## World War II Veterans Meet For Annual Reunion In Kansas

Members of Battery C of the 166th Gun Battalion who served together for 40 months during World War II convened in Wichita, Kans. Aug. 1 and 2 for a two-day reunion. The 23rd annual reunion was held in the Ramada Inn East.

The company spent 27 and one-half months in the South Pacific theater of war and served in Australia, New Guinea and the Philippines.

The group was preparing to move to Japan when the war ended.

Twenty-five members of the battalion attended the reunion. Families were guests at a luncheon on Sunday in the Air Capitol Room of the Ramada Inn. There were 68 present for the luncheon.

Sessions were presided over by Gerald Fager of Derby, Kans. and Richard Knebler of Wichita, Kans. Members voted to meet again in Wichita for the 1969 reunion. Wichita is the most centrally located site.

the Saturday meeting with a dance in the Moose Lodge climaxing the day.

The Hart Beat was informed Wednesday that controlling interest in Citizens State Bank in Earth has been purchased by three Hart men, Norlan Dudley, W. A. Hawkins Sr. and W. A. Hawkins Jr.

Details were not available at press time.

The approaching election of ASC community committees for farm program administration in Castro County was announced today by Jim Elder, Chairman, Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation County Committee. He called attention to the fact that the community committee elections this year are being held during the third week of September in all agricultural communities throughout the Nation in an effort to increase the awareness of this important farm-program function on eligible voters.

The farmer-committee system is a unique means of administering national agricultural programs and policies. The community committees assist the ASC county committee in administering the price support, acreage diversion, agricultural conservation, and other farm-action programs in the county; they are particularly responsible for keeping their neighbors informed about the programs. The county committee supervises the ASCS county office and is responsible for the local administration of the various programs.

Voting will be by mail, the Chairman explained, and ballots are being sent to each known eligible voter. In case eligible voters fail to receive a ballot

through the mail, one may be picked up at the ASCS office. Generally, a farm owner, tenant, or sharecropper is eligible to vote if he is eligible to take part in one or more of the programs administered by the ASC committees. Eligibility to vote or to hold office as a committeeman is not restricted by reason of sex, race, color, religion, or national origin.

Envelopes containing marked ballots may be mailed or returned to the ASCS County Office anytime before Sept. 18. Ballots will be tabulated publicly by the county committee on Sept. 23, at 9 a. m., in the ASCS Office. The public is invited to witness the vote counting.

Nominees for "E" Community, Castro County are: Sam Albracht, Geo. Edd Bennett, Paul Brooks, John Gilbreath, Milburn Haydon, and Ray Joe Riley.

For each committee, three regular members and two alternates will be elected. The chairman, vice chairman, and third regular member of the elected ASC community committee will also serve as delegates to the county convention to be held within the next few weeks. The alternate committeemen are alternate delegates to the con-

## Veterinary Medical Association Reports Encephalomyelitis Cases

The Texas Veterinary Medical Association, citing findings by a veterinarian in West Texas, reports that equine (horse) encephalomyelitis has been discovered. The cases were reported in West Texas near Seminole by Dr. A. J. Mabry, a large animal practitioner in that area.

The disease, sometimes called sleeping sickness and Blind Staggers, is a virus perpetuated by small birds that carry a high concentration of the virus in their blood. The culex mosquito transmits the disease from the birds to horses and can also transmit it to man. Horses do not transmit the dis-

ease the Veterinary Medical Association says.

Encephalomyelitis is often fatal and may cause permanent brain damage to surviving animals. The T.V.M.A. said horse owners should vaccinate their animals and take mosquito control measures. August and September are especially critical months for the disease in all of Texas since high mosquito population are found during these months. Vaccination of horses now and immediate mosquito control measures will help keep the disease from reaching epidemic proportions as was the case in 1967, the Veterinary Medical Association said.

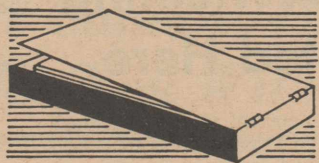
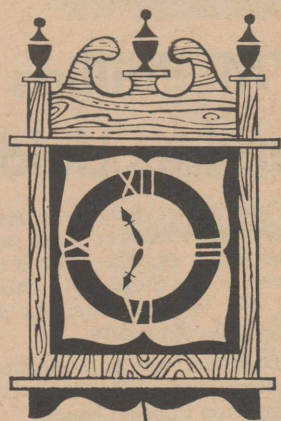

## KITCHEN KORNER

Every once in awhile we all like to fix an especially fancy dessert for our families or for company and here is one that while lengthy is not as complicated as it seems once you read it over. This isn't recommended for my friends in the TOPS club.

### FOUR SEASONS FANCY CAKE

Bavarian Cream, below

Chocolate Coating  
2 pkg. (6-oz. size) semisweet chocolate pieces

1/4 c. butter or margarine  
1/4 c. light corn syrup

Orange Chiffon Layer, below

1/2 c. heavy cream, whipped

1. Day ahead, make Bavarian Cream and Chocolate coating.

2. To make Chocolate Coating: Cut 5 pieces of waxed paper 8 by 7 inches; then cut one sheet 17 by 5 inches. Set aside.

3. In top of double boiler, combine chocolate with butter

and corn syrup. Cook over hot water, covered and stirring occasionally, until melted and smooth. Remove from heat; keep top in place over hot water.

4. Spread 1/3 cup chocolate coating evening on 17-by-5-inch waxed-paper sheet. On 8-by-7-inch sheets, spread remaining chocolate coating evenly. Refrigerate until firm-overnight or until ready to assemble cake.

5. Next day: Make Orange Chiffon Layer. Cool completely. Place on serving plate; spread top only with the whipped cream. Invert Bavarian Cream over cake; remove bowl, and peel off plastic film.

6. Remove the 8-by-7-inch chocolate-coated sheets from refrigerator; let stand at room temperature 3 minutes, or just until chocolate will peel easily from waxed paper.

7. Place chocolate side of one sheet, long side up and down, against side of Bavarian and cake; using a knife, loosen paper from chocolate at top, and peel off. Press chocolate against side, and quickly make a fold at top by sliding finger or handle of wooden spoon under chocolate and loosely pinching together to make fold. Repeat with remaining 4 sheets, overlapping them. Refrigerate.

8. To make topknot: Remove long chocolate strip from refrigerator; let stand about 5 minutes. With chocolate facing you, quickly bring long edges together, to make a 2 1/2-inch-wide strip; then peel off paper. Roll chocolate loosely into spiral about 4 inches in diameter. Set on top of cake; with fingers, push in and pull out chocolate to make top. Refrigerate.

9. For ease in slicing, let cake stand at room temperature about 20 minutes before serving. To serve, slice in wedges, without disturbing the topknot. Makes 16 servings.

### BAVARIAN CREAM

3 env. unflavored gelatine  
3 3/4 c. milk  
6 eggs, separated  
1/4 tsp. salt  
1 1/4 c. sugar  
1/4 c. dark rum  
1 c. heavy cream, whipped  
3/4 c. crushed almond macaroons or vanilla wafers  
1/3 c. finely chopped walnuts or pecans

1. Sprinkle gelatine over 1 cup milk; let soften.

2. Heat remaining milk in top of double boiler, over direct heat, until tiny bubbles appear around edge.

3. In medium bowl, beat egg yolks with salt and 1/2 cup sugar just until well blended. Add softened gelatine. Gradually add hot milk, stirring rapidly.

4. Return mixture to top of double boiler; place over simmering water; cook, stirring constantly, until mixture coats a metal spoon-about 15 minutes. Remove from heat; cool slightly. Add rum.

5. Refrigerate, covered, until mixture is thicker than unbeaten egg white, or until it mounds slightly when lifted with a spoon-about 3 hours. Or hasten chilling by placing pan over ice water; stir occasionally - takes about 30 minutes.

6. Meanwhile, line a 2 1/2-quart bowl with plastic film or foil; set aside.

7. In large bowl of electric

mixer, beat egg whites until they form soft peaks when beater is slowly raised. Gradually beat in remaining 3/4 cup sugar; continue beating until stiff peaks form when beater is slowly raised.

8. Add whipped cream and chilled gelatine mixture; beat, at low speed, just until combined-about 1 minute. Turn into prepared bowl.

9. In small bowl, combine macaroon crumbs and nuts; mix well. Sprinkle over mixture in bowl; press gently. Refrigerate until firm and ready to assemble Four Seasons Fancy Cake.

### ORANGE CHIFFON LAYER

1/2 c. egg whites (3 or 4)  
1 c. plus 2 T. sifted cake flour  
3/4 c. sugar  
1 1/2 tsp. baking powder  
1/2 tsp. salt  
1/4 c. salad oil  
2 egg yolks  
1/4 c. plus 2 T. orange juice  
1 1/2 T. grated orange peel  
1/4 tsp. cream of tartar

1. In large bowl of electric mixer, let egg whites warm to room temperature-about 1 hour. Meanwhile, preheat oven to 350 F.

2. Sift flour with sugar, baking powder, and salt into another large bowl; make well in center. Add, in order, oil, egg yolks, orange juice, and orange peel; beat, with spoon, until smooth.

3. With electric mixer at high speed, beat egg whites with cream of tartar until very stiff peaks form.

4. With wire whisk or rubber scraper, using under-and-over motion, gradually fold orange batter gently into egg whites just until blended. Do not stir.

5. Pour into ungreased 9-by-1 1/2-inch round layer-cake pan; bake 30 to 35 minutes, or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean.

6. Invert cake by hanging pan between 2 other pans; let cool completely-about 1 hour.

7. With spatula, carefully loosen cake from pan; hit pan sharply on table; remove cake. Wrap loosely in foil, or store in cake box, until ready to assemble Four Seasons Cake.
