## Vocational Training Offered In Junior High

A new course, Coordinated Vocational Academic Education (C.V.A.E.), has been added to the Hart Junior High School Curriculum this year. The course is designed to attract students who do not plan to go on to college or specialized schools, and who might other-

wise not finish high school.

The students are taught definite vocational skill which they must have to keep them from becoming trapped in the unskilled labor market, and are given enough Academic preparation to allow further study in technical or professional

skills in and after high school.

The title of Hart's C.V.A.E. Course is "General Farm and Ranch Repairs". This includes a wide range of skills, but emphasis will be placed on simple jobs involving welding, carpentering, and mechanics.

## Barley To Be Included In 1970 Feed Grain Program

Barley will be included in the 1970 feed grain program, it was announced today by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. Decision to include barley in the program follows the Sept. 10 crop report which indicates a record new national average yield of 44.4 bushels per acre.

Until 1960, annual barley yields since 1866 had averaged less than 30 bushels per acre. In 1960, the crop average was 30.9; in 1965, it was 35.1; in 1967, 40.6; and this year, 44.4. Although harvested acreage has been declining, the larger yields have resulted in production increases.

Currently, the 1969 crop of barley is indicated to be 416 million bushels. Carryover as of July 1 this year was 198 million bushels - up about 60 million bushels over a year earlier. The total supply would be 624 million bushels for 1969-70. Total utilization in 1968 was 368 million bushels. It appears a further increase in carryover is probable as of July 1, 1970.

Other provisions of the 1970 feed grain program will be announced in the near future.

## Longhorn Coaches Present Program

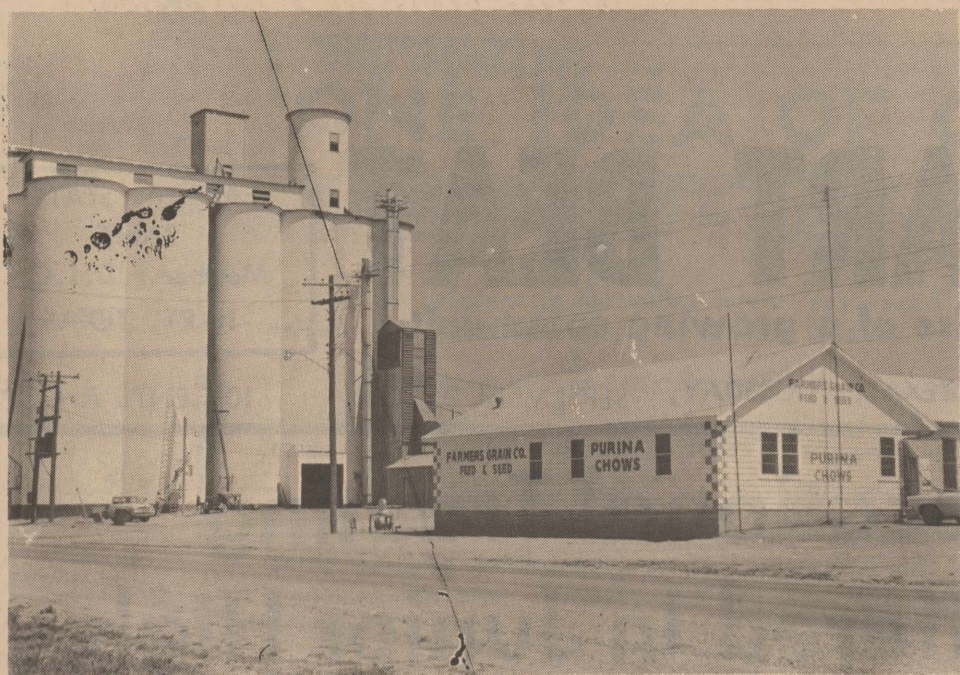

## Horns Smash Bronchos

The Hart Longhorns ran roughshod over the Meadow Bronchos here Friday night to the tune of 52-12.

The Bronchos had beaten the Horns by a score of 44-6 in 1968 and the Horns returned the favor by even a greater score. The Horns did a fantastic job on defense and they moved the ball well behind the great running of sophomore Johnny Ethridge and junior Landria Bruington.

The game started as the Broncs from Meadow kicked off to the Horns and Danny Smith got the show on the road with a 15-yard kick-off return.

With the ball on the 35 the Horns began to move, but their drive was thwarted by a fumble and the Bronchos took over on the Hart 40-yard line.

The Broncs, however, had the ball for only a short while as they fumbled the ball back to the Horns.

The Horns then started punching the ball downfield with quarterback Harold Bob Bennett directing fine running and passing plays. With the ball on the two yard line, Johnny Ethridge was handed the ball and over the goal line he went for Hart's first score of the night. Ethridge missed the conversion, but Hart led 6-0.

This was just a preview of things to come as the Bronchos could get nowhere and punted back to the Horns. The Horns were on their way again near the end of the first period and again it was Johnny Ethridge taking the ball over from the four-yard line and he also completed the conversion and Hart led 13-0.

Again the Bronchos found the going tough even behind good running by halfback David Watson and fullback Kyle King.

The Broncs punted and the Horns were down into Broncho country again, only to lose the ball on a fumble. The Bronchos fumbled right back and the Horns were in business again.

The Horns began another drive and it was sophomore Johnny Ethridge punching over from the three and then kicking the extras leaving the score at the half Hart 20 and Meadow 0.

The Horns kicked off to start the second half. The Bronchos started moving the ball some, but Roy Ethridge put a damper on it as he recovered a Meadow miscue on the Hart 35.

The Longhorns began moving the ball well again and Johnny Ethridge got his last touchdown of the night as he banged in from the 1.

Meadow's Bronchos again could not get going as the Horns fine defense had them bottled up. The Bronchos punted to the Horns and Hart started again.

This time it was Harold Bennett getting in on a four yard plunge and Ethridge completed the extra points and Hart led 33-0.

On Meadow's next drive, the going got a little better, but when they got down around

Hart's 35 yard line the drive fizzled. The mighty Horns then drove to Meadow's 10, where they had a third down and 10 situation.

Harold Bennett threw a pass in the end zone to Donny Black, but a good defensive play by Meadow batted the ball away.

On the next play, however, Bennett found Quincy Hawkins open in the end zone for six more points. Johnny Ethridge kicked the extras and Hart led 40-0 at the end of three quarters.

The Bronchos finally got rolling on their next drive and with fourth down and one yard to go, David Watson broke in from the one. Their try for the two extra points failed and the score was 40-6.

The Horns showed that they weren't ready to quit, though as they moved on down to Meadow's one yard line where Stanley Dyer carried the ball over.

The try for the extras was incomplete and the score stood at 46-6.

Meadow's next drive got nowhere and the Horns found themselves heading for another touchdown and score they did as Gary Six ran the ball in from the seven. The kick by Johnny Ethridge was no good but he still had 28 of Hart's 52 points.

The Bronchos got moving on another drive near the end of the game but it looked as though time would run out on them but on the last play of the game Meadow's David Watson scampered 40 yards for the last points of the game as their run for the extra points was no good. The final score stood at Hart Longhorns 52 to Meadow Bronchos 12.

The Horns will host Hereford J. V this Thursday night at 8.

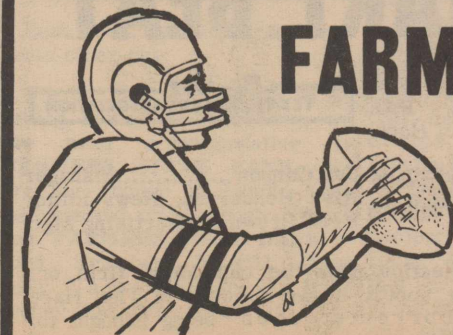

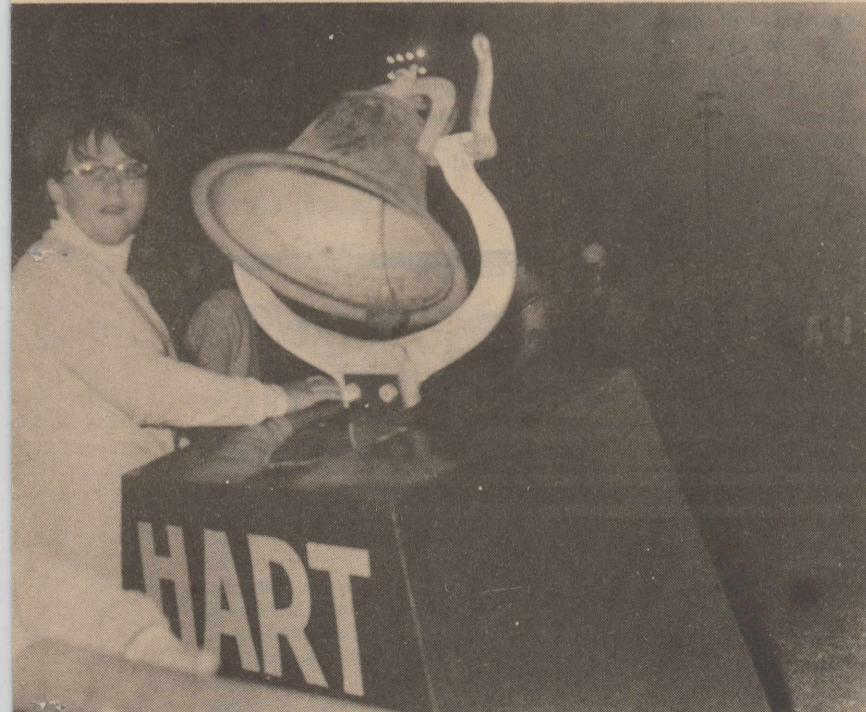

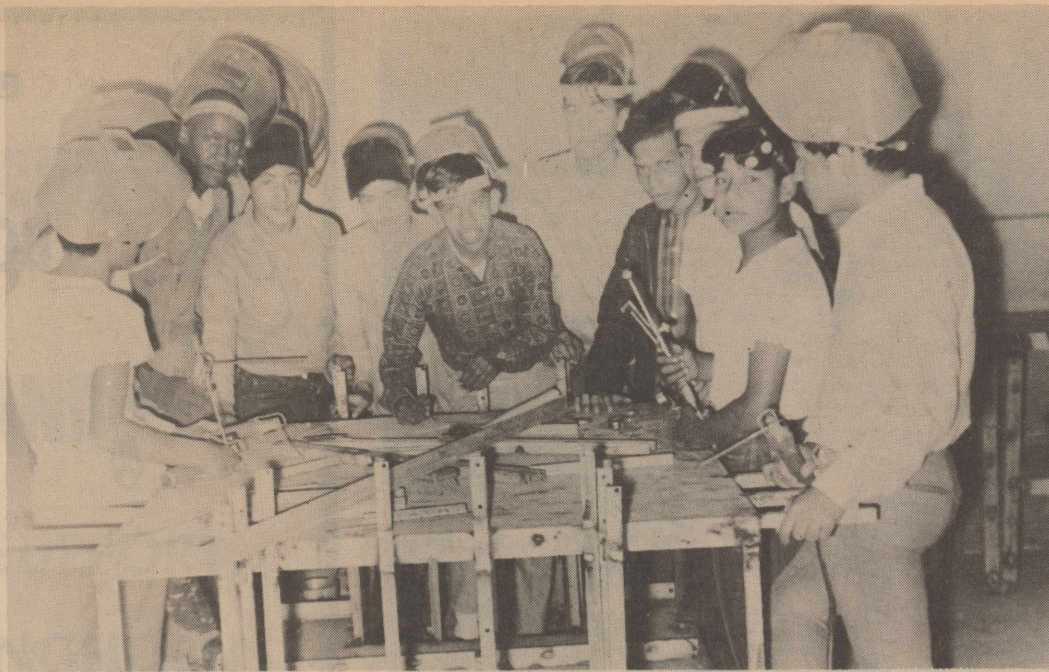

Melvin Barton, Dimmitt farmer and vice president of Grain Sorghum Producers Association, is in Washington, D. C. this week to attend a farm policy session with Secretary of Agriculture, Clifford Hardin.

Barton will attend the session as part of a farm coalition group showing the unity of farmers and farm organizations in asking Congress to extend the basic provisions of the 1965 Agriculture Act.

The farm coalition group is composed of 18 farm organizations. It includes representatives of three of the four

major farm organizations, and the organizations representing the commodity covered by the 1965 Farm Act. This is the fourth meeting of this group that GSPA has attended and the second one for Barton.

The group met with Secretary Hardin Monday afternoon. The purpose was to show the Secretary that most farmers and their organizations are in agreement on extending the basic objectives of the present farm programs.

Much has been said lately that agriculture must be unified before very much can be

expected from Congress in the way of farm legislation. It is hoped that these meetings will demonstrate the unity of the majority of the farmers toward extending the present law. There will be recommendations to improve it.

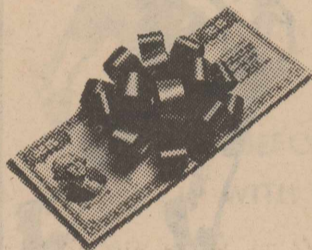

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## Financial Facts

The first chartered public bank in Sweden was founded in 1656.

Exclusive rights for the bank were given to John Palmstruch. At the time he was head of the Merchants' Guild. He was also a prominent miner.

The only capital he had was the cash on hand and mines. The bank was divided into two departments: The deposit branch which could make no loans. The loan department which was permitted to lend money.

Money could be lent on real estate and commodities. Ten percent interest was often charged.

Within two years the bank was issuing notes payable upon demand. Some were payable to order and some to bearer.

They were probably the first payable-on-demand bank bills ever issued.

# Hart Residents Attend Meet Moments OF Meditation

Check up on yourselves. Are you really Christian? Do you pass the test? Do you feel Christ's presence and power more and more within you? Or are you just pretending to be Christian?

If you were asked to give your definition of a Christian, you would provide many different answers.

Some would say "A Christian is one who believes in Jesus Christ as his Saviour," which would be a true but only a partial answer.

Some would say, "One who lives a good life," which would be an inadequate answer and, in a sense, a dangerous one.

Someone else might say, "One who keeps the ten commandments," which would also be inaccurate, since our Lord added an eleventh commandment - and one would also have to decide the implications of each of the ten commandments - and the all-embracing eleventh.

As a matter of fact, it is not possible to put into a few words any definition of a Christian. It

is easy to define an atheist as one who believes there is no God, or an agnostic as one who simply admits that he does not know whether there is a God or not.

But a Christian cannot be defined as one who believes in God or in Christ - for the ramifications of Christian faith go far beyond such belief.

Probably the best and most complete definition of a Christian is found in Paul's letter to the Romans, in the twelfth chapter.

First, a Christian is one, who recognizing the debt which he owes to God, dedicates himself wholly to His service. (Rom. 12:1)

Second, a Christian is one who has become a new and different person. (Rom. 12:2)

Third, a Christian is one who perpetually examines his life. (Rom. 12:3)

Fourth, a Christian is one who uses his talents as a supplement to the work of other Christians. (Rom. 12:4-5)

Fifth, a Christian is one who loves everybody. (Rom. 12:9-10, 14, 15, 18 and 20).

Yes, the final proof of a Christian is his LOVE. How do you measure up?

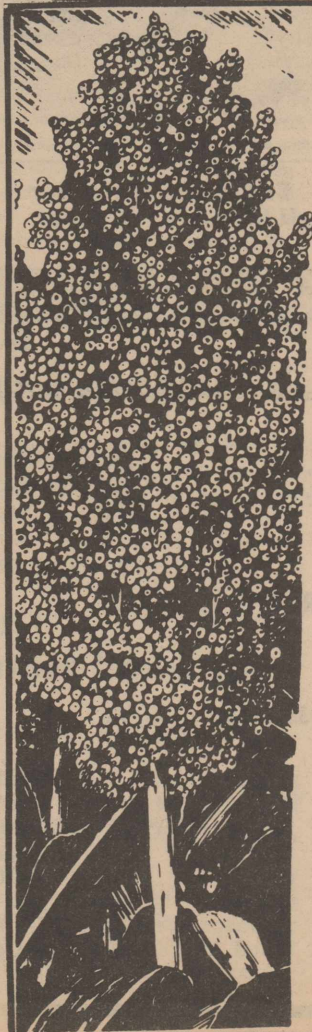
