## Two HHS Students Named Outstanding Teenagers

Two students of Hart High School have been named Outstanding Teenagers of America for 1967 by the Outstanding American Foundation.

Recipients of the coveted award are Rebecca Futrell, 16 year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Futrell, and David D. Harris, 18-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Duard Harris.

Selected for the honor on the basis of ability and achievement, the two will compete with other winners in Texas for the Governor's Trophy awarded annually to the most outstanding teenager in each state. They will also be eligible for one of the top national awards and college scholarships made available by the Outstanding American Foundation.

The non-profit organization, dedicated to honoring, inspiring and encouraging young people to take full advantage of the opportunities in America, sponsors this awards program annually.

Miss Futrell, a high school junior, is secretary and treasurer of the Student Council, is junior class reporter, a cheer leader and a forward on the basketball team. She is fourth vice president of the Hart Chapter of Future Homemakers of America, co-editor of Hart Longhorn Trails, member of the First Baptist Church and the adult choir.

She is correspondent for 1967-68 to Co-ed, published by Scholastic Magazine, Inc. for home economic students. Recently she was named queen and sweetheart of the Hart Lions Club. Miss Futrell plans to enter nurse's training.

Harris, a senior, is president of the Hart Future Farmers of America, secretary and treasurer of the Longhorn Letterman Club, and a member of the National Honor Society.

A tackle on the Hart Longhorn football team, he received honorable mention as an all-

district offensive tackle. He was selected for Who's Who this year, and attended Boy's State last June, sponsored by the American Legion Post 311 of Hart. He plans to attend Texas Tech.

## Last Rites Held In McLean For Former Superintendent

Paul Lewis Kennedy, 57, a former superintendent of Hart Public Schools, died Jan. 25 in the McLean Hospital.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Saturday in the First Methodist Church of McLean with the Rev. Elton Wyatt, pastor, officiating. The Rev. Denzil Leonard, pastor of Lincoln Avenue Baptist Church of Dalhart, and formerly of Hart, assisted.

Burial was in Hillcrest Cemetery at McLean with Lamb

Funeral Home directing the services.

Kennedy was born in Alvord. He attended Decatur Baptist College and West Texas State University, receiving his bachelor's and master's degrees. He began his teaching career in 1931 at Carey.

Kennedy was married to the former Frances Noel May 23, 1937, in McLean.

A veteran of World War II, Kennedy taught as well as serving in the administrative field.

He taught in Panhandle, Samnorwood, McLean and Borger before serving as Hart superintendent for seven years. He resigned as Hart superintendent in 1965.

Kennedy was "Man of the Year" by Hart Lions in Nov. 1964.

Surviving are his wife, Frances; a daughter, Mrs. Tony Smitherman of McLean; a sister, Mrs. Elizabeth Kennedy of Broomfield, Colo. and two grandchildren.

Signup dates for farmers in Castro County who wish to take part in the 1968 feedgrain, wheat and cotton programs have been announced by Jim Elder Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee.

All Commodity program signups will be held during the same period -- February 5 through March 15. Signup applications indicate the farmer's program intentions, including the extent of his participation in the programs.

Under both the feed grain and cotton programs for 1968, farmers may earn diversion and price-support payments as well as qualify for price-support loans on their corn and grain sorghum crops; feed grain diversion payments will be available to all program participants in 1968. The wheat program provides price-support loans and marketing certificates to bring returns up to full parity on the part of the wheat crop allocated for domestic use; no diversion payment is available for wheat.

While the signup period for 1968 commodity programs will

extend through six weeks, the Chairman urged that farmers who wish to take part in the programs file their applications as soon as they decide on 1968 production plans. "Time has a habit of getting away from us sometimes before we know it, so it's a good idea not to delay in filing program intentions," he said.

### ALTERNATE CROPS

A. APPROVED CROPS--All of the alternate crops that may be approved under the law have been approved for 1968. They are castor beans, crambe, flaxseed, guar, mustard seed, plantago ovata, safflower, sesame, and sunflower.

B. ACREAGE PERMITTED--Part or all of the acreage diverted in excess of 20 percent of total effective feed grain base and part or all acreage diverted from cotton at the 6.0 cent rate may be devoted to alternate crops.

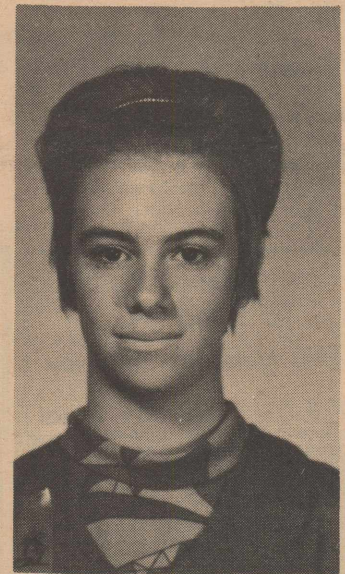
C. PER ACRE PAYMENT REDUCTION RATE--The reduction rate will be the following percentage of the additional diversion rate: 1. 50 percent for

castor beans, crambe, flaxseed, guar, mustard seed, plantago ovata, and sesame. 2. 100 percent for safflower and sunflower.

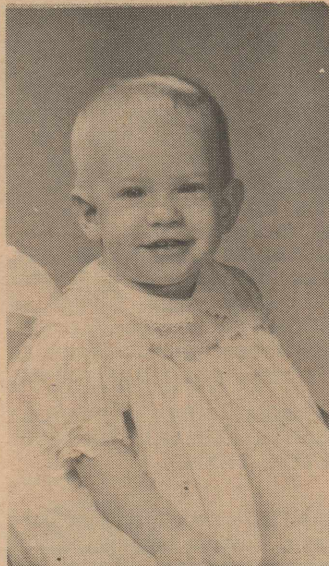

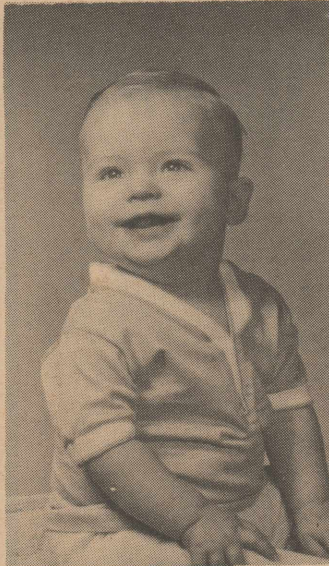

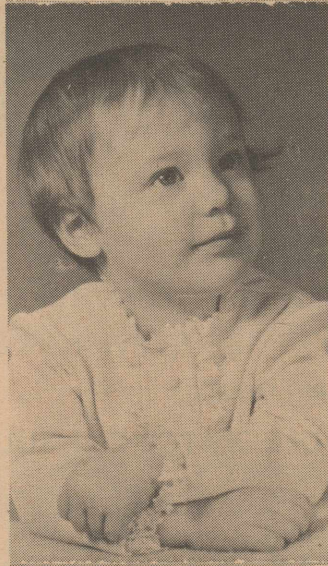

## Capt. Conrad Participates In Air Support Mission

WITH U. S. COMBAT AIR FORCES, Vietnam --Captain Theodore J. Conrad, son of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard J. Conrad, Nazareth, Tex., recently took part in a uniquely successful close air support mission over Vietnam.

When Captain Conrad and his fellow F-100 Super Sabre pilots struck an enemy bunker complex 20 miles north of Phu Cat in support of a U. S. Army unit, the battle damage assessment contained an unusual entry. In addition to destroying a cave and inflicting heavy casualties, the F-100 pilots were credited with causing an enemy soldier to defect.

"We had just completed our bomb run," Captain Conrad said, "and were making strafing passes, when the forward air controller reported that an enemy soldier had run over to the Army position carrying a white flag."

Captain Conrad is a member of the 37th Tactical Fighter Wing based at Phu Cat Air Base.

The captain, who was commissioned in 1960 through the aviation cadet program, attended West Texas State Univer-

sity and Texas Technological College.

His wife, Jeannie, is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Overstreet of 2908 N. Prince, Clovis, N. M.

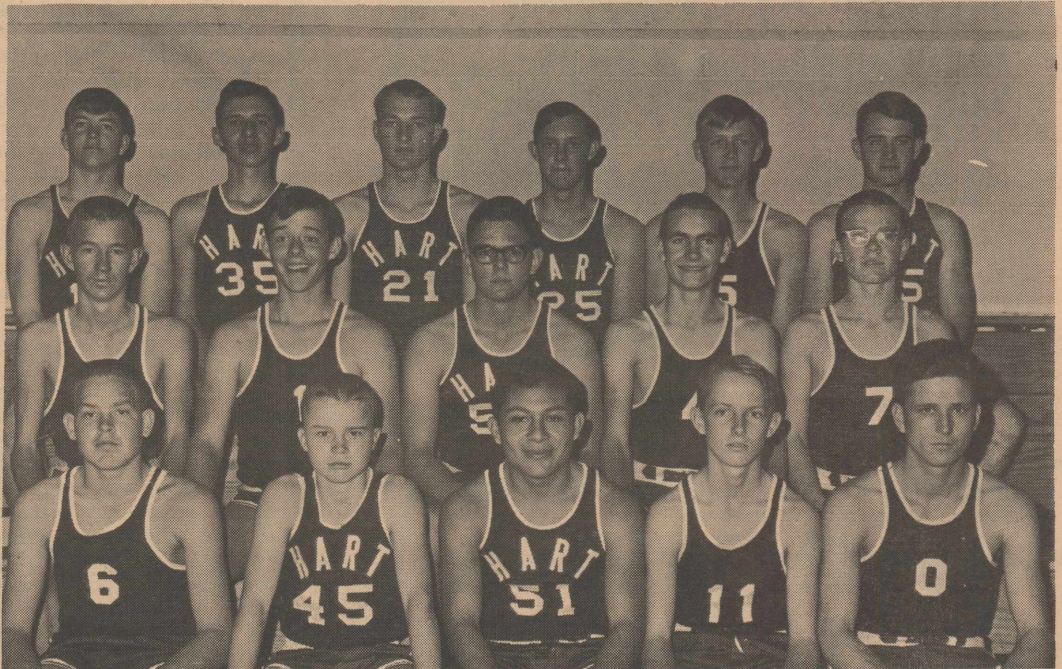

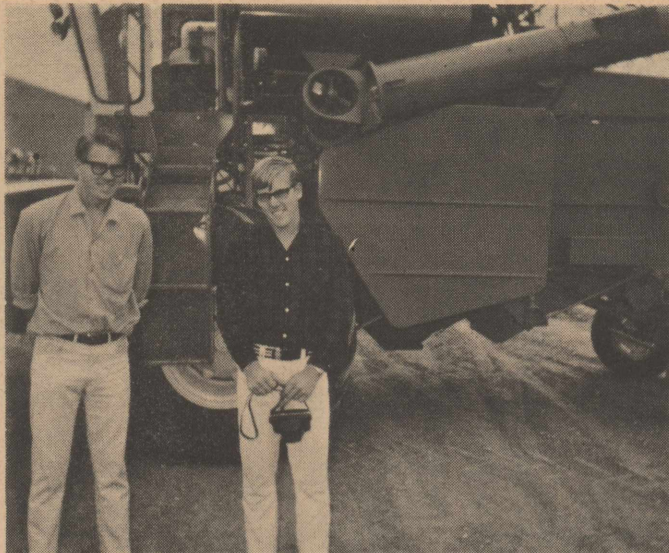

## Paul Brooks Family Has Visitors From Africa

"Unexpected company that just dropped by" proved to be an entertaining treat to the Paul Brooks family this week. While working in his field Saturday, Brooks was noticed by passing motorists who stopped to chat. Wanting to know more about the operation of a farm, the visitors asked to return on Monday.

The young visitors were Louis and Francois Naude of Kroonstad O.F.S. Republic of South Africa. They are on a three-months tour of the United States observing various methods of farming. They hope to obtain information to help them with the operation of 2000 acres of farm and grass land in South Africa.

The Naude brothers are owners of the vast acreage that employs 33 families. The younger Naude is 19 years old. The elder did not reveal his age but did say he had completed three years of university work.

In an interview Wednesday, Mrs. Brooks said that the young men who claim to be "mostly French" were obviously well educated. The elder spoke Eng-

lish quite well while the younger was more difficult to understand. Mrs. Brooks said that the Raudes found Texas to be quite similar to the section of South Africa where they lived. They said that Texans picturing all of Africa as jungles and natives was incorrect.

The brothers arrived in the United States via New York. They purchased a used car and are driving over much of the agricultural area of the U. S. Some nights they stop at a motel although much of the time they camp out with equipment they received at the African embassy.

Louis and Francois Naude are very impressed with the mechanization they have seen and with the abundance of water. They report that they have very little water and that from streams. They grow milo, corn and soy beans. They have no cotton.

Mr. and Mrs. Brooks are very glad that their South African visitors "dropped by" and issued an invitation that if ever they were back in the country, "Y'all come!"

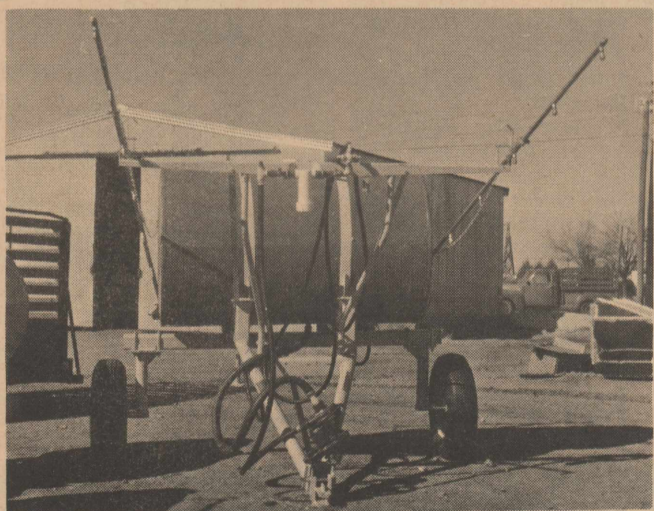

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## KITCHEN KORNER

There has been so much controversy over the dieting subject and several have asked for diet recipes, but I have found by looking at any of the diet recipes that there are very few that you are allowed more than one-fourth to one-half cup of any way so it would be just as well to get a calorie chart and pick out the foods you like best with the least calories.

I have a calorie sheet which says to pick no more than 800 calories for a day and no more than 8 hours sleep. "If you really want to lose weight fast and do not work at a hard job."

The best cure for your reputation is to get rich.

We tried a new salad during the weekend and it is delicious and gives you that extra something your appetite seems to crave at this time of year. We used it without the dressing but the dressing sounds very good.

### UNDER THE SEA SALAD

1 package lime jello. Mix with 1 cup boiling water and 1 cup pear juice. Put one-half the jello in mold that has a hole in the center. You may add a few Maraschino cherries if you wish.

Let the other half of the jello almost set-then whip. To this add 2 packages of Philadelphia creamed cheese (cream first), 1 teaspoon vanilla, 1/4 teaspoon ginger, a No. 2 can of pears (cut up). Add this on top of the part in the mold. When ready to serve un-

fold and make the dressing below and put in center of jello.

One-half pint whipped cream  
Add 2 tablespoons Mayonnaise.

2 tablespoons lemon juice  
2 tablespoons sugar  
2 mashed bananas.

### SWEDISH MEAT BALLS WITH SOUR CREAM

1 lb. ground beef  
1/2 lb. ground pork  
1/3 c. chopped onion  
3 T. chopped parsley  
3/4 c. soft bread crumbs  
1/2 t. marjoran  
1 1/2 tsp. salt  
Dash pepper  
1 Tsp. worcestershire sauce  
1 egg

Combine ingredients and mix well, add 1/2 cup milk and mix. Chill 2 hours or overnight if possible. Shape into walnut sized balls. Heat 4 tablespoons shortening and brown meat balls slowing until well done. Remove the balls from the fat. Stir into the fat the following: 4 tablespoons flour, 1 tablespoon paprika, 1 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/8 teaspoon black pepper. Add 2 cups boiling water, cook until smooth. Heat meat balls in gravy. Stir in 3/4 cup sour cream a little at a time. Serve with noodles or rice. (Makes 18 meat balls.)

"Operating under a system of freedom, and possessing know-how and the latest technology, the American farmer is the producing marvel of the world. Because of this, the average family spends less than one-fifth of its income for food. Americans enjoy the highest standard of living the world has ever known, in part, because of the farmer's efficiency.

"Farmers and ranchers, through their organized efforts, have sought a voice in State affairs in order to secure social, economic, and educational improvements for those who make their living from the soil."
