It's Opry Time!

Here we are once again, just a few days away from another big country western show right here in Knox City! It is an exciting time for all those involved in the planning of the show. This last week just before the performance always brings lots of little details to take care of to insure the success of the Opry.

Both of the organizations that are sponsoring the show are in full swing with their preparations, and this year's performance of the Opry promises to be the best ever presented in this area! Many readers will remember the same show being presented last year as a fund raiser for the Knox County Hospital Auxiliary. This year the show will once again be a fund raiser, both the Knox City Senior Citizens Center and the Knox City Jaycees are the sponsoring organizations.

There is a lot of work involved in a show of this type. About ninety percent of the action takes place long before the performance itself ever takes place. The planning began just about four months ago with a meeting of the Jaycees. An organization that has community service as its primary goal, the Jaycees need funds in the treasury in order to hold community service projects like the July 4 Splash Day project that was held at the city pool. The Jaycees paid for the pool for the day so everyone could get in for free, then the Jaycees had to purchase the three hundred hot dogs and buns so that they could turn right around and give them away for free to the kids at the pool. With fund raisers like the Opry, the Jaycees can raise the money needed for other community service projects.

In keeping with the tradition of helping our own community, the Jaycees elected to split all the proceeds from the Opry with the Knox City Senior Citizens Center. This way both organizations can benefit from the show and at the same time, the Jaycees will have completed another service project by helping the senior center. The funds that go towards the senior citizen center will also stay right here in Knox City and provide some very valuable assistance to those that we all tend to overlook from time to time, our senior citizens.

Ever heard of that old saying, "Shop locally and keep your money here at home"? Well, this Opry follows the same theory by raising funds that will go right back into our community by both sponsoring organizations. Now that you have heard those facts, there shouldn't be any reason not to purchase your tickets right away for the show!

One of the biggest areas of planning and work in a show like this is that of selling the tickets. Starting out about a month ago with a total of 480 tickets to sell, the Jaycees and the Senior Citizens Center eagerly approached as many people as they could in order to make a ticket sale. There have been so many who have said: "I'm going to the show, but I'll purchase my tickets later." Well, there is an answer to that and it is very simple: at the pace the tickets are going, there will not be too many available later!

The work for the show has continued right on schedule for the past few months. Entertainers were contacted and their appearances in Knox City confirmed. The Maines Brothers Band is scheduling the Knox City Opry in between a California tour and a European tour.
