Rural Accidents Total Fifteen

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated 15 accidents on rural highways in Castro County during the month of October, according to Sergeant W. E. Wells, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed, eleven persons injured and an estimated property damage of \$14,745.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first ten months of 1968 shows a total of 80 accidents resulting in five persons killed, 48 persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$58,575.00.

November and December are noted to be dangerous months in traffic and especially for pedestrians. Much is heard about the drinking driver and his responsibility for many serious accidents. Seldom is it known that many pedestrians have met their death on the streets and highways because they had been drinking to the extent that they were unaware of the danger they faced as they staggered along the road.

The sergeant stated the familiar saying, "If you drink, don't drive," might be changed to apply to the drinking pedestrian, "If you drink, don't walk--in traffic!"

Gun Registration Requirements Given By Commissioner White

Detailed procedures for registering machine gun, sawed-off shotgun, sawed-off rifle, silencer, deactivated war trophy and other destructive devices were announced today by B. Frank White, Regional Commissioner of Internal Revenue for the Southwest Region.

The Gun Control Act of 1968 requires that weapons and devices of this type must be registered with the Internal Revenue Service by Dec. 1.

White said that copies of Registration Form 4467 are available at Alcohol and Tobacco Tax and other IRS offices.

The forms are prepared in three copies, two of which should be mailed to the Director, Alcohol and Tobacco Tax Division, Internal Revenue Service, Washington, D. C. 20024. The third copy may be kept

Deryl Clevenger, Hart farmer, was named "Outstanding AGC Aggie of the Year 1968" at a reunion banquet Saturday night in Abilene.

The fourth recipient of the award given to an outstanding agriculture alumnus graduated from Abilene Christian College in 1951.

Following graduation he worked on the farm of J. W.

Cox of Tulia for four years. After renting land for the next eight years, he purchased 300 acres of land. He has added an additional quarter section of leased land to his irrigated grain and cotton operation.

Clevenger is serving his eighth year as Scoutmaster and has received several scouting honors including a National Council Scholarship.

An active member of PTA he has served in various capacities on the local and district level and has been awarded a life membership in Texas PTA.

Clevenger has taught a Bible class for a number of years. He is an elder and leads singing in his church. He and his wife, Joan, have three children, Iona, 17; Dee Ann, 15 and Duane, 13.

Nazareth Farmer Enters DeKalb 200 Bushel Club

C. C. Hanes of Nazareth with an outstanding yield of 183 bushels of corn per acre, has been entered in the 1968 DeKalb 200 Bushel Club.

Hanes' yield came from a field of DeKalb XL-45. His entry was mechanically harvested and verified by an impartial third party.

To attain his excellent yield, Hanes used such progressive management practices as early and thick planting, good weed and insect control, heavy fer-

tilization and high population hybrids.

He planted in 30 inch rows at a seeding rate of 34,000

plants per acre. His estimated harvest stand was 30,000 plants.

Hanes' fertilizer application included 253 pounds of nitrogen, 72 pounds of phosphate and 25 pounds of potassium. Weeds were controlled with Atrazine and two cultivations.

The DeKalb 200 Bushel Club

was begun in 1961. Its purpose is to promote friendly competition as well as discussion and idea exchange among the nation's leading corn farmers. The program attempts to encourage practices which will help farmers gain the maximum amount of net profit from each acre of corn.

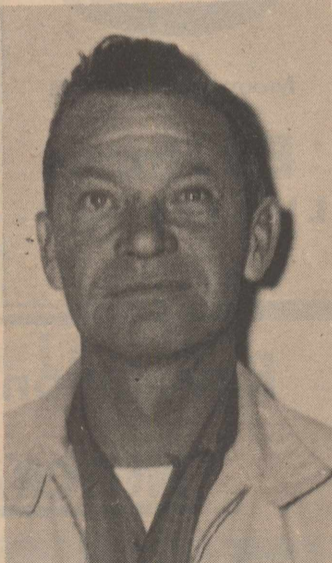
Manager Named To Hart Big 'N'

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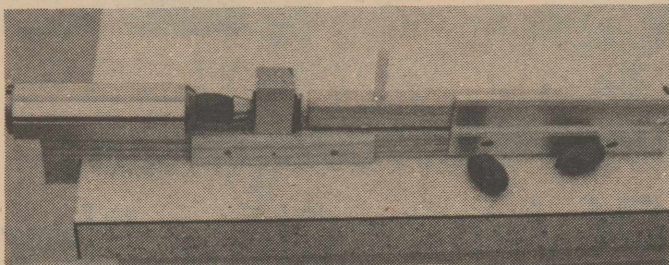


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Chapter Mothers Named Wednesday

GREEN RICE

cook two cups raw rice until dry.
1 c. chopped green pepper
1 c. chopped green parsley or dry if the green is not available
2 pods of garlic or 1 tsp. powdered garlic
1 c. grated sharp cheese
1 1/2 c. cream or half and half
1/2 cup salad oil

Mix all ingredients and bake one hour at 350 degrees.

SPAGHETTI CASEROLE

Cook 1 lb. spaghetti until tender, set aside.

Grind three green peppers and two medium sized onions in food chopper. Saute in 1/2 cup butter. Add 1 medium size

can tomatoes and salt to taste. Simmer slowly for 40 minutes. Put half of Spaghetti in baking dish, cover with 1/2 can ripe olives which have been chopped, 1/2 can mushrooms cut in small pieces, add half of simmered mixture, repeat with another layer of spaghetti and remaining ingredients. Pour over this casserole the following sauce.

2 T. flour
3 T. butter
1 c. cream
1 c. milk to which 3/4 cup grated cheese has been added.

Bake in 350 degree oven until brown and crusty. Serves 10 to 12. This is good served with garlic bread and a tossed green salad for a complete meal.

Financial Facts

There are only three present day currency classifications not in the process of retirement. They are: The Federal Reserve notes, the United States notes, and gold certificates.

The Federal Reserve notes are issued by the Federal Reserve Bank. One fourth of these are backed by gold certificates. The balance, of course, represent a direct United States government obligation. As with all circulating American currency, these notes are not redeemable in gold.

United States notes are known as "greenbacks" and are backed by 157 million dollars in gold reserve.

The gold certificates are issued by the Treasury, paid only to the Federal Reserve Banks but are not in circulation. They are secured by face value gold.

Just for the fun of it, examine the currency in your wallet!

The Hart Longhorns fell to undefeated Lazbuddie here Friday night 26 to 6 after playing their best game so far this season.

Both teams scored once in the first half and Lazbuddie led at half-time 8 to 6. The game could have went either way until the four minute mark in the fourth quarter.

At this point the opposing Longhorns received some disheartening breaks as far as Hart fans were concerned. They tallied three TD's in the final four minutes which swung the district championship in their lap.

Lazbuddie only has one more district game and even if they are beaten and the Longhorns win the rest of their games, they will still represent this district in the playoffs.

The Hart Horns kicked off to start the game which was fought to the finish.

Lazbuddie returned the ball to the 46 yard line where they started a drive for the first TD of the night.

Foster and Kinkson did most of the ground work for Lazbuddie. The drive consisted of two pass completions from Steinbock to Foster which were good for 21 yards.

The drive ended as Foster crossed the goal line from five yards out. Hinkson ran for the extras and left the score standing 8-0.

Both teams battled back and forth while the clock was slowly ticking the time away. This continued until the beginning of the second quarter.

Quincy Hawkins booted a long punt which was downed on Lazbuddie's own three yard line.

This was a big contributing factor to Hart's only score because three plays later Lazbuddie had only moved five yards and were forced to punt.

The strong rush put on by the Hart defense caused a short punt and Hart took over on

Lazbuddie's 31 yard line.

In three plays the Horns had only gained four yards.

Then came the big play as Rambo passed to Barham for the TD. The play covered 27 yards. Jimmy Robinson ran for the extras but was stopped short. This 8 to 6 mark was the final score of the hard fought first-half.

The entire third quarter seemed to be a repetition of the first half. Both teams drilled at each other hoping for an opening but both defensive squads were solid as the ball changed hands several times.

This grueling pace continued with everyone on edge hoping something would break loose.

It did.

Hart was caught deep in their own territory facing a fourth down situation with a little over four minutes left in the game.

Hawkins attempted to punt but a bad snap from center changed his decision as he ran hoping for enough yardage for a first. He was stopped a yard short and Lazbuddie took over on Hart's 32 yard line.

Quarterback Steinbock was on his toes three plays later as he rolled around left end and entered the end zone from 17 yards out.

Foster tried for the extra two but was met by a crew of Horns. Lazbuddie led 14 to 6 with only a few minutes left in the game.

The only way the Hart Horns had a chance to get back in the game was score and get both extra points. All hopes faded away with just a little over two minutes showing on the clock.

Frank Hinkson intercepted a pass from Gary Rambo on the 40 yard line and made his way across the goal line to give Lazbuddie the first safe margin of the scoreboard since the start of the game. Their try for extras failed and left the score 20 to 6.

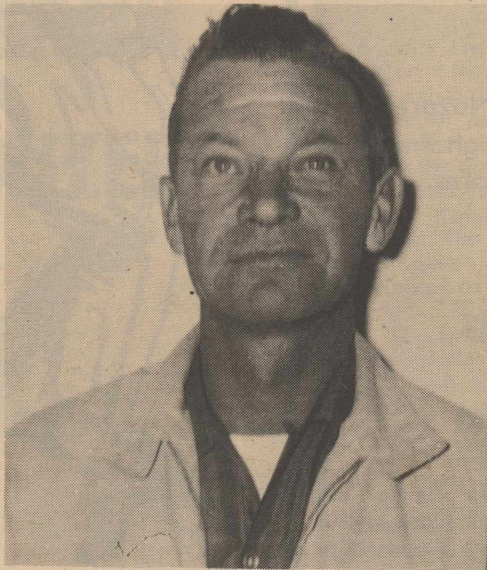

COTTON GIN RIDER DUMPED-- A controversial appropriations bill rider twice vetoed by Gov. John Connally was stricken from a budget draft on motion of Lt. Gov.-elect Ben Barnes.

Barnes got some opposition from House Speaker-designate Rep. Gus Mutscher of Brenham and Rep. W. S. Heatly of Paducah, but Gov.-elect Preston Smith held his motion carried on voice vote.

Rider sought to keep funds from being spent to police air pollution by cotton gins. Mutscher said the problem is insignificant and is used by politicians to "demagogue." Connally has maintained that the problem caused by gins is major. Barnes argued that the rider is unneeded and is simply a "political factor."

THE ABUNDANT LIFE

"I am come that they might have life, and that they might have it more abundantly." John 10:10

Are you getting all out of life that you want or can? Do you have abundance of life? If not you can. There are three things we can look at concerning this abundant life.

It is a life with a new dedication. That is, where do we place our affections? What or who is first in our lives? To what have we dedicated our lives? This new life means that God is at the center of our lives. It means that we have

changed our affections. It means that the things we once hated, we now love; and the things we once loved we now hate.

It is also a life with a new direction. We are now going in the opposite direction. We have made an about-face. We were once moving away from God and life, but now that we have the abundant life we are moving toward God and life. The thoughts of our mind is in a new way, a new direction. In the language of God's Word "We are passing from the realm of the dead ones into the land of the living ones."

It is a life with a new dynamic. That is, a new power. A power to change the habits

that need change, and power to make new ones that need to be made. Many lack a spiritual power in their lives. Their concept of religion is so weak that they have no spiritual drive. They have enough religion to know what they are doing is wrong; but not enough power to stop it. This new abundant life that God offers gives that needed power.

It does not come by just positive thinking, or by reading good books, or even just reading the Bible, as good as these exercises are. This power comes when we link or connect our lives, hand and heart, with God's power. It is His power flowing in and through us. The electric appliance may be in "A-1" shape, but it is useless unless it is plugged into the current. So our lives must be in contact with God if there is to be any real living.

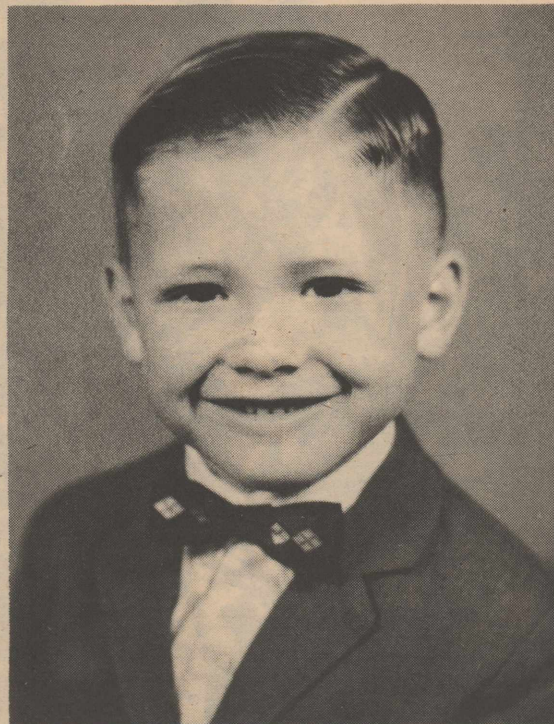
