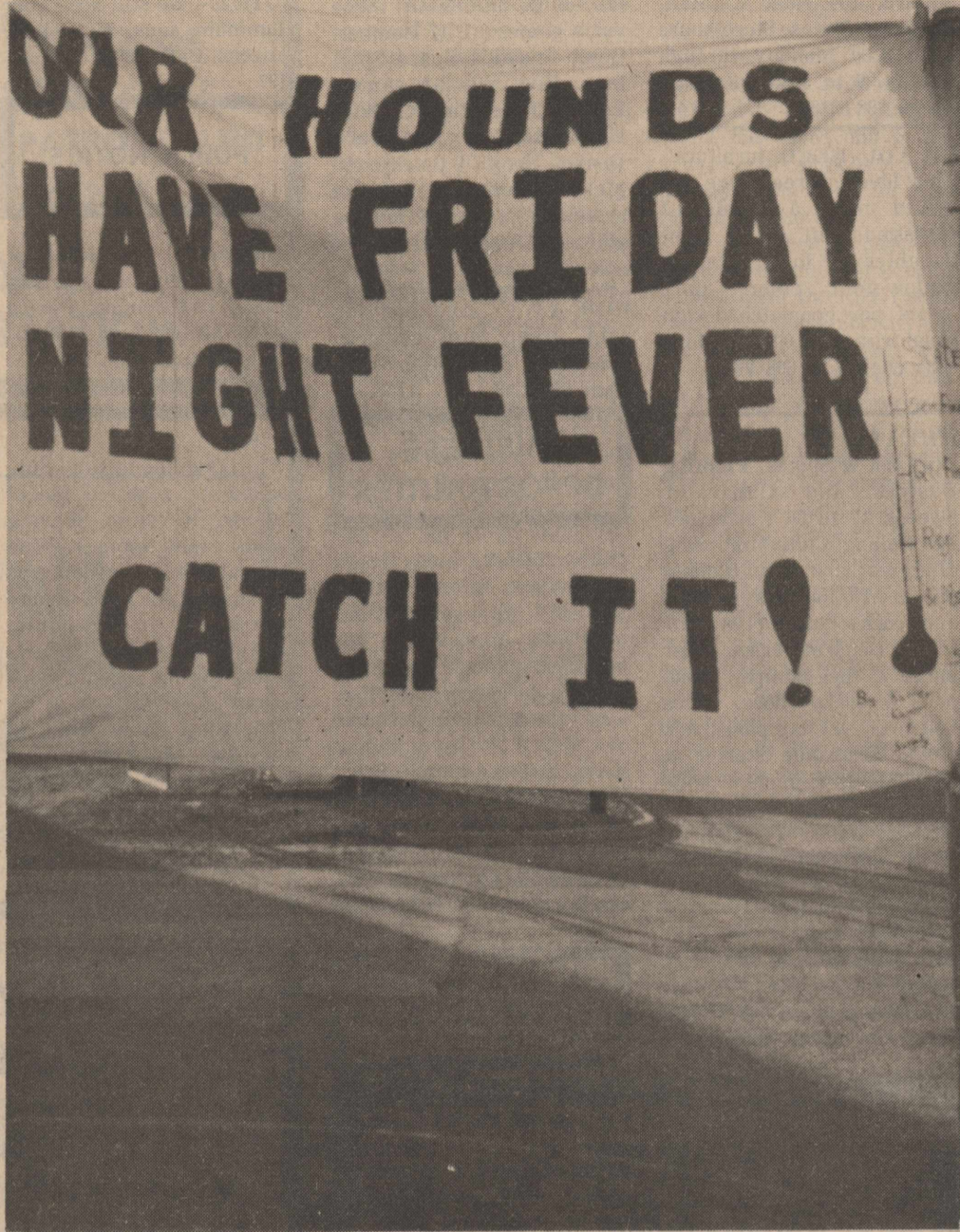

## Hounds Exterminate The Yellow Jackets

The Knox City Greyhounds took the first step towards the Class A state finals by soundly defeating Meridian last Friday night at Graham and capturing the Bi-District crown.

The Hound defense started strong by forcing mistakes and turnovers early in the game. This effort by the defense allowed the Greyhound offense good field position and several opportunities to capitalize on the Yellow Jackets' mistakes. Otis Lockhart rushed for a total of 130 yards on sixteen carries and scored four touchdowns. Lockhart, Wayne Hutchinson, and Steve Oudems each intercepted Meridian passes. James Evatt, Oudems, and Joe Paul

Flores each recovered one fumble while George Rocha recovered two fumbles during the game.

This Friday night the Greyhounds will travel to Childress to take on Nazareth for the regional championship and opportunity to continue the pursuit of the state crown.

The Knox City defense should receive praise for a fine job this week. Way to go, defense!

Meridian won the toss and elected to receive the opening kickoff. The Yellow Jacket offensive action started on their own 20 yard line after the kick by Lockhart went into the end zone for a touchback. Meridian fumbled the ball on their third offensive play and James Evatt came

up with the ball on the Yellow Jacket 18 yard line. Just two short plays later, Lockhart ramled through a good hole in the line opened up by the Hound linemen and continued the remaining 17 yards into the end zone for a touchdown. Wayne Hutchinson kicked the point after and the scoreboard lit up for the first time in the game, Knox City 7, Meridian 0.

In what could have appeared to be an "instant replay," Lockhart kicked the ball into the end zone and Meridian started out on their 20 yard line once again. It took Meridian only two plays to fumble the ball again as they were hit hard by the

MY THANKS, also for a very small black poodle named Mitzi Marie. While not actually a child, she is as much a part of our family as children will be eventually. It is amazing just how much loving can come from such a small little dog who loves her "daddy!"

MY THANKS for friends, both old and new. Many seem to overlook friendship as one of the basic staples of a happy life. I consider myself very fortunate to know exactly how important friends are. When one has had the opportunity to see friendships fade away, or to see "friends" turn the relationship around for their own personal gain, it serves to make good friendships last a lot longer.

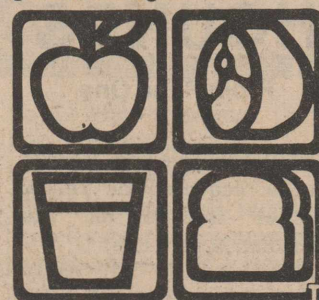

Hound defensive unit. George Rocha recovered the Yellow Jacket fumble on the Meridian 21 yard line.

Once again in early possession of the ball with good field position, the Hound offense opened up as Lockhart and Oudems carried for five yards, then Quarterback Wayne Hutchinson swept to the left side, broke a couple of tackles and ran 16 yards for another six points and the second Greyhound touchdown with 8:16 left on the clock for the first quarter. Hutchinson kicked the point after between the upright, raising the score to Knox City 14, Meridian 0.

Lockhart again kicked the ball into the end zone and Meridian took possession on their own 20 yard line. Whitaker, Evatt, and Hutchinson stopped the ball carrier for just a two yard gain on the first play. The second down action was stopped as Chad Whitley and George Rocha stopped the ball carrier after a three yard gain. After an offsides penalty against the Yellow Jackets, Evatt and Hutchinson stopped the third down play after a four yard gain and forced Meridian to punt. A short 25 yard punt allowed the Greyhounds to take over on the 50 yard line.

On first down Oudems followed some very good blocking and ran 18 yards up the middle. The next play saw more outstanding blocking by the Hounds, allowing Lockhart to run for 32 yards and score another Hound touchdown. Hutchinson again kicked the point after. That left the scoreboard showing Knox City 21, Meridian 0 with 5:41 left in the first quarter.

On Meridian's next possession, Whitley and Flores rushed the quarterback and caused a pass by Meridian to misfire. Otis Lockhart intercepted the pass and returned the ball to the Yellow Jacket five yard line. A clipping penalty against the Hounds moved the ball back to the 33 yard line with Knox City still in possession of the ball.

Oudems started off the next offensive series by the Hounds as he picked up a hard earned three yards up the middle. Lockhart then carried for six yards, Oudems carried again for two more yards and a first down. Lockhart carried for one yard, then three incompleting passes allowed Meridian to regain possession of the ball.

A good defensive effort by Evatt, Rocha, Gutierrez, Whitaker, Hutchinson, and Kevin Eaton allowed the Yellow Jackets only nine yards in three downs. That forced Meridian to punt back

to the Greyhounds once again.

Knox City took over on their own 40 yard line and put together a 12 play 60 yard drive. Lockhart and Rocha made the yardage with the help of a 15 yard screen pass and run from Hutchinson to Lockhart. The next Greyhound touchdown came as Lockhart ran the ball into the end zone from five yards out. Hutchinson's extra point kick failed, leaving the score at 27 to 0 in favor of the Hounds.

Meridian then returned the kickoff to their own 27 yard line. The Greyhound defense had a short breakdown that allowed Yellow Jacket David Carpenter to sprint 73 yards for a Meridian score. The point after kick was good and the score advanced to Knox City 27, Meridian 7.

The Hounds were unable to move the ball on their next offensive series and were forced to punt on fourth down. Meridian took over on their own 16 yard line, but quickly lost the ball on a first down fumble as George Rocha picked up his second fumble recovery of the night at the 18 yard line. Lockhart then picked up another six points as he scored his fourth touchdown. The point after kick by Hutchinson failed, leaving the score at Knox City 33, Meridian 7.

Knox City kicked off and Meridian took over at their own 34 yard line. Meridian was able to pick up a first down before Evatt and David Thompson teamed up on defense to allow only six yards in two downs. Then Chad Whitley sacked the Meridian quarterback for a 17 yard loss. Evatt and Whitley stopped the fourth down play and Knox City took over possession of the ball. This action ended the first half with Knox City going into the locker room ahead in points, 33 to 7.

The halftime activities were both delayed and extended as the field went dark and stayed dark for quite some time. A woman had turned the field lights off by mistake and they had to cool off before coming back on again. The Knox City band stayed on the field in the dark as they waited for the lights, then were able to perform when two individual lights came on and cast a very dim light on the field.

Second half football action started with Knox City's receiving the kick from Meridian. The Hounds picked up two first downs before being forced to punt the ball away. A very short punt allowed Meridian to take over on the Knox City 46 yard line. On the first play of the series, Greyhound defensive player James Evatt tackled the Yellow Jacket ball carrier

very hard and forced another Meridian fumble. The Greyhounds recovered the fumble as Oudems came up with the ball on the opposing team's 49 yard line.

Lockhart again went into action as he carried two times for 32 yards. Then Quarterback Hutchinson kept the ball on an option play and raced 17 yards to pay dirt and another Knox City touchdown. Hutchinson then kicked the extra point raising the score to Knox City 40, Meridian 7.

The Yellow Jackets and the Greyhounds exchanged pass interceptions when Oudems intercepted a pass that was off target because of a great rush on the Yellow Jacket quarterback by Chad Whitley. A few plays later Meridian stopped the Greyhound offense with a pass interception. The Yellow Jackets then started a drive that netted them four first downs. Good defense by Hounds Jesse Agraz, David Thompson, Willie Robinson, and a sack by James Evatt and Chris Whitaker set up a pass interception by Wayne Hutchinson. The interception runback by Hutchinson was for 44 yards. Once again in possession, the Hounds could not move the ball and were forced to punt back to Meridian.

The fourth quarter began with the Yellow Jackets fumbling once again and Joe Paul Flores recovering for the Hounds. George Rocha carried for two yards and a roughing penalty moved the ball another 15 yards and gave the Hounds a first down. Robinson carried twice, for two yards, then for 14 yards. With the ball on the five yard line, Rudy Agraz ran for three yards, then scored a touchdown for the Hounds with a two yard run into the end zone. The point after attempt failed and left the score, Knox City 46, Meridian 7.

After the kickoff, Meridian started their next possession at their own 12 yard line. Moving against the Hound reserves, the Yellow Jackets were able to move the distance and score in seven plays. The touchdown came after a 17 yard pass. The ball was passed in on point after to raise the score to Knox City 46, Meridian 15, and that was also the final score for the ball game.

The Hounds played with intensity and took control of the game early, allowing everyone an opportunity to play.

## Letters From Our Readers

Dear Editor:  
We want to thank Dave Thompson for the recent article pertaining to the Fire Department's effort to purchase the "Jaws of Life" rescue tool. This tool could have been used on several occasions in the past months for rescue. Even with the amount this tool is going to cost, if one life is saved, the money will be well spent.

We would like to bring to your attention that this tool is not the only project the Fire Dept. is undertaking. We are in need of several other pieces of equipment for a variety of reasons.

As you may or may not know, some of the trucks in the station house are not allowed to leave the city limits. Others are available for city and rural fires. On occasion, at rural fires, we have needed equipment that is stored on the "city only" trucks. Because of the cost of these specialized pieces of equipment, duplication for each truck is prohibitive. We feel we have the solution, however. We are attempting to locate and purchase, in time, a van, either a conventional type or a step van, such as Frito Lay Inc. uses to store this equipment in. This van will be taken to every fire, whether in the city limits or out, that way the equipment will always be with us if it is needed.

Another need is for a cascade system. This is a series of bottles of compressed air, which has been purified for the purpose of refilling our self contained breathing apparatus. This air supply, in some cases is all that is between the fireman and death, due to toxic vapors in burning structures. Because we presently have to get them refilled in Abilene, Wichita Falls or Haskell, we cannot afford to practice with them on drill nights. We may need the air for a fire before we could get them refilled. This system can be built cheaper than buying a ready built one. The system is

nothing more than four oxygen cylinders, of the hospital type, connected with tubing and containing this purified air. The cost of a factory built system is around \$1,100, but can be assembled for less than \$750.00 in our station.

A recent need has been met and we solved a resulting problem. Through generous donations, we purchased a smoke ejector fan, which has been most useful, and we wonder how we got along without it so long. As a result of this, we have had situations arise where no electricity was available for the fan to be used. The Department has voted and is the process of purchasing a gasoline generator for this type of situation.

We also need to purchase radio equipment that is compatible with the City Police Dept., the County Sheriff, and the County Hospital. Occasions have required that one or more of these services were needed and we had to relay the messages through the County Dispatcher in Benjamin, who due to scheduling, is not always available. When we need these other departments, we need them at a moment's notice and shouldn't have to waste valuable time tracking them down by relay procedures.

Some of the protective clothing in the department is no longer safe for the person who must wear it and this will have to be replaced in time. We hope that this item will be taken care of with funds from the City of Knox City. The cost of this should be somewhat less than some of the other items previously mentioned.

In time and as funds become available, we will acquire this equipment to better serve the citizens of Knox City and the surrounding rural areas. The funds will come from our money raising projects and money generated within the department. We are fortunate that

as we respond to the needs of the people, they respond to our need with donations for the purchase of this equipment. We appreciate this very much. We are here to serve and protect and with this kind of help we can do a better job of it.

Again thank you for your recent article and for presenting this to the citizens of Knox City and the area we serve.

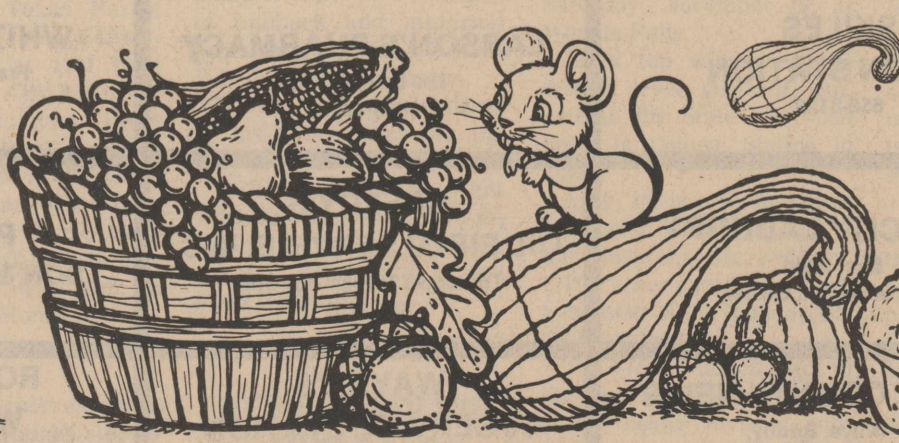
