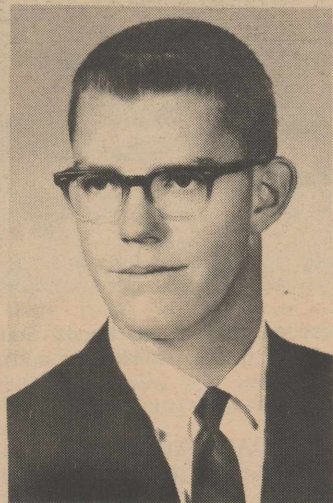

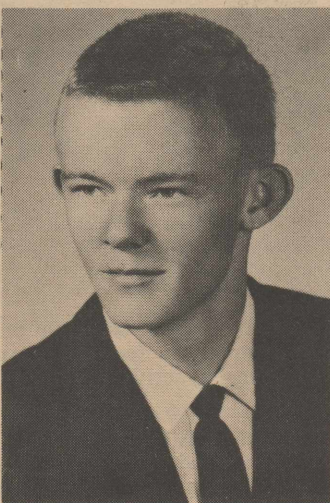
3 Hart FFA Boys Win Honors

Three young men, graduates of Hart High School and active in Future Farmers of America, received honor degrees at the State Convention last week in Lubbock's Municipal Auditorium.

David Smith, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Smith was selected as runner-up Star American Farmer.

Lone Star Farmer degrees were awarded to Roger Cleaver, son of Mr. and Mrs. Odell Cleaver, and David Harris, son of Mr. and Mrs. Duard Harris.

The American Farmer degree is the highest degree an FFA member can achieve. It is awarded on the basis of one per 1000 members.

Smith is the first member of the Hart FFA chapter to receive the coveted award. He will receive the degree at the National Future Farmer's Convention in Kansas City in October.

The American Farmer degree culminates a dream that began with the 1966 graduate's freshman year at Hart High School. An uncle had received the American Farmer degree and this became his nephew's goal.

Some of the more important honors that Smith received during his work as a Future Farmer were Star State Farmer of Plainview District, Area I, and Runner-up for Star State Farmer of Texas; member of the courtesy corps at the State FFA convention; and competing in State Judging contests.

Lanny Tucker, vocational agricultural instructor and Smith's advisor, remarks "We hope that other FFA boys will set their goal high and then achieve this goal. David knows that it can be done."

Cleaver and Harris, 1968 graduates, were among some 800 Future Farmers to receive the state's top award. Harris has engaged in an outstanding supervised farm-

ing program consisting primarily in breeding and show swine. He showed numerous winners at the major livestock shows. President of the Hart Chapter for 1967-68, he also served as chapter officer his sophomore and junior years.

The new Star Farmer plans to study agriculture at Texas Technological College.

Cleaver, too, has an outstanding swine breeding program. He exhibited the Grand Champion barrow at Amarillo and Hereford and the Champion Poland barrow at Houston this year.

He plans to attend Oklahoma State Technological College at Oklamulgee.

Tucker remarked, "We believe that David and Roger have set a fine example for all boys to follow. Both started with small feeding projects and invested their profits in breeding animals. Both purchased outstanding gilts that were used to start their present herds.

We feel they are typical of the FFA Creed that begins with 'I believe in the future of farming,' and 'that to live and work on a good farm is pleasant as well as challenging.'"

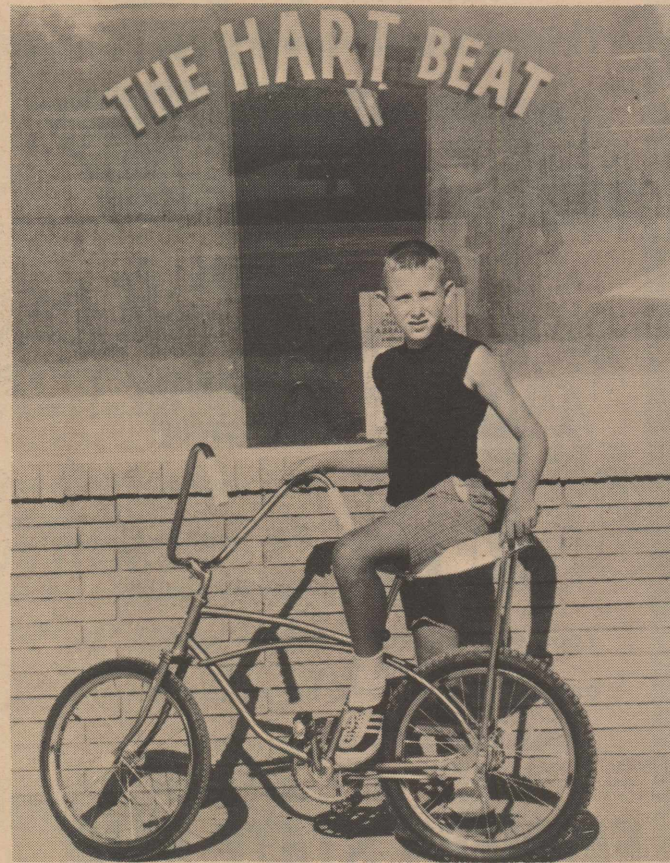
Superintendent Ted Averitt was appointed as official PESO representative and the date for the board of equalization meeting was set Aug. 7.

KITCHEN KORNER

Elsewhere in the paper you will see where they are hoping to start a TOPS Club here in Hart and will meet Friday evening and guess who will be there?

Well, I'm going to certainly try it and hope enough people come to make it an interesting club.

I'm going to have to calorie down some of the recipes I've been using to help all of us I think.

ENDIVE CROWN SALAD

It takes so little effort, but just see what a big effect

1 small head romaine
1 head Boston lettuce
2 stalks Belgian endive, quartered
8 radishes, trimmed and sliced
Piquant French Dressing (recipe follows)

1. Break romaine and Boston lettuce into bite-size pieces in a large salad bowl.
2. Stand endive quarters in greens to form a circle; layer radish slices in center.
3. Serve with Piquant French Dressing to drizzle over.

PIQUANT FRENCH DRESSING

Combine 3/4 cup salad oil, 1/4 cup wine vinegar or cider vinegar, 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard, 1/2 teaspoon sugar, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce, and a dash of garlic powder in a jar with a tight-fitting lid. Shake well to mix. Makes 1 cup.

SUN-GOLD EGG MOLD

Hard-cooked egg slices in shimmering gelatin top zippy egg salad for this luncheon treat.

1 env. unflavored gelatin
1/4 c. water
1 can (14 oz.) chicken broth
1 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
2 pimientos (from a 4-oz. can)
5 hard-cooked eggs, shelled
1/2 c. diced celery
1 tsp. grated onion
3/4 c. mayonnaise or salad dressing
2 T. lemon juice
1 tsp. salt

1. Soften gelatin in water in a small saucepan; heat over low heat, stirring constantly, just until gelatin dissolves. Stir in chicken broth and Worcestershire sauce. Chill 50 minutes, or until as thick as unbeaten egg white.

2. Cut 6 one-inch-long strips of pimiento; arrange, petal fashion, in the bottom of a 4-cup mold. Chop remaining pimiento; set aside for Step 4.
3. Spoon 1 cup of the thickened gelatin over pimiento in mold. Slice 2 of the hard-cooked eggs lengthwise; press 6 of the prettiest slices into gelatin around side of mold. Chill again until sticky-firm.

4. While gelatin chills, chop remaining whole eggs and slices; place in a medium-size bowl with chopped pimiento, celery, onion, mayonnaise or salad dressing, lemon juice, and salt. Mix well, then fold in remaining thickened gelatin.
5. Spoon over sticky-firm layer in mold. Chill until firm.

6. Unmold onto a serving plate. Frame with cucumber slices, if you wish.

Harold Bob Bennett To Attend Seminar

Harold Bob Bennett, son of Mr. and Mrs. George Bennett is one of three high school students from this county who will attend the sixth annual Texas Farm Bureau Citizenship Seminar July 30-Aug. 3 on the Campus of Baylor University in Waco, according to Rayphard Smithson of Dimmitt, president of the Castro County Farm Bureau.

Other students are Angela Conrad, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Leonard J. Conrad, Nazareth High School, and Durward Strickland, Jr., son of Mr. and Mrs. D. H. Strickland, Dimmitt High School.

The annual training school for high school junior and senior students is an intensive course in citizenship, our American heritage and the proper role of government, according to Smithson.

"It is designed to complement the formal education of these young folks and make their roles as citizens more meaningful," the local farm leader said.

The county Farm Bureau sponsors the local students by paying their tuition, room and board and transportation to and from Waco. Travel is by chartered bus. A total of 425 students from 156 counties are enrolled for this year's seminar.

Four nationally-known lecturers will address the 1968 school. They are: Dr. Clifton L. Ganus, president of Harding College, Searcy, Ark.; Dr. C. L. Kay, president of Lubbock Christian College; John Noble, author of "I Was a Slave in Russia"; and W. Cleon Skousen, author, lawyer, and former FBI agent.

Persecution of Christians Matthew 16: 24-25, Hebrews 11:32-40

Recently, Charles Foley, of the London news service, revealed details of secret traffic of refugees coming from Communist controlled nations to free nations. Among them was the Rev. Richard Wurmbrand who was purchased from communist remains by the International Christian Hebrew Alliance for \$7,000.00. He was arrested 14 years ago because of his Anti-Fascist views and remained these years in Communist prisons. Two and one-half of those years he was held in solitary confinement in a cell 35 feet underground, with a tube of air. His own Church in Bucharest has been made into a movie theater. Upon being released he asked, "Why is there so little published in the West of the many Communist reports of Christians jailed for baptizing, for taking Sunday School Classes, for insisting on Christian burial, for protesting when their children were taken from them to be indoctrinated with Atheism. This is just one example of the thousands of Christians that suffer around the world.

Jesus foretold that the Jews would suffer greatly and be

scattered around the world, just as they were. He further prophesied that the Jews would be hated world-over. This has also become a fact of history. Some of the persecution of the Early Church is described in Hebrews 11:32-40.

We again see Christianity undergoing grave persecution. Recently six missionaries to Viet Nam were killed by the Communists, Cuba, and other like nations also persecute the cause of Christ. Even in the so-called free nations there is persecution of Christianity by many educators, Atheists and fun-making speakers, etc.

How should Christians prepare for this persecution? First, by having an "Active Faith" (Note: Who Thru Faith" Heb. 11:33) Second, by recognizing our weakness ("out of weakness were made strong".. Heb. 11:34) Next by being filled with the Spirit (Eph. 5:18) Note the life of John the Baptist, who was spirit-filled (Luke 1:15)

The giving of the Holy Spirit to the followers of Christ was to help withstand the powers of Satan and his cohorts. Failure to have the presence of the Holy Spirit leaves the Christian weak and helpless. See the story of Samson when he stood and shook himself and wist not that the Spirit had departed."
