## Nine Accidents Investigated In Castro Co. During May

The Texas Highway Patrol investigated nine accidents on rural highways in Castro County during the month of May, according to Sergeant Vernon Cawthon, Highway Patrol Supervisor of this area.

These crashes resulted in one person killed, three persons injured, and an estimated property damage of \$8,570.00.

The rural traffic accident summary for this county during the first five months of 1969 shows a total of 36 accidents resulting in one persons killed, 21 persons injured, and

an estimated property damage of \$28,501.00.

Door prizes were presented to 20 women and 10 men. Children were treated to a skating party in the grade school auditorium.

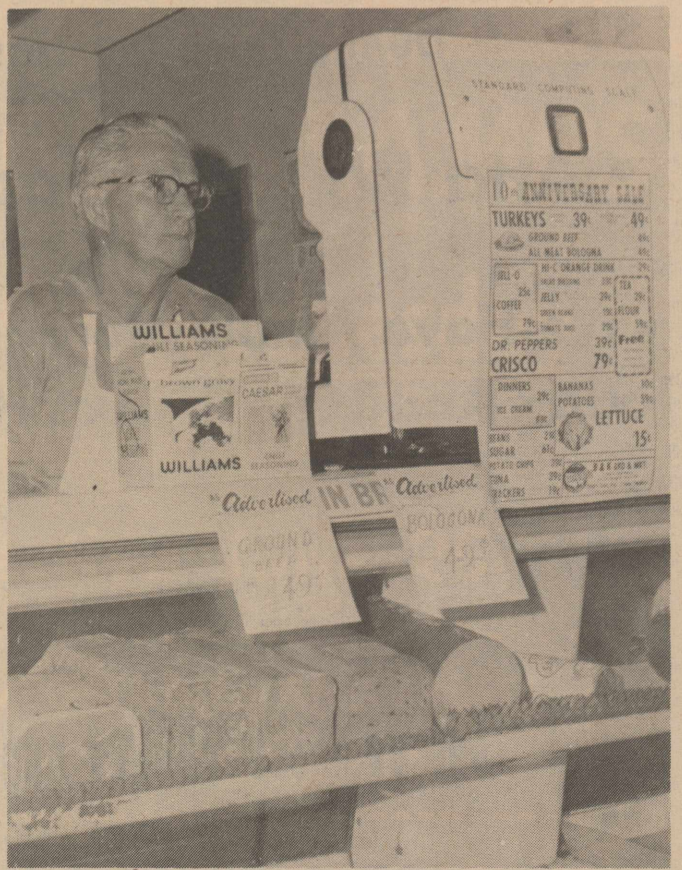
## Hart Residents Report Damage By Lightning

## Sorghum Growers Warned Against Greenbug Attack

Sorghum growers should be on the alert again this year for the pesky and destructive greenbug. This tiny pest which sucks the juices from the sorghum plant and did such widespread damage in the Sorghum Belt last summer is back at it in many areas.

If there are greenbugs in your fields be prepared to spray -- but do so only after you have positively identified them. Unless you're certain you have the greenbug you might be destroying beneficial insects by spraying. There are several other insects -- primarily the corn leaf aphid -- which resemble the greenbug.

Some key identifying characteristics of the greenbug are: a length of about 1/16 inches, a general light green color with a dark green stripe down the back, green legs with black tips, and black cornicle tips (the cornicles are two small tubes at the rear of the body). There are both winged and wingless greenbugs.

The greenbug feeds under leaves and near the ground. In contrast, the corn leaf aphid which is similar in appearance to the greenbug, but lacks the dark green stripe down its back, usually feeds in the whorl on new growth.

If you do identify a greenbug infestation, how do you decide whether its severe enough to spray?

Texas A & M, Oklahoma State, Kansas State and the University of Nebraska all offer these general tips:

1. If plants are up to six inches high, spray when there is visible damage with colonies of greenbugs on lower leaf surfaces.

2. Beyond six inches and up to pre-boot, spray before any entire leaves are killed.

3. From pre-boot on, spray when greenbug numbers are sufficient to cause death of more than the two lower, normal-sized leaves.

For spray materials, Wayne Fowler, agronomic education director for DeKalb AgResearch, Inc. reports that the most frequently recommended chemicals are Diazinon, Malathion, Ethyl Parathion, Phosdrin and Systox.

Fowler says the Diazinon and Malathion can be applied as a ground spray but he advises that the other three are highly toxic and should be sprayed from the air. He warns against using the methyl form of Parathion because of potential damage to the plants.

After a first spraying farmers should keep a close watch

on their plants and be alert to a reinfestation says Fowler. It may be necessary to spray again. If another application is required, be certain the ical can be used a second time in a season. Some materials are labeled for one spraying only.

Be certain to check with your local extension personnel or your seed dealer on any questions regarding greenbug infestation and spraying.

Such natural enemies of the greenbug as lady beetles, lacewings and certain wasp species, normally keep greenbug populations under control. But with cool, wet weather conditions, greenbugs are able to reproduce faster than these natural enemies can eliminate them. When these weather conditions prevail sorghum growers must be especially watchful.

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## Financial Facts

On writing a check, place the numeral amount close to the dollar sign. In other words, do not leave a space between the dollar sign and the numerals.

Let's say that you are issuing a check for \$15.27. In writing out the fifteen, start it far to the left. There should be no space between the left edge of the check and the FIFTEEN.

When you write the "and", put it on a slant. Print it in capitals. Keep the written figures close together.

Maintain your savings account book in a safe place. Print the account number on the outside of the holder for easy reference.

Record your savings account number, checking account num-

ber and credit card numbers in a special notebook.

## KORNER

I do not know what the rest of you think but I have definitely seen all the rain and mud I want for a month at least. I may have to get a boat to get to work if this keeps up. Our street is almost impassable. I am sure you're having the same troubles if you live out of town.

Many visited out of town over the weekend and have not returned since they cannot get into their fields.

I phoned my father who lives in Kansas Sunday. He was very glad to hear from me.

I am very proud of the fact that he is in fairly good health and can do his own farming. Especially since he is over 75 years old. He doesn't act or look 75 and says it is because he hasn't quit working. I am wondering if he just might be right. And just think, they are talking of retiring people at 50 years in the future. You know 50 isn't very old, is it?

Here is an idea for eating outside the easy way and a few salad recipes.

### SUMMER GARDEN MOLDS

- 1 pkg. lemon-flavored gelatin
- 1 1/2 c. hot water
- 1 tsp. salt
- 3 T. lemon juice
- 2 T. vinegar
- 1 c. diced celery
- 1/2 c. diced cucumber
- 1/4 c. green pepper strips
- 2 T. diced carrot
- 1 T. chopped green onion

Dissolve gelatin in hot water; add salt, lemon juice, and vinegar. Chill till partially set. Stir in vegetables. Pour into individual molds or 1-quart mold; chill till firm. Unmold on lettuce. Makes 6 to 8 servings.

### QUICK WAYS TO PEEL TOMATOES

Run back of knife over skin of tomato to loosen it; peel. Some cooks prefer to plunge tomatoes in boiling water or twirl them over flame to loosen skin. Quick, don't cook!

### BACK-YARD BUFFET

Cut whole tomatoes into stars. Turn stem end down; cut each one not quite through in 6 equal sections; spread apart. Sprinkle with salt. Top with sprigs of parsley and group on ruffles of lettuce in center of a large tray or Lazy Susan.

Group choice of fillings in dishes on both ends of tray. Offer Egg Salad, Crab-meat Salad, Guacamole, chive cottage cheese, and mayonnaise.

Pass relishes, toasted coney buns, and cold milk. For dessert, bring out ice cream sundaes and a plate full of crunchy cookies.

### APPLE-PINEAPPLE COLESLAW

- 3 c. shredded crisp cabbage
- 1 9-oz. can (1 cup) pineapple tidbits, drained
- 1 c. diced unpared apples
- 1 c. tiny marshmallows
- 1/2 c. chopped celery
- 1/2 c. mayonnaise

Combine, tossing till mayonnaise coats all ingredients. Serve in lettuce-lined bowl; trim with apple wedges. Serves 4 to 6.

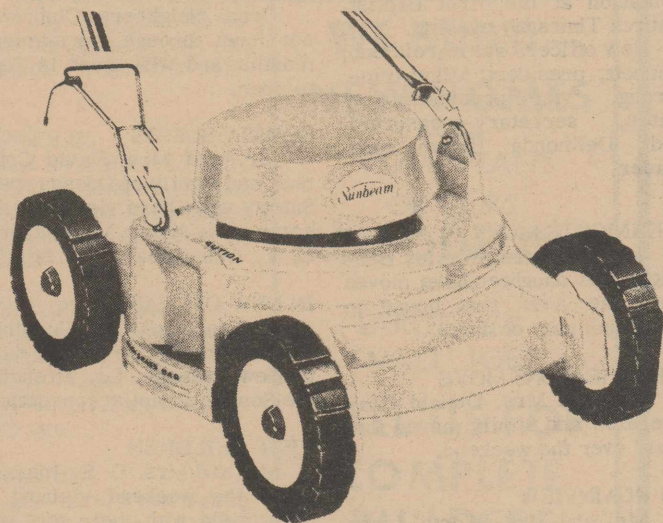
## Credit Card Precautions

## Accent on Health

Summer officially arrives on June 21, and the intense hot weather ahead calls for a few simple health rules which can make it more bearable, says the Texas State Department of Health.

First of all, avoid heavy, fat-loaded meals. They are difficult to digest during hot weather. Emphasize fruit and vegetables on your summer menu rather than protein foods - eggs, fish and meat - which your body needs for fuel during winter months.

Perspiration helps cool the body, but at the same time it drains the body of vital fluids. To replace these fluids, drink plenty of water or other liquids. Fruit juices are a pleasant way to make up the loss. But don't gulp down large amounts of ice water when you are overheated. The body also loses salt through perspiration. Replace your salt loss at meals, or if your work or exercise causes you to sweat profusely, take salt tablets - about one every half hour with a glass of water.

Parents can place extra salt in childrens' diet with salted nuts or crackers plus a little added salt during meals.

Your clothing plays an important role in keeping cool. Loose, light clothing is highly recommended for summertime wear. Normal body temperature are dependent on the evaporation of sweat.

Avoid wearing clothes that inhibit evaporation. Also, remember that white or light colors are cooler than dark ones, since they do not absorb hot sun rays so readily.

Exercise is an essential part of a well-rounded, healthy life,

but it can easily be overdone in the summer. Use common sense and start gradually if you are initiating a summer exercise program. Also, confine any long periods of hard yard work or active tennis games to the cooler parts of the day.

Swimming is one of the best summer sports, provided the proper safety rules are followed - including not swimming alone, getting chilled, waiting at least an hour after meals and avoiding tiredness.

All in all, summer can be one of the most enjoyable seasons of the year...provided you use your head as well as your body.

### DATE NUT LOAF

- 1 c. hot water
- 1/2 tsp. soda
- 1 1/2 c. finely cut dates
- 2 1/4 c. sifted flour
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- 3/4 tsp. salt
- 3/4 c. firmly packed brown sugar
- 1/2 c. chopped walnuts
- 1 egg, well beaten
- 2 T. butter, melted

Add hot water and soda to dates; let stand while mixing

other ingredients. Measure sifted flour, add baking powder, salt, and sugar and sift again. Add nuts. Add egg and butter to date mixture; then add to flour mixture and mix thoroughly. Pour into greased 9x5x3 inch loaf pan which has been lined with paper then greased; Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) for 1 hour or until done. When cold, wrap in waxed paper or aluminum foil and store overnight in refrigerator before serving.

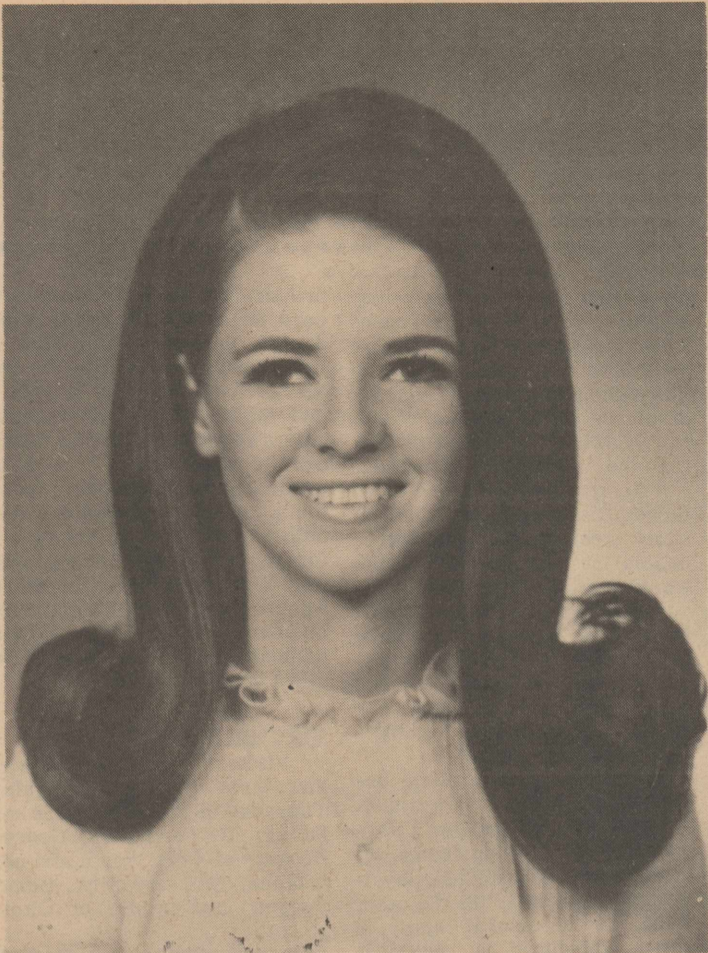

## Parent, Child Each Allowed Tax Exemptions

A child's summer job may be a tax boon to many parents, says Linda Jacobsen, Extension home management specialist.

Both parent and working child can get \$600 exemptions. Even though the child earns more than \$600, the parent is entitled to an exemption because he supports the child. Law permits the youth to have his own personal exemption even though the parent claims him as a dependent.

Children, however, adds the Texas A&M University specialist, must be full-time students or under 19. This is the only situation in which two different taxpayers get the \$600 personal deduction for the same person.

Hayakawa says, "Serenity suggests that which is elevated above earthly turmoil, the presence of an almost other-worldly calm and peace of spirit which has been reached through self-fulfillment.

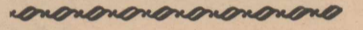

Serenity through communication with God. To many,

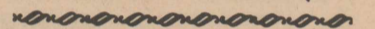
