Wheat Measuring Demands Caution

Extreme care should be taken in measuring and computing your wheat acreage since errors can be very expensive.

A report of acreage is required on each farm with a 1968 wheat allotment, even though no wheat is planted or the farm is not participating in the 1968 wheat program.

Wheat for harvest on a farm without an allotment must be reported. All adjustments in wheat acreages must be made by April 30 since wheat not destroyed by then is classified as wheat.

Wheat within the allotment destroyed by natural causes prior to May 1 and planted to another crop for harvest in 1968 will not be eligible for certificate payment, or history credit unless a written request is filed at ASCS office and such request approved by Castro ASC County committee.

Final planting date for crops destroyed by natural causes are wheat - Dec. 1; cotton - May 25; and grain sorghums - June 20.

These dates are for use in planting or replanting in order

Voting will be at the City Hall, with DeWayne Brown serving as presiding judge and Wister Clevenger as alternate.

Bailey, 46, was born at Lake Creek and moved to Hart from Petersburg nine years ago.

He is the owner and operator of a motor service and he and his wife have four children, three of whom are enrolled in the Hart schools. One graduated from Hart High.

The Baileys attend the Methodist church, of which they are members and Bailey serves as Sunday School superintendent. He also is a member of the local Lions Club.

Nelson, 39, local farmer, is married and has one boy and two girls. A member of the Hart Methodist Church, he is an assistant scout leader and has served on the ASCS com-

mittee and board of the Co-Op Gin.

He and his family have been residents of the Hart area for 15 years, having moved here from Tulia.

Hill, 33, has lived in Hart all of his life and was graduated from Hart High School. He has varied farming interest and is an adult leader in the 4-H Club.

He now serves on the Olton Recreation Center's board of trustees. Married and the father of five children, he is a member of the church committee in the St. John's Catholic Church here.

Bennett, local farmer and businessman, is married and the father of two children, Sandy and Rickey. The family attends the Hart Methodist Church. He is the only incumbent in the race, his name being petitioned on the ballot. He has served one term of three years.

Meeting Set At Hereford On College

The counties included in the proposed region five of the junior college proposal of the Texas coordinating board for higher education will meet in Hereford at 7:30 p. m., Thursday, April 4.

Each of the four counties--Deaf Smith, Castro, Parmer and Oldham--will have representatives of local and county government, chambers of commerce, school boards and other community leaders present for the meeting.

Dr. Robert L. Clinton, Asst. Commissioner and the one in charge of developing the proposals for the junior college system will be on hand to address the representative group.

The Education Committee of the Deaf Smith County Chamber of Commerce called the meeting so that the initial steps towards the eventual realization of a goal of the area may be taken.

At this point no location for the junior college has been determined.

Representatives present will elect a steering committee from each of the four counties to take over the further steps in developing a junior college district in the four county area.

'No Grazing' Period To Begin May 1

Farmers were reminded today that the "no grazing" period for diverted acres under the 1968 feed grain and cotton programs will start May 1. It will continue for the following five months until October 1.

Jim Elder, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee, explains that farmers who are diverting acreage under the

programs have agreed not to graze the diverted acres during a specific five-month period of the growing season and not to harvest a crop from diverted acres.

Farmers participating in the conservation reserve and cropland adjustment programs have agreed not to graze land diverted under these programs or harvest any crop from such land

during the life of the agreements.

Castro County farms signed up to participate in the 1968 commodity diversion programs for corn/grain sorghum and for cotton number about 1054.

Castro County did not receive any cotton under the release and reapportionment provisions.

-- State School Land Board has approved an application by the Duval Corporation to increase from 800 to 1,800 feet the maximum depth of exploratory sulphur wells on a mineral lease in Culberson County.

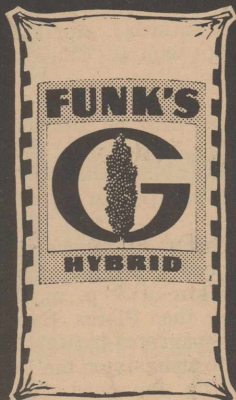
Lease was one sold Nov. 7 in Texas' first sulphur-lease sale on West Texas lands. State will receive one-sixth royalty on production from the lease.

Land Commissioner Jerry Sadler has set May 7 for another sulphur-lease sale. This one covers 19 tracts of land in Culberson, Reeves and Pecos counties involving 8,938 acres.

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KITCHEN KORNER

This morning we are getting a nice shower -- very spring like and very good for the farmers. Although it isn't so good for my project at home -- that of painting!

I always seem to get more paint on me than anywhere when I paint and tried the process of putting aluminum foil around the brush with a rubber band and cupping the foil to catch the excess paint and it really works well. So try it sometime if you have had the same trouble.

Here are some more good diet recipes.

DAPPLE APPLE BAKE

4 medium-size apples, pared, quartered, cored, and sliced
No-calorie sweetener
1 T. lemon juice
1/4 tsp. cinnamon
1/2 c. graham-cracker crumbs
1/2 c. zwieback crumbs
1 T. butter or margarine, melted
3/4 c. hot water

1. Place apples in a 6-cup shallow baking dish; sweeten with your favorite no-calorie sweetener, using the equivalent of 8 tablespoons sugar. Sprinkle with lemon juice and cinnamon; toss to mix.

2. Toss graham-cracker and zwieback crumbs with melted butter or margarine in a small bowl; sprinkle over apple mixture. Pour in hot water; cover.

3. Bake in hot oven (400) 15 minutes; uncover. Bake 15 minutes longer, or until apples are tender. Serve warm.

RIBBON-CANDY PUFF

1 env. low-calorie lime-flavor gelatin (3 to a package)
1 env. low-calorie lemon-flavor gelatin (3 to package)
1 env. low-calorie cherry-flavor gelatin (3 to a pkg.)
2 1/4 c. hot water
1 pkg. whipped dessert-topping mix
3 squares sweet cooking chocolate (from a 4-oz. bar)

1. Dissolve each flavor gelatin in 3/4 cup of the hot water in a separate medium-size bowl; cool at room temperature about 30 minutes.

2. Place bowl of lime-gelatin mixture in a pan partly filled with ice and water; beat until triple in volume and mixture forms soft peaks; spoon into a 10-cup mold; chill. Re-

peat beating with lemon, gelatin, then cherry-gelatin mixtures, layering and chilling each in mold, to make three layers. Chill several hours, or until firm.

3. To unmold dessert, run a sharp-tip, thin-blade knife around top of gelatin; tip, then tap mold gently to release gelatin from side. Cover mold with a serving plate; turn upside down; gently lift off mold.

4. Make whipped topping, following label directions. Frost gelatin all over; garnish with chocolate curls. To make: Shave the 3 squares sweet cooking chocolate into paper-thin strips with a vegetable parer. Chill dessert until serving time. Cut into 8 wedges.

CONSTITUTIONAL REVISION-- Judicial sub-committee of the State Constitutional Revision Commission has recommended that judges of the Texas Supreme Court and the Court of Criminal Appeals be appointed rather than elected.

Recommendations call for appointment by the governor of top court judges from a panel submitted by a special nominating commission. Judges occasionally would "run against their records" on a public ballot, with voters marking their preference for continued service or judicial retirement. Where judges are rejected, new appointment would follow.

Norman Register, director of revenue and finance for the City of Dallas, says Texas' \$250 home-furnishings exemption from ad valorem taxes should be either increased or done away with. Register told the local-governments committee that in 1876 when the \$250 figures was written into the constitution it was enough money to furnish a house. Now, however, that's ridiculous, he said.

Another witness before the committee said that Lubbock and Dallas are the only two cities in the state which effectively collect their ad valorem taxes on cars.

Revision commission heard strong recommendation from former Gov. Allan Shivers for four-year-terms for governors and advice from Municipal Advisory Council that cities are losing "tens of millions" of dollars in bond interest rates because of antiquated provisions in Texas law.

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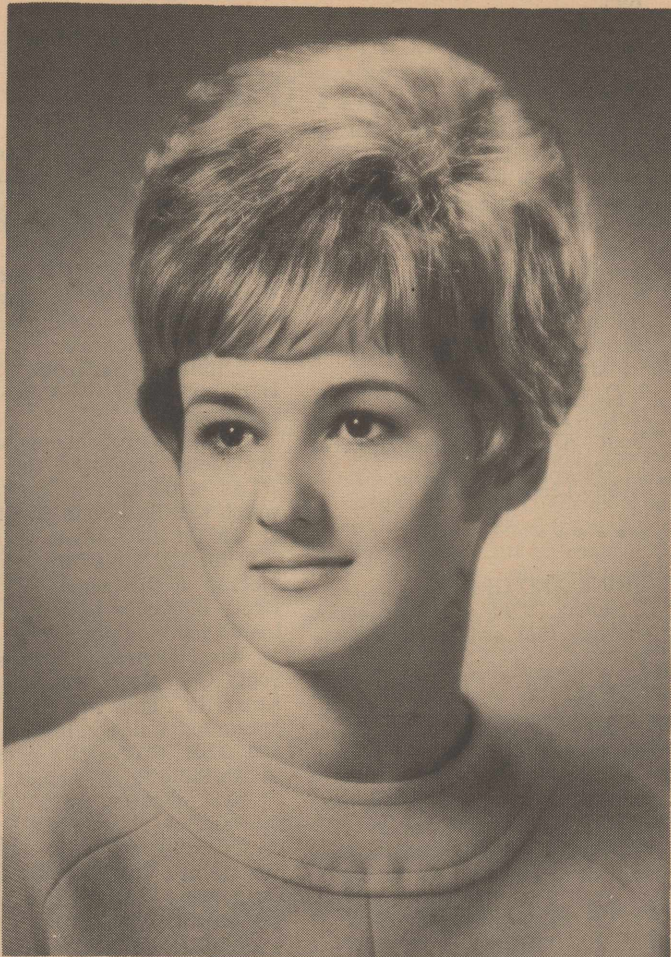

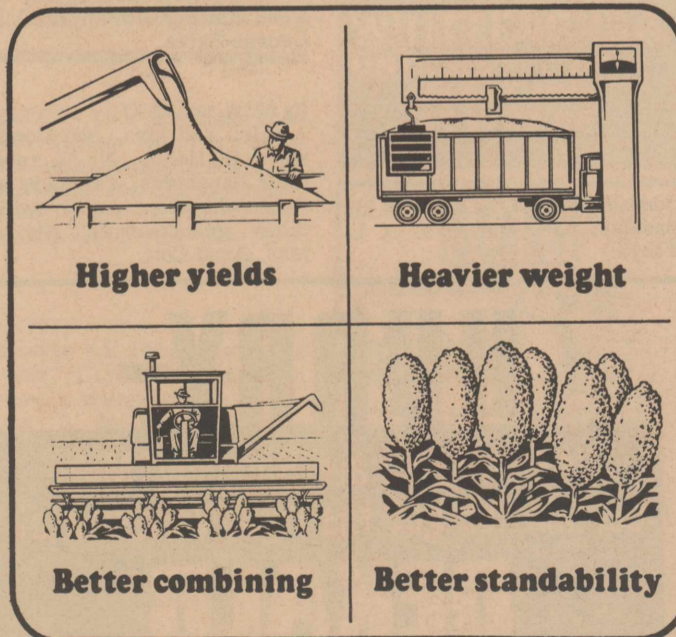
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Moments Of Meditation

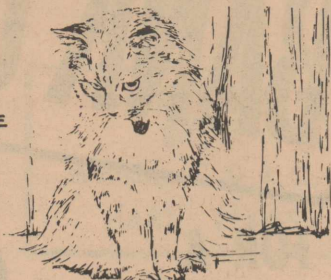

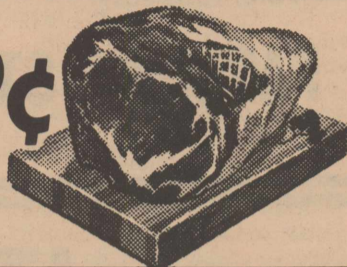

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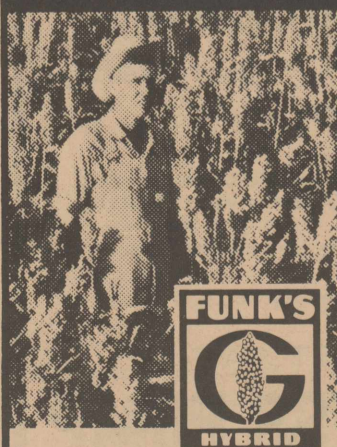

Hale County Soil Survey Set

A soil survey of Hale County has just been completed, except for one acre, according to F. F. Calhoun, Chairman of the Hale County Soil and Water Conservation District supervisors. Plans are being made to map the "final acre" during special ceremonies on April 4, 1968.

This survey is part of the National Cooperative Soil Survey. It was started in 1962. Soil Scientists of the Soil Conservation Service made the survey. Eventually a survey report will be published, including soil maps covering each acre of land in the county. The report will also include descriptions and other information about the soils in the county.

The program to celebrate the completion of the survey will begin at 5 p. m. It will be at the Hale County Agricultural Center located south of Plainview. Several prominent people will be involved in the program according to Calhoun. Among the visitors will be John C. White, Commissioner of Agriculture for the State of Texas. He will deliver the keynote

speech at the ceremony.

John C. White, 43, was elected Texas Commissioner of Agriculture in 1951. He has been successful in nine campaigns.

A 1946 graduate of Texas Tech, he has been nationally recognized for his work on agricultural legislation and farm problems.

He has served several times on the National Democratic Agriculture panel, promoting sound farm policies. On the state level, his work and recommendations for drought aid and an adequate water program have served as a pattern for legislative action.
