

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

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City Of Lubbock Honors Ex-Resident

(Editor's note: Former Knox City resident Irene Branch, who along with her late husband Jimmy Branch published The Knox County Herald for many years, was honored in retirement ceremonies by the City of Lubbock last Thursday. Rene, whose parents were the late Mr. and Mrs. Frank McAuley Sr., retires in January after five years with Alcohol Treatment Program of the Texas Tech Health Sciences Center. The following article appeared on the front page of the Lubbock Avalanche-Journal last Friday morning.)

Irene Branch, who gave up her days and many of her nights to help others, finally had a day of her very own Thursday.

It came to her from the Lubbock City Council, with Alan Henry proclaiming "Irene Branch in honor of the "dedicated educator and counselor in the field of alcoholism and chemical dependence.

Mrs. Branch began as a volunteer in the early 1970s and moved to director of the Lubbock Council Alcoholism. She retires in January after five years with the Alcoholism Treatment Program of the Texas Tech

Health Sciences Center. The proclamation read by Henry lauded her community service, saying it "exemplified professional and personal committment of the highest order.

It cited her as a "pioneer in providing...these services to the community.

Her "loving care for individuals and families suffering from the disease," it continued, "provided inspiration and direction to the entire community. The day spent working with

alcoholics and families, lecturing to schools and speaking to any organization willing to listen, didn't end At night, there was the

"I loved it all, the long hours, being awakened at night, all of it," Mrs. Branch

When she first got involved, she said, the only place for treatment was the alcohol recovery center and a "few" AA (Alcohol Anonymous)

Now, thanks in great part to her own work, serving on boards and with people, there are assistance places, all across town.

"A lot of it was eyeball-toeveball and referring them for treatment," she said.

And, onething which helped her in her endless task was her own status as a recovering alcoholic, a person who could empathize with "the feeling of guilt about drinking when they really don't intend to.

Because she had been there and could talk to the alcoholic or his family or his employer with knowledge beyond the academic, the alcoholic could relate to her and identify with her own struggle and success. "It will be 14 years since I had a drink. I still take

That frank attitude, combined with her willingness to put the need of others above the need for time off, helped bring the Lubbock programs into being. Today, there is education in

the schools and help in outpatient care, in-patient care and halfway houses to bridge the gap back to society. A lot of it was getting the

message across that "alcohol is the most abused drug" and needs to be treated that way. At St. Mary of the Plains

Hospital, where the Tech ATP is centered, Norma Brown, associate director of the program, pointed out that Mrs. Branch "did a lot of work, initiating and getting public information programs going in schools and community agencies.

Mrs. Branch, she added, was "one of the people willing

For herself, Mrs. Branch just said, "I was there at the right time.

She came to Lubbock in 1960 after she and her husband, Jimmie sold their weekly paper in Knox City and he joined The Avalanche-Journal staff. He died two vears later.

(EDITOR'S NOTE: In recent issues of the News, information has been passed on to readers about efforts to locate a radioactive waste disposal site in this area. A lot of questions have been raised as citizen awareness and concern over this issue grows. In response to the questions, Rob Harrison has agreed to furnish information in six articles to be published in The Knox County News. The following is the first of the series.)

Many things have transpired since Knox County was informed that it might well be the location of a 'Low Level' Radioactive Waste Disposal Site. This effort, of course, is by the Texas Low Level Radioactive Waste Disposal Authority. There have been town hall meetings all over the state and numerous hours spent trying to find out as much as possible and as soon

as possible. Over the next few weeks, a series of articles hopefully will tell you what you may have wanted to know. You certainly can't get any information on the subject by reading the press releases from the Low Level Authority. 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
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
