### Farabee Asking **Re-Election**

State Senator Ray Farabee announced his candidacy today for re-election to the Texas Senate representing the 30th District. The 30th Senatorial District covers a twenty-nine county area and a part of Denton County in North Central and Northwest Texas.

"Knox County is an important part of the 30th Senatorial District. It has been a privilege to represent this county in Austin. I would like to continue my public service for an additional four year term", Farabee said.

Farabee, a Democrat, was elected to the State Senate in 1974. The 51 year old native of Wichita Falls is married to Helen Farabee and has two sons in college.

Senator Farabee is chairman of the State Affairs Committee and a member of the Legislative Budget Board, which has primary responsibility for preparation of the state budget. He also serves on the Finance and Jurisprudence Committees.

He was recently appointed to chair the Select Committee on Judiciary, and to serve with Governor White, Lt. Governor Hobby, and Speaker Lewis on the Fiscal Policy Committee.

During his eight years in the Senate, Senator Farabee has sponsored significant legislation which has benefited the 30th District



what happens in Washington right now. Bills now being acted on Congress-S.1660 and H.R.4102-seek to reverse the intent of a clear national policy favoring competition the telecommunications business, and to continue a system of massive subsidies.

They would keep long distance rates high to avoid gradual, inevitable increase in local residential rates. Long distance calls, now priced substantially above cost, would continue to subsidize local calls.

This would abort AT&T's plans to reduce interstate long distance rates by \$1.7 billion-the largest rate cut in history



### **Council Reviews Several Matters**

In a regularly scheduled meeting last Tuesday night, members of the city council reviewed several key issues that included water flooding problems, fire department equipment repairs, health insurance for city employees, cable television deregulation, airport repairs and improvements, and police moved from Knox City. department matters. Those present were Mayor Buddy Angle, Councilwoman Elaine Lewis and Councilmen Elmer Wall, Greg Kuehler, Larry Staggs and Carol Felts. City Secretary Teri Anderson also attended to record the

minutes of the meeting. After the minutes from previous regular and called meetings were read and approved, the council opened the meeting to current business. Tommy Kent met with the council to discuss a water flooding problem in the area of his residence. His backyard and cellar are flooded with each heavy rainfall as water backs up into his yard from the alley directly behind his residence. Discussion by the council indicated that the problem would be hard to deal with as any lowering of the alley behind his house to eliminate watershed there could very easily flood several houses further down the alley. Council members advised they

would study the problem closely instead of taking any immediate action. Fire Chief Craig Williams met with the council and advised that the 1962 model Ford fire truck is in need of repairs to insure continued

use for approximately another ten years. After a brief discussion of the repairs to be made; the council advised Chief Williams to proceed with the needed repairs.

Cidy Williams was next to meet with the council members. He requested a deregulation of his cable television service here in Knox City. The service has approximately 500 customers with 200 or so also subscribing to HBO. Williams stated that he needed to raise fees in order to meet increased costs that have been


of the date to be published in the notice section of the classified page of The Knox County News. The council voted unanimously for the needed airport repairs. Named to the Airport Board were W.R. (Bill) Baker and Sam Tankersley to replace vacancies created when Greg Clonts and Ken Sickels

The council also appointed James Patterson to fill the vacancy on the Housing Authority Board creaded when Z.I. Smith resigned.

Knox City Police Chief Richard Ferguson had several police-related items for discussion. Action taken by the council included the approval of needed equipment and a salary increase for Patrolman Daryl Clifton, which had been agreed to prior to his attending basic certification school.

The use of city-owned equipment by private citizens was brought up for discussion. The council felt it wise to discontinue the practice of allowing the equipment to be used by anyone other than city employees. Insurance risks and damage to the equipment were the main considerations in the decision. If anyone wished to utilize any city-owned equipment in the future, they will be required to pay the city's hourly wage to an employee to operate the equipment.

In final action taken at the meeting, members of the council voted on representatives for the Tax Appraisal Board and discussed a Christmas party for all city employees and their families.
