



Fishpond Stocking Program Underway

The Wichita-Brazos Soil and Water Conservation District is again sponsoring a fishpond stocking program for the Knox County area. Orders are being taken now and must be in to the Knox City SCS office by May 18.

Fish will be delivered by late May to a central delivery point in Knox County where you can pick up orders and transport the fish to your ponds within a short-period to time.

Species available for delivery through the program are: 3-5 inch channel catfish, 6-8 inch channel catfish, 2-4 inch Florida black bass, 2-4 inch Native black bass, 2-4 inch Hybrid sunfish, 2-4 inch bluegills and Fathead minnows by the pound.


The fish are guaranteed live delivery to your ponds if you transport and place the fish in your pond within two hours from the time you receive them. The fish are also guaranteed to be healthy and free of parasites and disease

The District is sponsoring this program because the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department no longer provides fish for stocking to landowners in Texas. The District can obtain and provide the fish for you at a considerable savings from what it would cost you to travel and purchase them from a commercial fishery. In addition to the low discount prices available, large orders of 1,000 fish or more will get an additional five cents per fish discount.

Readers are asked to get their orders in before the deadline. For more information, they should contact the Knox City SCS office.

City Sales Tax Down Slightly AUSTIN -- State Com-

ptroller Bob Bullock recently sent checks totaling \$33.7 million in local sales tax payments to 974 cities who levy the one-percent city sales tax.

"Statewide, these checks are down more than three percent from last year,' Bullock said. "This follows the downward trend we're seeing in state sales tax receipts. For the first time in 21 years, we've seen a drop in the number of sales tax dollars collected from year to year. We've found the oil and gas industry pays about 30 percent of our state sales tax. either directly or indirectly, and the hardest hit areas of our state are where the local economy leans heaviest on oil

and gas. Knox City's net payment for this period was \$2,424.62 with the 1983 payment to date being \$20,318.13, down 11.30%. 



Cotton Leads Decline In Texas Crop Sales

Texas farmers got about \$800 million less from crops sales last year compared to 1981, with cotton sales taking the sharpest nosedive--from \$1.4 billion to \$875 million. Estimated crop sales totaled almost \$3.8 billion in 1982 but were down due to poor prices caused by huge stockpiles of most farm commodities, together with sagging domestic demand and decreased exports, says an economist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System. Also, weather losses were heavy in some areas, particularly in the South Plains. Grain sorghum was the second leading cash crop with receipts of \$619 million followed by wheat \$499 million.
