

Sorting is done electronically by means of magnetic numbers. There are two sets of numbers along the lower part of each check. The first set is used by the Federal Reserve Collection System.

The second set is the individual code alloted to bank customers. There are no two checking account codes alike.

After sorting according to banks, the amounts are totaled. These attached to each check bundle. Messengers from each bank go senger receives checks drawn on his own bank.

When differences are computed, settlements are made.
