Trip to the Moon Raises Questions



"Mankind is going to establish places of abode outside of his home planet, the earth," said Dr. Thomas O. Paine, NASA administrator, shortly after Astronauts Armstrong and Aldrin had landed on the moon.

If man does, indeed, journey to other planets and even set up colonies there, will this create a conflict between our deeds and our beliefs?

When God said to Adam, "Be fruitful, and multiply and replenish the earth and subdue it," did He intend to limit us to this planet?

Or is it true, as a famous biologist said, some time ago, that "in the evolutionary pattern of thought there is no longer either need or room for supernatural beings capable of affecting the course of events?"

"The earth was not created. It evolved," he said. "So did all the animals and plants that inhabit it, including our human selves, mind and soul, as well as brain and body."

Is Science Against God?

Have the achievements of modern science really outmoded faith in God as the supreme Creator? Some, who believe that science and God cannot peacefully coexist in the same universe, declare that science has now displaced God.

When the Russians succeeded in photographing the dark side of the moon from an unmanned satellite, some years ago, the Russian newspaper "Izvestia" reported that a Russian Orthodox priest had been converted to atheism.

The priest announced to his congregation in the village of Sodorkove, near Moscow, "I have become an atheist . . . People have learned to dominate nature . . . photograph the moon's hidden side, and put rockets into space. Not God, but science helped them. I am convinced there is no God."

On the other hand, Dr. Werner von Braun, director of the NASA Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Ala., declared recently, in a "Christian Life" interview, "We must learn to consider God as Creator of the universe and Master of everything."

Von Braun says that he considers it as difficult "to understand a scientist who does not acknowledge the presence of a superior rationality behind the existence of the universe as it is to comprehend a theologian who would deny the advances of science."

"The Heavens Declare"

Mrs. Madalyn Murray O'Hair, who apparently considers God her personal enemy, may not like this, but it is definitely true that a number of those who are planning and carrying out this nation's space program are sincere Christians who have no hesitation about telling the world that they believe in the God Who made the universe that they are learning about.

The Bible says, "The heavens declare the glory of God . . . There is no speech nor language where their voice is not heard."

Clayton Urges West Texans To Votes

Dear Editor--

I have read many articles about the Texas Water Plan and have studied the effects of the Plan on the future of Texas. The thing that concerns me most is letters to the editors which express non-truths about the Texas Water Plan. Of course, I realize there are those who would like to turn our state back to the birds, animals and barren lands, but I think most Texans are more concerned about human needs. The Bible teaches that God created all things and his highest creation was man. To man he gave the charge to "Be fruitful and replenish the earth, and subdue it." I hope we do not forget these commands and principles when we try to provide for man's needs.

The Texas Water Plan is big and will be costly, but the benefits Texans and their economy will receive from implementation of the Plan will be much, much more than the cost. Our cities and industries will continue to grow if provided ample water supplies and our agriculture land will be able to feed and clothe the increased population of the future. The actual financing of the plan will be at the expense of the users of the water. Constitutional Amendment No. 2 on the ballot August 5 would authorize an additional \$3.5 billion in bonds to the Water Development Board Fund. This fund has already helped more than 60 cities in Texas by lending them money at interest to provide water facilities for their people. The \$3.5 billion will be a continuation of this program with additional loans being made to political subdivisions for meeting their water needs for municipal and industrial use in the years ahead. However, it will all be coordinated and incorporated in a state-wide plan. The plan also considers fresh water inflows for the bays and estuaries to provide an ecological balance in those areas. The enhancement to fish and wildlife will be tremendous as well as refreshing and scenic to the tourist along with all the recreational benefits. Water for agri-

culture is provided in the plan, but this water will be furnished in cooperation with the bureau of Reclamation and the Corps of Engineers. Before projects can be approved by Congress, the Bureau studies must show that benefits will exceed cost and the government will be paid back by water fees under user contracts.

The \$3.5 billion bond program would be for a period of 40-50 years as need arises. The bonds could not be placed on the market until approved in increments by a 2/3 majority vote of the legislature. This, in effect, assures flexibility in the Texas Water Plan by assuring that the needs of the people are being taken into consideration each time the legislature is asked to approve an increment of bonds for issue. The program financing is similar to the Veterans Land Program and the Texas Opportunity School Loan Program which will not cost the State of Texas because they are loans at interest that are being paid back by veterans and young Texans who borrowed money to finish their college education. Planning and providing for future water supplies will cost approximately 1/4 that spent on highways and about 1/8 that spent on education per year. Without water supplies there would be no need for highways, schools, cities, industry, churches, etc. Water is one element essential to all.

The greatness of Texas and Texans will depend on how we plan and provide for the future. In Proverbs it says that "Where there is no vision, the people perish." Texans have vision and will prove it August 5 by approving Amendment No. 2. If we as a people can split the atom, put a man on the moon, and transplant a human heart, we can - we must - and we will provide for our future water supplies.

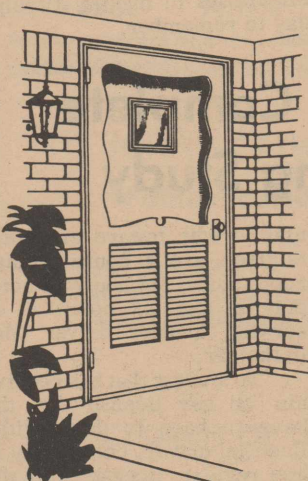

She was 74 years old, born March 18, 1895 in Hamilton, Texas.

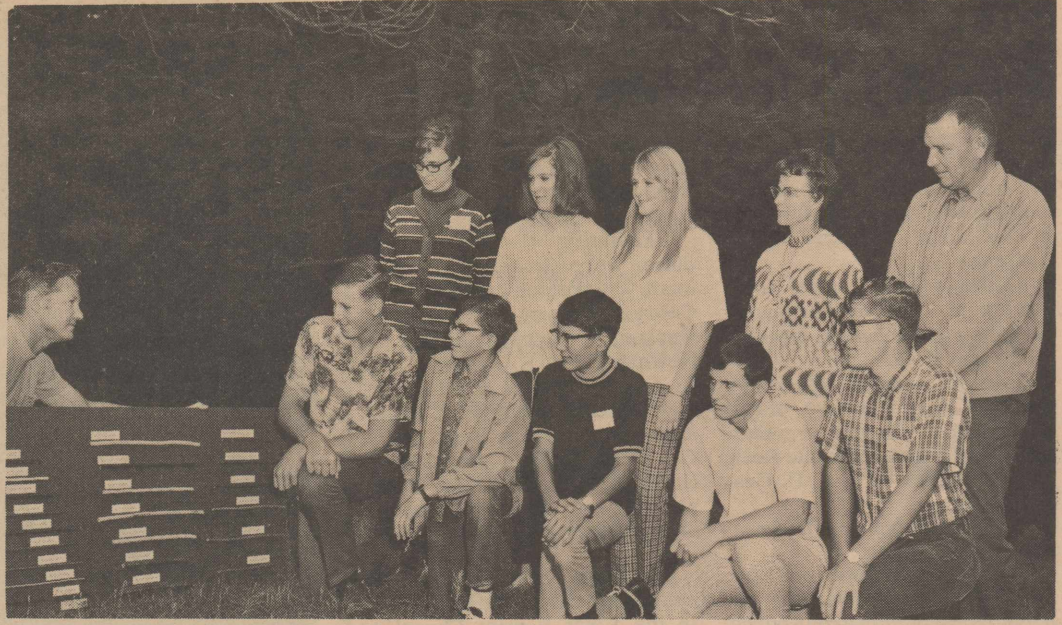

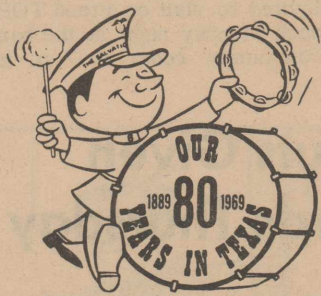

According To IRS

If you are getting a divorce during the year you may be creating a tax problem to add to all of the other problems that go with marital troubles. Since Texas is a community property state, Internal Revenue is required to consider the income earned by each spouse up to the date of divorce as community income. This should be split with the withholding credits also being split between the spouses at the time of the divorce. Internal Revenue and probably your attorney will advise you to agree on who will support the children and who will claim the income tax dependency exemption for the children. Internal Revenue reports that thousands of Texans prolong old marital problems through their failure to settle this issue. The Internal Revenue auditor has to settle the disagreement and he doesn't find it pleasant, but only one parent can claim the dependency. Congress has simplified the rules, but it is up to the individuals involved to reach an agreement.

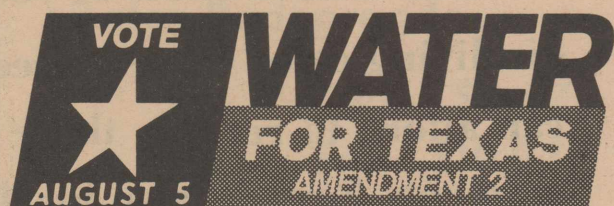

Fourth, has the name of the payee been changed? Five, are you sure of the signature? Is it that of the one whose name appears on signature card?

Although a check is made payable to "bearer", most tellers require an endorsement.

Recipes From Myrt Loman

Since this is the canning season, I must pass along some real good recipes, that are tried and true.

SWEET CUCUMBER PICKLES

Soak over night 7 pounds of sliced cucumbers in one cup of household lime and enough water to cover.

The next morning, wash until water runs clear.

Boil together 2 quarts of white vinegar, 4 pounds of sugar, 4 tablespoons of salt, 2 tablespoons of mixed pickling spices, 1 tablespoon of cloves and 2 sticks of cinnamon.

Pour this over cucumbers and boil slowly for 2 1/2 hours, put in jars and seal.

Here are some delicious jelly recipes, good this winter or with meats any season of the year and not too expensive to make.

GRAPEFRUIT JELLY

Mix 4 cups of canned unsweetened grapefruit juice with a box of powdered fruit pectin (Sure-Jell, or Pen-Jell). Heat to boiling point and add 4 1/2 cups sugar, boil for 5 minutes, pour in jars and seal.

JOLLY JELLY

1 package of powdered pectin, 1 package of Kool-Aid, (Food coloring if needed), 1/2 cup lemon juice, 3 1/2 cups water.

Bring to a rolling boil and have measured 6 cups sugar. Add this to liquid and when it boils 5 minutes with added sugar, skim and pour in jars and seal.

A small jar of these jellies make a lovely gift to a friend.

N.F.O. Gets Contract With Friona Elevator

A \$3 million Milo contract between the National Farmers Organization and the West Friona Grain Co., Inc., was announced last Friday morning, by State NFO president Don Kimball of Amarillo.

The contract, ratified by about 800 farmers in a closed session in Hereford Thursday night, calls for "a 15 per cent increase for the farmer, which is the highest since 1954," said Kimball, "The commodity buyer will be staying on the static level of market prices."

Kimball, who said that the NFO now has enough strength to short the market, declined to give a dollar and cents breakdown, but said NFO members in 16 counties would be involved in the 12-month contract.

Clarence Martin, owner of the elevator facility in Friona, said he was prompted to enter into the NFO contract to insure a 12-month supply of grain and "to give the freight to the farmer." He said his elevator had a capacity of about 200 million pounds and was one of the largest.

The contract calls for No. 2 yellow milo with a moisture content of about 14 per cent with a 5-pound test weight. Also included is a 10 per cent penalty should the farmer fail to deliver the milo to Martin.

"There is a tremendous volume of grain in this area," Kimball said, "We want \$2.50

milo for the farmer -- we're striving for that goal this year."

As for the warning to "short the market," Kimball said the price of milo had increased recently "solely because of the NFO."

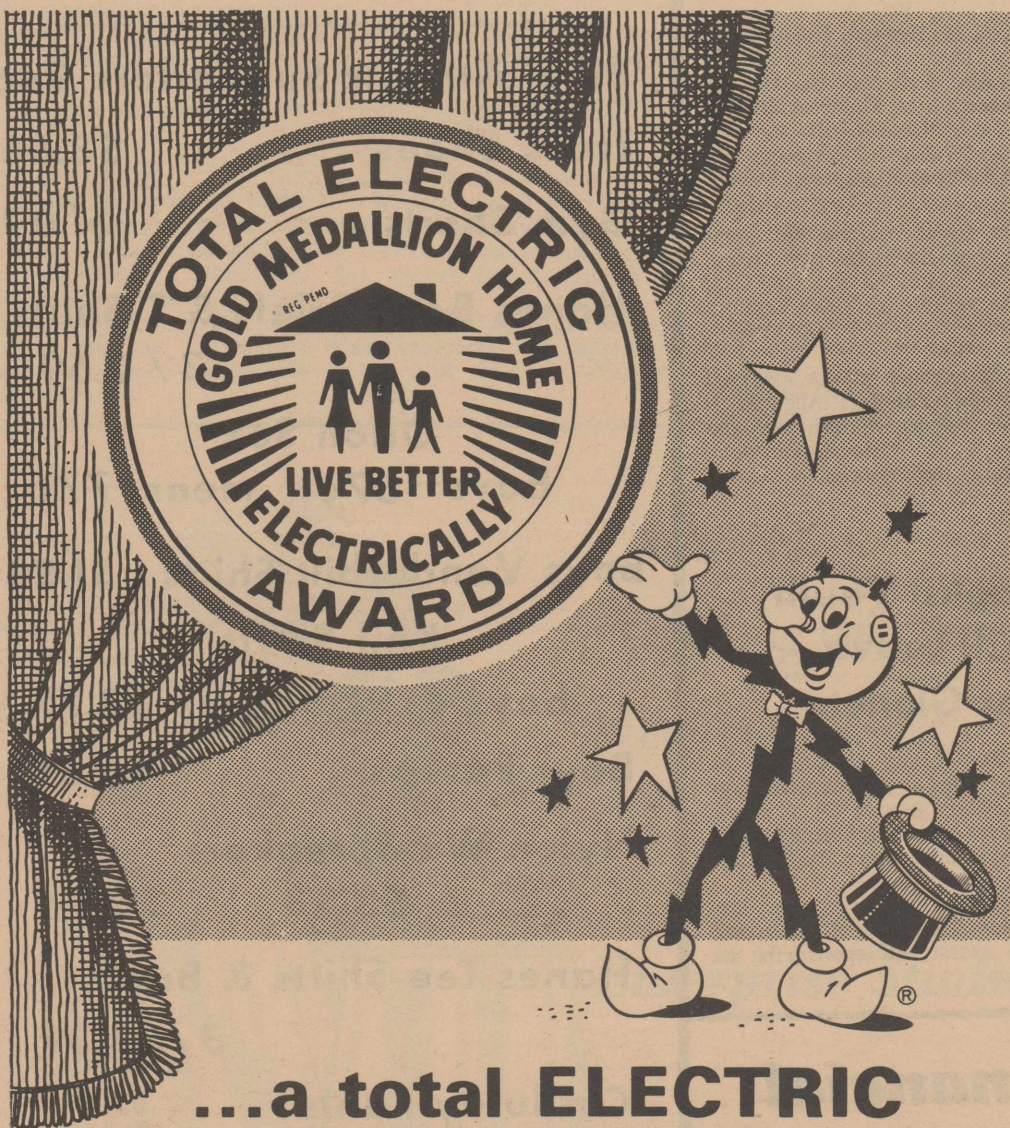
"Collective bargaining is the rage of the day -- the farmer is learning he must market his own product -- nationwide. Buyers have absolute control over the market at this time," Kimball noted.

He said that the action taken would involve "2,000 or 3,000 farmers."

Noting that rural America is "in trouble -- deep trouble," Kimball predicted "drastic situations and economic collapses because you can't make a profit without a price."

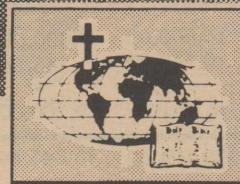
