

High School Senior Girls To Take Homemaking Test

girls will take a unique test Dec. 3 -- one on homemaking the only one of its type ex-clusively designed for girls at that educational level.

This written knowledge and attitude test on all facets of will be given homemaking simultaneously that day to more than half a million girls representing some 15,000 high schools in the nation.

Scholarships to colleges of their choice will be awarded to both state and national winners. The highest ranking girl in each state will receive a \$1,500 scholarship and a chance to win one of four national scholarships. These range from \$5,-000 for the girl chosen Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow, to \$4,000, \$3,000, and \$2,000 respectively for second, third and fourth place winners.

Runners-up in each state will receive \$500 grants with the first ranked girl in each school receiving a specially designed silver charm from General Mills, Inc., which inaugurated the Betty Crocker Search in 1954-55 and has sponsored it every year since then.

Climax of this national homemaking test will be an expense paid tour next spring of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D. C., for each state winner and her school advisor. Winners of the national scholarships will be selected and announced at a dinner in Williamsburg upon conclusion of the tour.

IRS Cautions **Against Errors**

The Commissioner of Internal Revenue gives these statistics on mathematical verification of individual tax returns in his Annual Report Summary for the Fiscal Year 1967:

-65.4 million returns were mathematically verified; - 3.9 million returns required correction; - 2.4 million were taxpayer errors that caused the taxpayer to underpay his tax. IRS collected \$207.5 additional millions from these folks. However. - 1.5 million made errors in favor of the government, and Internal Revenue refunded \$94.3 million to these taxpayers who had cheated themselves out of almost \$100 million through their own bad arithmetic.

This may not prove that most taxpayers would flunk grammar school arithmetic, but it seems to prove Internal Revenue's repeated warning: "Check it again -- carefully -- before you mail it." That dollar you save will be YOUR OWN.



A & M Specialist **Lists Good Buys**

New crop citrus fruits, many from the Texas valley area, are adding holiday spirit to local markets, reports Gwendolyne Clyatt, Extension consumer marketing specialist.

Grapefruit supplies are increasing and price is decreasing. Oranges, tangerines and tangeloes are on the market.

Green-skinned Fuerte avocados are beginning to come in with more reasonable prices, according to Mrs. Clyatt, a specialist with Texas A&M University. Since the new crop is large, avocados should be plentiful this season.

Due to limited supplies, apples are not inexpensive but occasional bargains are in sacks of smaller apples. Most of these are the right size for eating out of hand and are as flavorful as the large fruit.

Mrs. Clyatt reports best vegetable buys in carrots, celery, cabbage, cauliflower, turnips, rutabagas, broccoli, sweet potatoes and dry onions.

Beef supplies are ample, but she expects no price changes in the near future. Chuck and rib roasts are currently featured. Figured on a cost per serving basis, boneless roasts often cost no more than the bone-in roasts and are easier

Turkey prices are up a bit as demand increases. Fryers are featured in many markets as good protein choice.

Egg prices are on the upward trend again as holiday baking and extra cooking gets underway, however, good values in large size grade A eggs are available, Mrs. Clyatt says.

KITCHEN KORNER

So many of you will be making your fruit cakes soon and getting them ready for the Christmas holidays, so I will include a few hints on fruit

I also have a very good walnut cake recipe you might enjoy.

My family likes it made with black walnuts and it can be made into a three layer cake with a three minute icing for a very good cake for those who do not care for fruit cake.

HINTS ON FRUIT CAKES

A fruit cake is a rich spicy mixture, containing large amounts of fruits and nuts in cake batter. The real old fashioned fruit cake was largely a fruit pudding, very rich and dark but the trend in past years is to have more cake with the addition of fruits and nuts. For white fruit cake, use only light fruits and spices so the color will remain light and creamy. The top of a fruit cake is often decorated with cherries, citron, or other fruits and blanched almonds and nuts. An apricot glaze may be used to hold the decorations in place.

APRICOT GLAZE

1/4 lb. dried apricots 11/2 c. cold water 1 c. light corn syrup

Wash apricots. Cover with water and let soak overnight or for several hours. Using the same water, cook 15 to 20 minutes or until tender. Drain, rub half of apricots through a fine sieve. Measure puree and juice- should be 1/2 cup. Add l cup light corn syrup and boil rapidly for 2 to 3 minutes or until mixture is clear. Remove from heat and use immediately; use pastry brush to apply it to cake. Decorations may be applied after the first glazing. Then apply to top glaze over the decorations after the first coat has set. The glaze should be reheated to boiling each time it is used. Allow glaze to dry thoroughly before storing.

WALNUT CAKE RING

3 3/4 c. sifted cake flour 4 tsp. baking powder 1 1/2 tsp. salt 1/2 c. soft butter 1/2 c. shortening 2 tsp. vanilla 1 1/4 c. milk (room temp.) 6 egg whites (3/4 c.) 1 1/2 c. walnuts, finely chopped

Sift together flour, sugar, baking powder and salt.

Blend together butter, shortening and vanilla. Add dry ingredients and I cup milk. Blend together at low speed on mixer, then beat 2 minutes with mixer or 300 strokes by hand.

Blend in remaining milk and whites. Beat 2 minutes. Fold in nuts. Pour into greased and floured 3 quart ring mold.

Bake in moderate oven (350) 35 to 40 minutes or until it tests done. Cool 5 minutes; turn out on rack. Frost, bottom side up, with Creamy White Frost-

CREAMY WHITE FROSTING

3 1/2 c. confectioners sugar 1/2 c. soft butter or margarine 4 to 6 T. milk 1/8 tsp. salt 1 tsp. vanilla

Combine sugar, butter, 4 tablespoons milk, salt and vanilla in mixing bowl. Blend, then beat until smooth.

Add milk as needed for good spreading consistency. Spread over top and sides of cake.

Hart Longhorns Win Over Turkey

A happy bunch of Longhorns
Friday night took care of Turother Turkey fumble on their key's Homecoming by slamming them 40 to 14.

This was the final High School football game to be played by six Hart serniors. Each of the seniors; Ronnie Barham, Gary Rambo, Jimmy Allens-worth, Joe Quiroz, Richard Murry and Charles Bass all played a big role in ending the Hart season 5-5.

The game began as Joe Quiroz returned the Turkey kickoff to the 23 yard line.

Smith followed on the next two plays by gaining a couple, but all was lost as Jimmy Robinson fumbled and Turkey took over on the Hart 25.

Davis, Barnhill and Claud Robinson moved well against Hart and in five plays the ball was moved down to the 11.

At this point Dan Davis broke loose and crossed the goal line. The point after was no good but Turkey had an early 6-0 lead.

Joe Quiroz returned Tur-key's second kick-off to begin a determined Longhorn drive to equalize the scoreboard.

Jimmy Robinson carried the ball four times straight to place the ball on the Turkey 37 yard

Then Pancho Diaz entered the end zone after catching a perfect pass thrown by Gary Rambo. Allensworth kicked the conversion to edge the Horns out front 7 to 6. The rest of the first quarter went scoreless.

Hart's next score came during the early minutes of the second quarter as Jimmy Allensworth recovered a Turkey fumble for the second time of the

The Horns took over on their own 47 yard line. On the first play from scrimmage Joe Quiroz breezed down the field to tally a 53 yard TD.

An incomplete pass broke up the extras but the Horns moved ahead 13 to 6.

After Luis Longoria returned a Turkey punt to the 50, Rambo passed to Barham for 19 yards to set up the next TD.

The drive was closed in the final minute of the first half as Quiroz ran 18 yards for his second big touchdown.

Allensworth toed the ball through the uprights to give the Horns a 20 to 6 halftime lead.

As the second half got underway things looked good for Hart fans as Quincy Hawkins intercepted a Barnhill pass and romped 40 yards to reach the goal line.

As usual Allensworth's kick was true and the Horns took a 27 to 6 lead.

A 17 yard pass from Rambo to Hawkins and several runs by Robinson and Rambo moved the ball to the 10 yard line. Joe Quiroz broke loose for his third TD and Allensworth followed with another good kick to raise the score 34 to 6.

Early in the fourth quarter Turkey came up with a successful combination as Barnhill passed to Davis for a TD which covered 58 yards. Williams ran the extras to raise Turkey's score to 14.

The Horns made their final effort late in the fourth quarter as Luis Longoria ran 32 yards to reach pay dirt. The extra try failed and left the final score of the night 40 to 14 for the Horns.

Q - Is a gift of food or clothing to a charity deductible? I gave some things to some Boy Scouts when they came through our neighborhood collecting for a local church.

A- Yes, gifts of food, cloth-ing and other property to a charitable group are considered a contribution which may be deducted. The amount of the deduction would be the fair market value of the property donated.

Q - I'm working a fewhours a night in a local department store. Is there any way I can stop them from taking Social Security tax out of my pay since my regular job gives me

since my regular job gives me full coverage?

A- No. Each employer is required to withhold Social Security taxes on the first \$7,800 of income paid each employee during 1968.

If more than \$343.20 is withheld from your wages for Social Security in 1968 because you worked for two or more employees.

worked for two or more employers, the excess should be taken as a tax credit on your 1968 income tax return.

There are one hundred and two in the little company when the Mayflower casts anchor off Cape Cod. Now you are faced with a bleak coast, with no shelter of any sort against the is used to build a community

Nearly half of the company perish during the winter. There is a lack of food and shelter. It is a hard winter.

You work hard to clear the land, during the spring. Make friends with the Indians who teach you how to plant corn and to use fish for fertilizing the soil. You also plant barley and peas, and find an abundance of wild fruits and berries.

So as winter comes on again are in better circumyou stances. A plenteous harvest has been gathered in; you have built more substantial houses; so you face this winter with lighter hearts. As you think on these things, a spirit of grat-itude fills your hearts. You resolve to prepare a great feast of "Thanksgiving", and invite to it your Indian friends who had helped to make all this pos-

An account of the occasion may be still read in a letter by Edward Winslow, one of the company and later its Governor, dated December 11, 1621. He wrote to a friend in England as follows:

"Our harvest being gotten of fowling, that so we might frey.

"And the feast of harvest, after a special manner, rejoice together after we had gathered the fruits of our labors. The four in one day killed as many fowl as, with a little help beside, served the company almost a week, at which time, amongst other recreations, we exercised our arms, many of the Indians coming amongst us, and among the rest their greatest king, Massasoit, with some ninety men, whom for three days we entertained and feasted; and they went out and killed five deer, which they brought to the plantation, and bestowed on our governor, and on the captain and the others." This is a letter written to a friend according to J. Walker McSpadden, in his book entitled, "The Book of Holidays".

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
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
