## Farabee Asking Re-Election

State Senator Ray Farabee announced his candidacy today for re-election to the Texas Senate representing the 30th District. The 30th Senatorial District covers a twenty-nine county area and a part of Denton County in North Central and Northwest Texas.

"Knox County is an important part of the 30th Senatorial District. It has been a privilege to represent this county in Austin. I would like to continue my public service for an additional four year term", Farabee said.

Farabee, a Democrat, was elected to the State Senate in 1974. The 51 year old native of Wichita Falls is married to Helen Farabee and has two sons in college.

Senator Farabee is chairman of the State Affairs Committee and a member of the Legislative Budget Board, which has primary responsibility for preparation of the state budget. He also serves on the Finance and Jurisprudence Committees.

He was recently appointed to chair the Select Committee on Judiciary, and to serve with Governor White, Lt. Governor Hobby, and Speaker Lewis on the Fiscal Policy Committee.

During his eight years in the Senate, Senator Farabee has sponsored significant legislation which has benefited the 30th District and the State of Texas, including:

- Drug Trafficking Act, providing stiffer penalties for large-scale drug dealers;
- Teacher competency testing for improved public education;
- Laws to help agriculture and rural communities;
- Bills to strengthen child support enforcement and cut welfare costs;
- A law limiting the insanity defense.

Farabee was cited for the third time by *Texas Monthly* as one of the ten best legislators in Texas. In its assessment of Texas legislators, *Texas Business* recently accorded him "Great Honors", stating, in part, "...Overall, Ray Farabee is the most effective member of the Texas Senate."

## Charges Of Fraud Filed In Court Case

Court action regarding a Knox County resident involving charges of fraud in the food stamp and AFDC programs were made recently.

The resident was charged with felony theft, given five years confinement (probated), full restitution and disqualification for head of household for six months.

Charges stemmed from the client working and not reporting income, causing the household to receive food stamps and AFDC benefits totaling \$883.00 to which they were not entitled.

There are several other cases pending court action at this time, officials reported.

The KC Circle Club members conceived the idea of hosting a bazaar after several local artisans and homemakers expressed the need for an outlet to sell hand-crafted products. Emphasis on reviving old skills such as quilting has swept the entire country. Proceeds from the bazaar will be used for youth and young families' community projects including park playground equipment and assisting 4-H.

The KC Circle Club will have an array of items for sale including baked goods, arts and craft items, white elephant items, and the Texas Extension Homemakers Association Cookbooks. Club members will also have a booth for painting face decals for the youth-at-heart.

This past year the Extension Club has had a lap quilting course, chicken scratch embroidery workshop, and puff paint workshop. Bazaar items will be available from these programs. The purpose of Extension Homemakers Organizations is to promote home economics education and to improve home and family life.

The bazaar has had tremendous response from out-of-town artisans. Booths from Munday, Paint Creek, Borger, Crowell, Rochester, Iowa Park, O'Brien, Wichita

The pep rally will begin at 2:30 p.m. in the gym. Parents are asked to take note of this early dismissal.



## New Agent Appointed

Effective January 1, 1984, David Tunmire will become County Extension Agent-Agriculture in Knox County. The announcement is made jointly by County Judge Homer T. Melton, the Knox County Commissioners Court, and District Extension Director Elaine Houston.

Tunmire is a graduate of China Springs High School in China Springs. He holds a bachelor of science degree in animal science from Angelo State University and a master of science degree in animal nutrition from Texas Tech University.

While at Texas Tech, he was a research assistant in the general swine operation and an assistant in the

Animal Science Laboratory. In high school, he was active in athletics and in college, he was active in National Alpha Kappa Lambda Fraternity and the Block and Bridle Club.

He has served as County Extension Agent-Agriculture in Wichita County for two and one-half years where he provided leadership for 4-H Club programs and assisted with the adult phases of the agricultural program, including livestock, forage, and crop demonstrations. He has provided leadership for the reorganization of the 4-H Teen Leaders and 4-H Volunteer Leaders Association. Both organizations have increased in membership and leadership capabilities.

Tunmire organized a Youth Tractor Driving Course, whereby over thirty youth learned skills in tractor driving. He has, also, been instrumental in organizing a pilot 4-H computer project to be implemented in 1984.

Tunmire is married to the former Diane Prien from Fort Stockton, who is an elementary school teacher. As County Extension Agent-Agriculture in Knox County, Tunmire will serve as agricultural program leader for both adult and 4-H areas of work. He will work with the Program Building Committee and 4-H leaders along with Jane Locknane, County Extension Agent-Home Economics.

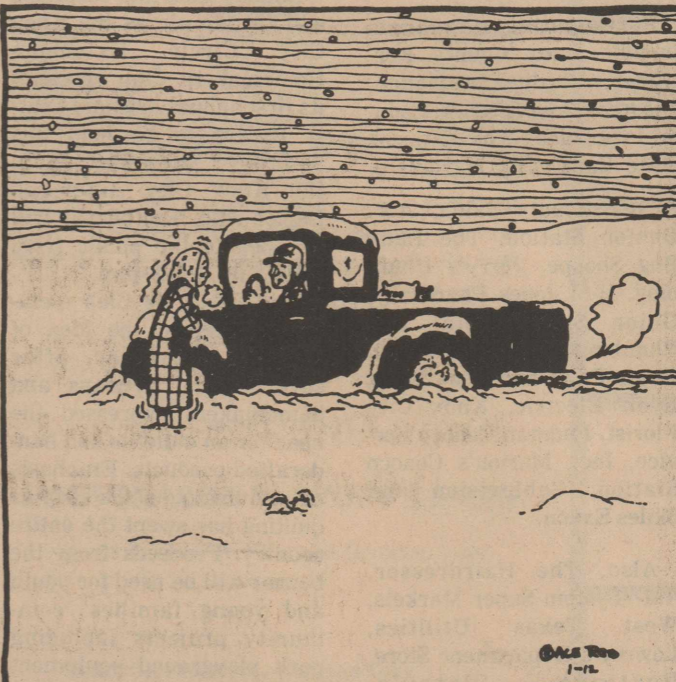

**Lowering Your Phone Bill**

The long and the short of it is, how much you have to pay for long distance calls in the near future depends on what happens in Washington right now.

Bills now being acted on in Congress--S.1660 and H.R.4102--seek to reverse the intent of a clear national policy favoring competition in the telecommunications business, and to continue a system of massive subsidies.

They would keep long distance rates high to avoid a gradual, inevitable increase in local residential rates. Long distance calls, now priced substantially above cost, would continue to subsidize local calls.

This would abort AT&T's plans to reduce interstate long distance rates by \$1.7 billion--the largest rate cut in history.



Your family may soon be able to pay less for long distance calls.

What the bills' advocates seem to overlook is that home telephone users have many options for controlling the cost of local service. There are protective mechanisms--economic budget-type rates and plans for a Universal Service Fund, for example--to ensure that people retain their telephone service.

Many people believe now is the time to tell Congress what they think of the idea of keeping long distance rates unnecessarily high.

## Council Reviews Several Matters

In a regularly scheduled meeting last Tuesday night, members of the city council reviewed several key issues that included water flooding problems, fire department equipment repairs, health insurance for city employees, cable television deregulation, airport repairs and improvements, and police department matters. Those present were Mayor Buddy Angle, Councilwoman Elaine Lewis and Councilmen Elmer Wall, Greg Kuehler, Larry Staggs and Carol Felts. City Secretary Teri Anderson also attended to record the minutes of the meeting.

After the minutes from previous regular and called meetings were read and approved, the council opened the meeting to current business. Tommy Kent met with the council to discuss a water flooding problem in the area of his residence. His backyard and cellar are flooded with each heavy rainfall as water backs up into his yard from the alley directly behind his residence. Discussion by the council indicated that the problem would be hard to deal with as any lowering of the alley behind his house to eliminate watershed there could very easily flood several houses further down the alley. Council members advised they would study the problem closely instead of taking any immediate action.

Fire Chief Craig Williams met with the council and advised that the 1962 model Ford fire truck is in need of repairs to insure continued use for approximately another ten years. After a brief discussion of the repairs to be made, the council advised Chief Williams to proceed with the needed repairs.

City Williams was next to meet with the council members. He requested a deregulation of his cable television service here in Knox City. The service has approximately 500 customers with 200 or so also subscribing to HBO. Williams stated that he needed to raise fees in order to meet increased costs that have been passed on to him. The council tabled the matter for further study and will meet with Mr. Williams again at the next meeting.

Local insurance agent David Neil Perdue discussed insurance with the council. His talk gave the council members a general idea of what to expect in relation to costs and options as they attempt to revise the health insurance offered to city employees. All members present agreed that the three different firms in Knox City should be given an equal opportunity to submit bids on a comprehensive health insurance policy for city employees.

David Counts, chairman of the Airport Advisory Committee, met with the council to discuss repairs to the airport and procedure involved in obtaining funds for the project from the recently approved financial grant awarded to Knox City by the State of Texas. A public hearing will be held on the matter, with the official notification

of the date to be published in the notice section of the classified page of *The Knox County News*. The council voted unanimously for the needed airport repairs. Named to the Airport Board were W.R. (Bill) Baker and Sam Tankersley to replace vacancies created when Greg Clonts and Ken Sickels moved from Knox City.

The council also appointed James Patterson to fill the vacancy on the Housing Authority Board created when Z.I. Smith resigned.

Knox City Police Chief Richard Ferguson had several police-related items for discussion. Action taken by the council included the approval of needed equipment and a salary increase for Patrolman Daryl Clifton, which had been agreed to prior to his attending basic certification school.

The use of city-owned equipment by private citizens was brought up for discussion. The council felt it wise to discontinue the practice of allowing the equipment to be used by anyone other than city employees. Insurance risks and damage to the equipment were the main considerations in the decision. If anyone wished to utilize any city-owned equipment in the future, they will be required to pay the city's hourly wage to an employee to operate the equipment.

In final action taken at the meeting, members of the council voted on representatives for the Tax Appraisal Board and discussed a Christmas party for all city employees and their families.

### Recipe File

#### LEMON BREAD PUDDING

- 1 cup soft white bread cubes
- 3 tbsps. butter
- 4 eggs, separated
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/2 tsp. powdered sugar
- 2/3 cup sugar
- 2 tbsps. grated lemon peel
- 5 tbsps. freshly-squeezed lemon juice
- 2 cups milk

Place bread cubes in large bowl. Sprinkle with lemon peel and salt. In a saucepan, heat milk and sugar to boiling. Add butter and stir to melt. Pour milk mixture over bread. Cool. Beat egg yolks and add to cooled bread mixture with lemon juice. Beat egg whites until stiff, but not dry. Fold into bread mixture. Pour into greased one and one-half quart baking dish. Sprinkle with powdered sugar. Place in pan of hot water and bake at 350 for one hour or until knife inserted into pudding comes out clean. Serve warm or cold. Makes six to eight servings.

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## Vets Will Be Required To Complete Report

According to Allen Lowrey, Veterans Service Officer for Knox County, a large number of Veterans Administration beneficiaries will soon be required to complete the annual income report. This report is required at this time each year so that a determination can be made as to whether a person continues to be eligible for the disability or death benefit payments.

Required to provide the annual income accounting will be all veterans receiving disability pension, all widows and children in receipt of death pension benefits, and all parents in receipt of dependency and indemnity compensation following the service-connected deaths of

their veteran sons or daughters.

The income report will be mailed to all of the VA recipients on November 1, 1983. The completed report must be returned to the Veterans Administration prior to January 1, 1984. Failure to return the report will result in termination of the benefits being paid.

Some of these income report forms will be difficult to complete and many pensioners will require assistance to be sure the cards are properly filled out. All persons needing assistance should contact their local Veterans Service Officer or veterans organization representative. All information entered on the card should be accurate, since most of it is subject to verification by the VA. It must be remembered that the Veterans Administration always verified with the Social Security Administration the amount of Social Security benefits a person is receiving, as well as amounts paid to a person by many other sources. Incorrect income information can cause delays in the processing of the reports, and possible terminations and overpayments.

## Sales Tax Rebates Are Sent Earlier

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday of last week sent city sales tax rebate checks a full week early because many taxpayers paid by the 20th of last month—as all taxpayers will be required to do this month.

"We're sending these checks early because 134,000 Texas taxpayers paid before the deadline," Bullock said. "This kind of cooperation among taxpayers is helping us avoid new and higher taxes. It's obvious this change will help local governments put these tax revenues to work faster in their cities."

Starting in November, all taxpayers will be required to file by the 20th of the month instead of by the last day of the month.

The earlier deadline set by the Legislature will bring in \$500 million more for the current state budget without a tax increase.

Bullock said this month's early payments "show that Texas merchants have accepted this change in the same spirit it was suggested—to save us from a tax increase." Bullock's office has been working with trade and professional organizations to

inform taxpayers of the change.

Knox City's net payment was \$10,054.47 as compared to \$10,612.95 last year for this period. The 1983 payments to date are \$67,176.90, a 90 percent increase over 1982's \$66,574.44.

Munday received a net payment of \$12,368.32 as compared to last year's \$7,783.08. Payments to date in 1983 have been \$51,325.78, a 12.89% increase over 1982's \$45,466.53.

Benjamin's net payment for this period was \$711.39 as compared to \$564.01. Payments to date in 1983 have been \$2,562.19 reflecting a decrease of 3.44% from last year's \$2,653.54.

Goree received \$1,323.02 for this period as compared to \$1,042.74 last year. The 1983 payments to date have been \$4,887.19, a 12.09% increase over last year's \$4,359.98.

The county had an overall increase of 5.79%.

Net payments for this period in area towns included Crowell, \$5,162.34; Haskell, \$28,588.39; O'Brien, \$299.61; Rochester, \$1,854.38; Rule, \$3,578.50; Weinert, \$441.34; Seymour, \$24,461.82; and Stamford, \$26,593.05.

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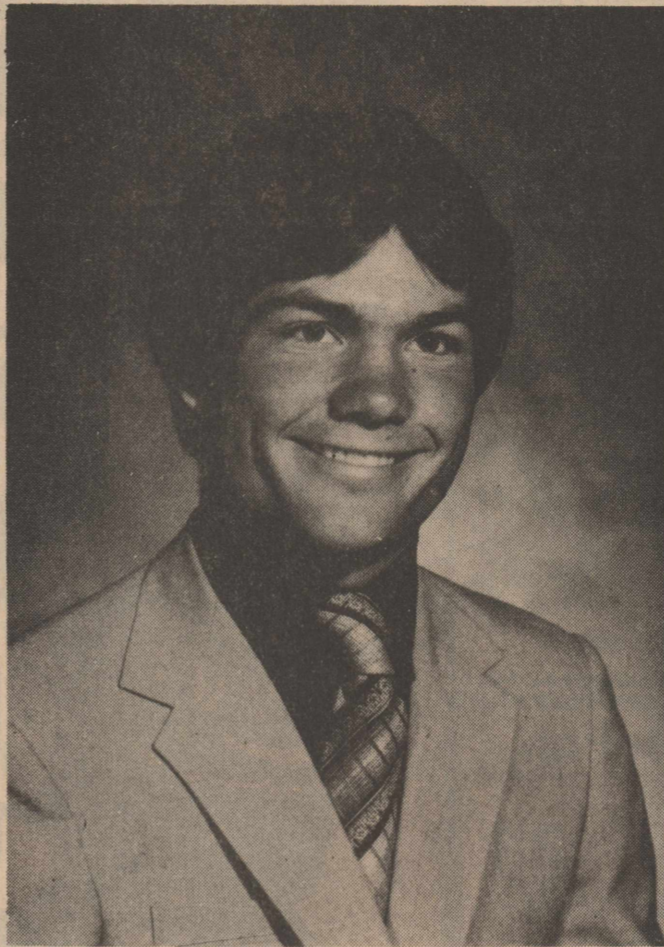


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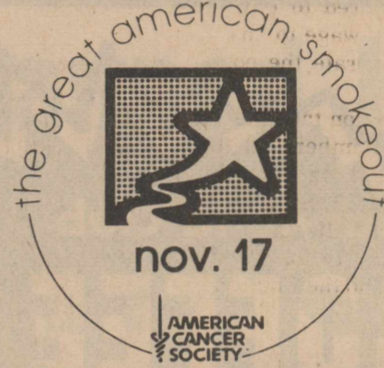

The first meeting in December is officer election night and the officers for 1984 will be listed in a later edition of the News.

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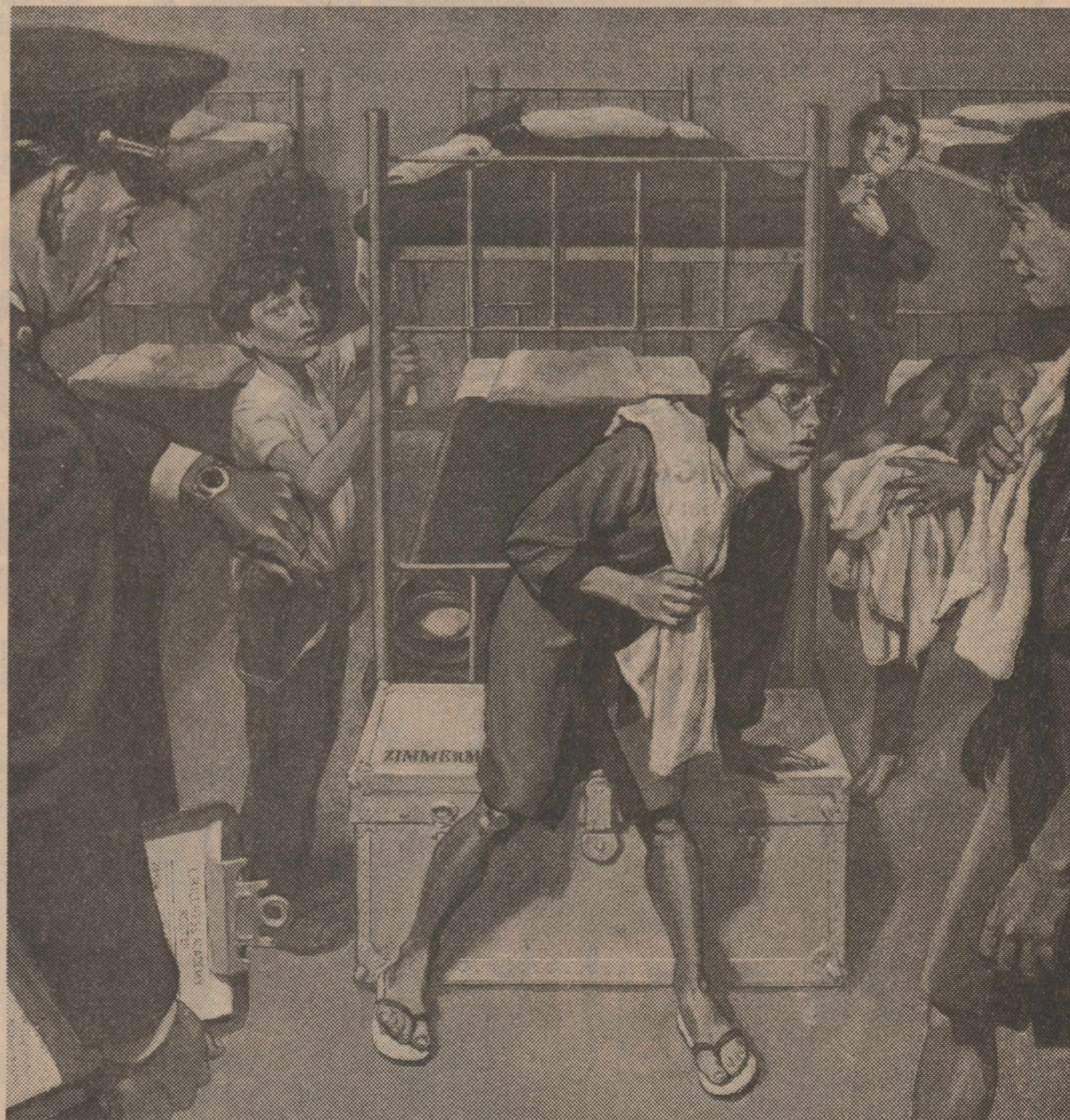

## Safety Is Urged During Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving often means traditional family reunions. Major V.J. Cawthon, Regional Commander of the Texas Department of Public Safety said, "Holiday weekends also often mean more collisions, injuries and traffic deaths because more people travel, and more traffic means more exposure to accidents."

Last year during the Thanksgiving holiday weekend, Texas recorded 40 traffic fatalities. Major Cawthon said, "Some people tend to drink more during the holidays and then attempt to drive. By doing this, they show a low regard for the well being of themselves, their passengers and other motorists." He said, "Drunk driving is one of the most dangerous risk factors facing the motorist."

He added, "Fatal accidents increase during night time hours, and darkness is coming earlier this time of year." He advised motorists to turn on their headlights and not parking lights at the first sign of dusk.

Cawthon concluded, "Heavy traffic calls for more caution and less speed, but those motorists who are extra careful, obey traffic laws and avoid the use of alcohol can have a safe and pleasant Thanksgiving."
