidates drew an excellent turnout of voters Saturday at the Knox City Community Center.

Voters cast 159 ballots to elect Craig Williams as mayor. Buddy Angle received 144 votes and incumbent Charles Auburg received 101.

In the contested race for the one-year unexpired council term, Elaine Lewis had 192, Shelton Boyd had 133, and John R. Peysen received 73.

Candidates for the two-year council seats were unopposed. H. Elmer Wall Jr. received 323 while Carol Felts

Area Election Results

O'Brien voters elected Charlene Brothers, former city secretary, as their new mayor with eight write-in votes. No one had announced for the position. Council members, who were unopposed and elected were Wayne McKinney, James Manning, and Rayland Hayes.

Benjamin voters elected Keith Conner and Freddy McGregor as city councilmen Saturday and re-elected Vernon D. McCanlies as mayor. McCanlies was unopposed and Conner was the only announced candidate for council. With two seats to be filled, McGregor received the most write-ins with 28 votes. Other write-ins included Dennis Duke with nine and Tracy Cartwright with one.

In the Benjamin school trustee election, Billy Ben Benson and Dave Oxford, who were unopposed, were elected to two-year terms while Louise Hertel, also unopposed, was elected to fill the one-year unexpired term created when Charles Griffith resigned.

Also unopposed in their candidacy for directors for the Knox County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 were Joe Barton, Don Hertel, and K.E. Woolley.

The new post office is located on Farm to Market Road 2229, east of the O'Brien Baptist Church.

O'Brien Post Office To Hold Open House

O'Brien Postmaster Ray Ashcraft has advised the News office that an open house for the new O'Brien Post Office will be held today, Thursday, April 7, along with a retirement party for R.P. Barnard Jr., who retired March 3, as rural mail carrier.

The reception for Barnard will be from 2:00 until 4:00 p.m., according to Ashcraft.

The new facilities were occupied last Wednesday, March 30.

The postmaster advised the News office that the first O'Brien Post Office was

opened in 1916. Through Ashcraft's efforts, a list of postmasters was put together but no specific dates were known. The first postmaster was a Mr. Bucie (no name or initials or correct spelling available), who was a surveyor with the railroad, as was J.F. Barnard who served two years as postmaster and then began as a rural carrier. Other postmasters were Abe Irvin, Clara Jarman, J.W. Johnston, T.B. Austin, Clara Barnard, C.M. Walsworth, and Ross Walsworth. Ashcraft began his duties at the O'Brien Post Office in August 1977.

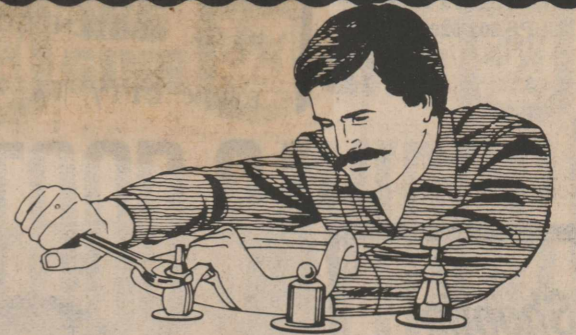

A Message To Our Customers About The 10% Withholding Law

Recently, we informed you of a new law passed by Congress that will require us to withhold 10 percent of interest payments as a prepayment against taxes on most accounts beginning July 1, 1983. We suggested that if you oppose this new measure, as we do, that you send a postcard or letter to your Congressman and Senators urging them to support repeal of this law.

Millions of Americans across the country did just that, and Congress received more mail on this issue than on possibly any other in history. As a result, a clear majority of Congressmen and Senators have cosponsored bills which would repeal the withholding law.

Regrettably, a few key Congressional leaders, as well as the President himself, have acted to block repeal, and have harshly criticized bankers for conducting what they say has been a misleading campaign of distorted facts about this law.

We have used strong words in describing this withholding law, and strong words have been used by a few political leaders in condemning the repeal effort.

We think, therefore, that it is appropriate to review the major features of this law, and the reasons it was passed last summer by Congress, with the active support of the President, as part of a larger tax program called the Tax Equity and Fiscal Responsibility Act (TEFRA).

Beginning July 1, 1983, banks and other financial institutions will be required to begin withholding 10 percent on payments of interest and dividends. This money then goes to the IRS in much the same way as payroll deductions are now handled. The amount of taxes withheld will be credited to you at the end of the year when you figure your tax bill.

You may claim exemption from the withholding requirement if you meet any of these tests for last year (1982 if filing form in 1983):

- Your tax liability for last year was \$600 or less; or
- You are 65 or older, and your tax liability for last year was \$1,500 or less; or
- You and your spouse filed a joint income tax return last year, and your tax liability was \$1,000 or less; or
- You or your spouse or both of you are 65 or older, you filed a joint income tax return last year, and your tax liability was \$2,500 or less; or
- You were not required to file an income tax return last year.

Your tax liability for last year is the income tax shown on your return minus any credits you were entitled to claim (other than the credit for withholding on wages, pensions, interest and dividends, etc.); the earned income credit; and the credit for federal tax on special fuels and oils).

You must file a certificate in order to claim exemption from withholding. If your payor provides a certificate, please use it. Otherwise, use the one IRS provides.

According to the IRS, if you file a false certificate when you are not entitled to the exemption from withholding, or if you fraudulently fail to revoke an exemption when you know you are no longer entitled to exemption, you may be subject to penalties of up to \$500 fine, one year imprisonment or both.

The IRS claims that withholding on interest and dividends is necessary to catch the small percentage of those who either deliberately fail or forget to pay the taxes they owe on interest and dividend income, or fail to file a tax return at all.

An IRS study reports that individuals fail to report up to 10 percent of interest income, although the same IRS study shows that it is possible for the IRS to reduce this rate to around three percent where accurate 1099 information reports on interest payments are received in computer-readable form and are matched against individual tax returns. Banks and other payors of interest and dividends are required to provide 1099 information to the IRS.

We believe that it is important that all citizens pay the taxes they owe, so that honest taxpayers do not bear an unfair burden.

We also believe that the evidence is clear that the IRS can do a better job of identifying tax cheaters and collecting taxes that are owed.

If the IRS will do its job, then you, as a responsive taxpayer, will not be forced to forgo the use of 10 percent of your interest, nor to determine your possible eligibility for an exemption.

If you are among the 75 percent of taxpayers who receive a refund because of overwithholding on wages and salaries, you will now be giving the government, in effect, an additional interest-free loan.

The fundamental fact is that withholding is unnecessary.

These are reasons why we oppose this law and seek its repeal. You may have others of your own, and may have expressed them to your representatives in Washington.

Unfortunately, a few elected representatives remain unconvinced, although we do not believe it is possible for a few, or even the President, to hold out against the sustained will of the public. We hope you will continue to make your views known to Washington.
