Six More Days

Registration Deadline Nears For All Voters

With the deadline for registration only a few days away, Texas voters over 60 years old have been reminded of a new law which requires every voter to register, regardless of age or place of residence.

Heretofore, voters over 60 years old were required to register only if they lived in a city of ten thousand or more inhabitants. Wednesday of next week, Jan. 31, is the last day to apply for a registration certificate.

Texas Secretary of State John L. Hill issued the reminder in a statement summarizing registration requirements. As Secretary of State, Hill also has the title of chief election officer of Texas. He

said that anyone who is now eligible to vote or who will become eligible by Feb. 28, 1969, may register at this time. The 1968 voting year begins next March 1 and runs through Feb. of 1969.

Hill emphasized that registration for most voters will close on Wednesday of next week, and they will not be permitted to register after that date. The only persons who may register after the Jan. 31 deadline are new residents who move to Texas after Oct. 1, 1967, and persons who become 21 years old or become naturalized citizens after January 31, 1968.

Voters may register in person at the county tax assessor-collector's office or at the City Hall which will be open for the remainder of the registration period.

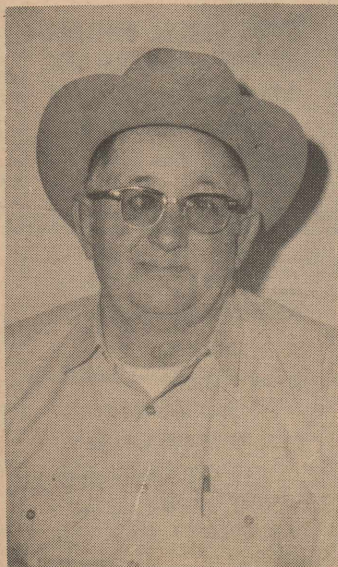
Kropp Is Named Hart Policeman

Tommy Lawrence Passmore, 30, of Amarillo was arrested about 4:30 p. m. Tuesday in a cafe in Amarillo in connection with the September attempted burglary of Farmer's State Bank.

Passmore appeared before

Potter County Justice of the Peace Bonita Potter on a grand jury indictment issued in Dimmitt at noon Tuesday.

Dist. Judge James A. Joy of Plainview set bond at \$25,000. Passmore remained in Castro County jail in Dimmitt

last Tuesday in lieu of bond.

Passmore was arrested by Potter County Deputy Sheriff Frank Gilley, Texas Ranger E. G. Albers of Canyon and Castro County Sheriff Jack Cartwright.

The alleged burglary occurred Sept. 4, 1967. It was believed to have been foiled when Willie Morgan, employee of Lubbock-Amarillo Armored Car Service, stopped at the bank for a routine check pickup.

At the time of the attempted burglary, Passmore was free on an appeal bond in Amarillo on a charge of theft over \$50.

Hart Grain Sub-Station Burns Near Edmonson

A fire in a grain elevator about seven miles northwest of Edmonson caused approximately \$10,000-\$15,000 damage early Saturday night.

Fire units from Edmonson, Hart and Dimmitt all answered calls to the fire after a passing motorist discovered the blaze at 6:15 p. m.

The elevator, a sub-station of Hart Grain Co., is owned by Roy Burrus of 1500 W. 24th St. in Plainview.

Firemen had the blaze completely extinguished by 8:30 p. m. An Edmonson fireman

said the fire apparently started in the upper part of the elevator, and that flames were visible almost to Edmonson.

Burrus said there was little grain stored in the elevator at the time of the fire, so not much damage to grain occurred. He said an accurate estimate of damage to the elevator itself could not be made so soon after the fire, but he would guess that damage would run between \$10,000 and \$15,000.

Cause of the fire was unknown.

Victor Espinoza Dies In Vietnam

Victor Espinoza Jr., son-in-law of Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Guzman, was killed in action Jan. 11 near Quang Tri, Vietnam.

Espinoza, 22, was married to the former Geneva Guzman, a 1966 graduate of Hart High School. She is attending Pan American College in Edinburg. Espinoza is also survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Victor Espinoza Sr. of Edinburg.

Espinoza's wife received the telegrammed report of his death as she was making preparations to go to Hawaii to meet him during his R&R leave. He had been in Vietnam for six months and in the Marine Corps for one year.

Accident Claims Teenage Nephew Of Hart Man

Granville Martin received word Monday of the death of a nephew, Walter Lee Martin, 17, in Los Angeles, Calif. Young Martin was killed in an automobile accident early Monday morning as he was driving to work. Still another nephew, James Luther Martin, a member of the Los Angeles police department was called

to the accident scene for investigation. Policeman Martin did not know that the victim was his cousin until arriving at the accident scene.

Walter Lee Martin was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charlie Martin of Los Angeles, Calif. Funeral services were held Wednesday in Los Angeles.

For a wedding trip to Dallas, the bride chose a dress of beige knit with bone accessories. They will be at home in Canyon after Jan. 23.

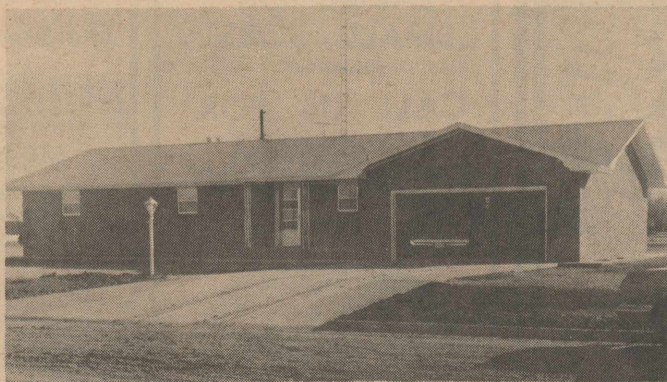
