morning, May 2. An approximate estimate of the amount of the loss would be in the vicinity of \$2000.00 or higher, depending on replacement costs. The items were not insured for theft.

City insurance policies were discussed, Insurance agent David Counts was present at the meeting to answer any questions the council had and to provide any information that he could on the various insurance matters. The council asked Counts to present them with a list of all the city policies that his agency currently has. Since the costs of insurance for the city is approximately 8% of the total budget, the council agreed to keep all current policies in effect and review each one as it comes due for renewal.

Larry Deering met with the council to discuss the water drainage problem in the area of south east Third street. The residents of that area are very concerned over flooding in the event of heavy rain. After discussion by the council, a decision was made to follow up with an earlier request to the State to see if another water dip could be placed in the highway in that area. The dip would be similar to the one at Avenue B (canal street) and aid in water flow for the area.

Another discussion was held about the condition of the roadway on south Aspen Street and any possible remedies for the problem. Since other streets in the city are being graveled at this time with a mixture of gravel, sand, dirt and cleche, the council agreed to wait and see how those streets hold up before attempting the same on Aspen Street.

Police Chief Richard Ferguson met with the council, Councilwoman Lewis brought up a complaint voiced to her by several citizens about the downtown area not being covered by night watchman services during the two nights a week that the full time night watchman is off. Two recent business burglaries have occurred on his scheduled nights off. Elmer Wall suggested that the reason for the hiring of a second full time police officer would be to have the city adequately covered during those nights off. Mayor Williams asked Ferguson to make every effort he could to cover the area on those nights until an additional police officer assumes his duties and patrols on those nights.

The hiring of a second full time police officer was discussed. Chief Ferguson advised that he had conducted background checks and some interviews on a total of seventeen applications that had been received for the opening. He presented his final preference of three applications for review by the council. After a long discussion, the council agreed to hire applicant Daryl Clifton from Texarkana to fill the opening. He is scheduled to begin duties on Friday, May 6, with a starting salary of \$950.00 per month. A decision on when he will attend the

Texas Police Officer Certification School will be made after the council has a chance to observe his performance.

Chief Ferguson then presented several reports. His monthly activity reports were given to the council. He also discussed a car-pedestrian accident that occurred recently when a vehicle and small girl on a bicycle collided. After another report by Ferguson on a recent incident involving law enforcement explorer scouts at the Knox City Community Center, a representative from the explorers met with the council to further explain the program recently started here in Knox City.

Mayor Williams advised the council on a fire hydrant that is in a potentially bad location. He brought the matter up for information only at this time.

As the agenda item of the budget was brought up, Councilman Wall wanted to have the proposed budget figures clarified to him, as he was unable to arrive at final figures from those given to him on the budget proposal sheet. Mrs. Railsback told him that she would explain the figures to him if he would stop by City Hall at a later date.

Information was given to the council that the Knox City Jaycees would be present at the next meeting to discuss the possibilities of utilizing the old railroad depot building for a Jaycee meeting site. Jaycee Steve Pepper will present the program to the council.

Personnel matters were discussed as the final agenda item. The possibility of hiring an additional employee to take care of outside activities such as road work was brought up for consideration. Since the proposed budget for the next fiscal year has already been allotted, no funds are available for an extra salary at this time. The actual necessity of even having such an extra position was discussed at length. Councilwoman Lewis asked about the feasibility of eliminating one employee position within City Hall to make funds available for the proposed additional outside maintenance man. City Secretary Railsback advised that no office positions could be eliminated if City Hall were expected to stay open and serve the public as it does now. Mrs. Railsback then presented the council with a summary of her accomplishments as a city employee for the past fifteen years. She advised the council that she has a tremendous pride in her work and in the part she has played in the guidance of City Hall. She stated that she felt she was well qualified to continue supervision of both City Hall and outside employee activities. The council complimented her past achievements and Mayor Williams asked her if she could research the proposed budget figures to see if any funds would be available so a qualified maintainer operator could be hired to improve city streets. He further advised that he felt an extra employee who would be fully qualified to operate the equipment and handle other jobs was a necessity. Williams also asked Mrs. Railsback to gather more in-

formation on the previously mentioned program of having instructors from Texas A&M come to Knox City and train the city employees in the better use of equipment.

In the final matter presented, Councilman Kuehler stated that he had received complaints about two lots in the northwest portion of the city. One is used to store collected junk and the other is being used to raise hogs. Other area residents have complained of the smell associated with these two lots and the possible health hazard that approaching hot weather might present. After a discussion on the matter, the council agreed to ask the city health officer to look at the locations and determine if any actual health violations are being committed.

Applicants must be Permian Basin residents working toward a degree in computer science or data processing, must be full-time students who have completed at least 30 credit hours of college work, must maintain a 2.5 grade point average, and must not qualify for other federal or state grants or scholarships.
