Governor Preston Smith in an official memorandum said, "Texas 100,000 4-H members are observing National 4-H Club Week, Oct. 5-11.

"The purpose of 4-H work is to give equal training to the Head, Heart, Hands and Health of Texas young people and to help prepare them to be better leaders and citizens who will fit into society where their life's work may take them.

"4-H is a part of the educational program of the Texas A&M University Cooperative Extension Service and is supervised on the local level by county Extension agents along with the help of 19,000 local volunteer 4-H leaders who are outstanding men and women in their local communities.

"Texas 4-H members, working with over 202,529 educational learn-by-doing projects, apply the latest research and scientific information to their work, keeping records, arranging exhibits and giving demonstrations as means of passing information learned to

others.

"The leadership and citizenship training which 4-H members receive is a valuable asset to our democratic way of life."

The governor urged all citizens to support and encourage the work of the "To Make the Best Better" organization.

The state 4-H Club leaders say that National 4-H Club Week observances are being held in many local and county clubs, and are hopeful that parents and other interested persons will attend. "It's a real opportunity to see 4-H members in action and to learn firsthand of the many worthwhile training experience offered to youth through the program," they noted.

They point out that 4-H programs have changed through the years and now include projects and activities for rural, suburban and urban youth. Local county Extension agents or local leaders can supply information on how to start a 4-H Club in your neighborhood.

### Funeral Services Held For H.E. 'Pappy' Loman

Funeral services were held at 2:30 p. m. Sunday in the First Baptist Church for H. E. "Pappy" Loman, pioneer resident and longtime railroad telegraph operator.

Officiating were the Rev. C. T. Cunningham, pastor, and the Rev. G. C. Applewhite of Lone Star, former pastor of the Hart Baptist Church. Burial was in Hart Cemetery under the direction of Lemons Funeral Home.

Loman died at 5:45 p. m. Thursday in Plains Memorial Hospital in Dimmitt where he had been a patient since Wednesday. He had been in ill health for some time.

Born Dec. 1, 1888 in Longview, Ill., he began his career with the Chicago Eastern Illinois Railway in Jamesburg, Ill. when he was 16 years old.

He worked with the Fort Worth and Denver, Rock Island and Santa Fe lines and was the first telegrapher at Lubbock when the railroad was extended from Plainview and Lubbock.

Loman retired from railroad employment Nov. 1, 1966 after 50 years service. Prior to his retirement, he had not taken a day off in 20 months.

His most gratifying memory of his career was that it was never marred by a railway tragedy.

After the death of his first wife in 1927 in Hartley, Loman was married to the former Myrt Pistole at Lelia Lake Aug. 1, 1930. She is regional correspondent for newspapers in Plainview, Dimmitt, Lubbock and Amarillo.

Loman was preceded in death by a daughter, Mrs. Jim-

mie Brown in 1954 and by a son, Wayne Loman, Jan. 4, 1969.

Survivors include his wife; two grandsons, Corky Stringer of Riverside, Calif. and Skeet Stringer of Anaheim, Calif.; a granddaughter, Mrs. Jackie Frye of St. Louis, Mo.; a niece, Mrs. Charles Fanakos of Champaign, Ill. and a nephew, Raymond Loman of Newman, Ill.

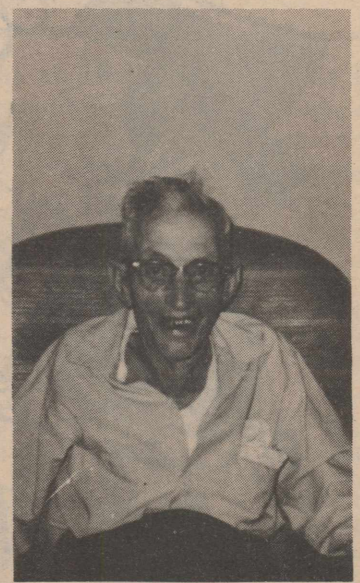

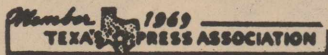

## Financial Facts

By Willis A. Hawkins, Jr.

Before checks reach the clearinghouse they must be sorted. The checks are separated according to the banks on which they are drawn.

Sorting is done electronically by means of magnetic numbers. There are two sets of numbers along the lower part of each check. The first set is used by the Federal Reserve Collection System.

The second set is the individual code allotted to bank customers. There are no two checking account codes alike.

After sorting according to banks, the amounts are totaled. These totals are recorded on slips and attached to each check bundle.

Messengers from each bank go to the clearinghouse with packages of checks. Packages are then exchanged. Thus each messenger receives checks drawn on his own bank.

When differences are computed, settlements are made.

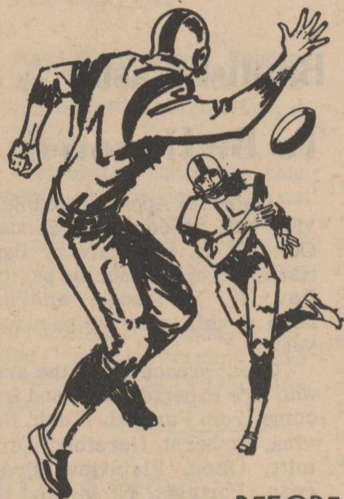

## Hart Loses First Game Of Season To Vega, 20-15

The Vega Longhorns tripped the Hart Longhorns 20-15 at Vega Friday night to knock the Hart Horns from the ranks of the undefeated.

The game was marred by numerous fumbles on the part of the Hart team and the big majority of the fumbles came in the last half.

The game started as the Vega Horns kicked the ball to Hart. Danny Smith received the ball on the Hart 15 and scampered 20 yards on the first run of the game. The Hart Horns began play from their own 35.

Hart looked as though they might just go for a touchdown, but they lost the ball on downs on the Vega 20 yard line. Vega too looked like they might take the ball in for a score and with the ball on the Hart 45 they proved it.

Halfback Jackie Richardson took the ball in from the Hart 45 to make the score 6-0 in favor of the Vega Horns. The Hart Horns found themselves getting nowhere the rest of the first period.

The Vega team could do hardly any wrong for a while. The first quarter ended with the score still 6-0.

Early in the second quarter the Vega Horns began moving the ball again to Hart's goal. This time it was moved by short passes and finally Bronc May threw a T. D. pass of 18 yards to Mike Hall for Vega's second touchdown.

The run for the extras was no good and that left the score at 12-0 in favor of Vega.

Near the end of the half Hart got a drive going. With the ball on the Vega 40, quarterback Harold Bennett threw a 40 yard strike to Quincy Hawkins.

Hart faked the kick for the extras and Jerry Heller threw the ball to Donnie Black for the two extras. That left the score at the half at Vega 12 and Hart 8.

The Hart Horns again received the kickoff to begin the second half. With short running plays the Horns began pushing downfield. But fumbleitis struck Hart and they lost the ball.

Vega was not to be denied either. The Vega Horns also were moving the ball well. Vega moved the ball down to the Hart one foot line where they were stopped by a fine goal-line stand on the part of Hart. Hart began moving the ball from there.

A running play took them out to the seven. But again the Horns were plagued by a fumble and they lost the ball on their own 7-yard line. From there Vega had little trouble running the ball in.

The touchdown was made by Bronc May on a 4-yard run. The run for the extra points was good and Vega led 20-8 at the end of the third period.

During the fourth and last quarter the Hart Horns began

to come alive as they were beginning to run the ball well and they were holding Vega down to almost nothing.

The only thing that hurt the Hart Horns the most in the last quarter was their fumbling. But Vega found a little bit of Hart's fumbling and it was recovered by Jerry Heller to set up Hart's last score.

After Heller recovered the fumble on the Vega 45, the Horns began to move the ball well. They moved the ball down to the one yard line where Danny Smith blasted in for the 6 points.

Johnny Ethridge kicked the extra points to make the score 20-15 in favor of Vega.

Later in the period the Hart Horns got the ball back and looked as though they would go in for another score, but they lost the ball on another fumble. Vega could do no better and gave the ball right back.

With the ball on the Vega 35 yard line the Hart Horns tried to score. But with all their timeouts gone the time ran out on the Horns and the game ended with the score Vega Longhorns 20 and the Hart Longhorns 15.

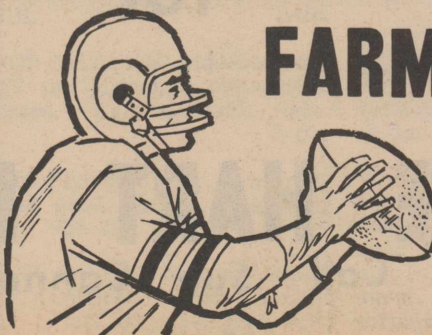

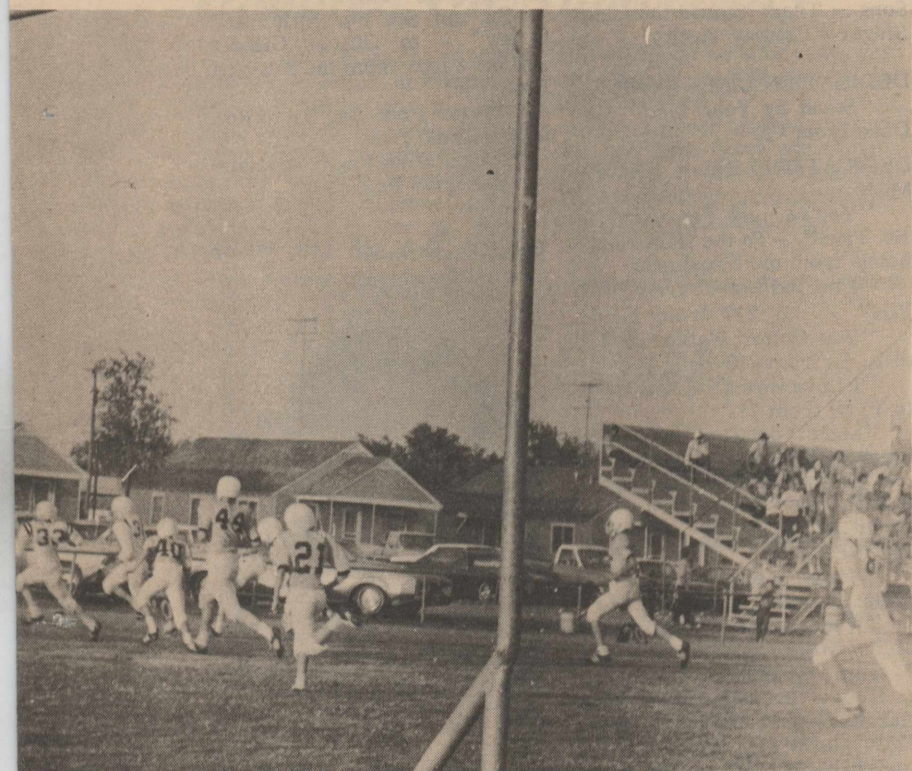

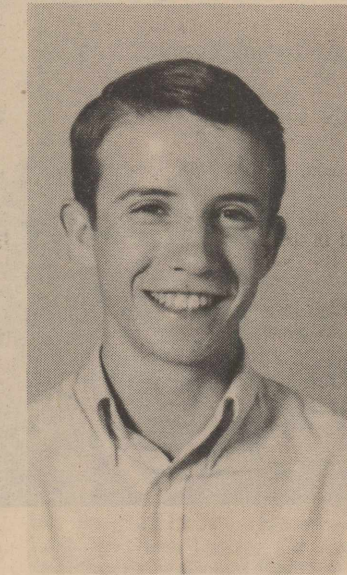

# Lions Clubs Of Texas Help Many Needy People

The Lions Clubs of Texas have a long reach, and the good their members do extends far beyond the borders of their state. Today, the words "Texas" and "Lions" carry a special meaning to men, women and children burdened with a heritage of centuries of poverty.

By donating \$6,230 to CARE during the past year, Texas Lions have contributed to the welfare of many needy people around the world.

They provided aid to the needy sick of three continents through MEDICO, a service of CARE. In Hong Kong, they co-sponsored a school gardening competition aimed at increasing food production. They supplied materials to build three new schools in Honduras and also built and equipped a school in Guatemala.

Lions Clubs throughout the nation contributed \$147,666 to help support CARE projects in 23 countries. Farmers were provided with seeds and hand tools; school children were given school supplies; the tools of the trade were supplied to carpenters, masons, shoemak-

ers, auto mechanics and other skilled craftsmen; midwives were equipped with modern, sanitary supplies to deliver healthy babies; seamstresses were given sewing machines.

In all, Lions built 81 schools last year and provided school desks for more than 1,600 children, installed water systems in four Central American villages, and an artesian well in the Philippines. Lions aided the blind of India, Pakistan and Ceylon by providing educational aids, Braille typewriters and duplicating machines.
