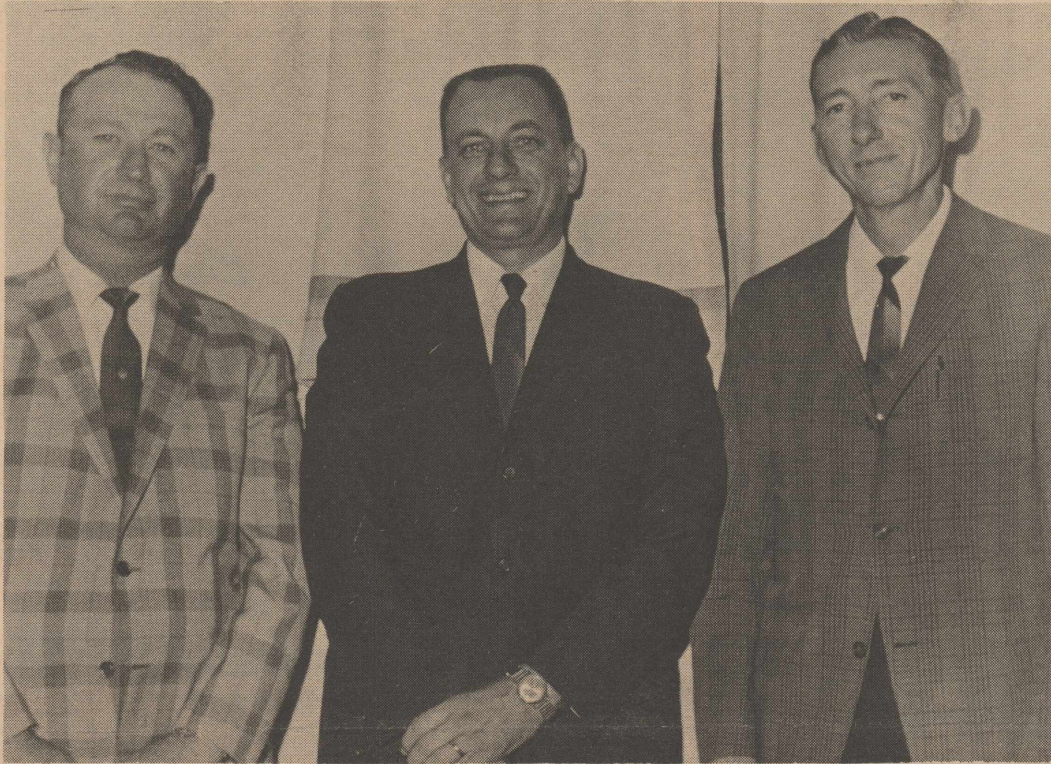

Turbulent Weather Causes Tornado Signal Reminder

Tornadoes in the area have been rather common for the past few weeks, especially east of Hart, near Edmonson.

With the season for tornadoes here, residents are reminded of the signals for alerting the townspeople that tornadoes are in the area.

Three short blasts alerts residents that the weather bureau has issued a warning that there might be tornadoes in the area, and to be on the watch.

One long continuous blast warns that a tornado is approaching Hart and to take cover.

Although hail and heavy rainfall missed most of the Hart area Sunday when other surrounding towns reported heavy rainfall and damaging hail, the Charles Martins who lived near Edmonson said that they received eight to ten inches of rain and that hail was four feet deep in bar ditches.

In a regular business meeting Monday night, Hart school board approved the proposed school calendar for the coming year, voted to participate in the PESO organization, accepted the resignation of one teacher and hired another.

The school calendar for the year adopted stated that opening day of school will be Sept. 3 with final exams being given May 21 and 22 and high school graduation set for May 23.

Holidays to be observed are

Thanksgiving, from Nov. 27 through Dec. 1; Christmas, from Dec. 20 to Jan. 2; Easter, April 3 through 7 and a one day holiday March 7 while teachers attend a Texas State Teachers Association District meeting.

Hart will participate in the PESO organization under the Title I program. Belonging to the organization, Panhandle Educational Service Organization, will entitle Hart schools to specialists in the reading field otherwise known as Title I.

In other action, the board accepted the resignation of Ronald Shaw, coach and science teacher in the high school and Mrs. Ted Averitt was named to serve as an elementary teacher, to be assigned to the grade in which she is most needed.

Moments Of Meditation

"What time I am afraid I will trust in the Lord," Psalms 56:3.

These are days of great fears. Some seem to be inwardly, others outwardly. There appears to be no end to fear-breeding experiences.

There are individual problems which brings fear to the heart. There is also family, national and world-wide situations which cause our "heart to faint" with fear. So, what shall we do?

First, try to see if the fear is real or imaginary. Of course, the end result is the same, whether the fear is real or imaginary. But many fears have no bases in reality. Did you ever worry about something that never did happen anyway.

Next, pray about your fears by naming them. If they are real or imaginary name them to the Lord and ask Him for guidance. Praying is not always saying words.

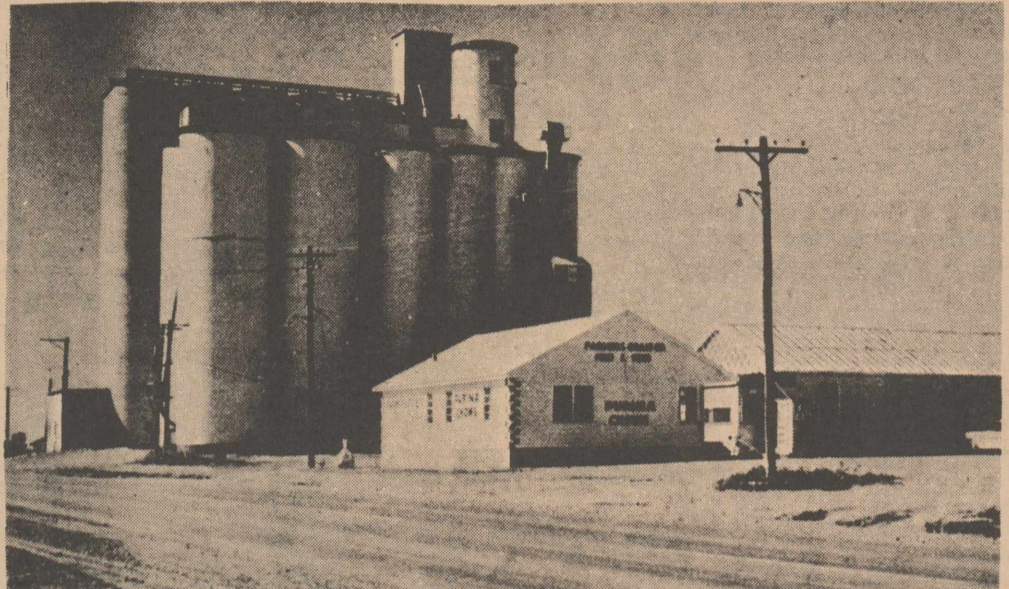

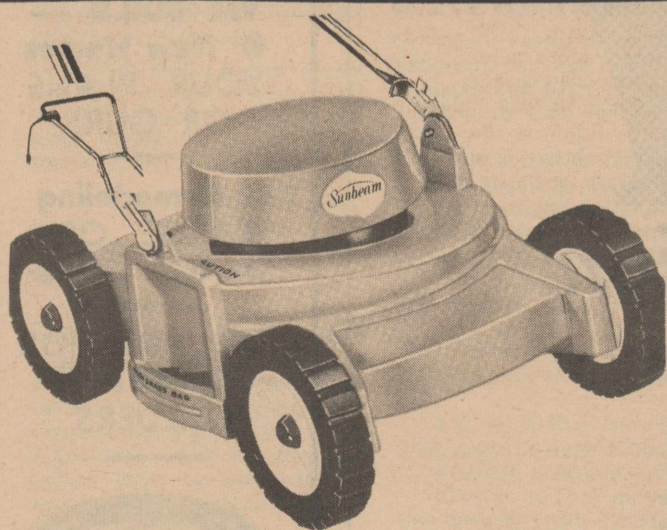

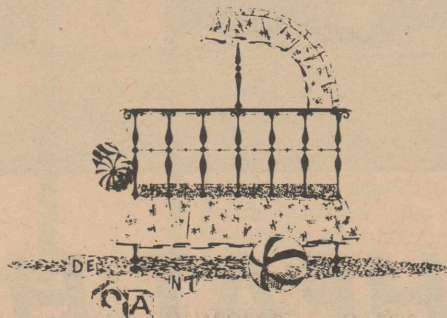
