**Win Regional Over Nazareth**

**State Quarterfinals Next**

A large crowd of Greyhound supporters watched as Knox City won the regional crown by defeating Nazareth 20 to 6 in last Friday night's game at Fairpark Stadium in Childress. A tenacious Hound defense kept good pressure on the Swifts' offense and contained them most of the night. Knox City allowed Nazareth only one first down and 30 yards of total offense in the first half while the Knox City offense was racking up eight first downs, 192 yards on offense, and two touchdowns for a 14-0 half time lead.

Nazareth came back in the second half, slowed the Hound offense and put together a long, time consuming drive that culminated with a Swift touchdown. The

Hounds were not to be put down as they came roaring back. Otis Lockhart sealed the victory for the Hounds with a 76 yard touchdown run behind a super block by Jerry Gutierrez. In the second half, Gutierrez led the Hound defense with four unassisted tackles and he deflected two passes from their intended receivers. Good work defense and good work, Jerry!

This week, the Hounds will travel back to Childress as they meet Valley at 7:30 p.m. for the state quarter final game.

The Hound, Swift game began as Knox City kicked off to start the game. The Hound defense was ready for action as Kevin Eaton stopped the first pass from scrimmage for a four yard loss. David Thompson stopped the second


Swift play for no gain, then a good pass rush by Chad Whitley caused a pass to be incomplete and that forced a punt to the Hounds.

Knox City took over the ball on their own 43 yard line as an illegal motion penalty made it first and 15 for the Hounds. Lockhart picked up two yards, then Wayne Hutchinson carried twice for nine yards, 13 yards and a first down. Lockhart was thrown for a one yard loss, then a four yard loss. Following a penalty for delay of the game, Hutchinson hit Lockhart with a screen pass. Lockhart followed super blocking by the Hound line and a key block by Andy Correll allowed him to run for 44 yards and the first Greyhound touchdown. Hutchinson kicked the point after to put

Knox City ahead 7-0.

Knox City kicked back to Nazareth and the Swifts took over on the 33 yard line. James Evatt and Chris Whitaker stopped the runner with just a two yard gain. George Rocha allowed only one yard on the Swifts' second down. Joe Paul Flores put on a great pass rush and the Nazareth pass went incomplete. That brought up a fourth and punt situation and Nazareth punted for 44 yards. That yardage combined with a 10 yard penalty for blocking below the waist caused the Hounds to start at their own 16 yard line. The Greyhounds were unable to move the ball and Hutchinson punted back to the Swift 50 yard line.

## Senseless Crimes, Slaughter Continue

In a Knox County News feature story last winter, information was passed on to readers about the senseless and inhumane slaughter of wild animals within Knox County and the surrounding area. The News article was carried by other newspapers in an area-wide attempt to help curb the problem caused by those who call themselves "hunters" but seem to kill animals just for a thrill or personal self gratification. Unfortunately, it now appears the article was ignored by those who are needlessly slaughtering our county wildlife.


The very graphic picture shown at left is not one that comes out of a magazine or from some place far away, it was taken by a News

photographer just north of Knox City over the Thanksgiving day weekend. Pictured are three deer that were shot, then dumped over a bridge and discarded like used garbage. The disgusting story does not stop there, pictured to the right of the dead deer are the cut off legs from three other deer. It is apparent that the "hunters" (and I use the term loosely) shot and killed at least six deer during their outing. The three pictured here have had their horns removed and bear marks to indicate that they were hung up as if being prepared for skinning. After skinning the first three deer, the "hunters" might have decided that skinning the remaining three would be too much work. The three were just loaded into the back of a pickup, taken to the old

wooden bridge north east of town and dumped over the side along with the remains of the three that were skinned.

Doesn't seem to make a whole lot of sense, does it? To begin with, even hunting with a license during deer season only allows a hunter one deer per season. Unless there were six hunters in this party, it is obvious that the deer were obtained illegally. If indeed there were six hunters with licenses, it seems very doubtful that any one of them would discard the animal if each only had one after the hunt was over. So, the proper term that needs to be applied here is: POACHING. It seems appropriate to use a nasty sounding word to

Nazareth picked up seven yards on first down, then a great pass rush by the interior line of the Hounds for the next two downs allowed no gain. Whitaker then stopped a run for no gain on the fourth down and Knox City took over possession on their own 43 yard line. Again, the Hounds were unable to move the ball and were forced to punt. Following the kick, the Swifts had the ball on their own 33 yard line. On first down, a good pass rush by Flores and Whitley caused the pass to go astray and Hutchinson intercepted. Wayne returned the intercepted ball 40 yards to the five yard line, but a clipping penalty brought the ball back to the 34 yard line. Jerry Gutierrez then carried for no gain and the quarter ended with the Greyhounds leading 7-0.

Second quarter action began with Hutchinson carrying for five yards, then Rocha carried for another five yards and a first down. Hutchinson followed a wave of Hound blockers for 14 yards another first down before finally being brought down on the Swift 10 yard line. On the next play Hutchinson handed off to Rocha, George broke one tackle and raced into the end zone for another Knox City touchdown. Hutchinson kicked the point after to put Knox City further ahead by 14-0.

Following the kickoff, Evatt, Rocha, Thompson, and Eaton teamed up to stop the Swifts and again forced them to punt back to the Hounds.

Knox City took over on the 32 yard line. Hutchinson and Steve Oudems picked up enough yardage for another first down. The Swifts then stopped Knox City and forced a Hound punt.

After another exchange of punts, Hutchinson hit Dwayne Watkins with a pass for a 33 yard gain. Lockhart then ran for 16 yards and Knox City seemed to be knocking on the door once again. Knox City then had two incompletes passes before Hutchinson hit Lockhart on a screen pass. With the completion of the pass, a clipping penalty moved the Hounds back to the 25 yard line. On fourth down, the pass was incomplete and Nazareth took over possession on the 25 yard line.

James Evatt stopped the Swift ball carrier for only a two yard gain on first down, then second down saw Jerry Gutierrez intercepting the Nazareth pass and running the ball back for eleven yards. Knox City took over with only a short time remaining before the half. One attempted pass was incomplete and the half ended with the score 14-0 in favor of the Knox City Greyhounds.

Receiving the second half kickoff, the Hounds were able to make only one first down before having to punt the ball away. Nazareth took over on their own 15 yard line. The Swifts picked up 15 yards and a first down. Chad Whitley then stopped the first down play for a five yard loss. Gutierrez stopped the second down play for a two yard loss, and on third down the Swifts passed for 30 yards and a first down with the pass from Quarterback Schmucker to Backus. 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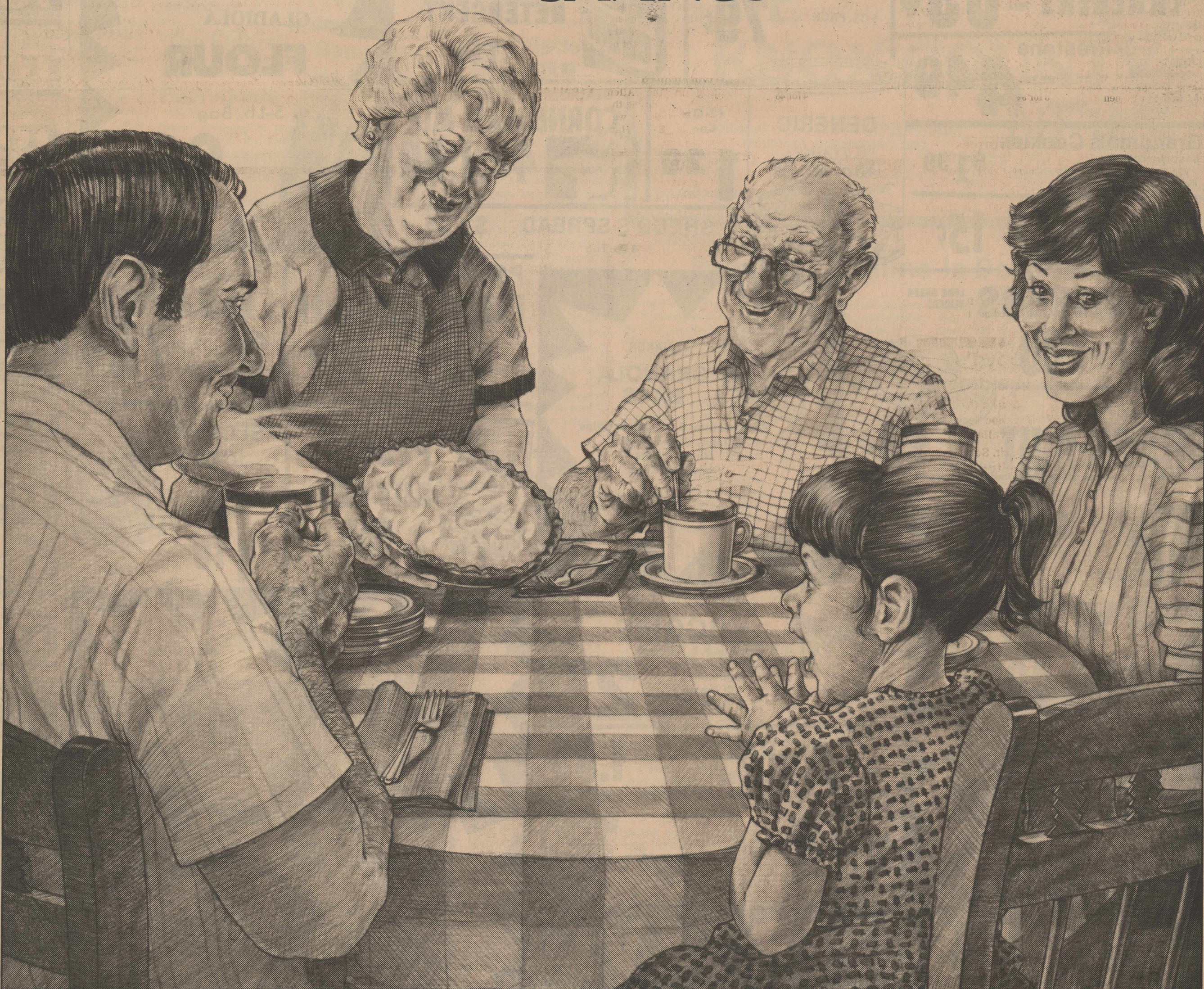
