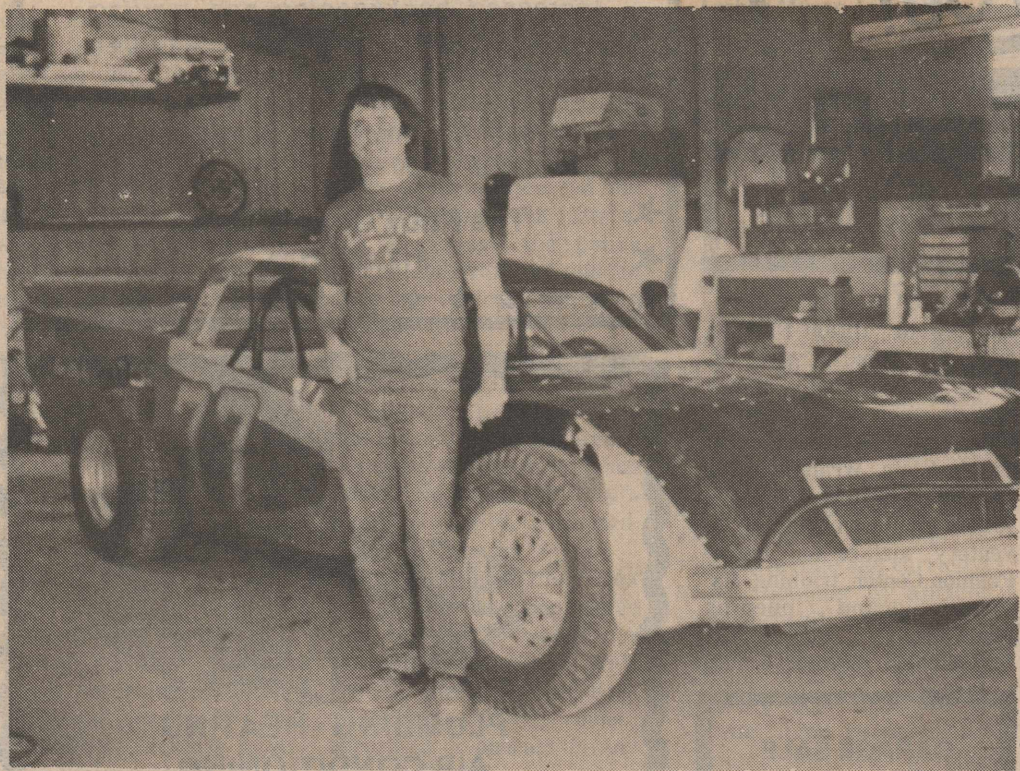

Deadline Is Friday

Friday, April 15, is the final day to offer a bid on loan or reserve wheat, grain sorghum and corn in excess of a farmer's PIK needs. All offers bidding a "0" percent will be accepted - in other words, a person can forfeit his loan in excess of his PIK needs. If one does not wish to forfeit his loan, he can offer a bid on what percent of the loan he would be willing to keep as his profit. If his bid is accepted, the government will pay off the loan and give him the portion he bid, which he may sell on the open market. The government will take the remainder of the offered quantity to supply PIK needs of other farmers. A person does not have to be in PIK to bid, according to John Rector, Knox County Executive Director of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service office in Knox City.

Rector said, "If your bid is accepted, you must pay back any unused storage on the loan quantity offered. This is necessary since Commodity Credit Corporation will take up the storage and handling from the date title changes on the commodity. By the same token, you will probably be due a refund of unused storage from the elevator where the grain is stored. All loan repayments and storage refunds must be made by a certified or cashier's check."

Rector also said that if one submits a bid offer and it is for a joint loan, all interested parties must sign the bid or be signed by someone having a power of attorney for the individuals.

Bids will be opened after 5:00 p.m. Friday, April 15, at the Knox County ASCS office and then be submitted to Kansas City for processing, Rector said. County offices will be notified of the results as soon as review and evaluation is completed.

Area Meet Set Here April 19

A meeting to discuss the program of the Big Country Development Corporation (BCDC) has been set for Tuesday, April 19, in the Citizens State Bank's Board Room, 110 North Second in Knox City at 10:30 a.m.

BCDC will serve as a vehicle for Small Business Administration (SBA) direct loans under the SBA Section 503 Certified Development Company program. The independently-governed BCDC was initiated by and is a function of the West Central Texas Council of Governments (WCTCOG). It is designed to serve as an additional tool for the economic development of the region.

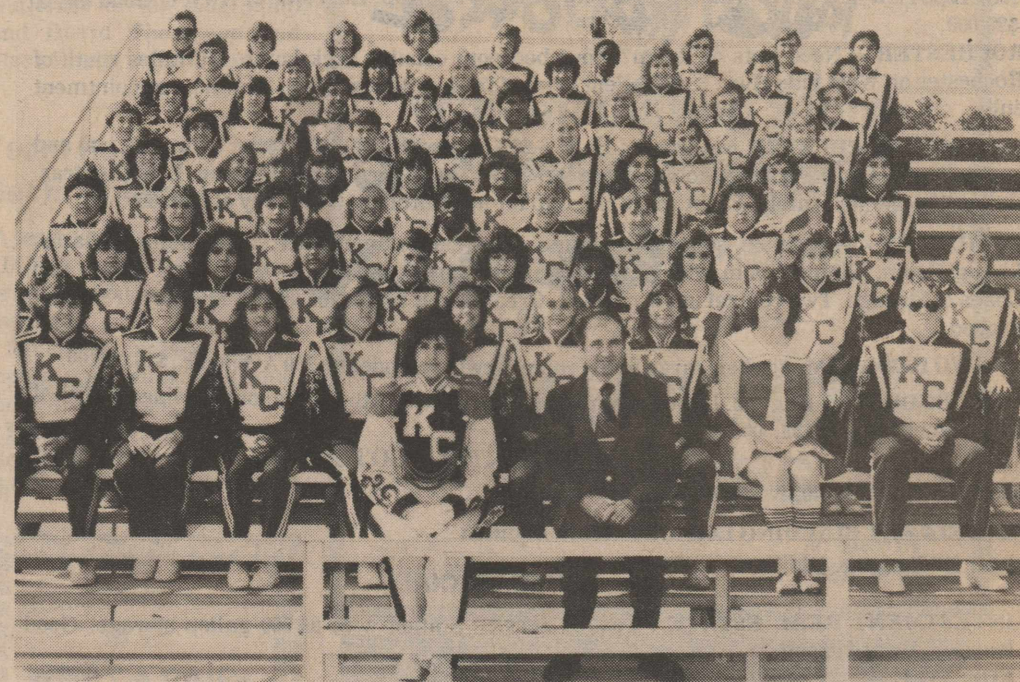
Tuesday's meeting will provide basic information about eligibility and procedures for the 503 program.

Aimed primarily at lenders, Chamber of Commerce staff or members and other interested business and financial persons the informal discussion will also provide opportunity for questions and answers. Printed information will be provided at the meeting, according to Clint Norman, Citizens State Bank president who serves as Knox County representative for BCDC.

Officials explain that as a rule of thumb, one job must be created or retained for every \$15,000 loaned by BCDC.

Jim Compton, the WCTCOG/BCDC staff person who will conduct the 30-minute session, also will be available after the meeting for individual questions.

The meeting is free and open to the public.

Officials Sworn In

The City Council of Knox City met in a regularly scheduled meeting last Tuesday evening to administer oaths of office to Mayor Craig Williams, Councilwoman Elaine Lewis, Councilman Elmer Wall and Councilman Carol Felts.

Outgoing Mayor Charles Auburg opened the meeting and conducted a canvassing of the election results as the first order of business. Councilmen present were Craig Williams, Greg Kuehler, Elmer Wall and Carol Felts, along with City Secretary Faye Railsback. Kuehler made the motion to approve the vote canvas, Felts made a second to the motion and all present voted in favor of the election results as listed. The canvas revealed a total of 411 voters casting ballots in the city election.

With the administering of oaths to election winners, Craig Williams assumed the duties of mayor, Elaine Lewis began her first term on the council, as councilmen Elmer Wall and Carol Felts began new two year terms. Auburg handed out the certificates of office and expressed his appreciation to the city for having the opportunity to serve as both a councilman and mayor for Knox City. Auburg then turned the meeting over to Williams and departed.

In his first remarks, Mayor Williams welcomed Elaine Lewis to the council and asked her to feel free to always speak her mind and express her opinions.

In further remarks to the council, Williams stated that any items discussed during council meetings were required to be posted on the agenda at least 72 hours prior to the meeting. In the past, the agendas have been posted on the bulletin board inside City Hall, Williams suggested that an additional copy of the agenda be posted on the front glass door of City Hall during the same 72 hour period in order to allow visible access to

the agenda after normal working hours. He further asked that notice of this additional copy be announced in the *News* so residents would be aware that it would be on the front door of City Hall.

a five minute time period be allowed for persons wishing to present items to the council. This will not be a total time period, but rather a time that be allowed without interruption to allow those appearing a better opportunity to express themselves.

In his concluding remarks, Williams asked that a letter of thanks from the city be sent to all those that helped with the recent election. All council members present agreed that the letters were a very good idea.

As the meeting opened for public discussion, a representative from General Telephone Company gave the council information on why General Telephone was seeking new rate increases. Because of the recent deregulation of the telephone industry by the federal government, rates on the local level will have to increase in order to allow General Telephone to keep up with both a demand for increased service and decreasing revenue. He advised that GTE has filed for an 85½ million dollar increase. The company has made an effort to decrease its expenses, the work force has been reduced by some 700 employees and that number is growing with the retirement of many personnel. An extensive effort has been made to improve customer service in the Knox City area, a graph chart that showed the improved service was shown to the council. The representative advised that within three weeks, long distance service to the local area will be greatly improved. New equipment installed to improve the quality of long distance calls is not operating properly yet, and the company currently has service repair specialists from several different firms looking into the problems. Brownie Troop Hears Reynolds

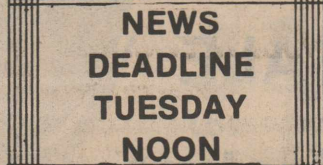

to have a slight advantage by being in the front of the pack when the flag drops for the start of the race. The better drivers are expected to do better by having to come from the back.

Even though Danny participates for his own fun and enjoyment, the racing world is not all fun and games. Safety is uppermost in the mind as accidents are very common on the dirt track. The track is watered down before each race and then packed down by the cars. The surface becomes muddy and rather slick! The drivers put on fire suits and helmets before being strapped into their cars with a special restraining harness. The cars themselves are designed with safety of the driver in mind. Roll bars are standard equipment in case of a rollover; the cars carry fire extinguishers and the gas tanks are replaced with bladder type fuel cells made of plastic to eliminate the chance of a spark in the event of a collision. Accidents are common place, last Saturday night alone Danny was hit three different times. The first corner can easily become the most dangerous spot on the track as 25 different race cars all try to squeeze into the same place at the same time!

(To better comprehend what that would be like, just picture in your own mind what it would be like if 25 different women all tried to get into the same parking space in front of the grocery store at the same time!!)

The car that Danny Lewis is using this year is a new one for the Lewis Race Team, it has the shape of a 1981 Camero and is constructed of both aluminum and fiberglass. The power plant for this racing machine is a 377 cubic inch engine that consists of a 400 short block with a 350 crank shaft. Everything is engineered and constructed with racing in mind, even the gas that flows through the Holly 4 barrel carburetor is special as the car uses high octane aviation fuel.

The racing season in Abilene began on April 9th and continues every Saturday night through August 27th. Races consist of slower cars running in one heat while faster cars compete together in another heat. Then the top 3 cars from each of those heats race against one another in a Trophy Dash to determine a winner. Finally, all the cars (up to 25) race together in the feature race.

With over \$3000.00 accumulated in prize money for his achievements in the past

three years, it represents only a small percentage of the overall expense needed to pursue this sport. Equipment is expensive because it is all designed for one specific purpose ... RACING! Danny is fortunate to be employed in a career spent repairing body damage to wrecked automobiles, his skill in this area allows him to easily repair the damage done by collisions in almost every race.

All things being considered, this is a past-time that many would only dream about being a part of. Not only is Danny Lewis a successful part of the big country racing scene, he also spends every minute of the races being a representative from his home town of Knox City!

The next time you watch shiny blue number 77 headed south on a trailer, just remember who will be driving it at the races. Usually seen with a big grin spread from ear to ear, Danny offered this final thought on his double life as "Parnelli" Lewis: "It's just fun!!"

council members expressed specific problem areas with phone service. The mayor also allowed others present at the meeting to express their phone complaints. Councilman Elmer Wall stated that he "could not see justification for an increase when all the phone company has been doing is just what it is supposed to be doing." He further said that because of the deregulation and the proposed rate increase, "customers will get less service and General Telephone will get more money." Mayor Williams noted that in previous meetings, the city council agreed to let attorneys from the Texas Municipal League represent Knox City's opposition to the raise at the Public Utilities Commission hearing for the proposed rate increase to be held in Austin on April 18.

Ideas for the use of Revenue Sharing Funds were asked for. A previous announcement from the city indicated that this would be the first of two public hearings required by law to determine how the funds would be used. Billy Bob Reynolds was present to represent the softball association. He advised the council that it would cost approximately \$1500.00 to seed the outfield. The cost of seeding the infield had already been donated by the Knox City Jaycees. Reynolds stated in his presentation to the council that the softball field would benefit the entire community if it were seeded and ready for tournament play. He said that a lot of teams would not come to play on a dirt field, and a grass field would bring many more teams to Knox City.

As an additional thought for use of the funds, Greg Kuehler indicated that some of it might be used to help seal coat and possibly pave some city streets. Councilman Wall stated that since one more public meeting on the funds has to be held, further discussion by the council should be put off until after that meeting.

Improvements to both the Community Center and Kennel were next on the agenda. Two estimated bids for repair work were discussed. The decision was made that since the amount of money involved was substantial, the repairs will have to wait and be included in the budget for next year.

The possible purchase of a used paper copier for City Hall was brought up with a presentation of information on the machine. Carol Felts made a motion to buy the copier, and with no second, the motion died.

The operation of the city swimming pool this summer was discussed. The council was informed that last year's pool operator did not want the job again this year. A prospect for the job had contacted City Hall but did not indicate that the salary per week would have to be raised since the pool operators are required to pay for lifeguards out of their own wages. An increase to a possible \$200.00 per week was agreed upon, Greg Kuehler made a motion to pass that offer on to the prospect, Elaine Lewis made a second to the motion and all voted in favor of it. Information was also brought up that the city has not always had certified lifeguards in the past. An apparent shortage of qualified available persons was the reason.

The hiring of another police officer was next on the agenda. Police Chief Richard Ferguson informed the council that 17 applications had been received for the position. Four of the applicants are already certified police officers, and one of those four was a female applicant. The council agreed with Councilman Wall when

he suggested that Chief Ferguson screen the list and present three prospects and his reasons for wanting each one of the three at the next council meeting. The old police car was discussed and Chief Ferguson was instructed to remove the police equipment from it and to store the vehicle at the city garage.

Councilwoman Lewis had a question about the Knox City ambulance. She was advised that the matter would have to be raised with the Ambulance Board through the city's representative on that board, Councilman Larry Staggs.

A request from the Knox City Chamber of Commerce was heard. The chamber would like to have a city wide cleanup during the last week of this month. The council agreed to co-operate in any way possible.

Police Chief Ferguson spoke with the council again. This time he advised that Police Chief Gerald Saffel from Munday would like to talk with the council at the next meeting about forming a county wide Law Enforcement Explorer Post of the Boy Scouts of America.

Mayor Williams informed the council that the budget for next year needed to be planned. All agreed to hold a budget planning workshop on April 19.

Before the meeting closed, Councilman Wall expressed his thanks to *The Knox County News* for attending and reporting on the meeting. All present agreed and further stated that all meetings are open to the public and that the council wants the public kept informed on all council activities. Councilman Kuehler stated, "It's their city, and they have a right to know what's going on."

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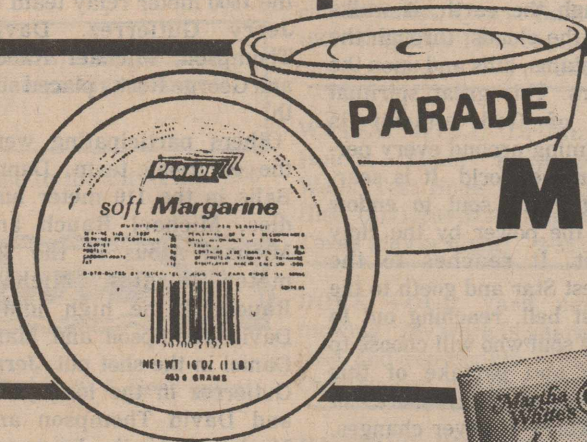
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
