Notaries Public Must File For Re-Appointment Soon

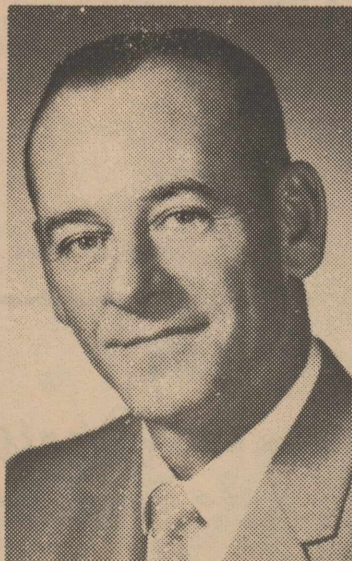
Secretary of State Martin Dies, Jr. announced that all qualified Notaries Public desiring re-appointment for the new term which begins June 1, 1969 and ends June 1, 1971, must pay the required fee and file a new oath and bond with the County Clerk between May 1, 1969 and May 15, 1969, inclusive.

Dies emphasized that Notaries Public should NOT send requests for re-appointment or for commissions directly to the Secretary of State inasmuch as the law specifically requires that the County Clerk

approve Notary Bonds and forward copies of the Application to the Secretary of State.

Secretary of State Dies further stated that any person not now a Notary Public who desires appointment for the beginning of the new term on June 1, 1969, should apply to his County Clerk before May 16, 1969. The applicant must be at least 21 years of age, a citizen of the United States of America and Texas, and a resident of the county for which appointed. The required Application Forms may be obtained from the County Clerk.

Editorials

Welfare recipients have now formed their own union - the National Welfare Rights Organizations (NWRO).

In 45 states, 30,000 families are taking part of their welfare checks to pay dues to this union so they can hire lobbyists in Washington, D. C., to lobby for more something-for-nothing.

As with most such organizations, poor people pay the bills so that the leaders can live mighty comfortably.

Last February, 54 members of the "National co-ordination committee" for this outfit held a convention in Jackson, Miss. They converged by jet from all sections of the country, to wine, dine and convene at a downtown hotel.

Jackson News Editor James Ward, intrigued by the way 20- and hundred-dollar bills were free-flowing around this poor people's gathering, invited himself to interview some of the delegates.

"Do you have any idea what that aged U. S. prime steak you're eating is costing?" "I don't know and I don't care!"

Not all delegates feasted so conspicuously but hotel records show there was some high-on-the-hog room service delivered to delegates that weekend.

Normally it would be none of our business, yours and mine, how these delegates comport themselves privately-except that you and I are buying those steaks.

We tax ourselves mercilessly in a conscientious effort to help the deserving poor and too frequently they get beans while the

undeserving get steak.

NWRO delegates said they had summoned this national convention "to develop strategy for dealing with the Nixon Administration."

The convention adopted resolutions demanding a guaranteed annual income.

We have "the right to live," Chairman Johnnie Tillmon said frequently.

The NWRO also voted to boycott Sears stores nationwide "because that chain does not extend credit to welfare recipients."

The NWRO also demanded other fringe benefits, including special clothing, basic household furnishings, so forth.

"Present welfare assistance is destructive of dignity." They want to make it dignified.

"Instead of forcing welfare recipients to work," The NWRO resolution said, the Nixon Administration should guarantee every family \$7,000 a year whether it works or not.

And if that isn't enough to rot your socks, Second Vice Chairman Mrs. Bruce Sanders was asked:

"If all 50 million persons you say are eligible for membership in the NWRO should join, what would your organization do?"

"Then" she said, "you might have to come to us for jobs."

"Welfare is a human right, a social right, a right under law," say these professional parasites.

They say they have a right to your money and they demand it.

Coins are works of art. To Augustus Saint Gaudens goes an accolade. He designed what is regarded as the most beautiful United States coin. It is the twenty dollar gold piece and bears his signature. His three letter monogram is below the date, with one letter atop another. The "S" is unrecognizable without a magnifying glass.

Perhaps the most active United States coin designer was Charles Barber. His engraving years began with 1892 and continued until 1915. He designed the dime, quarter and half dollar of that period. His signature is a small "B". It is placed at the cut-off line of the portrait.

Anthony de Francisci designed the Peace dollar of 1921. His joined initials appear just below the

portrait and above the date.

RED MEASLES DOWN-- Development of a new drug to combat Red Measles has cut the number of cases reported in Texas last year to only one-tenth the number in the past.

However, the State Health Department reports that the number of German Measle cases continues to climb, from 640 in 1967 to 2,923 in 1968. There's a new vaccine for that disease, too, but it has not yet been approved by the federal government for use in this country.

Statewide drops in the number of several diseases were recorded, including last year's leader, strep throat, which includes Scarlet Fever. In 1968, 32,263 cases were reported, compared to 37,408 in 1967.

KORNER

The nice warm Spring days are so very welcome and I notice almost everyone in town is out in their yards. The gardens are coming up and the flowers are beginning to bloom. I believe this is the time of year I like most.

The salads and vegetables always are so appetizing with Spring weather. But the little ones still like their cookies in the afternoon so here is a good cookie recipe. Also tried the dessert and it is delicious but very rich for us calorie counters.

CANDY BAR CUSHIONS

These pillowy cookies are perfect for coffee klatch-

- 1 c. butter or margarine
- 2/3 c. sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 2 1/2 c. sifted all-purpose flour

- 8 (3/4 oz. each) milk chocolate candy bars

Cream together butter or margarine and sugar till light and fluffy. Beat in egg and vanilla. Stir in flour. Using

cookie press with the sawtooth plate, press half the dough in strips onto ungreased cookie sheets. Cut candy bars into squares; place 3/8-to 1/2-inch apart on strips of dough. Press each candy square into dough lightly to secure. Press another strip of dough over candy to cover. Mark between chocolate pieces. Bake in moderate oven (375 degrees) for 12 to 13 minutes. Cut into pieces immediately where marked. (Cookies will break apart easily.) Makes 6 dozen cookies.

CHOCOLATE BAR CRUNCH

- A melt-in-your-mouth dessert-
- 20 marshmallows
- 1/2 c. milk
- 6 (7/8 oz. each) milk chocolate candy bars with almonds
- 1 pt. frozen dessert topping, thawed

- 1 1/2 c. graham cracker crumbs (18 crackers)
- 6 T. butter or margarine, melted

In saucepan, combine marshmallows and milk; stir over medium heat till marshmallows are melted. Remove from heat. Break chocolate bars into pieces; add to marshmallow mixture, stirring till candy is melted; cool. Fold dessert topping into chocolate mixture. Blend graham cracker crumbs and melted butter or margarine. Pat 3/4 cup crumbs in bottom of 8x8x2-inch baking pan. Spread chocolate mixture over crumbs; cover with remaining crumbs. Chill 3 to 4 hours or till firm. Makes 9 servings.

Texans Warned Tornado Time

Colonel Wilson E. Speir, director of the Texas Department of Public Safety and state director of defense and disaster relief, today reminded Texans that the peak tornado season has arrived.

Information obtained from the U. S. Weather Bureau's State Climatologist indicates that Texas reported 140 tornadoes during the past year. This figure compares with a record number of 232 during 1967, of which more than half occurred in September in connection with Hurricane Beulah. Since 1951, Texas has reported 1,659 tornadoes.

There were no months free from twisters in 1968. The peak tornado months, April, May, and June, produced 13, 48, and 21 tornadoes, respectively. Other totals included January, 2; February, 1; March, 3; July, 4; August, 8; September, 5; October, 8; November, 11; and December, 16.

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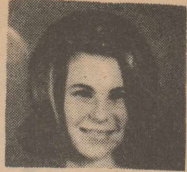

Sam Sez

WHERE IS MY REFUND?

This is refund time at Internal Revenue Service. A popular question at our Internal Revenue offices is, "Where is My Refund?" The chances are pretty good that it's being processed rapidly by our Internal Revenue Service employees and the computer. The computer generally sends between 900,000 and a million refund checks to taxpayers in our half of Texas. On a good day when the electricity is flowing smoothly through the computer transistors, 15,000 refund checks will be sent out. If everything goes real well the total may go up to 25,000 or more.

Most taxpayers who sent their tax returns in early in January have already spent their refunds. Some few have been notified that their return needs audit, or they have been audited. If you belong to "The 11:59 p.m. April 15, Club" a little patience with the Internal Revenue Service employees and Internal Revenue Service's digitized record keeper is in order.



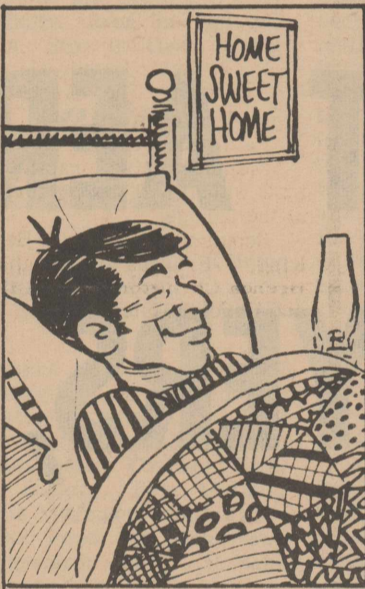

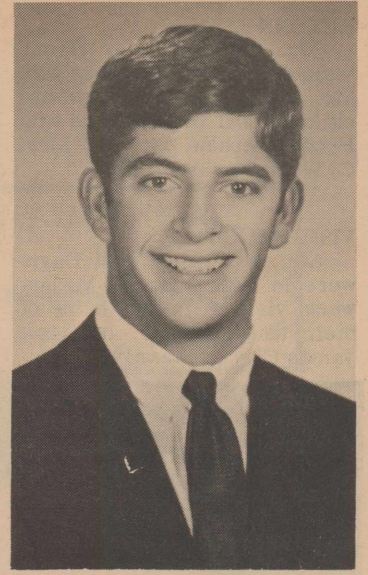

CHERRY JUBILEE PIE

Baked 9-inch single crust
1 can (1 lb. 5 oz.) cherry pie filling
2 T. sugar
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1/4 tsp. nutmeg
1 pkg. whipped topping mix
1/4 c. sugar
1 c. (8 oz. carton) commercial sour cream
Maraschino cherries, with stems if desired

Combine cherry pie filling, 2 tablespoons sugar, the cinnamon and nutmeg; set aside. Prepare whipped topping mix as directed on package except omit 2 tablespoons of the milk; beat until stiff. Add 1/4 cup sugar at low speed. Gently fold in the sour cream. Spoon about 1/2 of the cherry mixture into a baked and cooled 9-inch pastry shell. Spread about 2/3 of the whipped topping mixture over the cherries, then gently spoon the remaining cherries over the whipped topping layer. With the remaining whipped topping mixture swirl a spoonful on each serving and top with a maraschino cherry. Chill until firm, about 2 hours.
