

# **Driver Education Course Available This Summer**

Driver Education this summer to students of Hart at a cost of \$25.00 per pupil. This cost will be used to defray car expense and teacher salary.

Classroom phase will begin June 2, 8-10 a. m. in the High School and end June 18.

Class will be held Saturday June 7 and 15. A test for a restricted driving license will be given June 19 by the Texas Department of Public Safety.

After successfully passing this test your child will be given six hours of behind the wheel training and six hours of observation. This will be scheduled on an individual basis at regular times during the day. A pupil is not permitted to drive

Hart High School will offer more than one hour per day.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

BEEF STROGANOFF

2 lbs. fillet beef 1/2 lb. mushrooms 4 T. butter 1/2 T. minced onions Salt, nutmeg 1/2 pt. sour cream.

Order fillet cut in 1/2 inch slices. Pound with wooden mallet or potato masher to make very thin and cut in neat finger-shaped pieces. Melt two tablespoons butter in large, heavy pan. 

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

When God selected Mary to

be the mother of Jesus, He

chose a woman of humble birth,

a woman of no extraordinary

talents and that is why Mary

offers a challenge to every

mother today. One might almost say that Mary was a "nobody!"

Betrothal and marriage occurred early in life in the Orient, and it is probable that Mary, the mother of our Lord, was a teen-ager at the time she gave birth to Jesus. Jewish families usually allowed a per-

iod of a year to intervene between betrothal and marriage, and although betrothed couples did not live together, they were nevertheless legally bound.

For a baby to be born during this interval between betrothal and marriage would naturally subject the mother to disgrace in the eyes of others, and we can well imagine Mary's embarrassment when she was informed that she was to give birth to a child. No matter that the birth was supernatural; her neighbors would not likely understand, and Mary fled to the hill country where her cousin Elizabeth lived.

I am sure that Mary had her periods of uncertainty and doubt - she would not have been human otherwise. But the song which she sang, once she realized the tremendous privilege that was hers, shows the simple faith with which she ultimately accepted the responsibility.

As a devout Jewess, Mary would be familiar with the words of Isaiah: "Unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given... Behold, a virgin shall conceive, and bear a son."

Maybe she also recalled the words of the same prophet: "He shall grow up as a tender plant, as a root out of the dry ground...despised and rejected of men; a man of sorrows, and acquainted with grief." As she listened to the words of the shepherds, and saw the gifts offered to her Child by the Magi, "she pondered them in her heart."

Then came the necessity to flee to the South for refuge from Herod - no easy journey for a young mother with a newborn babe. And then the return, and presentation of the child at the temple. Apparently the couple was poor, for, while the usual offering at such an occasion was a lamb, Mary and Joseph could afford only a pair of doves.

Parents, nowadays, throw up their hands in frustration when they try to understand their children, and Mary was no exception. Take the time Jesus' parents took him to Jerusalem, when he was twelve years old, or the years in the carpenter's shop. Then He leaves to commence his ministry. And then the Cross! As she stands looking up at the poor, bleeding, suffering body, she wonders: Is this the end of all of my hopes? Yes, He had been rejected and despised of men, but surely this is an ultimate rejection – surely the Messiah could not end His life thus?

The last Biblical reference to Mary tells us that she was

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continue the daily round of work within the home without complaint, to make an honest attempt to understand and help their children – and, when tragedy strikes, to put themselves in God's palm, and, finally, when final realization comes as to our reason for being, to unite with others in seeking to promote our mission – and His – on earth.

Just as God chose Mary for a particular task, He selects every mother with a very particular responsibility. Mother's Day is not a day for sloppy sentiments! It is a day when we honor the mother who fits the description of Proverbs 31: 25-29.
