#### Reduce Soil Loss From Wind, Water

To reduce soil loss from wind and water, improve water infiltration, and improve physical condition of soil, stubble mulching is a good practice to consider.

Stubble mulching can be used successfully to control erosion on fallow ground. Also stubble with adequate residues from prior crops are effective for erosion control while establishing grass. Leaving crop residues in the field helps maintain soil fertility, tilth, and water intake.

Stubble mulching is managing plant residues on a year round basis. To accomplish this, harvesting, tilling, planting, and cultivation operations are performed so that protective amounts of tion remain on the soil surface. When adjusted properly sweep-type tillers, rodweeders, and shisels all leave residue on the soil sur-

HB 1753 which further regulates medications being dispensed in nursing homes, HB 1726 which legislates a patients bill of rights.






