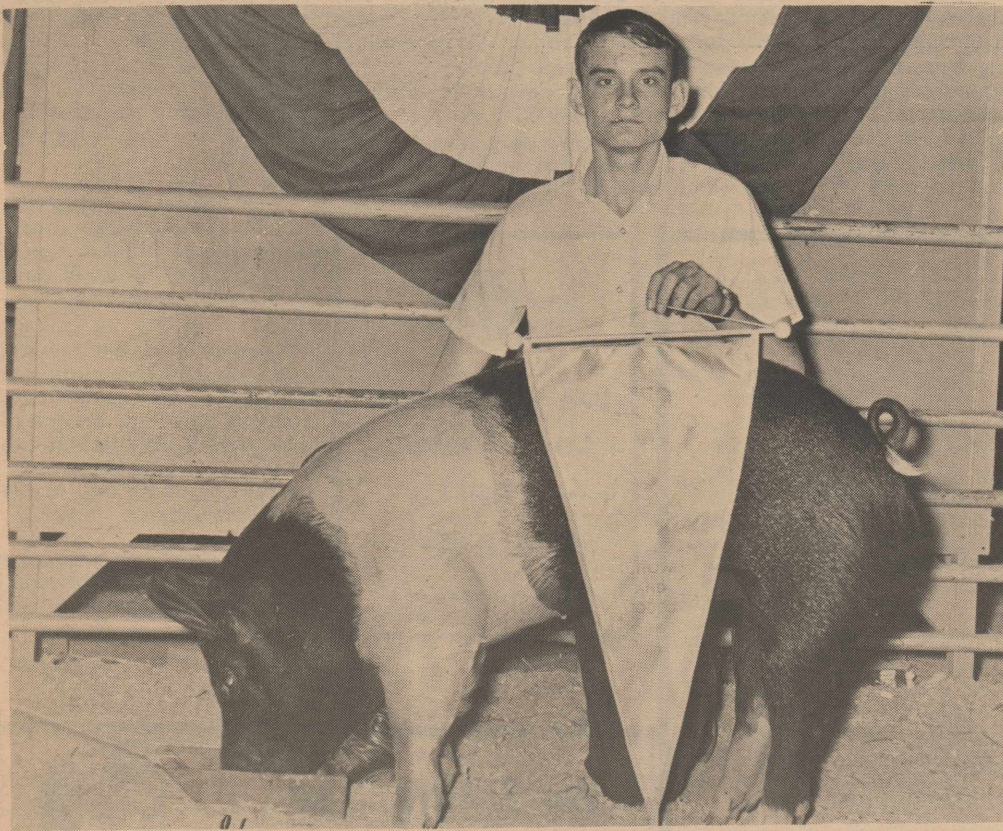

A National Farmers Organization meeting will be held at 7:30 p. m. Friday in the Community Room of Farmers State Bank.

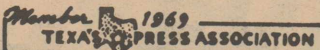

Admit that you were wrong and you stand on the side of truth. You stand straight. And you grow.

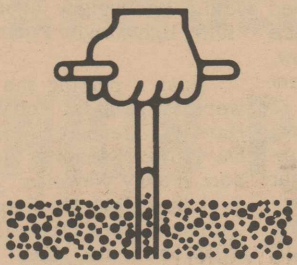

Editorials

Law Must Be Enforced

A newspaper columnist noted that today's law enforcement officer has to "speak softly and carry a big law library". Actually, his paraphrase of the well-known quotation from Theodore Roosevelt comes close to being true. There is nothing wrong, of course, with an officer's speaking softly and being well-versed in legal criminal procedure. Ideally, this is as it should be.

Unfortunately, in the criminal realm within which he must work, the law enforcement officer is the only one "playing by the rules." This places him at a definite disadvantage. In complying with all the procedural safeguards established for criminals, an officer must often subordinate his personal safety, his own rights, and the rights of society to insure that he does not commit some error which might later result in the release of the guilty. Criminals are usually well aware of their legal rights and take full advantage of them.

Many critics of law enforcement today substitute paper theories for grim realities. When they advocate more restraints on arresting officers, they do so apparently on the premise that police are dealing with only law-abiding, cooperative citizens who respect the law and those charged with enforcing it. While a big percentage of police contacts are with the responsible members of society, increasing assaults against and killing of law enforcement officers are indicative of the open contempt numerous violators have for police and authority of any kind.

Arguments are made that court opinions

and legal restraints are not so broad as to require arresting officers to unduly endanger their lives in order to meet standards established to protect the rights of the suspect or accused. Here again, we encounter the difference between theory and practice. Judicial guidelines which are so vague and questionable that even the highest jurists disagree on their intent place a heavy burden of judgment on the enforcement officer. In crucial moments, this burden of judgment can create indecision. And as we know, moments of indecision can cost an officer his life.

The trend today, even though unintentional, is to negate the enforcement of the laws to insure that the criminal is protected. We are asking our officers to operate under an honor system in dealing with an element of our society which has no honor. Certainly, arresting officers cannot be permitted to resort to illegal tactics themselves, but they must be allowed to perform their duty with confidence and with the assurance that they have the support of the public, the government on all levels, and the courts. The powers of arrest must be as clear and positive as possible.

Vigorous law enforcement is needed to cope with crime and violence in our Nation. It cannot be achieved if arresting officers are required to make an apologetic approach to every killer, rapist, robber, and thug roaming our streets. If the rule of law is to prevail, the law must be enforced.

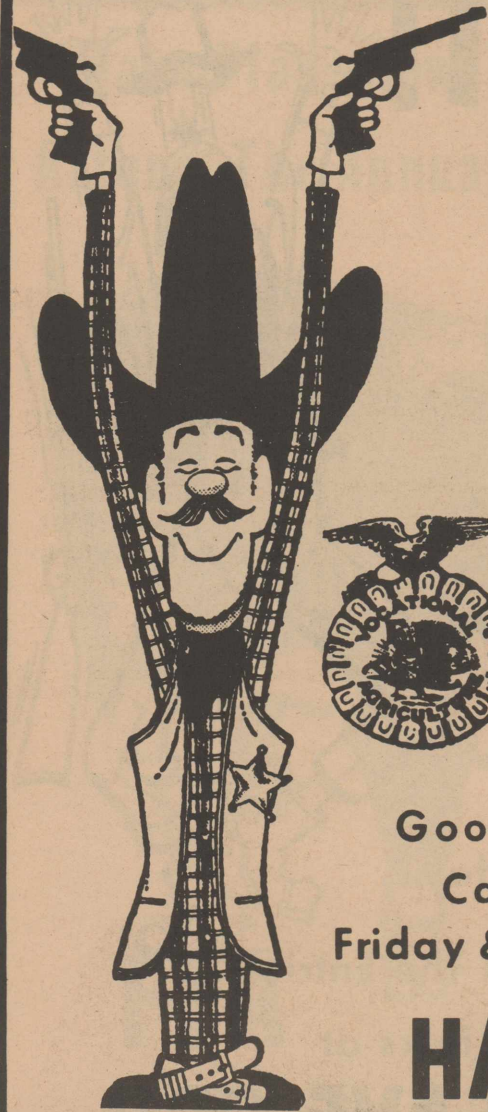

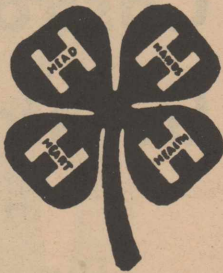

Easter Seal Campaign To Continue Thru April 6

Children and adults with physical handicaps in Texas are urged to contact the Texas Easter Seal Society if medical care or therapeutic treatment are needed.

Herman R. Baker, Sherman, president of the State Society, announced that the society stands ready to provide services to the physically handicapped that are not provided by other resources to patients both young and old.

The president also called on parents, doctors, nurses, clergymen, and other agencies to refer to the society handicapped persons in need of assistance.

The Texas Easter Seal Society is affiliated with 21 Treatment Centers.

Through the program, financed by contributions to Easter Seals, 17,622 children

and adults received rehabilitation services in 1968.

The Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults of Texas is an affiliate of the National Easter Seal Society for Crippled Children and Adults fighting crippling on national, state, and community levels.

Last year, on the national level, more than a quarter-million handicapped persons received care and treatment and other Easter Seal services.

The 1969 Easter Seal Campaign, now underway, will continue to April 6, Easter Sunday.

LOSE ANY MONEY?

Usually weapons, ammunition, medical supplies and food stores are discovered by American troops while searching abandoned Viet Cong positions in Vietnam. However, a new item was added to the list recently when a member of the 173rd Airborne Brigade found \$150,000 of U. S. Currency in three neat stacks of \$50 bills in a cave along the north central coast of Vietnam. That same day a member of the same unit found \$9,000 worth of Vietnamese money (Piasters) in another cave. No one knows how the money got there or why it was abandoned.

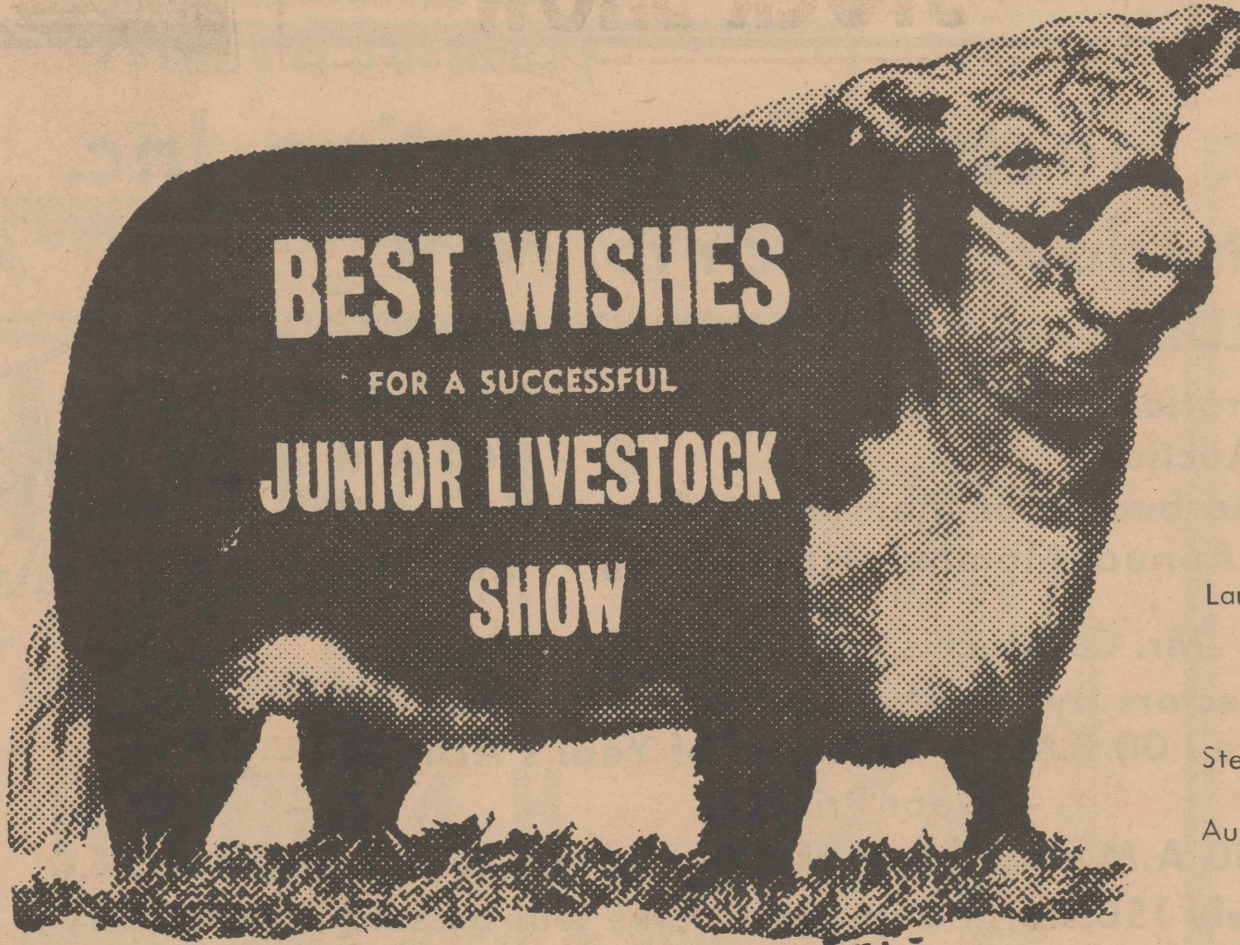

Herbicide Residue Study Completed At High Plains

A herbicide residue study completed at the High Plains Research Foundation this past season might be useful to farmers in planning this year's cropping operations.

Herbicide residue due to the increased and repeated usage tends to pose problems in planning crop rotation. A specific herbicide rate providing full season weed control may remain active over a long period, thus causing damage to succeeding crops.

The residue study was initiated in 1967 with cooperation of the Geigy Chemical Company in the study Propazine 80W and an experimental herbicide GS 14260-80W, now marketed under the brand name of Igran. These herbicides were applied alone and in combination on May 25, 1967, at 100, 200 and 400 percent of the recommended rate on grain sorghum.

Wheat was planted following grain sorghum harvest in the fall of 1967 and soybeans and cotton in the spring of 1968.

Residue carry-over from Propazine at the recommended rate of 1.25 pounds per acre had little or no effect on any of the following crops of wheat, cotton or soybeans. A yield reduction was noted in wheat and soybeans when Propazine was applied at 200 or 400 percent of the recommended rate either alone or in combination with Igran.

Hail damage resulted in OLD SOLUTIONS STILL GOOD

No matter how much technological progress we make in the Army, we still fall back on old solutions to problems. One of the problems in Vietnam has been to find an effective warning system to alert our troops when the enemy is trying to infiltrate on installations. Some soldiers think they have the solution. In parts of Vietnam we are now using honking geese around the perimeters of our installations and, as a result, everybody seems to get the message when a Viet Cong infiltrator is in the area. Actually the use of geese as guards is not that novel. They were originally used by the Roman legions of Caesar's time.

the cotton having to be replanted twice. As a result, cotton yields were not influenced significantly by residue from the herbicides.

The residue study with Igran revealed no residual effect on any of the crops in 1968, according to Dennis Mooney, Assistant Agronomist conducting the test.

"The Igran chemical is slated for another two-year testing program at the Foundation," Mooney said. Plans call for Igran to be applied on grain sorghum in 1969 to be followed in 1970 by vegetable crops of cucumbers, potatoes and onions.

Complete findings on the Propazine-Igran residue study are included in the 1968 Annual Report of the High Plains Research Foundation to be released this month.

Tax Man Sam Sez

MAKE NO MISTAKE ABOUT IT

The good tax folks try real hard every year to get tax instructions that taxpayers can follow without getting mixed up. Of course, the law is real complicated and the IRS folks that write the instructions have their work cut out for them. Taxpayers have more trouble getting the right tax table, and the right line or column on the tax table than anything else. Since the law requires a lot of different tax tables, the instruction must be detailed or even tedious. About the only thing we can do is to re-check our tax computation carefully.

More than half of the errors reported by the computer for Dallas district taxpayers are caused by taxpayers getting mixed-up and getting the wrong tax table, line, or column. So re-check your instructions, your computations and everything. Be real careful! If you don't the computer may send you a little notice pointing out your error.

Congressman Bob Price Would Resume Bombing

Panhandle Congressman Bob Price, a former Air Force Jet Fighter Pilot who served in the Korean War and one of the few Members of Congress who has checked out in the F4C Phantom Jet and the F-111 and F-111A, said bombing in North Vietnam should be resumed and should include military and strategic targets in both Hanoi and the port of Hai-phong.

"The North Vietnamese have violated whatever agreements were made when President Johnson ordered a halt to bombing in the North," Price said. "They are not now and have never observed any sanctuaries in South Vietnam."

Price said the U. S. bombing halt "should never have been made" but now that the Hanoi Government has repeatedly broken all the agreements including shelling civilian centers and violations of the Demilitarized Zone, "we should hit them with everything we have."

"The only agreement the Communist Government of North Vietnam will honor is one of force," he said.

"As long as we allow them the sanctuary of their ports, industrial and transportation centers and infiltration routes, they will continue to stalemate the war

while their negotiators stalemate the peace talks," Price added.

"I have said before and I repeat that the brave men fighting and dying in this war should not be denied their principal means of striking the enemy sanctuaries, especially when the enemy refuses to recognize even civilian sanctuaries in the south," Price said.

"The Communist response at the negotiating table will be in direct proportion to the armed force we apply and can best be applied from the air and sea on targets where it will hurt them most," Price said.

ITEM: Your sewing machine is precision equipment that needs proper care. Sewing machines are built for sturdy use, yet lint buildup can throw the tension of a machine out of balance; grit or fibers from metallic cloth can cause motor damage. After eight hours of sewing time, clean lint from machine and oil it. Use a lint brush to clean the feed dog and thread-handling areas.

ITEM: Amateur chefs can grow their own seasonings at home with a miniature herb garden. Select young herb plants in small clay pots and keep them in a sunny kitchen window. Since herbs prefer a humid atmosphere, it's best to set the pots on a pebble-lined tray and keep the pebble layer moist.

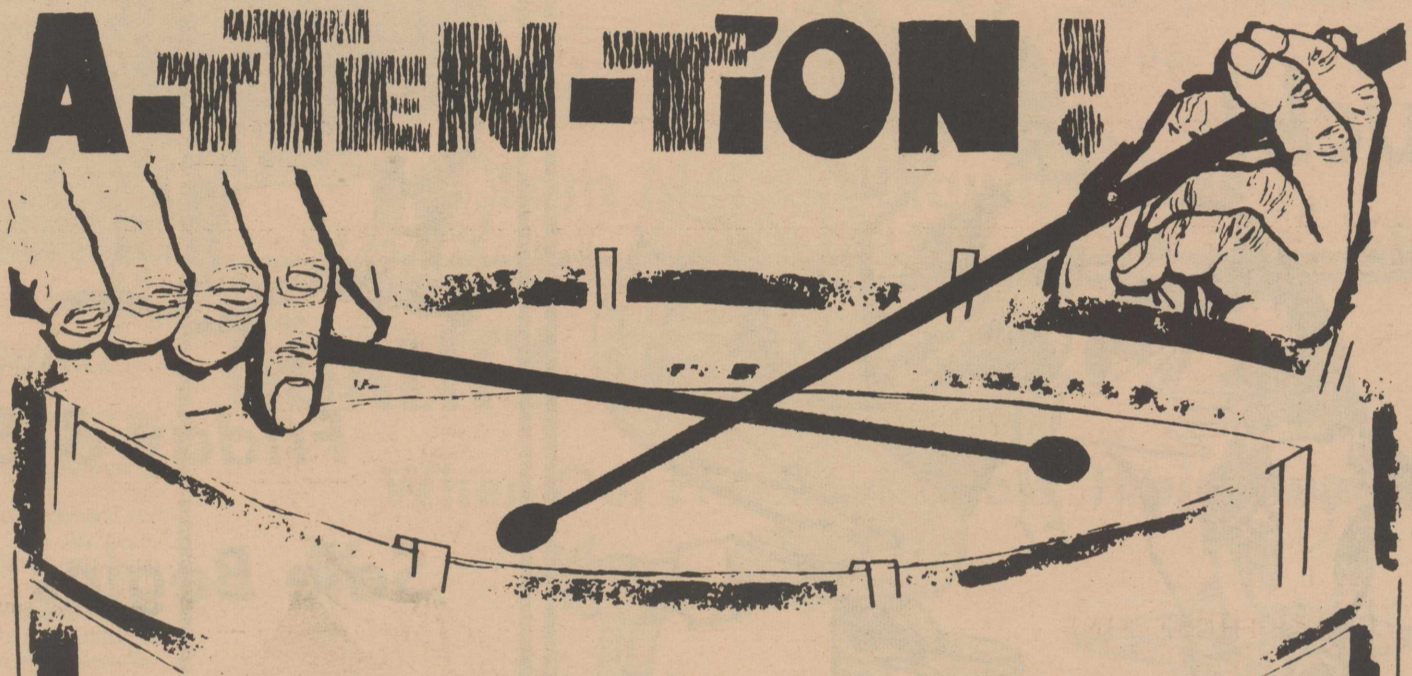

The Cost of Driving

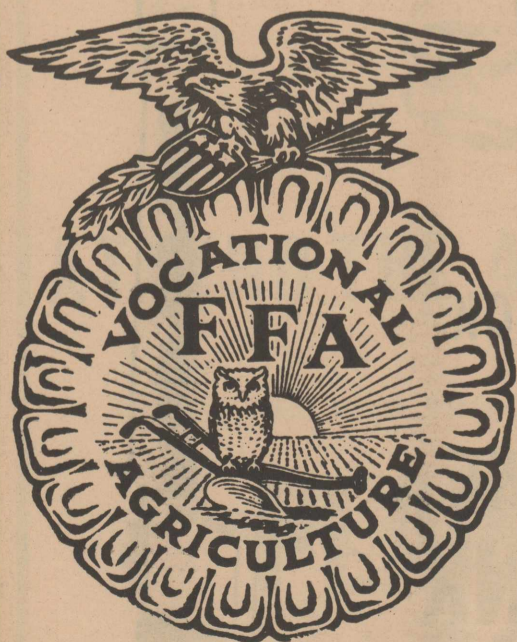

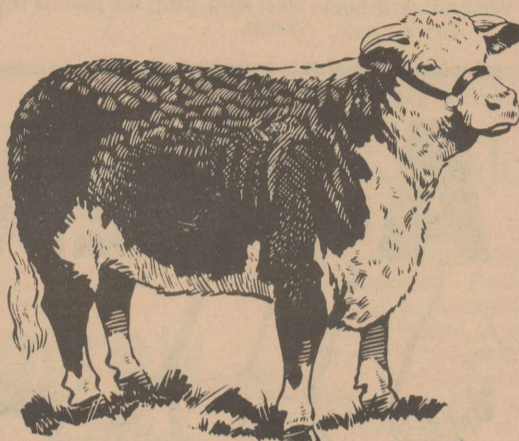

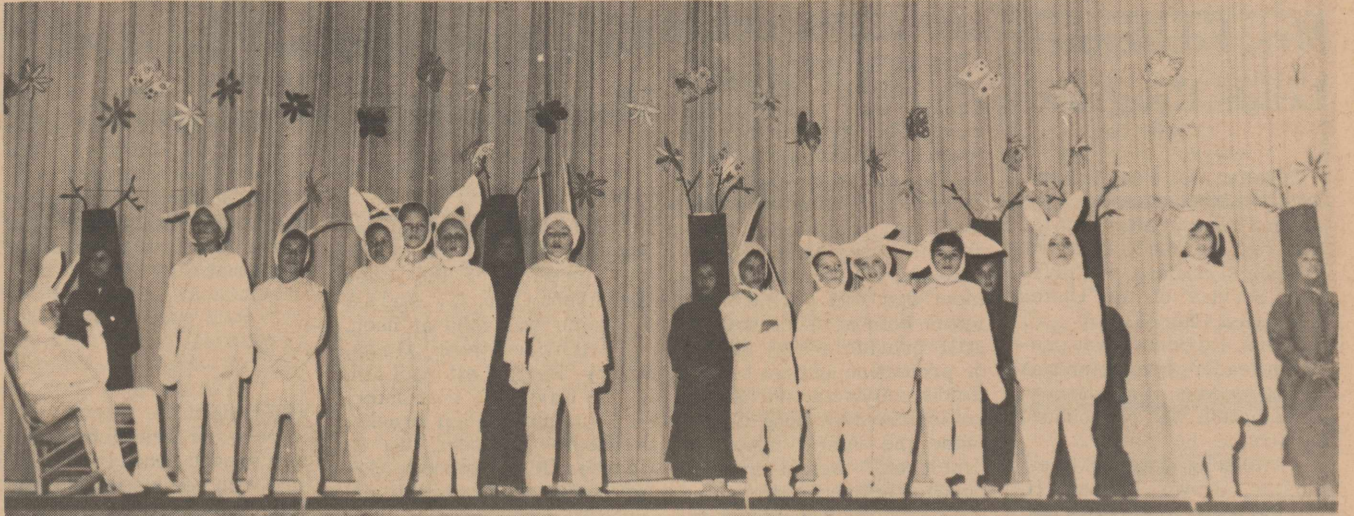

APRICOT WHIP

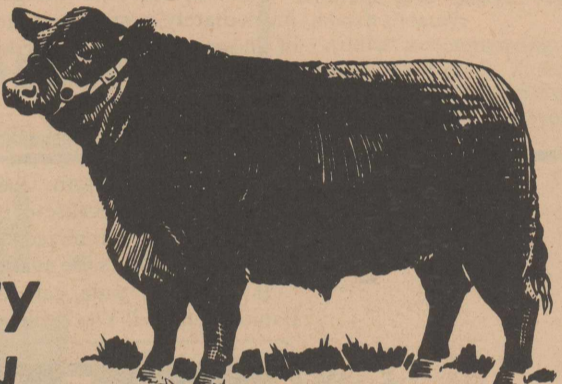
Good Start

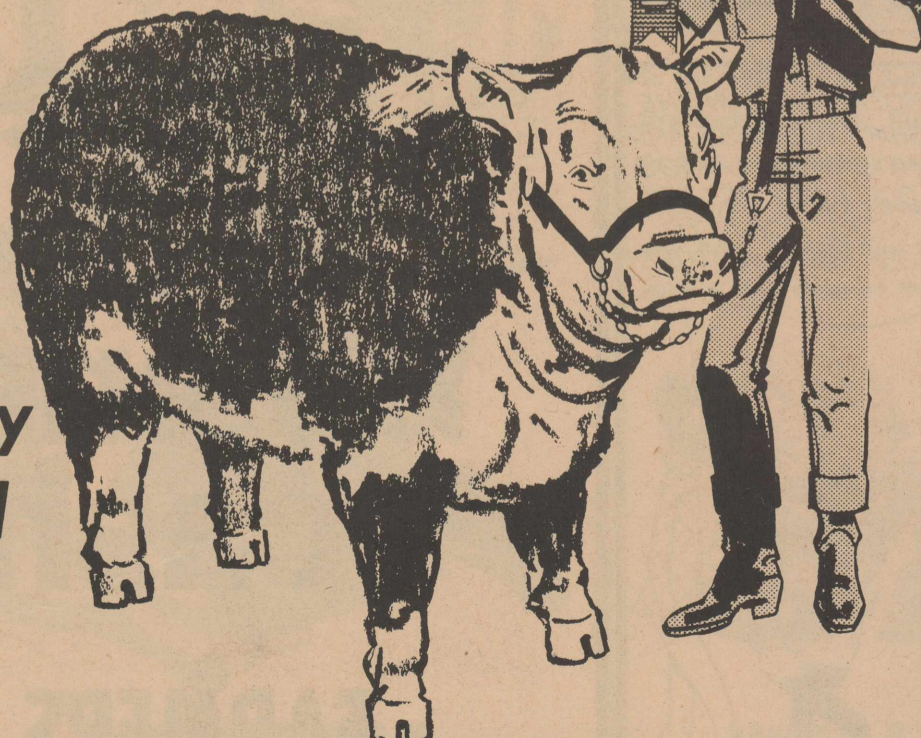

Interregional Highway, Austin, Texas 78740, beginning January 1. This applies both to tax returns with remittances and those with refunds due.

The IRS Southwest Region, which includes Texas, is the latest to require direct filing of all income tax returns with IRS regional service centers, under a law enacted November 2, 1966, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue, said today.

Direct filing of returns will eliminate initial handling at the district office, where they are packaged and shipped to the service center for processing.
