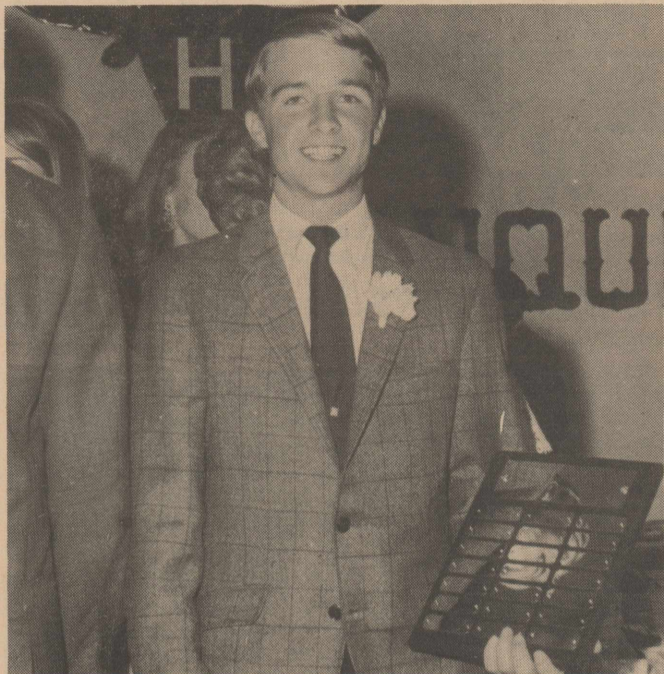

## Pre-School Week Slated For Next Year's Beginners

Hart Elementary School will hold a Pre-school Week May 6, 7, and 8 from 8:30 a. m. until 12 noon. This will include all students planning to enroll in the first grade this fall.

A parent or guardian should accompany each child on the first day, if at all possible, in order that the school officials may properly enroll the children. The first meeting will be in the elementary gymnasium at 8:45 a. m.

Parents are asked to pick up their children at 12 noon. Those students who will be riding the bus may ride to school in the morning but parents will need to make arrangements for their children to be picked up at noon.

The children will eat their noon meal in the school cafeteria all three days at 10:50 a. m. Price of these meals

will be \$.35 each. If your child cannot eat in the cafeteria, he should bring a lunch.

The only supplies the child will need to bring is a no. 2 soft lead pencil and a small box of crayons. He will need a big chief tablet in the fall, so if parents wish, he may bring it at this time.

Hart Elementary School will hold their annual Elementary Olympics Friday afternoon, May 9, beginning at 1 p. m.

Preliminaries will be held in the P. E. classes the week prior to the day of the meet. Only semi-final and final races will be held on Friday afternoon.

There will be 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13 and over divisions for both boys and girls. Ribbons will be awarded to the first, second and third place winners in each event.

There will be three running events in each age division with 9 and 10 year old boys competing in high jump with 11, 12, 13 and over boys competing high jump and football punting.

Each student may compete in only two running events and one field event in their age division.

## Texas Tech Coach Speaks At Banquet

Texas Tech offensive back-field coach Burl Bartlett was guest speaker at the annual athletic banquet held in the cafeteria Friday night, April 25.

"Competitive athletics are one of the great things that can happen to young people in America," Bartlett told the audience. "You are lucky in that you attend a small school. Here all of you have an opportunity to play."

"Competitive athletics is something that is being threatened and later in life you are going to have to fight to keep it. Nothing worthwhile is free. Anything worthwhile is worth working for. In athletics, as in life, you must practice self denial, self discipline and practice (or work) to excel in any undertaking," he said. "You must learn to put the team (other people) ahead of self."

Bartlett told the athletes that young people were prone to sell themselves short and that as an adult or an athlete, that they must build on the things that they could do. He told them that he didn't know of anything that an alibi had ever done.

"Take stock in your work and build on your strength." He stressed the importance of giving the very best in what every one set out to accomplish, which makes him a champion.

"The biggest problem throughout life will be YOU."

"To excel, you must be enthused, really get in there and compete--not just partici-

pate, and do your very best."

"Bad breaks are going to come in your lives. The important things is -- 'Are you going to bounce back?' It's easy to play when you're ahead - it's hard when you're behind and it's late in the game," he stated.

He told them that friends were important and that whether they liked it or not that they would be judged by the people with which they associated.

"Last," Bartlett said, "Don't leave God out of your life. Make up your mind to serve God where ever you are. Without God, you have no inner strength."

"It's not important how LONG you live -- it's important HOW you live."

standing achievement in the field of athletics were Rebecca Futrell, who was named outstanding team member of girls' basketball and Andy Rogers, outstanding team member of boys' basketball.

Danny Smith received the outstanding football player award and Gracial Cantano received the outstanding track member award.

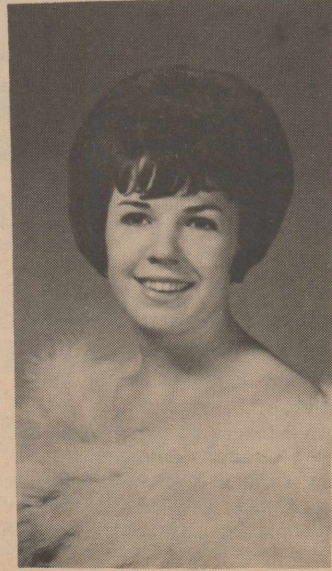
She plans to attend West Texas State University and major in elementary education.

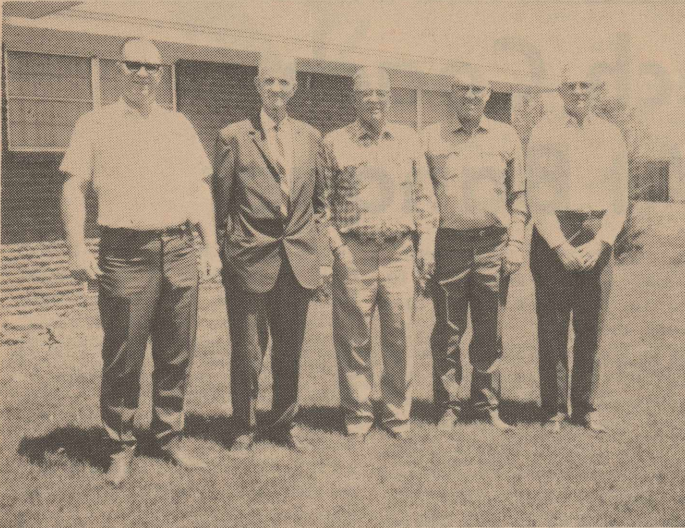

## Annual Research Report Now Available From HPRF

Time is nearing when High Plains farmers will begin planting this year's cotton crops.

One of the most useful guides in planning this year's cotton farming program can be the 1968 Annual Research Report of the High Plains Research Foundation. Information contained in cotton research results can make the difference in profits for the farmer using proper management guides.

Presently most farmers are in the midst of the pre-plant

irrigation schedules. According to Jim Valliant, Foundation soil scientist, the pre-plant irrigation is important to insure adequate moisture for seed germination and early plant growth. He added that research at the Foundation has shown irrigation water applied a month to three weeks ahead of planting date is most satisfactory.

Optimum planting date for maximum yield and highest quality cotton in the area is from April 25 to May 10.

## Financial Facts

One of the truly great coin "sculptors" is Adolph Weinman. He designed our Mercury dime and the walking Liberty half dollar. His signature is the letter "W" resting atop an "A" They appear on the obverse side of the dime and the reverse of the half dollar.

James Earle Fraser designed our Buffalo nickel. His signature, a prominent "F", appears below the date on the obverse side. It is cut into the field though the date is raised.

Laura Fraser, his wife, designed the Grant Commemorative and the Oregon Trail half dollar.

John Sinnock created the Sesquicentennial of American Independence half dollar in 1925. His signature is a plain "J.S."

Later he designed the Roosevelt

dime and the Franklin half dollar.

## KITCHEN

### KORNER

There are so many activities going on at the schools it really keeps the parents on their toes to go to or help with the affairs.

It will be a very short time until summer vacations begin and the children are home or going on to get a higher education in college. There has been so much said on the actions of the college students and while there are some who are not acting as we think they should, did you ever stop to think that there are lots of older people who do not always act or think grown up either. If a few people in a small community do not always get along it is very evident that the larger groups and communities are going to have larger problems. We are really lucky to live in a small town where we don't see the troubles of the large cities.

In helping serve and take foods to many of the activities now and coming up soon we always like to have a new or just a little different salad. Here are a couple you might like to try one from Korea and one Swedish.

#### BEAN SPROUT SALAD (From Korea)

- 2 c. canned bean sprouts (drained)
- 1 small red pepper or 1 canned pimento (chopped)
- 2 green onions finely chopped
- 2 tsp. prepared Sesame seed
- 1 clove garlic crushed (optional)
- 1 hard-cooked egg thinly sliced
- 2 T. corn oil
- 1 T. vinegar
- 1/2 tsp. salt

#### IN DALLAS

- 1/4 tsp. pepper
- 2 T. Soy Sauce

Combine onions, garlic, sesame seed, sweet pepper or pimento, and Soy Sauce. Pour over bean sprouts, combine vinegar, oil, salt and papper, add to bean sprout mixture and toss lightly. Chill well. Garnish with egg slices.

#### SWEDISH SALAD

- 1 No. 2 1/2 can chunk pineapple (drained)
- 2 small cans mandarin oranges (drained)
- 1 lb. green grapes (chopped)
- 1 c. blanched almonds (slivered)
- 3/4 lb. miniature marshmallows
- 1 tsp. salt
- 2 T. water
- 2 eggs
- 2 T. lemon juice
- 1/2 pt. cream (whipped)
- 1 c. celery (sliced)

Combine oranges, Pine-apple, grapes, almonds and marshmallows. Mix salt, water, eggs and lemon juice. Cook in double boiler until thick. Add to fruit mixture. Let stand 24 hours. Just before serving, fold in whipped cream and celery.

## PUBLIC NOTICE

### Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (HJR9)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding thereto a new Section 49-d-1 to read as follows:

"Section 49-d-1. (a) In addition to Texas Water Development Bonds heretofore authorized to be issued by Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III of the Constitution, the Texas Water Development Board is hereby authorized to issue \$3,500,000,000 in aggregate principal amount of bonds. No part of such additional bonds shall be issued prior to approval thereof by the vote of two-thirds of the elected members of both houses of the Legislature.

"(b) The proceeds from the sale of such bonds shall be deposited in the Texas Water Development Fund.

"(c) The bonds herein authorized and all bonds authorized by such Sections 49-c and 49-d of Article III shall bear such interest and mature as the Texas Water Development Board shall prescribe subject to the limitations as may be imposed by the Legislature.

"(d) The Texas Water Development Fund shall be used for the purposes heretofore permitted by and subject to the limitations in said Sections 49-c and 49-d and in addition thereto for the purposes of developing water resources and facilities for the State of Texas, both within the State and without the

State of Texas. Provided, however, that financial assistance may be made pursuant to the provisions of such Sections 49-c and 49-d subject only to the availability of funds and without regard to the provisions in Section 49-c that such financial assistance shall terminate after December 31, 1982.

"(e) Under such provisions as the Legislature may prescribe, the Texas Water Development Board may receive grants and, in addition, execute contracts with the United States or any of its agencies, other states of the United States, foreign governments and others, for the acquisition and development of such water resources and facilities for the State of Texas. Such contracts when executed may be secured by the general credit of the state, and if so secured shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas in the same manner and with the same effect as Texas Water Development Bonds. If facilities are acquired for a term of years, such contracts shall contain provisions for renewal that will protect the state's investment. The aggregate principal amount of Texas Water Development Bonds authorized herein and in said Sections 49-c and 49-d shall be reduced by the aggregate of principal payments committed under such contracts constituting general obligations of the state. The provisions hereof shall not be construed to limit the authority of the Texas

Water Development Board to execute contracts or issue revenue bonds when such contracts or bonds are not secured by the general credit of the state.

"(f) Texas Water Development Bonds and such contracts secured by the general credit of the state shall after approval by the Attorney General, registration by the Comptroller of Public Accounts of the State of Texas, and delivery to the purchasers, be incontestable and shall constitute general obligations of the State of Texas under the Constitution of Texas.

"(g) Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such Acts shall not be void by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on Tuesday, August 5, 1969, at which election all ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment broadening the powers of the Texas Water Development Board and the purposes of the Texas Water Development Fund; eliminating the interest limitations on Texas Water Development Bonds; raising the authorized amount of Texas Water Development Bonds by \$3,500,000,000; extending the maturity schedule on Texas Water Development Bonds; eliminating the procedures for curtailment and the curtailment date of financial assistance to be provided by the Texas Water Development Board."

#### Sam Sez

Taxpayers can save themselves tax dollars at income tax filing time by keeping good records throughout the year.

Those who maintain good records are less likely to overlook deductions to which they are entitled, Ellis Campbell, Jr., District Director of Internal Revenue in Northern Texas, said.

A good system for keeping records is to get a supply of large envelopes or folders, label them according to the types of income and deductions you have, and accumulate the information, Campbell said.

Taxpayers who itemize their deductions on Form 1040 must have available cancelled checks, receipts, statements, and other data to support the claimed deductions.

Campbell said that, in addition to saving tax dollars, good record keeping makes preparation of the tax return a much easier task.

## Bob Price Writes

Dear Friends:

Because of the alarming increase in the traffic of obscene materials, I am devoting this newsletter to a review of my efforts in Congress to fight pornography. The following is taken primarily from my remarks on the Floor of the House of Representatives as recorded in the Congressional Record, April 28, 1969.

#### PORNOGRAPHY

The United States Post Office Department estimates that more than \$500 million worth of obscene material is sold to young people through the mail each year. J. Edgar Hoover, the Director of the FBI, warned more than a year ago: "The publication and sale of obscene material is big business in America Today... It is impossible to estimate the amount of harm to impressionable teenagers and to assess the volume of sex crimes attributable to pornography, but its influence is extensive." FBI statistics show that sexual violence is increasing at an alarming pace, and Mr. Hoover states that pornography in all its forms is a major cause of sex crimes, aberrations, and perversions.

A factor complicating the legislative attempts to deal with the increasing flow of pornography has been the uncertainty in the law caused by the U. S. Supreme Court decisions in the area of anti-obscenity legislation. State legislatures do not know, and the U. S. Supreme Court has not stated with certainty what legislative regulations will be upheld.

Since obscenity is not protected by the first amendment of the Constitution and since Congress has a responsibility to protect the public interest, I believe there are compelling reasons for Congress to take the initiative and deal with the problem. It is for these reasons that I introduced a bill on Monday, April 28, 1969, to suppress traffic in obscenity, particularly pornographic material that is sent to young people through

the mail.

The bill I introduced makes it a Federal crime to disseminate through interstate commerce or the mails obscene matter to minors under the age of eighteen. Moreover, to protect families my bill prohibits the unsolicited mailing of obscene material to people with minor children living with them. Presently, adults are protected under the pandering advertisement statute (39 USC 4009). Under this statute, adult patrons decide for themselves what they consider is sexually offensive publications, and legal orders are issued directing the mailer to remove the complaining patron's name from the company's mailing list.

To enforce its provisions, my bill provides a penalty much higher than in similar bills introduced by other Congressmen. A penalty of not less than \$1000 nor more than \$5000 AND imprisonment for not less than one year nor more than five years is provided for the first offense. For each additional offense, the penalty is not less than \$3000 nor more than \$20,000 AND imprisonment for not less than three years nor more than ten years.

My bill would further bar Federal courts from hearing appeals of local jury findings on obscenity cases. Thus, under the provision, if a movie, a theatrical production or publication were found obscene by a jury under local law, no appeal could be taken to the Federal courts. This provision still retains the right of appeal on questions of law to protect "due process." Moreover, the Congress is clearly within its constitutional powers in so limiting the appellate jurisdiction. Senator Everett Dirksen recently introduced a senate bill containing a similar measure to bar such Federal court appeals.

I am hopeful that committee action can soon be taken on this proposal so that the youth can be protected from the ever-increasing traffic in obscene materials in this country.

**Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR3)**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sections 42, 46, and 48 of Article III, Sections 3a and 7 of Article VII, Section 12 of Article VIII, Section 3 of Article IX, Sections 1, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, and 9 of Article X, Section 10 of Article XI, Sections 3, 4, 5, and 7 of Article XII, Sections 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, and 7 of Article XIII, Sections 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, and 8 of Article XIV, Sections 3, 4, 7, 13, 29, 32, 34, 35, 36, 38, 42, 45, 46, 54, 55, 57, 58, and 60 of Article XVI, Constitution of the State of Texas, be repealed, it being specifically

understood that the repeal of these sections shall not in any way make any substantive change in our present constitution.

The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to repeal the obsolete, superfluous and unnecessary sections of the Constitution."

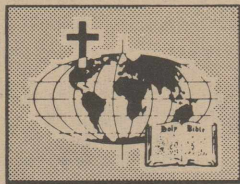
