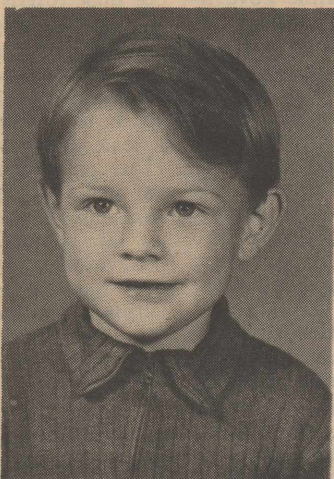
The public is invited to the 8:30 meeting to hear Madden's address.

### Savings Bonds Sales Reported

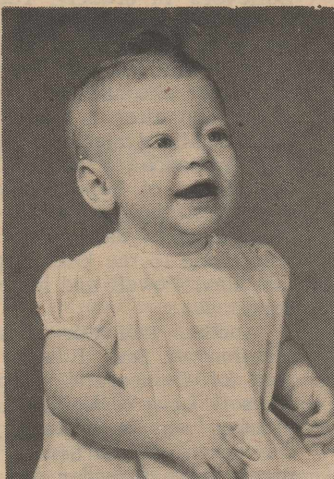
During the month of November sales of United States Savings Bonds and Freedom Shares in Castro county totaled \$4385 according to Judge B. E. Wilson, Chairman of the Castro County Savings Bonds Committee. Total January-November sales were \$56,121 and this is 63 per cent of the 1968 goal of \$90,000.

During the eleven-month period sales in Texas totaled \$164,300,917 -- 89 per cent of the 1968 sales goal and a 6.8 per cent increase over sales during the same period of last year.

Nationally, sales of Series E and H Bonds and Freedom Shares for November totaled \$377 million. Series E sales totaled \$334 million and November sales of Freedom Shares were \$28 million -- 61 per cent above last November.

The camp is free to eligible blind, deaf, mute or crippled children. Transportation to and from the Camp is sup-

plied by the Local Lions. All requests for summer camp are handled locally by Lions.

## County Spelling Bee Director Chosen, Plans Being Made For Castro Contest

Judge Raymond E. Wilson, Castro County Judge, is the 1969 Spelling Bee Director for Castro County.

Sometime before April 1, the Castro County Bee will be held and the champion will go to Amarillo on April 19, 1969, for the annual regional elimination for the National Spelling Bee.

Last year, Bonnie Wagner, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lawrence Wagner of Nazareth was the Castro County Champion and placed 18th in the Regional Bee. The champion was a seventh grader in the Nazareth Junior High School.

The 1969 Golden Spread Bee will be co-sponsored by West

Texas State University and the Amarillo Globe-News. L. J. (Jack) Edmondson, West Texas State University Director of Public Services, will be Bee Director for the Golden Spread.

Again there will be a unique secondary contest -- the Junior Spelling Bee, open to contestants from the sixth and lower grades. Elaine Harris, 12, was the County Junior Champion for 1968, and her parents were Mr. and Mrs. Jackie M. Harris of Dimmitt. She was a sixth grader in the North Grade School.

First place winner in the Golden Spread Bee will go to Washington to participate in the National Spelling Bee, sched-

uled for June 2 through June 7, 1969. The Washington trip includes several sightseeing trips and entertainment, the annual Bee banquet and presentation of awards.

The Golden Spread winner will also receive a traveling plaque, carrying the names of all Regional winners since 1949, to be placed in his or her school.

Other outstanding prizes for top contestants include a Zenith portable television, a 24 volume set of Encyclopaedia Britannica, several copies of the Lincoln Library, a Britannica World Atlas, and cash prizes.

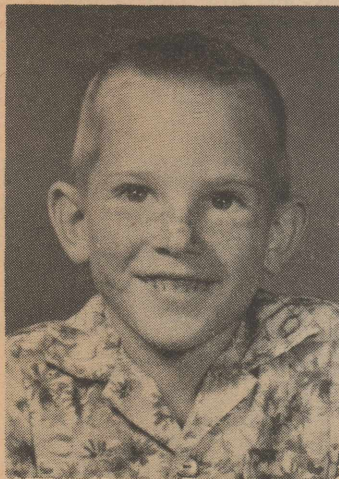
Each County Champion receives an engraved plaque and gold pin. Each County Junior Champion is given a trophy

and a silver pin during the intermission at the Regional Bee (but there is no regional contest between the juniors; they are merely guests of the Globe-News for the annual Spelling Bee luncheon to be held at the Amarillo Country Club.)

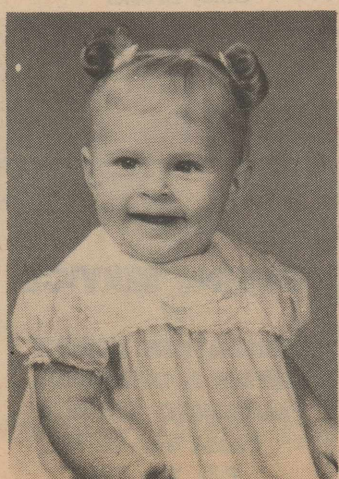
In the school contests, each winner receives a Paper-Mate pen, inscribed "School Champion".

produced on the United States one dollar bill.

# Editorials

## The Struggle In Congress

While the outlook for the Executive Branch of the U. S. government is bright for the first time in many years, the situation in the Congress is not nearly as cheering. Believers in orderly, responsible government were dismayed Jan. 3 when the U. S. House of Representatives voted to seat the Rev. Adam Clayton Powell, the Harlem Democrat who had been refused a seat two years ago after a House study committee accused him of misusing Congressional funds. The presence of Adam Clayton Powell in the House of Representatives injures the dignity of that body. The action in seating him suggests that many in Congress are vulnerable to the kind of political pressure that Rev. Powell and his supporters represent.

Another indicator of attitudes was the election of Sen. Edward Kennedy to the post of Democratic whip, defeating Sen. Russell Long of Louisiana. Sen. Kennedy's election was a setback for Conservative Democrats in the Senate. It also indicates that a move is under way to create a Kennedy power base in the Senate.

These and other developments on the Congressional scene suggest that Richard M. Nixon won't have an easy time with a Democratic-controlled Senate, or at least with the "liberals" in the House and Senate. Obstructionist tactics are likely to be encountered by Mr. Nixon as he seeks to deal with inflation, introduce reform in labor laws, and produce new, realistic legislation for the 1970s. The "liberals" in Congress are like the Bourbon kings of France who were said to forget nothing and to learn nothing new.

The American people gave Mr. Nixon a clear mandate for change; but the Congress was left virtually unchanged. So Nixon faces a difficult four years in the White House. He will have to work hard to mobilize public opinion in support of conservative reforms in government practice. Grassroots opinion will have to be energized so that the "liberals" in Congress will feel its impact.

Fresh initiatives are desperately needed in Washington because the old policies, espoused by the Kennedy and Johnson administrations, failed to work. Massive federal anti-poverty programs, instead of eliminating poverty, have provided opportunities for abuse, as a recent inquiry in Detroit revealed.

The anti-poverty organization in that city failed to make an adequate check on where public money was going.

What is most important is that something be done to halt the blackjacking of the economy by special interests such as the giant labor unions. The paralyzing of great seaports by maritime unions, for instance, is a scandal that must be halted. No doubt Nixon will plead with the unions to be reasonable, but such pleas almost certainly will fall on deaf ears. The only thing that the "robber barons" of Big Unionism will understand is a tough, anti-union monopoly law. Enactment of such a law should be a major objective of conservatives even if it takes more than two or four years to get it passed. National strikes that hurt the general public seriously impede the country's economic growth and hit at the well-being of citizens in every section.

Fortunately, not everything is gloomy on the Congressional scene. Veteran conservatives gained some valuable reinforcements in the November elections. One thinks of such men as Senators Barry Goldwater of Arizona, Henry L. Bellmon of Oklahoma, Edward J. Gurney of Florida; and Representatives Louis Frey, Jr. of Florida, Orval H. Hansen of Idaho, Earl Landgrebe and David Dennis of Indiana, Lawrence J. Hogan of Maryland, Ed Foreman of New Mexico; G. William Whitehurst and W. C. Daniel of Virginia, and James M. Collins of Texas. These members of Congress, many of whom were supported by such worthy organizations as Americans for Constitutional Action and Business-Industry Political Action Committee, have a tremendous leadership potential in the 91st Congress. While they may not hold down important Committee posts, they can be vocal in stating what the country needs and, thereby, will help make possible the mobilization of conservation opinion.

The conservative coalition has worked well in the past and no doubt will operate effectively in the new Congress. But conservatives will have to work very hard, for the radical movement in the country also is intent upon strengthening its position inside Congress. It will be committed to its own effort at mobilization of leftist opinion on college campuses and in urban protest areas. Major political battles lie ahead that will determine the future of the Republic.

## Miss Kittrell's Services Held

Funeral services for Miss Opal Kittrell, sister-in-law of Mrs. Vasca Kittrell, of Clovis were held Tuesday morning in the Sixteenth and Pile Church of Christ in Clovis.

## KITCHEN KORNER

By Lela Gallion

These two recipes are delicious but not if you are counting calories. Serve it to the rest of the family.

### APPLE KUCHEN

- 1 1/4 c. sifted all-purpose flour
- 1/4 c. sugar
- 1 1/2 tsp. baking powder
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 1/4 c. butter or margarine
- 1 egg, beaten
- 1/4 c. milk
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 5 c. thinly sliced, pared tart apple

### TOPPING:

- 1/4 c. sugar
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/4 c. butter or margarine, melted

### 1/3 c. apricot preserves

Cinnamon-Ice-Cream Sauce, or whipped cream

1. Preheat oven to 400 F. Lightly grease a 13-by-9-by-2-inch baking pan.

2. Into medium bowl, sift flour with 1/4 cup sugar, the baking powder, and salt. With pastry blender, cut in 1/4 cup butter until mixture resembles coarse crumbs.

3. Add beaten egg, milk, and vanilla extract, stirring with a fork until the mixture is smooth - will take about 1 minute.

4. Spread batter evenly in bottom of prepared pan. Arrange apple slices, thin sides down and slightly overlapping, in parallel rows over the batter.

5. Make Topping: Combine sugar, cinnamon, and melted butter. Sprinkle sugar mixture over the apple slices.

6. Bake 35 minutes, or until apple slices are tender. Remove to wire rack.

7. Mix apricot preserves with 1 tablespoon hot water. Brush over apple. Cut apple kuchen into rectangles, and serve it warm, with Cinnamon-Ice Cream Sauce or whipped cream, if desired. Makes 12 servings.

### FRESH APPLE CAKE

- 2 c. unsifted all-purpose flour
- 2 c. granulated sugar
- 2 tsp. baking soda
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp. nutmeg
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- 4 c. finely diced pared raw apples (about 1 1/2 lb.)
- 1/2 c. chopped walnuts
- 1/2 c. soft butter or margarine
- 2 eggs
- Confectioners sugar

1. Preheat oven to 325 F. Grease a 13 by 9 by 2 inch baking pan.

2. Into large bowl, sift flour with granulated sugar, soda, cinnamon, nutmeg and salt.

3. Add apple, nuts, butter and eggs. Beat until just combined - it will be thick. Turn into prepared pan.

4. Bake 1 hour, or until top springs back when lightly pressed with fingertip. Cool slightly in pan on wire rack. Sprinkle with confectioners' sugar.

5. Serve warm, cut into squares. Top with whipped cream or ice cream if desired.

Makes 10 to 12 servings.
