Gutierrez State-Bound **In Tennis**

By Coach Ronnie Verhalen Ricky Gutierrez won second place at the regional tennis tournament last week in Abilene and will be one of eight young men to vie for the Class A state tennis title in Austin May 13 and 14. Knox City O'Brien doubles team of Joe Rocha and Jerry Gutierrez placed a good but personally disappointing fourth in the regional tournament

Gutierrez defeated Perry Simmons of Megargel, 6-0, 6-0; Mike Hartman of Santa Anna, 6-3, 6-1; and in the semi-finals, Robbie Fite of Maypearl, 6-3, 6-0. The finals saw him matched against the same opponent he faced in last year's regional final, Steve Howard from Zephyr. The results were almost identical. In a good, hard-fought match, Howard defeated Gutierrez, 6-3, 2-6, 6-4.

Rocha and the younger Gutierrez also kept their cool and played solid tennis. First, they beat Tom Thompson and Bert Patterson (Forsan), 6-2, 6-3, then Joe Smith and Monty Stricker (Richland Springs), 6-1, 6-4. In the semi-final round, they faced a team from Santa Anna, a perennial powerhouse in Class A doubles. After losing the initial set to Chris DeLeon and Johnny Vasquez, 6-2, cilman Carol Felts. Rocha and Gutierrez came back to win the second by the same margin in reverse, then lost in a third-set heartbreaker, 7 games to 5. They were oh so close to capturing a ticket to the state contest! Jerry, a freshman with lots of talent, has a bright future in high school tennis for the next three years. Ricky and Joe, both seniors, have represented our school and towns splendidly in their junior high and high school tennis careers. Joe has earned the trip to regional three times, and this is the third year that Ricky will have gone to state in tennis. Let's wish him luck in Austin
