In a Knox County News feature story last winter, information was passed on to readers about the senseless and inhumane slaughter of wild animals within Knox County and the surrounding area. The News article was carried by other newspapers in an area-wide attempt to help curb the problem caused by those who call themselves 'hunters'' but seem to kill animals just for a thrill or personal self gratification. Unfortunately, it now appears the article was ignored by those who are needlessly slaughtering our county

The very graphic picture shown at left is not one that comes out of a magazine or from some place far away, it was taken by a News

photographer just north of Knox City over the Thanksgiving day weekend. Pictured are three deer that were shot, then dumped over a bridge and discarded like used garbage. The disgusting story does not stop there, pictured to the right of the dead deer are the cut off legs from three other deer. It is apparent that the "hunters" (and I use the term loosely) shot and killed at least six deer during their outing. The three pictured here have had their horns removed and bear marks to indicate that they were hung up as if being prepared for skinning. After skinning the first three deer, the "hunters" might have decided that skinning the remaining three would be too much work. The three were just loaded into the back of a

pickup, taken to the old

wooden bridge north east of town and dumped over the side along with the remains of the three that were skinned.

Doesn't seem to make a whole lot of sense, does it? To begin with, even hunting with a license during deer season only allows a hunter one deer per season. Unless there were six hunters in this party, it is obvious that the deer were obtained illegally. If indeed there were six hunters with licenses, it seems very doubtful that any one of them would discard the animal if each only had one after the hunt was over. So, the proper term that needs to be applied here is: POACHING. It seems appropriate to use a nasty sounding word to



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

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

Nazareth picked up seven yards on first down, then a great pass rush by the interior line of the Hounds for the next two downs allowed no gain. 
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
